RULES

BURTON-ON-TRENT GENERAL INFIRMARY.

TITLE

GOVERNORS

The ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the GOVERNORS will be held at the Nursing Institution (kindly lent) Union Street, Burton-on-Trent, on Friday, 6th June, 1941, at 12 o'clock noon.

To receive the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year 1940.

To elect Officers.

To elect Committee.

To receive and if so decided to adopt revised Rules, (draft of which is attached hereto).

The President, Colonel The Rt. Hon. John Gretton, P.C., C.B.E., M.P., will take the Chair.

DRAFT.

RULES.

TITLE.

1. The Title of the Institution shall be "The Burton-on-Trent General Infirmary" and it is hereinafter referred to as "The Infirmary."

GOVERNORS.

2. (a) Each person subscribing one guinea or more annually shall be a Governor during the continuance of the Subscription.

(b) The nominee of any Trustees, Company, Firm or Society making an annual subscription or contribution of one guinea or more shall be a Governor during the continuance of such subscription or contribution.

(c) Ministers of Religion whose congregations make an annual contribution of three guineas or more shall be Governors for twelve months from the date of payment.

(d) The President, Vice-Presidents, Honorary Treasurer, and the members of the Honorary Staff, shall be Governors while holding office.

(e) The six representatives of the Burton-on-Trent and District General Infirmary Contributory Association (hereinafter called the "Contributory Association") who are for the time being members of the Committee under Rule 6 shall be Governors.

(f) Any person who has rendered conspicuous service to the Infirmary may be appointed a Life Governor on the recommendation of the Committee.

SUBSCRIPTIONS.

3. (a) All Subscriptions are payable in advance and are considered to be for the current year at the time of subscribing and as terminating on the 31st day of December next ensuing.

(b) No subscriber six months in arrears shall be entitled to any right or privilege in respect of such subscription until the arrears are discharged.

(c) Each annual subscriber shall be entitled to receive Recommendation Notes of such nature and number as may from time to time be determined by the Committee, for the purpose of providing free treatment for poor and necessitous persons.

OFFICERS.

4. The Officers shall consist of The President, the Vice-Presidents, the Honorary Treasurer and the Honorary Auditor. They shall retire at each Annual General Meeting but shall be eligible for re-election. The President and the Honorary Treasurer shall be ex-officio members of the Committee.

MEETINGS OF GOVERNORS.

5. (a) An Annual General Meeting of Governors shall be held on such date and at such time and place as shall be determined by the Committee to receive the Annual Report of the Committee, the Statement of Accounts for the previous year and the Auditor's Report thereon, and to elect the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Auditor and the Committee for the ensuing year.

(b) A Special Meeting of Governors may be held at any time decided by the Committee or at the request of twenty Governors by application in writing to the Superintendent and Secretary.

(c) Notice of the Annual or any Special Meeting of Governors shall be given in one or more of the local papers at least seven days previous to the date of the Meeting.

COMMITTEE.

6. (a) The management of the Infirmary shall be vested in a Committee which shall consist of :

Five Ex-officio members, viz. :

The President.

The Mayor for the time being of Burton-on-Trent.

The Honorary Treasurer.

Two representatives of the Honorary Staff to be elected by the Medical Board.

Six representatives of the Contributory Association to be elected annually by the Association.

Not more than eighteen other members of whom one-third shall retire annually but shall be eligible for re-election at the Annual General Meeting.

7. The Committee shall have the control of the finances of the Infirmary and all such administrative powers as may be necessary for carrying out the operations and objects of the Infirmary in accordance with these Rules. They shall also have the following special powers :

(a) To give the necessary orders for any expenditure of an extraordinary nature, the sale of any property of the Infirmary and the investment of Capital Funds, provided that such orders shall not be valid unless made by the Committee at a Meeting for which due notice of such business has been given in the Notice of the Meeting.

(b) At their first Meeting after the Annual General Meeting of Governors to appoint from their members a House Committee and such other Sub-Committees as they shall think needful for the purpose of the general management of the Infirmary.

(c) To fill any vacancy that may occur on the Committee or amongst the Officers until the next Annual General Meeting of Governors.

(d) To make such Bye-Laws or Regulations as they may think fit with regard to the general management and administration of the Infirmary or to any matter not provided for by these Rules, and generally to settle and deal with any matter that may arise as they may deem expedient in the interests of the Infirmary.

MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE.

8. (a) Meetings of the Committee shall be held monthly and at the first Meeting after the Annual General Meeting they shall appoint a Chairman and a Vice-Chairman. The Chairman of the Meeting shall have a casting vote in addition to his own vote.

(b) Five Members of the Committee shall form a quorum.

(c) The Minutes of the proceedings of every Meeting of the Committee shall be recorded by the Secretary and shall be confirmed at the following meeting and signed by the Chairman.

PROPERTY AND INVESTMENTS.

9. (a) Such of the freehold Properties and Investments of the Infirmary as the Committee shall from time to time determine (except such part thereof as shall, in the opinion of the Committee, be required for the current working and expenses of the Infirmary) shall be vested in Lloyds Bank Limited, (hereinafter called "The Bank") as Trustee for and on behalf of the Infirmary. The Bank shall hold the said Property and Investments, whether present or future both as regards capital and income, upon trust to deal with the same as the Committee shall from time to time by resolution direct. A copy of any such resolution, certified under the hands of the Chairman of the Meeting at which it was passed and the Secretary, shall be sufficient authority for the Bank to act thereunder, and the Bank

shall be free from all responsibility or liability for any act or thing done in pursuance of and in conformity with any such resolution. Without its previous consent in writing the Bank shall not be bound to hold leasehold property or any Property or Investment involving personal liability, nor to deal with the same in any manner involving personal liability, and shall be responsible for such Property and Investments only as may, for the time being, be standing in its name or in that of its nominee.

(b) The Bank shall be indemnified against risk and expense out of the said Property and Investments and shall be entitled to act as Banker and retain any banking profits accruing by reason of its acting as Banker, and shall also be entitled to retain the customary share of brokerage on the sale, purchase, or other dealing in investments (without being liable to account therefor).

LEGACIES AND SPECIAL DONATIONS.

10. (a) If no condition has been imposed by a Testator or a Donor, all moneys received shall be applied to the purposes of the Infirmary at the discretion of the Committee.

(b) The receipt of the Honorary Treasurer shall be a good discharge for all legacies paid to or for the use of the Infirmary.

HONORARY MEDICAL AND SURGICAL STAFF.

11. The Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff shall be appointed by the Committee and shall consist of such number of Physicians and Surgeons as the Committee may from time to time determine. In appointments made subsequently to the date hereof candidates for the position of Honorary Physician shall be Doctors in Medicine of a British or Irish University or Fellows or Members of a Royal College of Physicians, shall be registered according to the Medical Act, and shall not be engaged in general practice; candidates for the position of Honorary Surgeon shall be Masters in Surgery of a British or Irish University or Fellows of one of the Royal Colleges of Surgeons, shall be registered according to the Medical Act, and shall not be engaged in general practice.

In addition to the foregoing appointments there shall also be such number of Assistant Physicians and Assistant Surgeons and other Medical Officers in charge of Special Departments as the Committee may decide upon.

AUDITOR.

12. The Accounts of the Infirmary shall be examined annually by the Auditor, who shall be a Chartered Accountant and shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting each year. The Auditor shall be paid such fee or honorarium as the Committee shall determine.

PATIENTS.

13. (a) Patients, whether In-Patients or Out-Patients, must at the time of their admission produce a Voucher from the Contributory Association or other recognized Hospital Contributory Scheme. Poor and necessitous Patients will receive free treatment but must produce a Subscriber's Recommendation.

(b) Cases which are urgent or arise from accident may be admitted without a Voucher or Subscriber's Recommendation, but such Voucher or Recommendation must be provided subsequently.

(c) A patient who is eligible to be a Member of a Contributory Association but who presents a Subscriber's Recommendation will not be eligible to receive free treatment.

(d) Any patient who is eligible to be a Member of a Contributory Association but who is not a member, will be required to pay such charges towards the cost of treatment and maintenance as may be determined by the Committee.

69 of the deaths occurred within 48 hours of admission.

It will be seen that in spite of the somewhat difficult conditions that have existed during the year there has been a considerable increase in the volume of work carried out, the total number of In-Patients admitted being 2,458 compared with 2,085 last year whilst new Out-Patients and Casualties numbered 9,939 as against 8,785. Under the Emergency Hospital Scheme 107 In-Patients and 424 Out-Patients were treated.

In order to allow of the admission of more patients from the Waiting List arrangements have been made for the transfer of some of the In-Patients in the convalescent stage to the Belvedere House Hospital. This arrangement has relieved the position considerably but the Waiting List remains a source of much concern to the Committee.

Finance. Receipts on Maintenance Account shew an increase of £9,708, due principally to the substantial advance in the amount raised by the first year's working of the Contributory Scheme, the resumption of payments by the Ministry of Health under the Emergency Hospital Scheme, and increased receipts on account of Services rendered.

Maintenance costs, however, (which last year exceeded income by nearly £5,000) have again advanced by £2,634, the main increase being under the head of Salaries and Wages, special Nursing salaries in connection with the Emergency Hospital Scheme amounting to £1,965, compared with £1,049 last year. Coal and slack also shews a considerable increase, which is due to the fact that for a large part of the year it was necessary to heat the new Ward Block and the Nurses' Home in addition to the existing buildings.

In addition payments to other hospitals for the treatment of Contributory Scheme members amounted to £1,696.

The net result shews a surplus of £543 on the year's working, the previous deficit of £5,367 on maintenance account being reduced to £4,824.

There is every reason to anticipate a still further increase in maintenance costs during the present year. Apart from the increasing prices of many commodities, Nurses salaries

have been increased under a scheme arranged by the Ministry of Health and the British Hospitals Association, and although these increases will be subsidised by the Government, more than one-half of the cost will fall upon the hospitals. Moreover it is hoped that some part of the increased accommodation provided by the extensions will become available during the year. Every effort therefore will be necessary to bring about a further substantial increase of income, in order to meet the increased expenditure and to reduce the existing deficit.

The Committee desires again to record its sincere appreciation of the loyal support received from subscribers and friends. Special thanks are due to the Ladies Flag Day Committee, under the chairmanship of Mrs. Manners, for the remarkable result of their annual effort which realised £663, a total more than £200 over any previous year; and to the Mayor (Councillor J. Jones, J.P.) and the Committee responsible for the organization of the Mayor's Annual Infirmary Ball, the proceeds of which, £405, also created a new record. The Committee would also express its sincere thanks for the valuable support rendered by those friends who promoted or assisted in numerous special efforts and entertainments on behalf of the Infirmary and also for the continued help rendered by the Clergy, Ministers and Congregations in connection with the Infirmary Sunday Collections.

Contributory Scheme. The success which has attended the establishment of the Contributory Scheme has been well-maintained and in its first full year's working the amount raised was £19,085, whilst in addition the sum of £671 was received from outside Contributory Schemes for the treatment of their members. On the other hand treatment for members of the scheme at outside hospitals has cost £1,696, but when the additional accommodation provided by the new Ward Block can be brought into use this figure should show a reduction.

The Committee would tender its congratulations and sincere thanks to the Contributory Scheme Committee, Collectors and Officials for the excellent result that has been achieved.

Extensions. Progress in connection with the completion of the Extensions Scheme has been disappointingly slow, but in view of the tremendous difficulties caused by war conditions with regard to labour and supplies of material this has been unavoidable. The new Nurses' Home is now completed and furnished and will be occupied very shortly. The 160-bed Ward Block is practically complete; the last of the special Sub-Contractors are now nearing the end of their task and most of the necessary Surgical equipment and Ward furniture has been received; whilst the new Boiler House has been in commission for some time.

In connection with the Nurses' Home a number of generous and greatly appreciated promises have been received to defray the furnishing of bedrooms at a cost of £30 per room. A list of these is appended and cards indicating the donors are attached to the bedrooms so furnished. The Committee would record its sincere thanks for this further generous support, and at the same time would bring to the notice of other friends this opportunity of shewing, in a practical manner, their interest in the improved accommodation for the Nursing Staff provided by the new Home.

A most useful addition to the equipment has been made by Mrs. Manners, who has very kindly provided an electric linen-marking machine, which has already proved of great service in the considerable task of marking the large quantities of linen required for the new Wards and the Nurses' Home.

Personal. The death of Colonel F. H. L. Meynell, D.S.O., a Vice-President of the Infirmary, is recorded with deep regret. In addition to being a generous supporter, Colonel Meynell had also been one of its Trustees for 22 years.

On leaving the district Colonel F. F. Burghard, C.B. resigned his position as Honorary Consulting Surgeon, which he had held for the past 18 years, and the Committee would record its grateful appreciation of his valuable services.

Gifts. Although owing to War conditions the result of the yearly Egg Collection organized by the Burton Daily Mail was much reduced, the Committee would again express its sincere thanks for the efforts of all whose work and gifts made a most welcome and valuable contribution.

Very substantial help was also received during the year in the shape of gifts of garden produce. These were on a much larger scale than ever before and considerably eased the difficulties caused by the existing abnormal conditions.

In conclusion sincere thanks are tendered for the many gifts received from numerous friends and from the Churches, Chapels and Schools; to the contributors of donations and gifts for Christmas festivities; to the Press, the Police and the Fire Brigade; to the voluntary stretcher-bearers; and to all friends and helpers whose many and varied services have been of such great value to the institution.

CONTRIBUTORY ASSOCIATION.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, 1941.

Twelve months ago in my report I was not able to cover a complete twelve months work of the Contributory Scheme; now we have the results of a full year's working, which is particularly interesting, as it enables us to appreciate more fully the real merits of the Scheme.

During the year we have encountered many difficulties due to war conditions—labour being transferred from Industry in the interests of the National War Effort; female and juvenile labour has in many cases substituted adult male labour; consequently the results will not appear so striking as they would have done in happier times. Naturally, therefore, during such a period the membership of the Contributory Association is likely to fluctuate and is certainly dependent for its success more and more upon the goodwill of employers and employees alike.

The income of the Scheme for 1941 reached the total of £19,085 12s., this being an increase of £4,515 on the 1940 figure, and compared with the 1939 total which was raised under the Saturday Collection, we have an increase of £8,875. The sum of £17,566 0s. 9d., was contributed through the various works and establishments affiliated to the scheme, facilities having been made available in many cases for deduction of weekly contributions from the wages and in other cases permission given for the contributions to be collected by representative workers. Honorary collectors representing the Association in various parts of the town and the village districts served by the Infirmary were responsible for collecting £1,099 10s. 6d., and individual contributors paid direct to the Secretary's Office £420 0s. 9d.

The Committee recognise that the success of the Contributory Scheme is dependent upon the fullest co-operation between the employers and employed, and the Honorary Collectors

who so willingly placed their time and service at our disposal, and I sincerely recognise this valued assistance.

During the year more reciprocal arrangements have been made with Contributory Schemes in other parts of the country. By such arrangements contributors and their dependants admitted to hospitals in other areas may obtain assistance towards the cost of treatment in those hospitals. Payments made to outside hospitals for such services to contributors or their dependants have been very heavy, and amount to £1,697.

The Committee are anxious that the Scheme shall be able to meet and provide the full maintenance cost of its members and their dependants receiving treatment at the Infirmary, and at the same time recognise that we have a responsibility towards finding some part of the cost of the treatment of the poor and necessitous persons, and it is their business to consider ways and means of increasing the income of the scheme so that this aim of meeting our indebtedness to the Infirmary will be accomplished.

We look forward with great anticipation to the opening of the new Hospital. The long list of patients awaiting admission, we realise, cannot be reduced until there is more accommodation available, but increased income will be very necessary to meet maintenance costs of the services which will be provided by the new hospital and the developments in Medical and Surgical science, and I am confident that we shall not be slow in responding to any call which is made upon us to meet this increased expenditure.

I should like to place on record on behalf of the members of the Contributory Association our grateful thanks to the following :—

The Hon. Surgical and Medical Staff and the Nursing Staff for their devoted service to contributors and their dependants and to poor and needy persons attending the Infirmary. We are indeed grateful to everyone of them.

The contributors for their loyal support to the Association, and the Employers of Labour for their co-operation in arranging for contributions to be deducted from wages or collected by members of their Staffs.
