Report of the Committee of Management for the Year 1945

Your Committee of Management has pleasure in submitting its report for the year 1945, marking its 50th Anniversary.

The year under review continued, as with the previous war years, to present many difficulties. It was hoped that with the advent of peace in August last, most of these difficulties would disappear, but though some of the old handicaps, such as dangers from air attacks, had no longer to be encountered, other matters of deep concern to your Committee arose to take their place. Some of these items are reported in the pages which follow.

ADMINISTRATION.—The Committee of Management was very considerably strengthened during the year by the co-option of the following members :—Viscount Bearsted, Lady Baron, Mr. Arthur Franks, Mr. Henry Jacobs, Mrs. Simon Jacobs, Mr. S. Moseley, Mrs. S. C. Lewsen, The Hon. M. R. Samuel and Dr. John Glyn (nominee of the newly-formed Aid Society). The thanks of their colleagues are accorded these new members for kindly devoting so much of their valuable time to the affairs of the Hospital.

Mrs. Hyman Isaacs and Miss B. Oppenheimer resigned from membership during the year. Our warm thanks are extended to them for their valued help over a period of many years.

In accordance with the Articles of Association, the following members retire, in rotation, but are eligible and offer themselves for re-election :—Mrs. Rosenheim, Mrs. Sklan, Dr. J. Snowman.

The Auditors, Messrs. Lionel H. Lemon & Co., also retire, but are eligible and offer themselves for re-election.

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING was held at the Dorchester Hotel, W.1, on 20th June, 1945, for the transaction of purely formal business.

IN-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.—The number of patients delivered in 1945 was 484, an increase of 19 over the year 1944. This is a source of satisfaction when bearing in mind the disruption of arrangements in many instances, due to "rocket" and "flying-bomb" attacks and re-arrangement of the affairs of patients evacuated from London. Pressure on the very limited number of beds in our temporary premises later became acute, and continues to cause concern.

Following protracted negotiations with the Ministry of Health, however, permission was finally granted for the Committee to proceed with the building of a small section of our new building at Lordship Road, Stoke Newington, N.16, and it is hoped to have 30 beds available in the new building in the latter months of 1946. This should prove a great boon to our London patients and will ease the pressure on the accommodation at Hampton Court.

OUT-PATIENT DEPARTMENT.—

ANTE-NATAL CLINICS.—The Clinics continued uninterruptedly throughout the year, both in London and in Hampton Court, and attendances show a slight increase over those of the previous year.

Arrangements were in hand at the end of the year for the transfer of the Underwood Road, E.1 Clinic to premises at 77 Lordship Road, Stoke Newington, N.16, adjoining the site of the new hospital, acquired for this purpose. It is hoped that the transfer

will have been successfully carried out by the time this report is published.

POST-NATAL CLINICS were continued at the Underwood Road, E.1 premises throughout the year, being seriously affected in the early months by the effect of enemy air attack. This work, too, will shortly be transferred to the Stoke Newington premises.

INFANT WELFARE WORK.—Details of the work of the Centre will be found on page 20. Discussions regarding the future of the Centre were held with officials of the Stepney Borough Council over a period of many months. As a result of these discussions it was finally mutually agreed that as from the 31st December, 1945, the responsibility for the carrying out of the work of the Centre, previously under the care of your Committee as a Voluntary Centre, be transferred to the Council.

Our thanks are here accorded to Mrs. E. Strauss, who served as Honorary Secretary and Treasurer to the Infant Welfare Centre almost since its inception; to Dr. A. D. Brooks, who served as Medical Officer for many years, and to Dr. A. Bonnard and Dr. J. Stross for their services, temporarily, as Medical Officers following on the resignation of Dr. Brooks owing to ill-health. Tribute must also be paid to the conscientious services of the Health Visitors, Miss Priestley and Miss Jaffa.

MEDICAL STAFF.—Sincere thanks are once again tendered to the hospital's Obstetric Surgeons, Mr. R. L. Dodds and Mr. J. V. O'Sullivan, for their untiring services to our patients; to Mr. Albert Davis, Assistant Obstetric Surgeon, and Mr. B. G. Spiers, Clinic Assistant, for the most valuable services rendered in their respective capacities and to Dr. Orpwood Price and Dr. Kathleen Frazer for their work as Pathologist and Visiting Medical Officer respectively.

NURSING STAFF.—With gratitude the Committee desire to place on record their appreciation of the devoted services of Matron and her most loyal Staff of Sisters and Staff Midwives. The many messages of thanks received from patients pay eloquent tribute to the excellence of the nursing care.

MIDWIFERY TRAINING SCHOOL.—The hospital continues to attract an adequate number of Pupil Midwives desiring training. Fifteen pupils successfully passed the Part I Examination of the Central Midwives' Board during the year.

LADIES' ASSOCIATION.—Particulars of the activities of the Association are given on page 8. This loyal band of workers continued, throughout the war period, to make garments for the hospital's mothers and their babies. With a return to peace, arrangements were in preparation for a resumption of the Association's popular sewing meetings early in 1946.

FINANCE.—The Income and Expenditure Accounts and details of the assets and liabilities of the Corporation are given on pages 10 to 18.

INCOME.—The total sum available for general purposes amounted to £12,778, an increase of £2,296 over 1944, again mainly accounted for by receipts from patients and from Hospital Contributory Schemes.

The thanks of the Committee are tendered to Lord Bearsted for his continued invaluable help and guidance in financial matters.

As an economy measure, detailed lists of contributions received are again omitted. It is hoped, however, to resume publication of these lists, together with other items of interest, in the Report for 1946.

EXPENDITURE.—The expenditure on general maintenance for the year at £11,861 shows an increase of no less than £1,882 over that for 1944. This increase is largely due to the increased rates of salary of Nursing and other Staff, but costs of public utility services and consumable stores of all kinds tend to show a marked increase throughout.

The Committee, therefore, appeals to the Community to give increasing financial support to this, the only Jewish Maternity Hospital in the Empire.

NEW HOSPITAL.—After protracted discussions with the various Ministries concerned, the Committee is glad to be able to report that a permit has now been secured to enable work to be resumed on our new building at Lordship Road, Stoke Newington. The many restrictions on building work of all kinds has, however, had the result of limiting our efforts to a restricted programme, for the provision of 30 beds only—roughly one-half the accommodation originally planned. In addition, the provision of the modern Out-patient Clinic and Nurses' Home originally included in the Scheme cannot, at present, be proceeded with. It has, therefore, been necessary to purchase the leases of properties adjoining the new Hospital site in which these sections of the Hospital will, temporarily, be housed.

THE FUTURE.—At the time of going to press plans are going ahead for the institution of a National Health Service, details of which will be placed before the public by H.M. Government in the near future.

It is impossible to foresee at this moment the exact role which the Voluntary Hospitals, as at present constituted, will play in this new service.

Your Committee is in constant touch with the various organisations representing the interests of the Voluntary Hospitals, and will take any steps possible to safeguard the Hospital's future and to retain its place, primarily, as a Communal institution.

CONCLUSION.—It is gratifying to be able to report another year of successful endeavour, in times which continue to present difficulties and anxieties in many directions.

Given the opportunity, your Committee feel sure that the Hospital will go forward into an era of still greater achievement in the years immediately ahead.
