REPORT

Of the Committee for the Year 1928.

The Committee beg to submit the 39th Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1928.

Note.—In addition to the In-patients mentioned under sub-headings 4 and 5 above, 194 Out-patients received treatment during 1928, and 38 during 1927.

The Committee record with pleasure that, during the year just completed, Income has exceeded Expenditure by a considerable sum; the former was not, however, quite sufficient to clear off the accumulated deficiencies of 1925, 1926, and 1927, which have now been reduced to approximately £103.

The more satisfactory condition of the finances is, to a material extent, accounted for by the receipt of two anonymous donations of £50 and £10, respectively, which were expressly given by two generous contributors to partly defray the debt to the Bank, as on January 1st, 1928.

The usual annual Hospital Day collection was held on May 19th, and produced the substantial sum of £121 7s. 7d., which is approximately £7 more than was obtained in 1927.

The Bakers and Sweeps Charity Football Match Committee have again made a generous grant in aid of the funds, representing part of the proceeds of the match played on Boxing Day, 1927, the amount received by the Hospital being £71 16s. 8d.

The Alexandra Rose Day Committee awarded £55 in favour of the Institution, in recognition of the local collection in Cheshunt on June 13th, 1928, the organisers of which received very able assistance from Mrs. J. P. Thompson in the Waltham Cross district.

A Bazaar took place in the grounds of the Hospital in July. The opening ceremony was performed by Mr. and Mrs. F. O. Keysell, of Stevenage, who originally resided at Cheshunt.

The Committee were pleased to welcome two former parishioners on this occasion, and are gratified that the net takings amounted to £120 3s. 8d., including the donations received on that day.

Hamilton, the Hon. Organiser, forwarded a cheque for £50 at the suggestion of Mr. W. J. Molison; it is desired to accord to both of these gentlemen a suitable expression of thanks for their kindly interest.

The Institution is indebted to Major and Mrs. Savory for the generous gift of a Wireless Set, which has recently been presented, the cost of the necessary installation being guaranteed by two members of the Committee.

Miss A. M. Boole, who was appointed Matron in November, 1927, resigned after twelve months service, to take up a more important position at Ilfracombe. On her departure, the Committee recorded an expression of thanks in her favour for the efficient way in which she had carried out her duties during the time she had been connected with the Hospital.

Many applications were received for the vacant post, and considerable difficulty was experienced in selecting the most suitable candidate, and it was only after due deliberation that Miss I. M. Penny was appointed.

The Hospital is deeply indebted to the Medical Staff, the Masseuse and Nursing Staff, for their untiring services during the past year, efficient help being given to the latter by "V.A.D.'s" and probationers.

The officers and men of the Metropolitan Police, attached to Cheshunt Station, have, on many occasions, given kindly assistance in cases of emergency.

Sincere thanks are due to the Clergy and Ministers of all denominations who have visited the patients in the wards, and contributed to the funds by their congregational collections.

Finally, the Committee record their gratitude to Almighty God for His Blessing on the work of the Hospital.

RULES.



OBJECTS.

1.—THE COTTAGE HOSPITAL is intended for the reception of persons suffering from disease or accident, who cannot be properly treated in their own dwellings.

MANAGEMENT.

2.—The Hospital shall be controlled by a General Committee of not more than 15 persons, in addition to the President, Chairman, Medical Staff, Treasurer, and Hon. Secretary. The General Committee shall appoint the House Committee, consisting of 17 persons (at least 5 to be ladies); such Committee shall include the Medical Officer for the month, the Treasurer, and Hon. Secretary, and at least 6 members of the General Committee. The Chairman of the General Committee is ex-officio a member of the House Committee.

3.—The domestic arrangements shall be under the direction of the House Committee; the nursing and medical arrangements under the Medical Staff.

4.—The General Committee shall have power to frame Bye-laws for the regulation and management of the Institution, and shall have the power of appointing and dismissing the Matron and Nursing Staff.

5.—The Medical management of the Hospital shall be under the control of the Medical Staff. The doctor sending in a case will be responsible for it until he has arranged with the doctor for the month to take it over.

6.—The Matron, subject to the direction of the doctors in charge of the patients, shall keep a register of patients admitted and discharged, and all necessary books.

GENERAL MEETING.

7.—An Annual General Meeting of the Life Governors and Subscribers, to which the Public are also admitted, shall be held in the month of February in every year on a date to be fixed by the General Committee, when the audited accounts of the past year ending December 31st shall be submitted, and all Officers and members of the General Committee for the year shall be elected, not including the medical staff, new members of which shall be appointed by the General Committee, who also have the power to dismiss any member should occasion arise.

8.—The Secretary is empowered to call the General Committee together when required. On a requisition in writing, signed by not less than 5 members, the Secretary shall call the General Committee, giving 7 days' notice, stating the object of the meeting.

9.—A special meeting of the Life Governors and Subscribers may be called by the General Committee at any time, and shall be so called on a requisition for that purpose, signed by not less than 5 Life Governors or Subscribers, stating the object of the meeting, and handed to the Hon. Secretary not less than 14 days before the day proposed for the meeting. Seven days' notice of every special meeting, stating the object of the meeting, shall be given by circular or advertisement.

10.—All questions brought before a general meeting shall be decided by a show of hands, or by a poll (if so demanded) of those persons entitled to vote under Rule 17.

FINANCES.

11.—Annual subscriptions shall become due on the 1st of January in each year, and shall be deemed to be payable that day, unless notice of discontinuance shall have been previously given to the Hon. Secretary.

12.—The amount of weekly payment to be made by each patient shall be decided by the House Committee. No patient shall be admitted without a written undertaking by himself or by some responsible person on his behalf for payment of such weekly sum as shall thereafter be decided by the House Committee.

13.—A statement of the receipts and expenditure made up to the 31st December in each year shall be audited, and a printed copy with the report of the Committee forwarded to each Life Governor and Subscriber with the notice convening the General Meeting.

14.—The Committee may direct the investment of the funds of the Hospital, not required for current purposes, in the names of the Trustees, in the Public Funds, in securities guaranteed by the Government of India, or in such other securities as Trustees are by law permitted to invest trust moneys.

15.—There shall be 3 Trustees, in whom shall be vested all the property of the Hospital, upon trust, for the sole benefit of the Hospital, to be dealt with in such manner as the Committee for the time being may from time to time direct. The dividends, etc., of all investments shall be paid over to the Treasurer, whose receipt shall be a sufficient discharge.

PRIVILEGES OF SUBSCRIBERS.

16.—Donors of £21 or upwards shall be Life Governors, and as such shall be entitled to recommend 1 patient annually, and to vote at all General Meetings during the donors' life.

17.—Subscribers shall be entitled to recommend 1 patient annually for each 1 guinea annually subscribed, and, with subscribers of 10s. 6d., shall be entitled to vote at all General Meetings held during the year for which their subscriptions shall have been paid.

18.—A collection from a congregation shall entitle the minister of that congregation to privileges similar to those of a subscriber of 1 guinea. A collection by a Friendly Society shall entitle such Society, through its Secretary, to recommend within 1 year from receipt 1 patient (being a member, or his wife or child, of that society) for each 2 guineas collected; such patient to be free from liability to payment under Rule 12. In cases of joint collections by two or more Societies, the recommendations shall be divided between them as they may decide. In the event of a patient, admitted by a free ticket, having to remain in Hospital for a lengthened period, it is necessary that a second letter should be provided at the expiration of one month.

19.—No case, however recommended, shall be received into the Hospital without the approval of one of the Medical Staff.

PATIENTS.

20.—Cases of severe accident and urgent illness shall be admissible when there is room, and the admission of uninsured persons duly recommended under Rules 16, 17, and 18 shall be decided on by the doctor in charge of the case.

21.—Persons afflicted with Alcoholism, Mania, Epilepsy, Infectious, Contagious, or Incurable Diseases, shall not be admitted; nor shall any woman be admitted in an advanced stage of pregnancy.

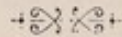
22.—Should a question arise as to the suitability of any case for treatment in the Hospital, the matter shall be submitted to a meeting of the Medical Staff specially summoned for that purpose, whose decision shall be final.

23.—The patients will not be permitted to receive food or drink from any source without the sanction of the Medical Attendant or Matron, and such must be submitted to the Matron before the ward is entered.

24.—Patients may be visited by their friends (not more than 2 at the same time) between the hours of 2.30 and 4.30 p.m. on Sundays, between 3 and 4 p.m. on Thursdays, and by special permission at any time. These visits will at all times be subject to the discretion of the Doctors or Matron.

25.—Provided there is ample room in the Hospital, the House Committee may, in their discretion, admit paying patients; the fees for the same and any special case being fixed by the said Committee.

26.—These rules may be altered or added to at any General Meeting, but no such alteration or addition shall be made unless written notice of the same shall have been given to the Hon. Secretary 14 days at least before the day of meeting. Notice of such proposed alterations shall be sent to each Life Governor and Subscriber with the notice convening the meeting.
