Report of the Committee of Management

THE year 1934 has been chiefly conspicuous for a great deal of hard work, owing to the increased number of in-Patients.

Financially we have held our own and marked time, reducing the deficit on the Building Fund by just over £1,000, and slightly improving our position with regard to our general account. For the former we have again to thank the Fitton Trustees, the Bernhard Baron Trust Fund, and King Edward's Hospital Fund for their generous donations. We also owe grateful thanks to Mrs. Gilbert Russell for her gift of £100 and to the fathers of the babies born in the Hospital, who rarely omit to add 1d. to our Mile of Pennies Fund on their tri-weekly visits. £100 has already been collected by this Fund.

The Hospital activities now include not only the Labour and Lying-in Wards and Extern Department, but also the Ante-Natal, Post-Natal, and Infant and Dental Clinics, the Mothers' Club for those expecting their first babies, and a certain amount of research work, conducted by our generous friends, Dr. Davis and Dr. Boyd, pathologists to the Seamen's Hospital. The purchase of a first class microscope, towards which we received three welcome gifts, has enabled our Resident Medical Officer to join in this branch of the work.

We feel even more strongly than before that we cannot delay much longer in adding another ward block to our present accommodation. At present we are refusing about 1,000 cases a year—90 were counted in one month alone—who come up confident of securing a bed in four or five month's time, and find to their dismay that we are always fully booked up six months ahead. To this end we have been advertising in the Metropolitan Tube Railways and have also ordered a large supply of collecting boxes (Subscribers and friends please note) besides having our ordinary collections. Messrs. Morgan Laird & Co. have presented us with a very attractive booklet containing full details of the work of the Hospital, which is invaluable for advertising purposes. The subject of Maternal Mortality has again been much before the public, and we cannot but feel that a Hospital which can show a record of only 1.62 Maternal deaths per 1,000 births during the last 13 years—not one of those deaths being septic—should be enabled in the public interest, to enlarge its boundaries. The average Maternal Mortality Rate for the country is over 4 per 1,000 and it has risen during the last 10 years. At least half of these deaths are preventable, but it seems probable that they will not be prevented until fundamental alterations have been made in the training of both medical

students and Midwives—a two years' training to be given to the latter, and to all candidates, irrespective of their previous calling. This is already the case in many European countries. We have been pioneers in the matter of Midwives' training in the past, and it is possible we may again become so.

The Hospital has sustained a very great loss in its Chaplain and friend of twenty years' standing, the Rev. R. White Ayre, who has been obliged to retire from reasons of health.

Our very grateful thanks are again due to Mrs. Hawkes for her successful and well organised Linen League, and to all the many kind friends who have helped with our various functions, Mother's Day, Flag Day, Pound Day, October Sale, Jumble Sale, Christmas and Epiphany festivities.

We should like to call the attention of our friends to the fact that the Hospital is keeping its 30th Anniversary this year, and that an Appeal is shortly to be launched with the object of completing the building. The Second Ward Block, Nurses' Hostel, and Isolation Block are still to come, and the Isolation Block is becoming a very urgent matter as our present temporary building is growing very dilapidated.

Report of the Matron

1934 has been a very over-crowded year, and one which has taxed the resources of the Hospital to their limit. We can make up 42 beds, including those reserved for isolation, but we have found ourselves on many occasions with 44 or 45 in-patients and, therefore, with no isolation bed—a dangerous condition. In November our daily occupied beds averaged 40 and we, therefore, failed lamentably in keeping some accommodation for severe emergencies and a margin to meet the sudden rushes that must inevitably occur—which should be the ideal of every Maternity Hospital.

It is also essential to successful management to empty and clean the wards in rotation—stoving, bedding, etc., every two months. This has only been made possible by converting the lecture room into a convalescent ward for a considerable period, a thoroughly bad plan as the lecture room serves as a silence room for quiet study as well as lectures. The standard of the Central Midwives' Board Examination is rising steadily and, if the candidates are to be successful, time, space and quiet are

necessary for them. Our nurses have, up to the present, done well in spite of these difficulties, only three having failed during the past year out of 30 entrants.

The medical report for the year is also satisfactory, but this has only been achieved at great expense of anxiety and worry, besides the constant strain of refusing urgent cases from the district, and the depression caused by our failure to meet the increasing demand.

The health of the staff has been good on the whole. One young maid developed an acute appendicitis and was operated on in S. Nicholas' Hospital, returning to us to convalesce. She is now on full work again. Our engineer and general factotum, Mr. Conway, unfortunately broke his fibula and was off duty for eight weeks, which necessitated our engaging extra help. The floors in both theatres have been very satisfactorily re-laid by Messrs. Thomas & Edge in a combination of tiling and linoleum.

797 in-patients were delivered during the year, and 807 babies born, there having been 10 cases of twins. This exceeds last year's total by 72 deliveries. One mother died on her 14th day after labour, very suddenly, of pulmonary embolism. 190 patients were delivered on the district and, of these, one mother died of acute heart trouble on the third day after labour. She had been very ill for a long time at home and had refused Hospital treatment. No patient was transferred to another institution.

The attendances at the Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics were naturally increased in proportion to the deliveries, and the Young Mothers' Ante-Natal Club continues to flourish. The Dental Clinic is very popular and increases in numbers. 30 complete dentures have been supplied during the year. There is a marked improvement in the health of many of the mothers since this service became popular.

Miss Jennie Mennie, who had worked with us after passing the Central Midwives' Board Examination as staff-nurse for some time, was appointed Sister in April, and it has proved a happy arrangement on all sides. We are very grateful to her for her successful efforts in organising Country Dancing among the nursing staff. Their display at the Linen League Garden Party and also on Pound Day was greatly appreciated.

As usual I gladly take the opportunity afforded me by the Report of saying how deeply indebted we are to many who have given us voluntary help in our various efforts—and especially to those who come regularly to our crowded weekly infant clinic,

Miss Tilley and Miss Leadbitter, and to our Mothers' Club. Also to kind friends who have given lectures to the nursing staff on various subjects, of general as well as professional interest—lectures which have been, without question, of great value to us all.






