

Annual Meeting of Subscribers.

On Wednesday night, January 26th, the Annual Meeting of the Governors and Subscribers of these Institutions was held at the Selby Cottage Hospital, being presided over by Mr. W. T. Everatt, J.P. (vice-chairman). There was a numerous attendance.

THE SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Mr. Brabbs read the report as printed on pages 7, 8, and 9.

THE MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT

was presented by Dr. Todd, J.P., C.C., who stated that the out-patients during the year numbered 500, and attendances at surgery 3,000; bottles of medicine dispensed, 891; visits paid, 1,000; and there had been 300 accidents, which had mainly happened on the highways. This number made one a day, excluding Sundays, and they were a serious charge and responsibility on the Hospital. They involved deaths, and inquests to attend, and took up very much time of the staff and people who came in contact with them. There had been 246 operations—161 in the female ward and 85 in the male ward. The nurses had been very busy throughout the whole of the year.

The Chairman thought the Secretary's report was an excellent one, and covered all the ground necessary in the year's work. Dr. Todd had shown them the value of the Hospital in the way of providing relief and succour to those who had had accidents or illnesses.

On the proposition of Mr. J. H. Dixon, seconded by Mr. W. H. Staniland, the reports were unanimously approved.

THE TREASURER'S REPORT

was presented by Mr. W. E. Hodgson, and was of a satisfactory character, showing a balance in hand on the year. The total receipts for the year had been £1,367/14/5.

A discussion ensued in regard to the payment of fees for services, Dr. Todd pointing out that there had been motor patients who did not pay anything. He also stated that it was no uncommon thing to be sent for to go into the country to a motor accident and to find that the patient had been removed to another Hospital. He advised that each village should have a dressing-station, and individuals should be told off to obtain a doctor if necessary. They had had cases where the doctors had rushed out, and when they got there had found the patient had been taken somewhere else.

Mr. Dixon said they had a list of charges where there were no tickets, and he enquired whether it was not possible to enforce them from those who did not reside within the Riccall and Selby Rural Districts.

The Chairman: We can only do our best to get what we can from these people.

The meeting unanimously adopted the financial statement.

ELECTION OF GOVERNORS.

On the proposal of Mr. Dixon, seconded by Mr. Staniland, the reelection of the retiring Governors, with the addition of Mr. A. L. Cochrane in place of Mr. Ullathorne, who had become a life governor, was unanimously agreed to.

ELECTION OF OTHER OFFICIALS.

Mr. Mark Scott, J.P., was unanimously re-appointed president and chairman of the Institution for the ensuing year, and Mr. W. T. Everatt, J.P., was also re-elected vice-chairman. Mr. J. W. Pickles was unanimously re-elected auditor.

TO CREATE MORE INTEREST.

Mr. A. L. Cochrane raised the question of holding the annual meeting of subscribers to the Institution at a more convenient centre than at the Hospital, and on the proposal of Mr. Dixon, seconded by Mr. Cochrane, it was decided to ask the Governors to consider the matter of change of venue for the next annual gathering.

SUBSTANTIAL GIFT FROM THE WORKINGMEN.

Mr. Blacow, on behalf of the Selby and District Workpeople's Hospital Committee presented to the meeting a cheque for £350.

The Chairman proposed a vote of thanks to the committee for their gift, and spoke of the generous support they had received from them. He was sure they were all deeply indebted to them for their gift, which was a very good start for the year, but he hoped that next year it would be £700. He felt sure they could do it. He reminded them that the Governors' responsibilities would be considerably more.

Mr. Hodgson: I would not limit them to £700.

Mr. Theasby: We may have a little surprise packet for you next week.

Mr. Staniland seconded the vote of thanks, which was unanimously adopted.

THANKS TO MEDICAL OFFICERS AND STAFF.

Mr. Dixon proposed a vote of thanks to the Medical and Nursing Staffs for the admirable way in which they had carried out their work during the past year. He referred to the gratitude of the patients who had been treated there, and said they were highly satisfied with the work done, and when they took into consideration the fact that there were cases going into the Hospital which was not well equipped for them, and when they heard of the Nursing Staff being without rest for several days and not even having their clothes off, they were bound to feel that the work which they had been doing was very strenuous. The Medical Staff had been hard-worked too, but they had done it satisfactorily. He moved the resolution of thanks.

Mr. Illingworth seconded the resolution, which was unanimously

approved.

Dr. Todd said the best thanks they could possibly have was when their work ended in alleviation and cure.

OTHER THANKS.

Mr. W. J. Hanlay proposed a vote of thanks to the Treasurer and Auditor, which was seconded by Mr Clark and agreed to.

Mr. Hongson replied and said it was a pleasure to do what they could to help the Hospital. He appealed for increased assistance in the way of subscriptions.

Mr. T. Hall proposed a like compliment to the Chairman, and spoke of his labours on behalf of the Institution.

Mr. Theasey seconded, and thought they had got a Chairman who could put a lot of time in to carry on the building scheme successfully.

This was agreed to.

Mr. Everatt replying said it give him a tremendous amount of pleasure to do what he could to help the Hospital on its way. It was a work in which he had been deeply interested since the war, for he saw a great deal of it in France, and he felt that if he could do anything at all to help forward the splendid work he certainly would do it to the best of his ability. It was impossible to do it by himself. He had many valuable lieutenants in the way of governors and subscribers, but for whom the work would probably have fallen very flat. He thanked them for all they had done in the past, and remarked that their chief point was to raise money for the new Hospital, the prospect in connection with which in view of the industrial trouble was very good. It was astonishing where the money came from, but he hoped the subscriptions would be doubled and then they would secure the £2,000 required for the upkeep of the new Hospital, and he hoped that they would all put their weight into it and persuade others to contribute. He thanked them for re-electing him their vice-chairman, and was sorry that Mr. Scott was not able to be with them, and he asked them to send that gentleman a letter of appreciation of his services and their remembrance of him, and the hope that he would be spared for some years to be associated with the Institution.

Mr. Hanlay referred to the services of the Secretary (Mr. S. Brabbs), and spoke of his energies on behalf the Institution, and alluded with satisfaction to the very interesting report which he had presented to them that night. He moved thanks to him.

Mrs. Cochrane seconded and Mr. Dixon supported, and observed in view of previous remarks that he should be right in saying that the Workingmen's Hospital Committee were making an effort, whereby they hoped to present next year £1,000, if they could raise it. He spoke of the box system which they had inaugurated in the town, and said they were going into the villages and were hoping to place boxes there in the hope of securing more funds to the Hospital. They were not going to leave the burden of the Hospital to the subscribers in Selby simply, but were going to try the villages within the Riccall and Selby Rural Districts.

The Chairman added his testimony to the work which Mr. Brabbs had done, and said he felt grateful to him for what he had carried out for the Hospital.

The resolution, which was unanimously adopted, was briefly responded to by Mr. Brabbs, and the proceedings terminated.

THE ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE

Year ending 31st December, 1926.



The Governors of the Brooke Dispensary and Cottage Hospital present their Twenty-eighth Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1926.

They are pleased to report that a Credit Balance is shewn on the accounts of last year of £132/8/11, and it has been deemed advisable that this sum be transferred to the Deposit Account.

During the year 978 cases were medically treated at the Dispensary. There have been 246 cases admitted to the Hospital, of which 85 were men and 161 women and children, being an increase of 16 on the previous year. The cases generally have been of a more serious nature.

In another place will be found Tables giving particulars of the patients treated, and operations performed, during the year. These Tables can only be fully understood by those who have received a medical training, but it may be simply stated that almost every unit in the list includes someone who has been cured or relieved of some painful disease, which, in a proportion of the cases, would have led to a fatal termination.

As medical science increases the methods become more complex and elaborate. The most perfect equipment is essential for operative work, and the most skilful nursing is necessary. All these lead to increased expense, which is amply justified by improvements in the results, for lives are now saved, and cures effected, in a way which was impossible only a few years ago.

Attention must be drawn to the ever-growing number of motor and other accident cases which are brought to the Hospital.

Owing to the shortage of beds serious accidents and other cases have often to take the journey to other Hospitals outside the area.

"The sick of the country have a claim for housing as well as the healthy."—Sir Hy. Burdett.

The annual subscriptions and donations amount to the sum of £419/4/9, being a decrease of £100/17/9 on the previous year.

The total receipts for the past year amount to the sum of £1,367/14/5, and the total expenditure £1,262/6/4, which, as stated before, shews a credit balance.

Patients' payments are quite satisfactory. The general desire to pay as much as they can afford is the best testimony the work of the Hospital can receive, and this spirit makes the work of the Governors both pleasant and encouraging.

A large and steady subscription list is a necessary financial basis for this Institution, and the Governors appeal to all to give both liberally and promptly. The valuable assistance rendered by the Committee of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund has again been most pleasing, and to have secured such gratifying results, in view of the adverse conditions in industry, is a wonderful achievement, and reflects the highest credit on the general body of subscribers to the Fund. The Governors are much indebted to the Members of the Executive Committee of this Fund for their generous assistance.

The Annual Hospital Sunday Fund collections in Selby, for the Medical Charities of the town, took place in December last, when special services were held in the various places of worship. The collections amounted to the sum of £54, of this sum the Institution received £25/13/6.

Collections were also taken during the year in the Churches of various villages in the district on behalf of the Hospital.

The Governors are grateful to the clergy and ministers and the congregations at the various places of worship for their generous response to the appeal made on Hospital Sunday.

The Governors wish to express with deep regret the great loss the Institution has sustained during the year by the death of their President, the late Lieut.-Col. Hawdon, D.L., J.P., and take this opportunity of recording their appreciation of his valuable services in aid of the Hospital's work and development through all the stages of its existence.

The Governors again desire to place on record their indebtedness to the Members of the Honorary Staff and Medical Officer for the great zeal and energy displayed.

The Matron, Nurses and others have also shown a deep devotion to their respective duties, and it is due largely to them that the various sections of the Hospital working under their charge have shewn such excellent results.

To the local Press, the donors of gifts in kind, the organizers of entertainments and other efforts on behalf of the Hospital, the donors of special gifts for the patients at Christmas, the donors of cash and kind anonymously, and to all others who have helped in any way, the Governors express their deep gratitude and sincere thanks.

A most encouraging feature to the Governors and the staff is the large numbers of letters received from patients and their friends and from employers expressive of their gratitude for the treatment received at the Hospital.

The 20th of August, 1926, may be regarded as a red-letter day in the annals of Selby, that being the day on which the foundation stone of our new Hospital was laid by H.R.H. Princess Mary. A happy augury (we may hope) of the successful completion of our enterprise, and a manifestation of the Royal Family's interest in the care of the sick and injured. All sections of the community co-operated in giving the King's daughter a loyal reception, and all are deeply indebted to her for her gracious assistance on that day.

The Governors recognise that the full and complete attainment of the new Hospital is a formidable task, and that it will make a heavy demand upon the goodwill and charity of all who desire to increase the usefulness of Hospital work in Selby by the provision of a fuller service.

Without presumption the Governors venture to suggest a means whereby individuals or villagers in the surrounding districts, intimately associated with the Institution, can render a service of permanent value to the community, and that is by undertaking to meet the cost of some section of the new Institution, and thus fully identifying themselves with the scheme.

There is plenty of scope for public philanthropy, and it would be a timely and gracious act if those who are financially in a position to do so would adopt some portion of the work as their own. No similar expenditure could bestow so great a benefit on their fellow-citizens, and the association of the donor's name with a separate integral part of the Institution would form a lasting memorial of their kindness and munificence.

The Governors are fully conscious of their heavy responsibilities which they can only discharge by having the assurance of the continued generous support and hearty co-operation of all sections of the public.

For that support they do earnestly appeal.






