





Thirty-Fourth Annual Report.

For the Year 1927.

To the Governors of the Crewe Memorial Hospital.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the Committee of Management we have pleasure in submitting the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the Year ended 31st December, 1927. The accounts reveal a very satisfactory position.

Deaths.

During the year the Hospital has suffered very considerable loss by the deaths of three valued members of the Committee, in the persons of Baroness Schröder, Mrs. McNeill and Mr. J. W. Jones.

The sudden death of the Baroness Schröder came as a great shock to everyone, she having attended a meeting of the Committee only a few days prior to her death. She was very keenly interested in the Institution and her help and support, in many ways, will be greatly missed. She had been a member of the Committee since 1897.

By her will she bequeathed a sum of £500 to the Endowment Fund of the Hospital.

Mrs. McNeill was the only surviving member of the first Committee and continued to attend the meetings regularly and took a very active interest in its welfare, never tiring of supporting any undertaking in its aid.

Mr. J. W. Jones was also a very valued member, being also a Trustee, and although during the latter part of his life he was unable through indisposition to continue the same lively interest, he was always a very staunch supporter.

To the representatives of each we offer our sincere sympathy in their loss and place on record our deep appreciation of their valued assistance, so willingly rendered, for so many years. Their places will be hard to fill.

Financial Statement.

The Financial Statement still shows a credit balance and is the best indication of the generous and untiring efforts of the many friends which the Hospital is so happy to possess.

L. M. S. Rly. Hospital Fund.

We can only reiterate what we have said previously that the arrangements with this excellent Fund have been of a most harmonious and satisfactory character. The greater number of patients admitted to the Hospital are members of the Fund, which will be better understood by reference to the Financial Statement showing the amount paid on their behalf. The example set by the Fund is one worthy of consideration by other employers of Labour, also the employees who when in need of hospital treatment find their difficulties reduced to the lowest possible minimum.

We wish the Fund the continued success which it so worthily deserves, and once more express our great appreciation of its valued work.

Patients.

From the comparative statement shown on page 25 it will be seen that 659 patients have been admitted during the year of whom 606 were discharged as cured and relieved. The number of patients is less than last year owing to the fact that the operating theatre at the hospital was closed for three months on account of alterations and consequently only minor operations could be performed during this period. In addition there has been an outbreak of measles which rendered it necessary to close the Hospital to new patients. The waiting list for patients is still a long one and we are still suffering from the effects of overcrowding; but with the completion of the extensions it is hoped that our difficulties in these matters will be overcome.

Linen League.

It is very gratifying to record the continued success of this effort, which is undertaken by the Ladies, and will all concerned please accept our warmest thanks. The effort this year resulted in 473 articles being received, and contributions to the amount of £52 6s. 7d. which will be expended as necessity arises to replenish the stocks at the Hospital. In view of the extensions to the Hospital, and the demand for more beds, the success attending the effort is greatly appreciated.

We also gratefully acknowledge with many thanks their handsome contribution of £50 toward the Extension Fund.

Egg Collection.

This is another successful Ladies' Effort which is much appreciated by the Management Committee and this year no less than 456 eggs were collected.

Euston Restaurant.

This Sub-Committee have again to report a very successful year, the result of which has been that they have been enabled to contribute £500 to the funds of the Hospital, being an increase of £100 on the previous year.

We take this opportunity of thanking our many patrons for their support, also the staff, for their loyal and faithful service, which undoubtedly is an important factor, and we look with every confidence to a continuation of support from this source.

In addition to being such a very valuable asset to the Hospital, it carries cut the intention of the founders by providing refreshments at a reasonable cost. Improvements are being constantly made for the comfort of its patrons, which by the increased support are evidently greatly appreciated by the public. The Commercial Room is always at liberty for meetings in aid of efforts on behalf of the Hospital and it is very gratifying that it is so much called in request for this purpose.

Annual Fete.

The very wet Summer caused much anxiety to those responsible for the arrangements connected with this Great Event, but fortunately (unlike the experience of many other similar efforts) the weather was on its best behaviour in the week preceding the date of the event, and gave everyone concerned great encouragement.

The altered conditions under which it had to be held, i.e. "Showland" having to be located outside the Park gave the Executive much thought for consideration, but undaunted by the immensity of the task, and the many problems to be solved, they set to work with a willingness and determination which could not fail to mean ultimate success. We are pleased to record that what at first seemed an impossible task, and of grave concern, particularly from a financial point of view, was quite as successful as in previous years. It was decided that the ground in close proximity to the Hospital would prove the better of the sites available and was adopted as the venue for "Showland." This necessitated much extra labour and expense, fencing having to be erected practically all round the ground and a new Entrance made on the West Side of the Park, but all obstacles were overcome, and with the closing of the road adjacent to the spot, to which the Corporation very willingly acceded, everything passed off satisfactorily and much valuable knowledge was obtained for future occasions.

The programme was very much on similar lines to previous years, and it is surprising how year by year, the Troupes find fresh ideas, and carry them to such a successful conclusion. The arena was again filled to its utmost capacity, and the pleasure afforded to the spectators was demonstrated by the reception given to them as they passed through, and gave their performances.

Unfortunately the storm which broke over the grounds towards the end of the afternoon rather upset the otherwise perfect arrangements.

The "Forecasting" Competition, which was a new feature, being introduced this year for the first time, was a great success, and reflects the greatest credit upon those responsible for its organization.

As we have pointed out previously, the preliminary arrangements in connection with an event of such magnitude required a great sacrifice of time, thought, and labour, on those responsible for its organization, better understood by those who undertake the work whether the Officials or Committee, or those taking an active part in the Carnival. We desire to convey our warmest appreciation of their efforts and hope that the good work will continue and meet with the support that it deserves, as without its help the work of the Hospital could not be continued with efficiency as at present.

It was extremely unfortunate that the Special arrangements made this year in regard to Illuminations, and the Grand Firework Exhibition, were somewhat marred by the storm, but of course it is understood, in all out-of-door efforts that this risk has to be run. We look for better luck next year.

We again desire to express our thanks to Mr. P. Collins and the other Showmen for their effort on the Monday night; and it is pleasing to think that his great interest in our Hospital still continues; this resulted in a useful addition to the finances.

The amount granted to the Hospital was £1000 the same as in the previous year, and taking all things into consideration it is a very handsome result. Long may the same good spirit exist and success attend the efforts of the Committee is the sincere wish of the Management.

Mr. J. A. Dutton (Hon. Secretary and Organizer) will be pleased to hear from any one desirous of assisting, or who has any suggestions in connection with this year's event, which it is hoped will be a record one, in view of the Great Extension Scheme now in hand.

Workshop Cricket Competition

Notwithstanding the very wet weather during the Summer months, on many occasions interfering with the arrangements in connection with this Competition, it had a very successful time.

The interest, both of the players and supporters, was even greater than ever, and many happy hours were spent in playing the respective matches, the keen rivalry of the teams creating much enthusiasm, which was reflected in the splendid support accorded.

No less than 35 teams entered, and the cricket throughout was of such a lively character that it is safe to say was enjoyed by all. The Hospital benefited as a result of the effort by £50, and we look forward with great confidence to continued support from this venture. It is obvious that the organization and arrangements necessitate a great sacrifice of time and labour on the willing band of workers who undertake this part of the Competition and to all, particularly Mr. Bostock who acts as Hon. Secretary of both this and the Football Competition, we accord our grateful thanks and hope they will continue to receive the support their efforts merit.

Workshop Football Competition.

It was very unfortunate that the weather interfered so many times with the arrangements connected with this Competition, but the Committee and Officials are to be complimented on bringing it to such a successful issue, both from a playing and a financial sense. The repeated setbacks were sufficient to dishearten even the most enthusiastic workers, but, undeterred, they plodded on and were eventually rewarded by successful Semi Final and Final Matches, which replenished the otherwise depleted exchequer.

Owing to the re-organization of the Shops in the Works, there were fewer Shop teams, but this did not in any way interfere with the interest taken. There were 25 entries, the Final being fought out by teams representing "The Forge" and "Copper Shop" resulting in a win for the former, after a most exciting encounter, by 3 goals to 1.

The Cup and Medals were presented by Mr. Forshaw of the L.M.&S.Rly. Cos. Welfare Department, who expressed his great surprise at the interest taken in the effort and his pleasure at being present. The financial result was the same as in the previous year, i.e. £90 being handed over to the Hospital, which is a magnificent result taking into consideration, as mentioned before, the very bad climatic conditions that had to be contended with during practically the whole of the Season.

Alexandra Rose Day.

The organization of this effort was again undertaken by the same willing Ladies, and, as usual, the efficiency of the arrangements was again demonstrated by the gratifying success of their efforts, and although these efforts are generally speaking being made with more frequency than hitherto, it is pleasing that "Alexandra Rose Day" loses none of its popularity, not only locally, but throughout the length and breadth of the land. The amount raised this year and handed over to the Hospital was no less than £106 11s. 9d.

Can we say more than that we express our deep indebtedness to those concerned, whether in the organization or in the disposal of the Flowers in the streets, also to those who contributed by gifts of Flowers, or in any other way to the success of the undertaking.

Extensions.

We are pleased to report that during the year very considerable progress has been made in regard to the much needed extensions, so long before your notice.

The Bungalow, which will eventually be the Lodge at the new entrance to the Hospital, when the extensions are completed, has been erected, and was occupied in August, being utilized as temporary sleeping quarters for the Night Staff, who by the kindness of the Webb Orphanage Trustees, had been sleeping at that Institution.

The alterations to the Operating Theatre and X-Ray Room were completed in October, and an Ultra Violet Ray Room added and a new X-Ray apparatus installed, which it is admitted bring these departments quite up to date, and capable of carrying out any work desired. The L.M.&S. Rly Co's. Employees' Committee whose great assistance we have been pleased to acknowledge on previous occasions, have again shewn the very keen interest they take in the Hospital, having defrayed the entire cost of these alterations, and the new X-Ray Apparatus. We again take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation of their generous and very valued contribution to the equipment of the Hospital.

The Ultra Violet Ray Apparatus was installed by the Medical Staff of the Hospital, and to them we express our great gratitude.

The large scheme of extensions was commenced towards the end of September, after many meetings of careful thought and consideration. Tenders were invited and eventually the contract was given to Messrs Heath and Sons of Newcastle, Staffs.

The scheme being identified with the Jubilee of the Borough of Crewe, it was desired, if possible, to arrange for the Foundation Stone laying during the Mayoralty of Alderman A. H. Badger and we are pleased to record that this became an accomplished fact, the Ceremony taking place on Saturday, 29th October, when we were favoured with a large and representative assembly, including the member for Crewe, Sir E. Craig, and many prominent townspeople and detachments of Girl Guides and Boy Scouts and the Crewe Works Band.

Stones were laid by the Mayor, Alderman A. H. Badger, J.P., as Chief Citizen of the Town, and H. P. M. Beames Esq., J.P. (President of the Hospital) and Chief Mechanical Engineer of the L.M.& S. Rly. Co. at Crewe.

The X-Ray Apparatus was also officially handed over to the Hospital on this date by representatives of the L.M.& S. Rly. Co's. Employees' Committee.

Very considerable financial help was given to the scheme at the Ceremony, which was greatly appreciated, particulars of which will be found together with other items received since, on page 16.

We are delighted to record that the L.M.&S. Rly. Co., in celebration of the Jubilee of the Borough. very kindly forwarded a cheque for £2500 towards the Scheme and we take this opportunity of expressing our grateful thanks for their great help; this is not, by any means, the first time the Hospital has had sympathetic assistance from the Company for which we are deeply indebted.

Schoolboys' Football Competition "Timperley Shield."

The Competition amongst the Schools of the Town was again well supported, and our thanks are due to those Teachers who so very kindly gave of their services, not only in the organization, but in assisting in carrying the matches to such a successful issue.

The Hospital benefited to the extent of £16, and as we have said previously we do not view this effort so much from a financial sense, although that is very acceptable, but as a means of getting the boys engaged in Hospital work, with the hope that when they have once commenced they will continue with the good work.

The final was played between teams representing the Borough School and West Street School, the former winning by one goal to nil.

The Shield was presented to the winners by Sir W. Hodgson, J.P., C.C., who was supported by the Director of Education and other prominent members of the Scholastic profession.

It is hoped, ere long, to introduce a Competition engaging the School Girls in Hospital work, and the Committee will be pleased to receive suggestions, with this object in view.

L. M. S. Rly. Co's. Employees' Committee.

The extent to which the Hospital has benefited by the efforts of this Committee will be better understood by reference to the remarks under the head of "Extensions." We have, as stated previously, made reference to the great interest they have evinced in the great Extension Scheme since its inception, and it was very pleasing to see their representatives present on the date of the Foundation Stone laying, when they handed over a cheque for £1000, as a part payment on account of the responsibility they have undertaken in connection with the better equipment of the X-Ray Department, by defraying the cost of the alterations to the room and the installing of the up-to-date apparatus. We hope to place a permanent token of our appreciation in the room and look forward with grateful thanks to a continuance of their support.

Juvenile Hospital Ball.

The Children's Ball was again a great success. The considerable amount of work which the effort entails was admirably carried out by the ladies concerned. The Town Hall was crowded and the costumes were delightful. The event has become exceedingly popular both with the children and the adults and this year the Hospital benefited by the sum of £27.

The best thanks of the Committee are tendered to the Alexandra Football Club; the Artists who gave their services so willingly from time to time to entertain the patients and staff at the Hospital; the workers who are instrumental in obtaining workshop collections for the Hospital; the various places of Worship for their collections; the Committee of the Weston Garden Party for their handsome donation of £22 10s. 0d.; and the annual governors for their regular support.

We have tried to thank everyone who has helped along the good work of the Hospital and if anyone of these has not been mentioned we tender our grateful thanks.

The Committee look forward with confidence to your continued support of their efforts to keep the Hospital efficient up-to-date and increasing in usefulness.



FORM OF CLAUSE to be inserted in the Will of a Testator or Testatrix bequeathing a Legacy to the Hospital.
