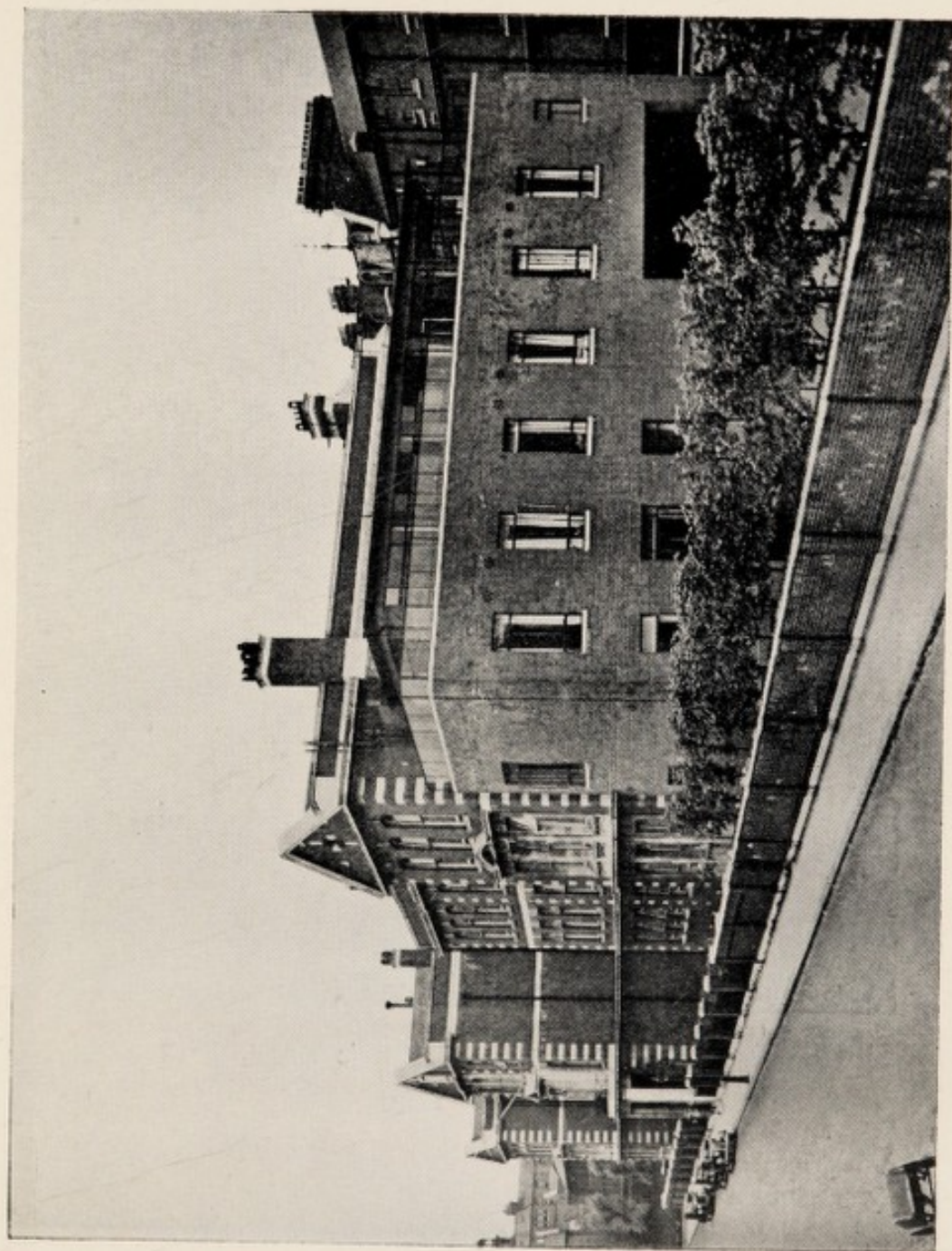

PAYING FLOOR.

The Paying Floor contains four wards of homely character with altogether 22 beds arranged so that they can at any time be secluded by curtains.

Patients are given special privileges, among them many opportunities of seeing their friends. They pay at a uniform rate of £5 5s. a week to the Hospital and moderate fees for operations to the Surgical Staff with whom they arrange for admission. (See list on previous page.)

An experienced House Surgeon is always in attendance.

No fee is charged for the use of drugs, dressings or the Operating Theatre, and "Extras" are kept at a minimum.

Single rooms are also available at a fee of £10 10s. per week for maintenance.

Further particulars may be obtained from the Secretary.

The Special Work of the Hospital.

THE Chelsea Hospital for Women, was founded in 1871 for the reception and treatment of respectable poor women and gentlewomen in reduced circumstances suffering from those many distressing diseases to which the female sex in particular is liable. A large proportion of women thus afflicted are those upon whom the many misfortunes of ill-health most heavily fall—the poor Gentlewoman, the Governess, the Wife of the struggling Clerk, of the Artisan, and the very poor. Their homes are altogether unsuited for the performance of a critical operation, and they cannot have there the special nursing and care which their condition demands. It is therefore obvious that the work of this Institution in restoring Mothers, Wives, and Daughters to that health upon which the maintenance of families so frequently depends, is indispensable to their homes.

The wisest system of medical relief has been adopted at this Hospital since its foundation, viz.:—that of asking the Patient to contribute something towards the cost of her maintenance if in a position to do so, while, to the really poor, gratuitous treatment is given. (In no respect whatever are the free patients less generously treated than those who contribute something towards their support.) The Wards, which contain from five to nine beds, are furnished and arranged in a manner to give them a cheerful, homelike appearance.

Applicants for admission, who are unable to attend for examination, must forward a Medical Certificate (proper form to be obtained at the Hospital) and state whether their means allow them to pay 10s. 6d., 21s., 42s. or 63s. per week. In case payment is not possible, an effort should be made to obtain a Subscriber's Letter.

Regulations for the Admission of In-Patients.

Patients are admitted in rotation, with the exception that priority is given to urgent cases.

CONTRIBUTING PATIENTS' fees are paid in advance, on the day of entrance and on each succeeding Monday.

No other charges are made, except for washing of patients' personal linen. The Nurses and Servants are prohibited from accepting any gratuity.

All Patients are requested to come provided with a change of linen, brush, comb, towels, and slippers, and only such luggage as is absolutely necessary.

The Dietary is ample. Articles of food and drink may not be brought in without the consent of the House Surgeon, except Eggs, Jam and Biscuits. On no account may stimulants be supplied.

Patients of all religious denominations are admitted, and may be visited by a Clergyman or Minister of their own denomination.

Patients may be visited by their friends on Wednesdays and Sundays, between 3 and 4.30 o'clock, but only two visitors are allowed at the bedside at the same time.

Patients, before leaving, are requested to present themselves to the Secretary.

Out-Patient Department.

OUT-PATIENTS are seen by the Surgeons to Out-Patients every week day (except Saturdays and Bank Holidays), and they must attend promptly at 2 o'clock (NEW CASES AT 1 P.M.).

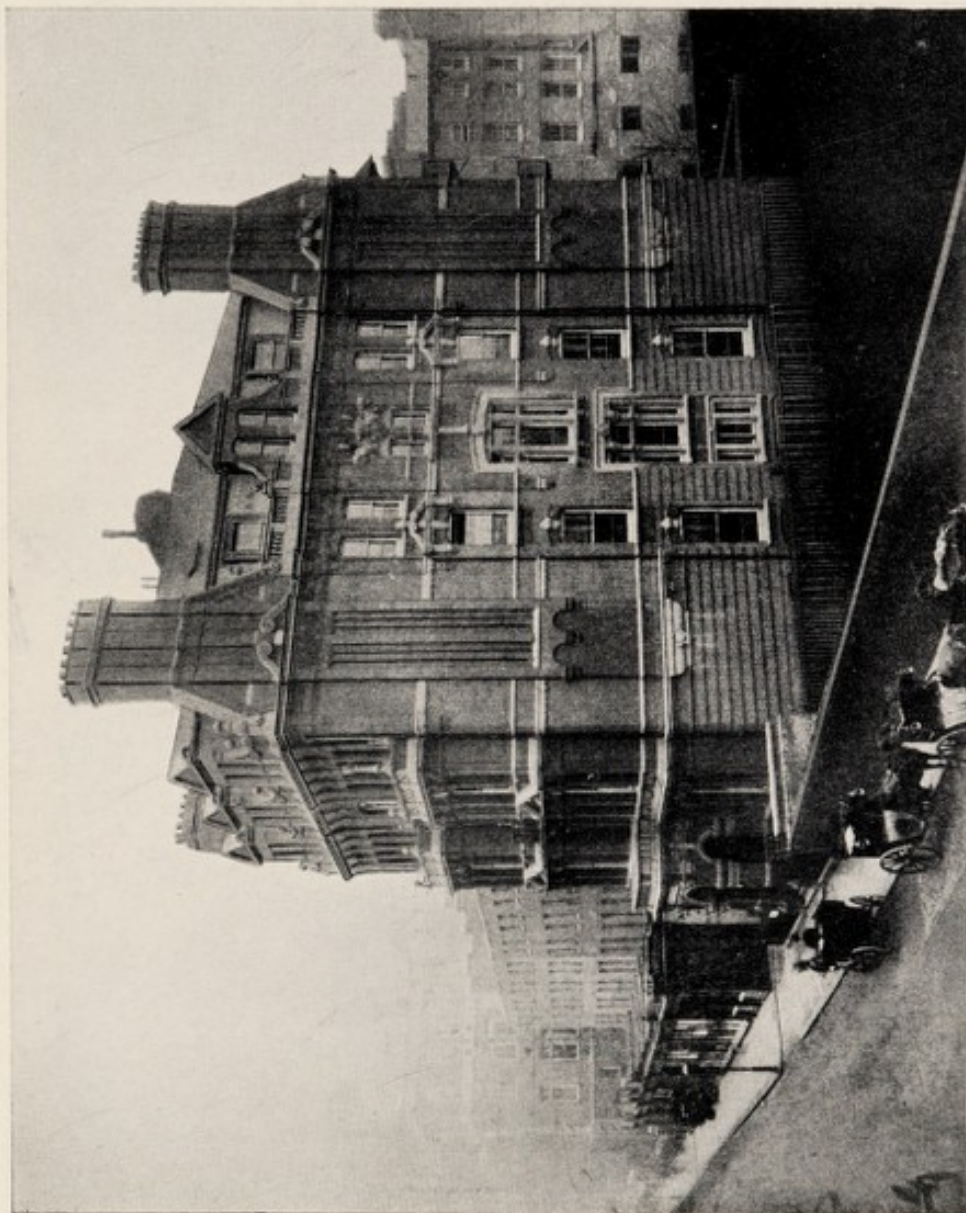
Patients will be provided with proper bottles for their medicine upon payment of a deposit of 2d. on each bottle. Deposits will be refunded when bottles are returned.

A Subscriber's Letter gives free treatment for four weeks unless specially costly preparations are ordered. If the Patient is unprovided with a Letter payment must be made at the rate of not less than 1s. per week, according to the means of the patient.

The HOSPITAL is in DOVEHOUSE STREET, near the Town Hall, King's Road, Chelsea, and the Brompton Hospital, Fulham Road, and the following

RAILWAY STATIONS—South Kensington and Sloane Square (Metropolitan Railway), and South Kensington (Great Northern, Piccadilly and Brompton Railway); and Chelsea Station (West London Extension).

OMNIBUSES—Many pass close to the Hospital on their way to and from Putney and Walham Green, and all parts of London.

Visit of Her Majesty Queen Mary.

To the GOVERNORS OF THE CHELSEA HOSPITAL FOR WOMEN.

Your Council has pleasure in submitting the Sixty-ninth Annual Report, covering the twelve months ended 31st December, 1939, a period which, though marred by the outbreak of War, is chronicled as one more successful chapter in the Hospital's history.

Royal Visit.

The outstanding Hospital event of the year, one which will always be remembered by those who were privileged to be present, was the visit of Her Majesty, Queen Mary, on Friday, the 19th May, to declare open the extensions to the Hospital and Nurses' Home. The bed accommodation in the Hospital has now been increased to 126.

The arrival of Her Majesty, who was received by the Marquess of Londonderry and the Countess of Ilchester, was proclaimed with cheers by the large number of people who were waiting in Arthur Street. A guard of honour of the Nursing Staff lined the covered way down which Her Majesty passed to the marquee.

The ceremony of declaring open the new buildings, attended by several hundred Governors and friends, was held in a large marquee which had been erected on the tennis court. On this warm and sunny day, the newly completed and re-decorated Wards, gay with flowers of varied colours, presented a happy, bright and cheerful picture as Her Majesty toured the Hospital and graciously chatted with each patient. After touring the Wards, tea was served in the Board-room and Her Majesty,

on leaving, expressed pleasure with the extended Hospital, especially referring to the Margaret Atkin Wing, its design and colour scheme.

Extensions.

The extensions, commenced in May, 1938, were completed in April, 1939, and it was hoped that following the long period during which portions of the Hospital had had to be closed for months at a time, the work of the Hospital would be able to be resumed on an enlarged scale and free from further interruption. The total cost of the work was £36,000, of which £6,000 was charged to Revenue Account in 1938.

The amount so far raised is around £17,000, so that £13,000 is still needed to clear the deficit. This has necessitated raising a loan with the Bank, the interest on which, until the loan is repaid, will add annually to the already rising cost per bed. Elsewhere in this report will be found a donation slip, and the Council will be most grateful to any who will complete and forward it, with a gift, to the Secretary at the Hospital.

Broadcast Appeal.

On Sunday, February 19th, the Bishop of Bristol (Dr. Woodward), a former Chaplain to the Hospital, broadcast a "Good Cause" Appeal from the B.B.C. London Regional Station on behalf of the Hospital. Hundreds of donations were received, varying in amount from 3d. in postage stamps to £50 in Bank of England Notes, the total reaching £373, which has been applied to the Building Fund. Quite a number of gifts came from those who had been patients in the Hospital as long ago as 20 to 25 years, and in each case the donor stated that she would always feel it a privilege to be able to help the Hospital that had done so much for her. These spontaneous acts of remembrance and gratitude are greatly valued, and the Council extend very grateful thanks to Dr. Woodward for so kindly undertaking this service, and to all who responded to the Appeal.

Nurses' Appeal.

As shewn in the Building Account, the members of the Nursing Staff raised no less a sum than £573. Your Council consider this a magnificent effort, and they extend the warmest thanks to all who were responsible for this splendid result.

General Work.

By the middle of April all the beds in the Hospital were occupied, and from then until late in August a high percentage of occupied beds was maintained. During that month the Hospital was graded a Class A.1 Hospital by the Government, and on instructions patients were evacuated, only three, who were too ill to be moved, remaining in the Hospital at the end of the month. Some were taken to their homes, and others transferred to the Convalescent Home at St. Leonards-on-Sea. The Home since has also been used as our Auxiliary Hospital, and has served a very essential purpose, enabling far more patients to be treated at Chelsea than would otherwise have been possible.

The Council are greatly indebted to those members of the Volunteer Service who so willingly helped in the evacuation. Certain work of sandbagging, reinforcing ceilings, protecting windows and screening the operating theatre, was carried out, so that on the outbreak of War, the Hospital was ready to be used as a Civilian Casualty Hospital. From then on, a number of Wards have remained empty of patients, but equipped for the immediate admission of casualties should the necessity arise. The Out-Patients Department has been adapted by the Local Authority as a First-Aid Post, and the remaining beds are being used in carrying on the normal work of the Hospital. The Council feel that, whilst the true purpose of the Hospital is being maintained, though only to a limited extent, the Hospital is taking its rightful place on the "Home Front."

The number of In-Patients treated in the eight months ended August 31st was 1,222, and in the four months September 1st to December 31st, 248.

Finance.

The Income and Expenditure Account reveals a serious deficit of £3,956 on the year, due largely to the smaller number of beds occupied and the continued rise in the price of almost all commodities during the past few months.

Since the outbreak of War the Government, through the Ministry of Health, have made certain grants in respect of beds reserved under the Casualty Service, but even with this additional help, it has been impossible fully to meet expenditure. Whilst your Council desire to thank all donors, they give special thanks to :—

Honorary Medical Staff.

It is with a deep sense of loss that the death of Mr. John Ellison, F.R.C.O.G., which occurred suddenly, is reported. For twenty years Mr. Ellison had been associated with the Hospital, as Registrar from 1919 to 1923, and afterwards as Honorary Surgeon up to the time of his death. His passing is a tragic blow to the Hospital, and all will miss one who earned the name of "Honest John."

Early in July Dr. Eric Gandy, who had reached the age at which, according to the Rules of the Hospital, he should retire, had completed 20 years of devoted service as Anæsthetist. On his retirement the Council, in expressing their thanks to Dr. Gandy, appointed him Consulting Anæsthetist. This appointment is the first of its kind since the Hospital was founded in 1871.

Dr. Robert Cope was appointed to fill the vacancy, taking up his duties early in August.

At the outbreak of War, Mr. Roques was called up for service with the Royal Air Force, and most of the other members of the Honorary Medical Staff were serving in the Emergency Medical Service of the Ministry of Health. Now most of them have taken part-time duties in that Service, enabling

them to carry out work at the Hospital as they did in time of peace. Mr. Frank Cook, Dr. R. J. Clausen and Dr. Cope are all serving Officers with the Royal Army Medical Corps.

Nursing Staff.

A number of the Trained Staff were members of the Territorial Nursing Service, and since the outbreak of hostilities several have been called up, whilst others have received orders to stand by. The Nursing Staff, under the guidance of the Matron (Miss D. L. C. Buckingham) are carrying out their duties cheerfully and willingly in trying and difficult conditions.

The War has meant many changes in the routine of the Hospital, and hours of duty often have to be altered at short notice. The black-out has not only meant the expenditure of a large amount of money, but has also called for the exercise of patience and care by every member of the Staff. Your Council are pleased to record the co-operation which has throughout existed between all sections of the Staff in carrying out the new routine which War restrictions have demanded.

Gifts.

During the year a number of friends kindly sent a variety of gifts, and these are referred to in detail on page 43. Whilst the Council extend thanks to all for their generosity, they desire to thank individually Mrs. Sannyer Atkin for the generous floral decorations she provided for the Margaret Atkin Wing on the occasion of the visit of Her Majesty Queen Mary.

Ladies' Committee and Honorary Officers.

The Report of the work of the Ladies' Committee appears on page 17. The Council are pleased once again to have the opportunity of expressing thanks for the valuable help rendered by Lady Ilchester and her Committee in so many ways and on so many occasions.

The Chaplain, the Rev. A. H. Butler, has taken up duty with the Field Forces as an Army Chaplain, and the Rev. W. Bryan Green, Vicar of Holy Trinity, Brompton, has been appointed Chaplain pro tem. The Rev. J. S. Valentine, the Honorary Roman Catholic Chaplain, the Rev. B. Paletz, the Honorary Chaplain to the Jewish Patients, and his Assistant, Mrs. J. Geffen, still continue their spiritual ministrations, and

to all these the Council extend their thanks, as well as to Mrs. Herbert Taylor, the Honorary Librarian, Miss Bailey, the Organist, and Mr. W. F. Pope, the Honorary Solicitor.

Conclusion.

The Council are grateful to all friends who have assisted the Hospital in any way during the year, and use this report as a medium through which to express their thanks.

More Annual Subscribers are needed, and during the year quite a number of regular Subscribers have signed Deeds of Covenant. This is an effective and simple way in which still further to assist the finances, and your attention is directed to the scheme which is set out in detail on the inset facing page 72. The Council will be most grateful to any subscriber who decides to help in this way. No one can foretell the future, but those upon whom the administration of the Hospital falls look forward with confidence and assurance to the continued support of all.

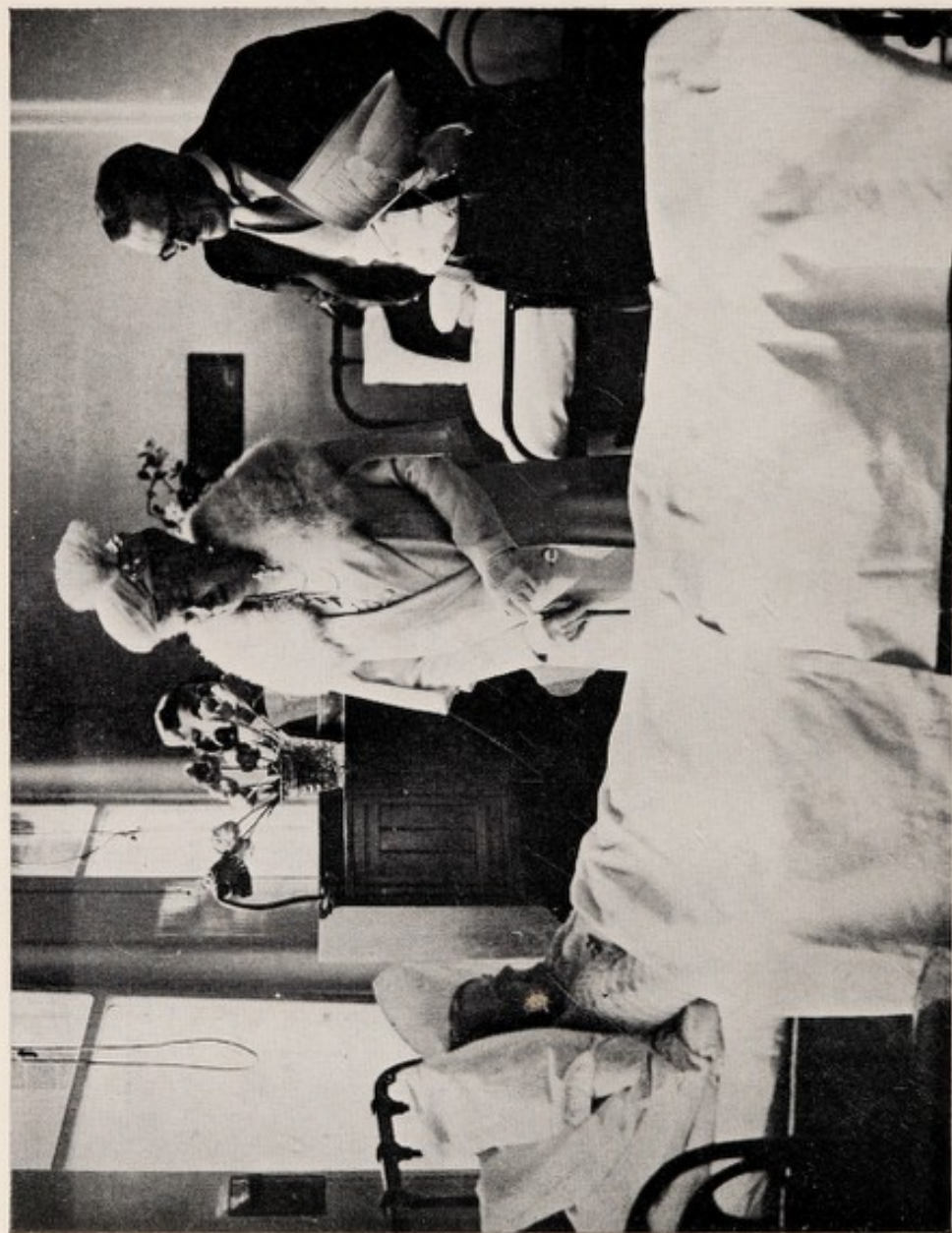

Report of the Ladies' Committee for 1939.

During the year the resignation of Lady Mary Herbert, owing to the appointment of her husband to the Governorship of Bengal, was received with great regret, as was also that of Mrs. John Ellison, to whom our sincere sympathies are extended on the death of Mr. John Ellison. We are happy to say that the Viscountess Wimborne has joined the Committee in the absence of Lady Mary Herbert. Lady Alice Waddilove and Mrs. Walter Searle are also newcomers to the Committee, and a warm welcome is extended to all three.

The extensions to the Hospital were declared open on Friday, May 18th, by Her Majesty, Queen Mary, who was attended by Lady Desborough and Major the Hon. John Coke. Those present were particularly impressed by, and will ever remember, the cheery atmosphere of the light and airy Wards, so gaily beflowered on this sunny afternoon.

It was hoped that the larger Hospital would have a period free from further interruption of its work, and all were looking forward to a year of record service. Unfortunately, hostilities broke out, completely changing the routine of the Hospital. The Convalescent Home at St. Leonards-on-Sea has been used also as an auxiliary Hospital, working in close co-operation with the parent Hospital at Chelsea.

The Special Hospitals' Flag Day was held in October, several ladies either selling flags or holding Depots. Though the total amount raised was more than in 1938, the Hospital received a smaller grant, as three-quarters of the total collected was given to the Red Cross Fund. Members are also gratefully thanked for the assistance they gave on Alexandra Rose Day, and it is hoped that their valuable help will again be forthcoming this year.

Christmas festivities once again gave great satisfaction to all, though they were carried out on a somewhat lesser scale owing to few patients being resident in the Hospital and the fact that the Convalescent Home was entirely closed. The thanks of the Committee are given to all who sent gifts of money or kind (enumerated on page 43). The valuable gift of garments from the Queen Mary Needlework Guild was especially welcome.

Visiting at the Hospital and Convalescent Home, so far as circumstances allowed, was again undertaken by members of the Committee, who took the opportunity of assuring themselves of the comfort of the patients.

The Linen League contributed £45 towards the cost of the linen required at the Hospital during the year, and thanks are extended to all who contributed.

Whilst some members are serving in the various Auxiliary Services and others are away from London, it is hoped that the Ladies' Committee will, as far as is possible under the circumstances, continue their assistance to the Hospital, which needs all the help it can possibly obtain.

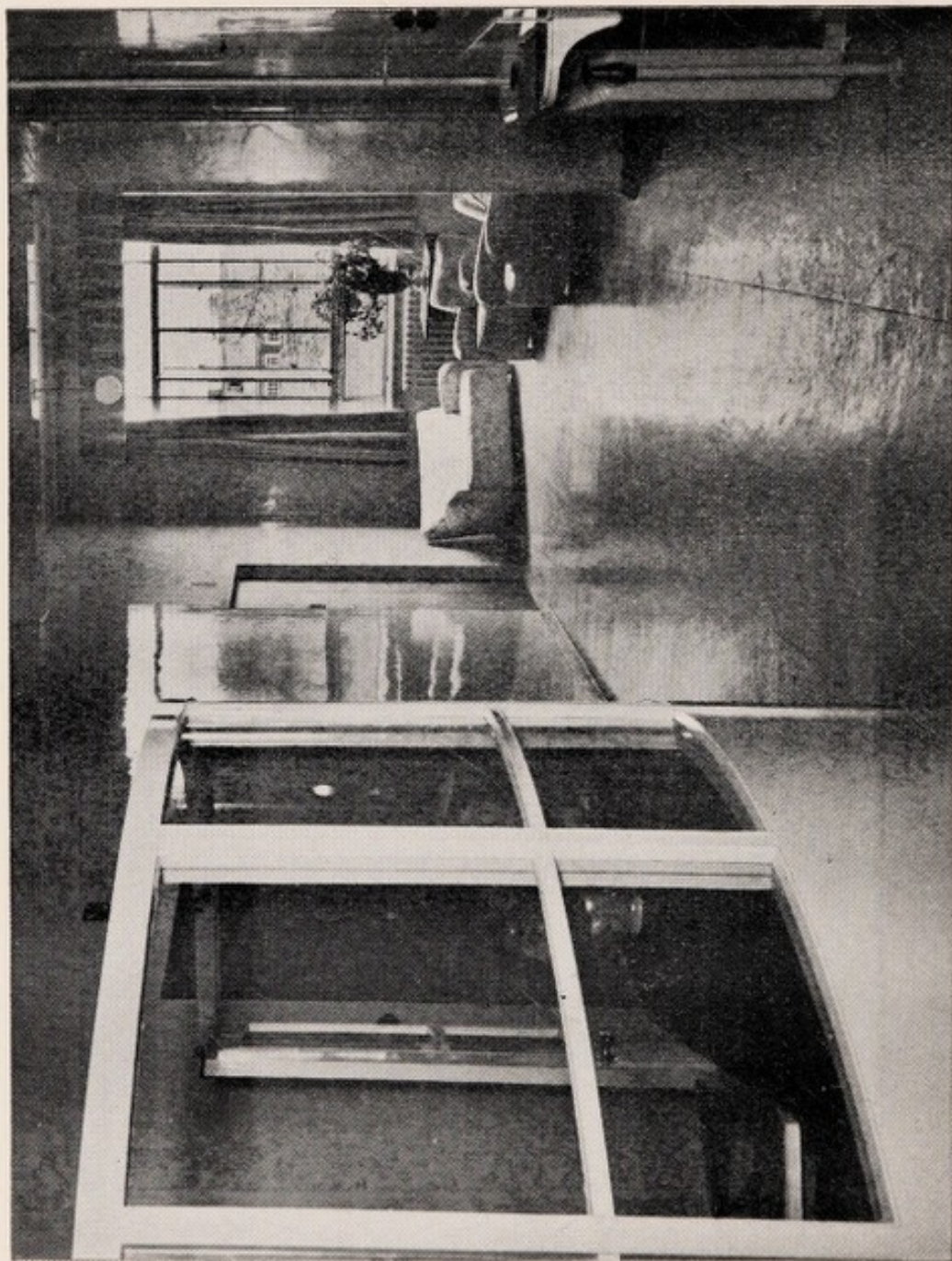

Report of the Registrar and Radium Officer, 1939.

In spite of the difficult circumstances, the work of the Hospital was well maintained during the year. 1,570 patients were admitted to Hospital and 2,587 new cases seen in the Out-Patient Department.

Early in the year the Hospital joined the Emergency Hospital Service, as a grade A.1 hospital. On instructions from the Ministry of Health, an almost complete evacuation of the hospital was carried out on September 1st, so that, on the outbreak of war, all preparations had been made for the hospital to fulfil its obligations. The necessary drugs and supplies were obtained, and certain A.R.P. measures carried out, including strengthening part of the basement, provision of an emergency operating theatre, erection of a protective screen in the main operating theatre, and the sandbagging of vital positions.

In spite of the disturbance caused as a result of the out-patient department being taken over as a first-aid and decontamination post by the Borough of Chelsea, and the absence of most of the members of the Honorary Medical Staff, the daily out-patient clinics were carried on, as usual, without any interruption. Within a fortnight, urgent gynæcological cases were being admitted for operation and treatment with the full approval of the Sector Commander.

After the first few weeks of the war, a large proportion of the Honorary Medical Staff were able to return, and the work of the Hospital has been continued, as far as possible, on the usual lines. A certain number of beds are permanently ready for the immediate admission of air-raid casualties.

Of the 14 deaths in Hospital during the year, four were due to pulmonary embolism, but, for various reasons, none of these cases had the full post-operative breathing exercises and massage.

The follow-up system for all malignant cases has been continued. Apart from carcinomata of the cervix, there have been :—

We are grateful to Mr. Cooling for his co-operation during the year and the clerical assistance supplied to the Radium and Follow-up Department has been much appreciated.

The routine deep X-ray therapy, for malignant cases, is now being carried out at Westminster Hospital under the direction of Dr. F. M. Allchin. Once again we wish to express our thanks to Dr. P. A. Flood and his staff at the Royal Cancer Hospital for the many occasions on which they have helped us with deep X-ray therapy and emergency radiological examinations.

The operative mortality for the year was 0.73%.

N.B.—Through the years in question until 1928 funds were being collected for the Rebuilding of the Hospital, the Building of the Nurses' Home and the Extension of the Convalescent Home and many of the following gave valuable assistance.

REPORT OF THE CONVALESCENT HOME

for the year ending 31st December, 1939.

TO THE GOVERNORS OF THE CHELSEA HOSPITAL FOR WOMEN
CONVALESCENT HOME.

Year after year the value of the Convalescent Home has been referred to, but never could more emphasis be placed on these words than at the present.

From the beginning of the year to August the number of occupied beds was maintained at a high level, and then the general evacuation order was received. On Thursday, August 24th, all then resident returned to their homes, and on the following day, 8 patients, whose treatment was incomplete, were received from Chelsea. That was the beginning of the new use to which the Home has since been put, i.e., an Auxiliary to the Parent Hospital in London, and one which has proved invaluable to the patients and also has enabled a larger number to be treated at the Parent Hospital than would otherwise have been possible.

Since September patients have been transferred from and to Chelsea by ambulance, usually two journeys being undertaken each week. The patients who have taken part in this scheme have expressed great satisfaction in having been able to spend the latter part of their recovery in such pleasant surroundings. Additional Nurses have been transferred from Chelsea, and although this new use of the Home has meant a complete change of routine and work, Miss Barlow and her own and augmented Staff have risen to the occasion in a wonderful manner, and have carried out their duties with the greatest possible credit.

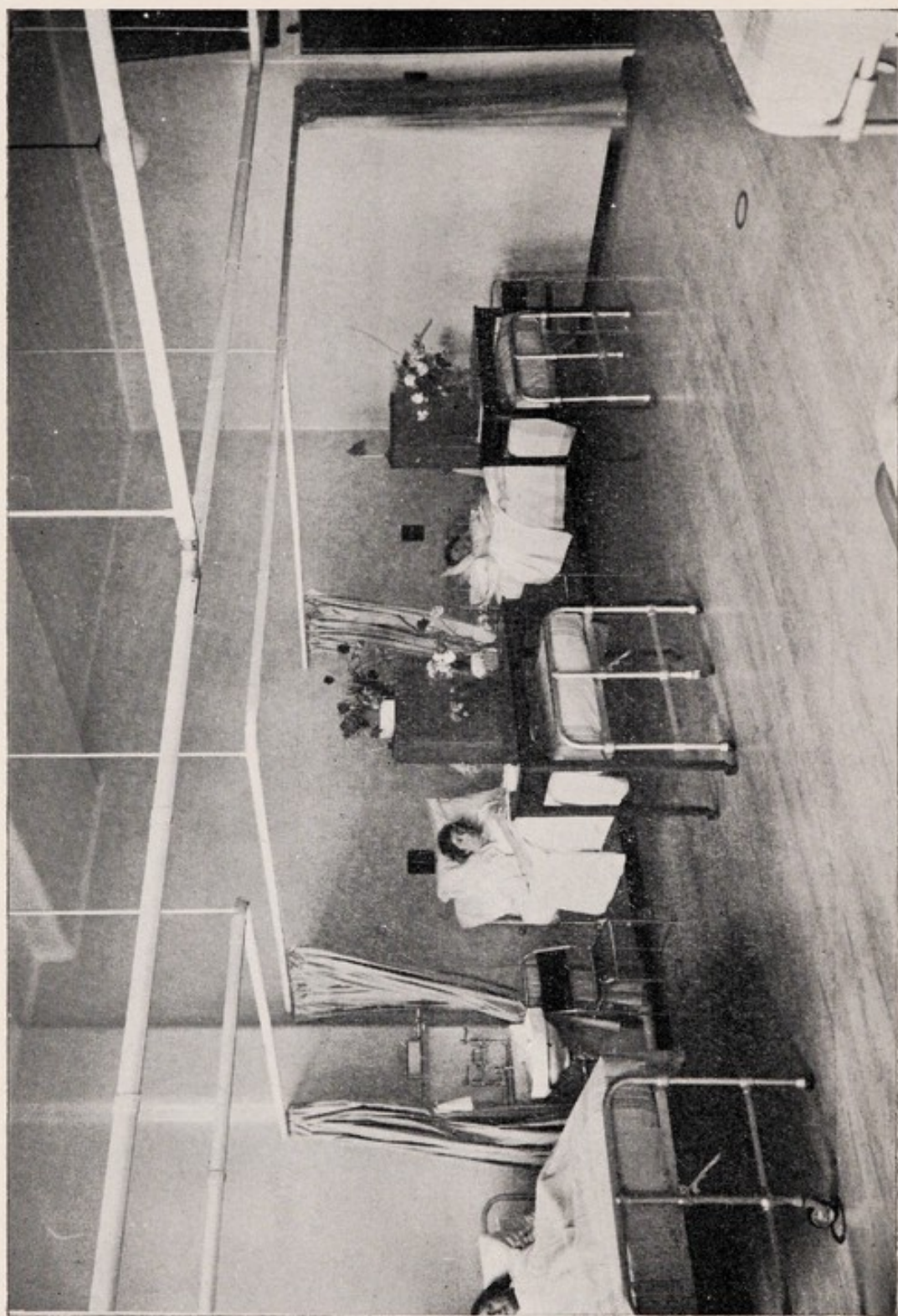
Finance.

The year's working discloses a small surplus, which is due largely to the Legacy of £200, bequeathed by the late Hon. Mrs. Durant, an increase in patients' payments, and a donation of £110 which Mr. Sannyer Atkin gave to defray the cost of new beds throughout.

Reconstruction Work.

For a period before and after Christmas, the Home was closed so that a portion of the internal redecoration recommended by the Architect, and certain repairs, could be carried out. Old and worn linoleum has been replaced with new of a neutral colour, floors have been levelled and renewed where necessary, mantelpieces removed, modern mirrors fixed, and certain rooms re-decorated. Colourful curtains are to be hung, and every effort made to make the Home as cheery as possible.

During the year Dr. Derrick Martin resigned his post of Honorary Medical Officer, and the Council expressed thanks to Dr. Martin for devoted services of several years. Dr. H. W. Gabb was appointed to succeed him, and was very much liked by both patients and staff. When hostilities broke out Dr. Gabb was called up, and since then the work has been undertaken temporarily by Dr. Glynn. To both of these, together with the Rev. A. E. Kirkland, the Honorary Chaplain, the Rev. T. O'Donoghue, the Honorary Chaplain to Roman Catholic patients, Mr. S. H. Williams, the Honorary Surgeon-Dentist, and the members of the Ladies' Committee, sincere thanks are expressed.

In conclusion, the Council desire to thank all those who have rendered service in any way, and trust that this support may be continued for many years.
