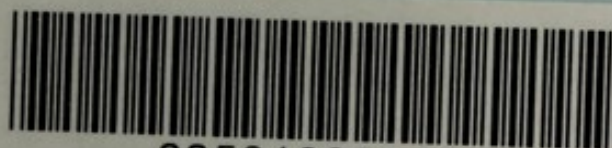

Report of the Committee of Management for the Year 1944

The Committee of Management has pleasure in presenting its report for the year 1944, which, as an economy measure, is again in condensed form.

The year 1944 proved to be, without doubt, one of the most difficult ever experienced by the Committee. The early months augured well for another year of outstanding work. Then in the summer, with the advent of "flying-bomb" attacks, the work became beset by difficulties, all of which, we are glad to state, were successfully overcome, but which, nevertheless, considerably affected both the volume of work carried out and the normal smooth-running of the Hospital. This should be kept in mind when reading the reports of the separate Departments, which follow.

ADMINISTRATION.—We regret to have to report the death during the year of Mrs. Leon Rees, who had been a valued colleague for many years, and had taken a keen personal interest in the work until the onset of her long illness.

The following members of the Committee of Management retire, in accordance with the Articles of Association, but are eligible and offer themselves for re-election to the Committee:—Mrs. E. Levine, Mrs. L. Magnus, Miss B. Oppenheimer.

The Auditors, Messrs. Lionel H. Lemon & Co., also retire, but are eligible and offer themselves for re-election.

During the year the Committee, through its representatives, continued to take an active part in discussions affecting both the present and future work of the specialist maternity hospitals of the Country as a whole and of London in particular and the hospital will, it is very much hoped, play an important part in the post-war maternity work of London, when established in the new building at Lordship Road, Stoke Newington.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.—The Annual Meeting was held at the Dorchester Hotel, W.1, on 21st June, 1944, formal business only being transacted.

IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.—The number of patients delivered at the Hampton Court Hospital in the year totalled 465. In view of the large scale evacuation of expectant mothers, both from London and the immediate neighbourhood of the Hospital, the total of 465 cases must be considered most satisfactory, and reflects credit on the reputation of the Hospital.

Minor damage was sustained to the Hospital premises, but the work was, fortunately, not interrupted.

In August, following an appeal from the Ministry of Health for assistance, the Committee undertook the staffing of one of the Ministry's emergency maternity homes, in Yorkshire, opened for the reception of expectant mothers evacuated under the official scheme. The change-over of staff was speedily and efficiently accomplished, but unfortunately the number of patients eventually sent to this emergency home by the authorities proved to be too small for the effort to be of real advantage, due, no doubt, to the reluctance of mothers to travel so far from their homes.

ANTE-NATAL CLINICS.—The clinics continued throughout the year, meeting weekly at our Whitechapel premises, and fortnightly at Hampton Court. It is praiseworthy to record that notwithstanding serious damage to the building at Underwood Road only one clinic had to be postponed pending first-aid repairs. The total attendances at the clinics were only slightly below those for the previous year.

POST-NATAL CLINICS.—Attendances in this department were seriously affected by the evacuation of the mothers, but the clinics were, nevertheless, held regularly throughout the year.

INFANT WELFARE CENTRE.—Detailed statistics of the work of the Centre will be found on page 20. The clinics continued to function twice weekly throughout the year, and attendances remained satisfactory, in spite of the greatest difficulties. The Centre premises were very severely damaged by blast in August last. As a result the work was transferred to the Brady Girls' Club (very kindly placed at our disposal by Miss Miriam Moses, J.P.) pending first-aid repairs. The repairs were very speedily carried out, however, and work at Underwood Road was resumed after a break of only two weeks. Mrs. E. Strauss continued to serve as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer to the Centre.

The Committee desires to place on record its appreciation of the work carried out by the Medical Officer, Dr. A. D. Brooks, and the two Health Visitors, under conditions which proved to be both extremely hazardous and trying.

DISTRICT MATERNITY NURSING.—The Committee regret to have to report the death of District Maternity Nurse, Miss A. H. Jones, who had been in the service of the Hospital since 1930, and would shortly have reached retiring age. Miss Jones rendered magnificent service during her years with the Hospital, and will be sadly missed. A successor has been appointed and the work continues satisfactorily.

MEDICAL STAFF.—The Committee is glad to welcome back Mr. R. L. Dodds, Hon. Obstetric Surgeon, on his release from the Forces and take this opportunity to pay tribute to him and to his colleagues, Mr. O'Sullivan and Mr. Albert Davis, for their continued valued and devoted service to the Hospital. Thanks are also here conveyed to Dr. Orpwood Price, Pathologist, and Dr. Kathleen Frazer, Visiting Medical Officer, for their valuable assistance throughout the year.

It is also desired to place on record the Committee's appreciation of the services rendered by Miss Kathleen M. Robinson, who acted in the capacity of deputy for Mr. Dodds during his absence.

Mr. B. G. Spiers, appointed early in the year, also rendered valuable help as Clinical Assistant at the Underwood Road ante-natal clinics, and thanks are also due to the medical staffs of Kingston County Hospital and the Blood Transfusion Service, Slough, for assistance given both readily and speedily in times of emergency.

NURSING STAFF.—The staff of trained midwives was maintained at full strength throughout the year, and the Committee's thanks are again accorded to Matron and the Sisters for their devotion to duty during a year of almost unparalleled difficulty.

MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOL.—The maximum number of pupil midwives was in training throughout the year, 14 successfully passing the Part I Examination of the Central Midwives' Board.

LADIES' ASSOCIATION.—Details of the work and finances of the Association will be found on page 8. Work continued throughout the year, but has been somewhat affected by the war-time removal of many members from London. It is hoped that with a return to normal times the efforts and interest of the members will be much increased.

FINANCE.—Details of the income and expenditure of the Corporation will be found on pages 10 to 15, and the Balance Sheet on pages 16 and 17.

INCOME.—Total income from all sources for general maintenance purposes amounted to £10,984, an increase of £502 over that for 1943. The increase was mainly due to the increased amount received from patients and Contributory Scheme payments.

The Committee's thanks are once again tendered to Lord Bearsted for his valuable guidance in connection with the investment and re-investment of funds.

In conformity with the war-time practice of economy in the use of paper and in printing costs, detailed lists of contributions received are again omitted. The grateful thanks of the Committee are extended to all subscribers and donors for their continued support and interest. The Committee also acknowledges with gratitude the continued allocation to this hospital of a percentage of the proceeds of Sunday opening of cinemas, by the following managements: Cameo News Theatres; Odeon Theatres, Ltd.; Warner Theatre, Ltd. (the last named to both General and Appeal Funds).

EXPENDITURE.—Expenditure on the general maintenance of the Hospital and the Welfare Centre during the year amounted to £10,750, and extraordinary expenditure in connection with transfer of staff, £34—a total of £10,784. This is an increase of no less than £795 on the expenditure for 1943, and of £2,301 over that for 1942. The increases are due, largely, to the revised scales of salary of nearly all grades of staff, and to heavy increases in the costs of all kinds of consumable stores and public utility services. The figures will, it is hoped, bring vividly before the Community how great is the Hospital's present need for increased financial support. This upward trend in expenditure must be expected to continue and can only be offset by the Community sharing the Committee's burden and considerably increasing its financial support.

BUILDING FUND.—Early in the year an appeal was made for contributions to a memorial fund in memory of the late Mrs. Alice Model, M.B.E. A total sum of over £1,400 was received in response to this joint effort on the part of the Hospital and the Union of Jewish Women. Thanks are here conveyed to all those who contributed so generously in response to this appeal. It is intended that the X-ray department at the new Hospital shall be named in Mrs. Model's memory, the estimated cost being £3,000. Further contributions towards this objective would, therefore, be warmly welcomed.

FUTURE PLANS.—Strong representations have been made to the authorities concerned for permission to proceed with the completion of our new hospital building in North London, in view of the urgent need of additional maternity hospital beds at the present time. Here, again, the Committee's efforts have been seriously handicapped as a result of enemy activity, and the consequent overriding priority of repairs to bomb-damaged houses. It is sincerely hoped, however, that permission will be received during 1945 for the erection of at least a temporary unit on the site of the new hospital, to tide us over until the main building can be completed.

CONCLUSION.—As already pointed out, the year 1944 proved to be one of exceptional difficulty. The Committee feels, in consequence, that the greatest credit is due to the loyal Medical, Nursing and Administrative staffs of the Hospital for so ably carrying out the work through all the troubles and vicissitudes which beset them, and so accomplishing what, in these difficult circumstances, must be considered another year of successful work. The year 1945 will see the 50th anniversary of the establishment of the Hospital. It is hoped by the Committee that in celebrating the Hospital's Golden Jubilee it will be possible to mark the occasion by the commencement of a new era in its history—its establishment on its new site and the commencement of what it is sincerely hoped will prove to be a yet more successful future. Given the goodwill and generous support of the Community they feel confident of being able to achieve this aim.

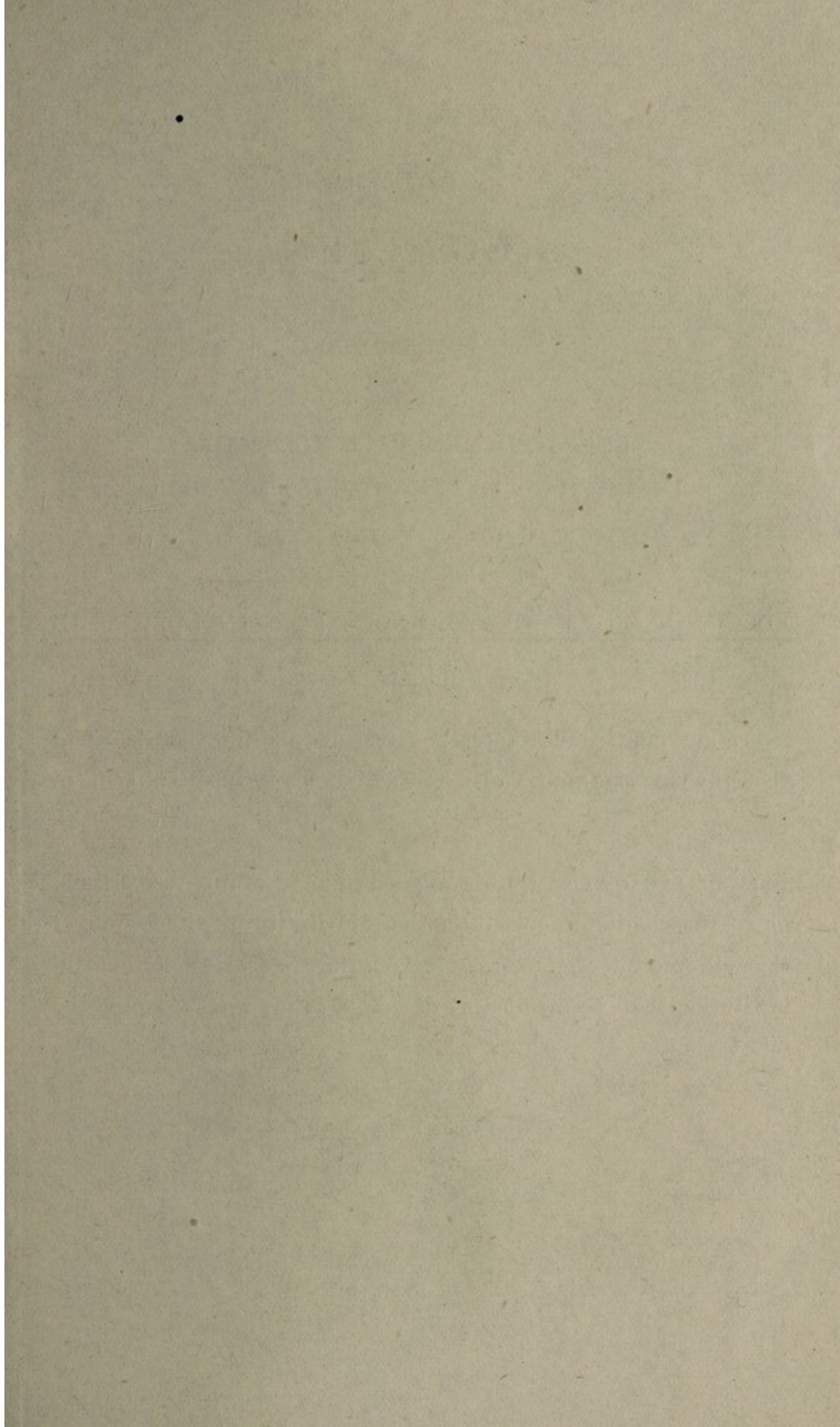
