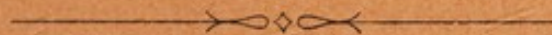

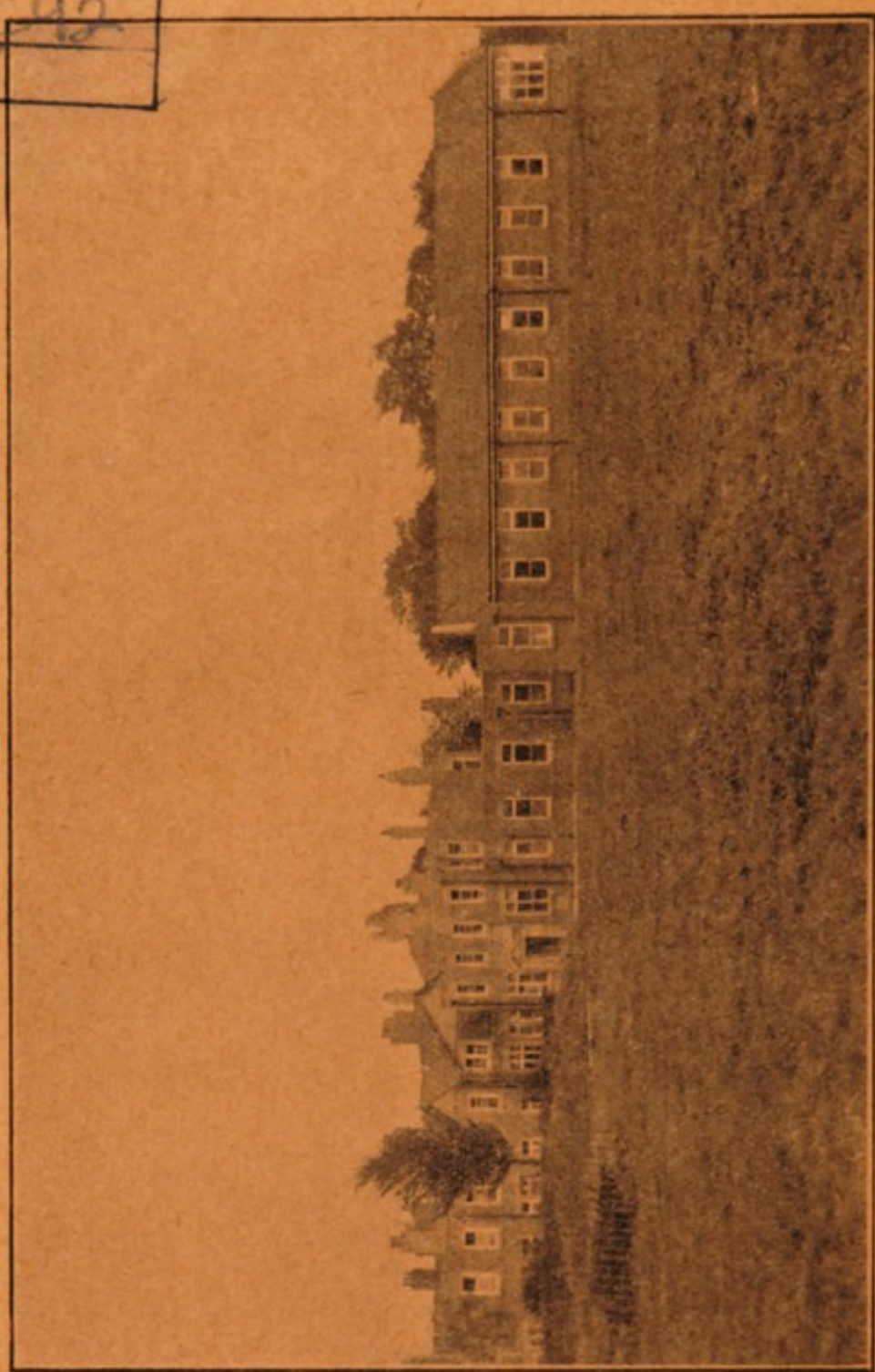

# Thirty-Fifth Annual Report

## For the Year 1928.

---

*To the Governors of the Crewe Memorial Hospital.*

Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Committee of Management have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1928.

From the Financial Statement (Maintenance Account) it will be seen that in addition to the usual sources of income, which have been well maintained, there are several items of exceptional interest, i.e. contributions in respect of "The Exhibition of Engine" 'Royal Scot' at Crewe Station—Sale of Tinfoil—Income Tax reclaimed—which enabled the Committee to finish the year with a credit balance of £48 18s. 0d.

This we consider is a matter for congratulation, when we take into consideration the many calls that have been made in connection with the Extensions Account—detailed particulars of which will be found elsewhere, and the further fact that the Committee have placed to the latter account the sum of £1000 received from the Annual Fete and £500 received from the Euston Restaurant, items which are usually placed to Maintenance Account.

It has been a year of great activity, the most important achievement being the completion of the Extensions Scheme.

The Opening Ceremony in connection with the latter took place on Saturday, 29th September last, when we were honoured by the visit of H.R.H. Princess Mary, Viscountess Lascelles, who, to the joy of the inhabitants of the town, undertook to perform the opening ceremony.

We are very greatly indebted to Her Royal Highness for her presence, and we think we can claim the happy event will for ever remain a "red letter day" in the history of the Hospital.



On arrival at the Hospital the Princess was received by the President, who was presented to Her Royal Highness after which she proceeded to a specially erected platform at the entrance to the Hospital.

A very pleasing incident took place on the arrival of the Princess at the platform, Her Royal Highness being presented with a bouquet of roses by Miss Mary Timperley, the little daughter of the Hon. Secretary Councillor P. Timperley.

The Princess graciously consented to receive purses which had been collected on behalf of the building Fund. It was very gratifying to see the enthusiasm with which this work had been undertaken, and it was a very pleasing sight to witness the representatives of the various Schools in the Town, Railway Workshops, Factories and Business Houses, as they stepped on to the platform and handed to Her Royal Highness their contributions to the effort.



The President handed a cheque for £1000 to the Princess being the proceeds of the Annual Carnival and Fete recently held in aid of the Hospital.

The President of the Hospital presided over the gathering, and was supported by Sir William Hodgson, Sir Josiah Stamp, the Mayor and Mayoress, Trustees of the "Wood and Garnett" bequest, Representatives of the Medical Staff, Management Committee and other local bodies.

The Guard of Honour was provided by the Nursing Staff, of the Hospital, British Red Cross Society, S. John Ambulance Brigade, Girl Guides and Boy Scouts.

The President, in extending to Her Royal Highness a very hearty welcome to the railway town of Crewe, said how greatly it was appreciated that in the midst of her many duties and calls upon her time Her Royal Highness had been able to visit the town to open the extension of the Hospital.

He gave some very interesting particulars of the beginning and subsequent growth of the Institution, resulting in the hospital providing a : additional 25 beds—private wards— a new administrative block—X-Ray, Ultra Violet Ray Depts., and adequate accommodation for the Staff.

Captain Beames presented the architect Mr. Jas. Martin and the builder of the new Extensions Mr. Stephen Heath after which the architect asked Princess Mary to accept a souvenir of the occasion, consisting of solid gold pencil case.

Having accepted the Souvenir, the Princess formally declared the extension open by unlocking the door at the entrance, after which a short Dedicatory Service was held, conducted by The Mayor's Chaplain (Rev. D. T. Mann) and the Rev. W. H. Brind, R.D.

Thanks were expressed to Her Royal Highness in a resolution moved and seconded by Sir W. Hodgson and Sir Josiah Stamp respectively, and the feeling of all was fully conveyed in words spoken by the former when he said "It is with hearts full of thankfulness that Captain Beames and his Committee and all the people of this community recognise in the gracious visit of the Princess a right Royal benediction on all the work embraced in the extension of these premises."



Her Royal Highness made a tour of inspection of the whole of the premises, the first point visited being the "Wood and Garnett" Ward, and while in this Ward C. E. Davenport, Esq., Dr. R. T. Turner and W. E. Birchall, Esq., trustees of the bequest were presented by the President, the Princess named the Ward "The Wood and Garnett" Ward.

The Princess expressed herself pleased with all she had seen. Before leaving the Princess spoke to a number of those in charge of the Guard of Honour following which the National Anthem was sung.

After the departure of the Princess opportunity was afforded the General public to inspect the premises.

### Linen League Effort.

It is particularly pleasing to record the continued success of the Ladies in this effort—especially this year, when with the extended premises, there was a greater demand to equip them.

The work means a great sacrifice of time and labour, so willingly given, and the success of their efforts must to some extent recompense them for the time devoted to the work.

This year no less than 421 articles were received and £86 11s. 5½d. in cash, the latter being expended, as necessity arises, in replenishing the stocks.

The exhibition of Linen at the Hospital, when an opportunity was given to the public to inspect the premises, was a great success, the privilege of viewing the hospital being greatly appreciated.

### Egg Collection.

The result of the collection of Eggs, organised for the second year by the Ladies of the Management Committee and the Matron, exceeded the most sanguine anticipations, resulting in no less than 2,886 eggs being collected, and the Ladies are to be congratulated on the success attending their efforts—this is an increase of 2,430 eggs on the previous year, and speaks for itself as to the efficiency of the organisation.



### Tinfoil Collection.

This item appears for the first time in the report, and the result demonstrates the value of what can be done by the collection of what would otherwise be waste, and to Mrs. Delaney who organised the venture and carried it through to such a successful issue, we tender our appreciation of her work, the magnitude of which can be better understood when it is stated that no less than 900 lbs. was received, for which £10 11s. 3d. was handed over to the Hospital Funds. To those who gave the additional prizes please accept our thanks and we are pleased to hear that still greater successes lie ahead.

### Alexandra Rose Day.

This effort is now looked upon as a permanent source of income for the Hospital, and whilst it continues to be managed by the same willing Ladies, its success is assured. This year it resulted in a contribution of £86 7s. 7d. to the Hospital, and to all who were in any way associated with the organisation we tender our grateful thanks and sincerely hope that they will continue to carry on the good work.

### Fishing Competition.

Unfortunately the interest in this Competition seems to have diminished, and this year no Competition was held.

The Committee had an amount of £24 1s. 4d. standing to their credit at the Bank, which has been handed over to the Hospital.

We sincerely hope that it may be possible to again organise followers of "Isaac Walton" and that we shall be able to enlist their appreciated assistance on behalf of the Hospital.

Meanwhile the Cup has been safely put away pending a revival of the interest.

### Exhibition of Engine "Royal Scot" at Crewe Station.

It was our good fortune to be included amongst those to whom grants were made, as the result of the Exhibition of the Engine "Royal Scot" at Crewe Station, the amount allocated to the Hospital being no less than £71 10s. 0d., and to all concerned we express our grateful thanks and appreciation for their kindly thought.



### Euston Restaurant.

Whilst we have not had quite as good a year as last—which was a record one—we have every reason to be pleased with the result of the year's working, taking into consideration the general depression in trade.

The profit on the year's trading is £425 2s. 11d., which added to the amount brought forward £247 4s. 0d., gives an available balance of £672 6s. 11d. The Committee have voted £500 0s. 0d. to the Hospital, and made a request in the circumstances that it should be allocated to the Extensions Account.

We again thank all who have in any way contributed to the success of the establishment, whether Staff, Patrons or others, and look forward with confidence to a continuance of their esteemed support.

### Juvenile (Fancy Dress) Ball.

This Social Event, in which the children take such a deep interest, was again an unqualified success from every point of view, and reflects the greatest credit on those responsible for the arrangements, to whom we extend our heartiest thanks.

The Town Hall presented a very pretty sight, the originality and diversity of the costumes, etc. must have caused the judges many anxious moments prior to giving their decisions.

The Hospital benefit to the extent of £8 13s. 0d., which is very gratifying.

### L.M.S. Hospital Fund.

It is our pleasure to once again express our great appreciation of the excellent work carried on by this estimable Fund, the extent of its association with the Hospital will be understood by reference to the Financial Statement, giving the amount of the payments made on behalf of its members who have been in the Hospital. We can only repeat what we have said previously, that every railwayman should be a member, if he is not he is failing to take advantage of a most valuable organisation, which provides help just at the time when it is needed.

We again express our thanks and wish the Fund continued success.

### L.M.S. Railway Employees' Committee.

The Hospital has again had the hearty support of the Employees' Committee who some time ago agreed to raise the cost



of the Extension of the X-Ray Department and the new apparatus installed therein. A substantial donation appeared in the accounts for 1927 and it is understood that as a result of their efforts in 1928 a further donation will shortly be received from them. The interest of the Employees' Committee in the work of the Hospital is much appreciated.

### Annual Fete and Carnival.

Those responsible for the organisation of the Pageant, in connection with the above, which it must be admitted is the chief attraction of the day, had many anxious moments prior to the event owing to the fact that there were fewer Workshop Sections than usual (due to causes over which they had no control) but the Hon. Organizer (Mr. J. A. Dutton) with the resources at his disposal, was able to provide a very good "bill of fare" and much to the pleasure of everyone all passed off satisfactorily and the huge assembly around the arena had a very good entertainment.

It is sincerely hoped that with the improvement in the times, there will be the same keen rivalry exhibited by the various Workshops, and that the entries from this source will come up to the realization of former years.

The features in the Park were somewhat on the lines of previous years, excepting that there was a slight alteration made in the distribution of the different events, which proved to be a distinct improvement.

An additional attraction was provided this year by the engagement of a Band to play during the afternoon and evening and it was greatly patronized; it is felt that developments might be attempted in this direction.

The Rose and Sweet Pea Exhibition extended its operations, which was appreciated.

The Tennis Tournament as usual attracted a large number of entries and proved again a very appreciable item in the programme.

The various events created great enthusiasm and were witnessed by many devotees of the game.

The Bowling Tournament attracted some of the best bowlers in the district, and was the cause of great excitement especially in the final rounds. The winner this year being Mr. H. Buckley.

The Illuminations maintained their high degree of excellence and were the admiration of huge crowds many of whom came down specially to the Park for this attraction.



Mr. Pat Collins' "Old English Faire" was as usual the scene of a great concourse of people and the presence of this attraction is always looked for at the Annual Fete.

The Financial Result was the same as in the previous year, the Hospital benefiting to the extent of £1000, and it makes one ask what would the Hospital do without its Fete and Carnival?

To all engaged in its organisation, calling for such a great sacrifice of effort long before the eventful day we tender our very grateful thanks, can we say more than that we deeply appreciate all that is done and sincerely hope that all will continue in the good work, in the full knowledge that whatever sacrifices are made are to help a good cause

Mr. J. A. Dutton, the Hon. Organizer, will be pleased to receive the views of any one interested as to the future efforts—any suggestions made will receive the serious consideration of his Committee.

### Workshop Football Competition.

This Competition has again had a successful time, notwithstanding many disappointments on account of bad weather; the respective games were all fought out in a friendly and sporting spirit, and were, we feel sure, enjoyed both by players and spectators alike.

The final between the Steam Sheds and Forge ended in a draw, after a very hard, vigourous game; and as the lateness of the Season did not allow of a replay it was decided that the respective teams should be joint owners.

It is very gratifying to record that the teams arranged to afterwards play a friendly game on behalf of the Hospital, which resulted in the sum of £20 15s. 11d. being contributed to the funds of the Hospital. We thank all concerned for the kindly thought that prompted their action, and may further success attend their good intentions.

Mrs. Lemon very kindly attended and presented the awards.

The sum of £80 0s. 0d. was voted to the Hospital from the Competition, for which we extend our thanks.



### Workshop Cricket Competition.

No less than 35 teams entered for this year's Cricket Competition, and quite apart from the financial result, which is greatly appreciated, it was the means of providing exceptionally good sport, which was greatly enjoyed by the spectators who assembled on the evenings when the games were played.

Unfortunately the weather interfered with the game in the final match and it had to be postponed, but amends were made for the disappointment on the postponed date, when the Electrical Signal Dept., for the second year in succession, were the victors.

It is pleasing to know that the Committee have been able to vote the sum of £50 0s. 0d. to the Hospital, and to Mr. Bostock, who acts as Hon. Secretary to both this and the Football Competition, players, umpires, the Committee and those who patronized the different matches we tender our grateful thanks for their help.

Mr. G. H. Wood very kindly made the presentations to the winners at the conclusion of the final game.

### "Timperley" Football Shield.

This Competition among the teams representative of the Schools in the town created great enthusiasm among the boys, and the matches were the means of attracting good crowds to the Goddard Street Ground to witness the young sportsmen.

The result of the Competition added considerably to the finances of the contribution from the Football Section, and to the Teachers who carried through the arrangements, whether in the organization, or controlling the games, we extend our thanks for their kindly assistance.

### Christmastide at the Hospital.

The patients in the Hospital had a very enjoyable Christmas.

The Staff decorated the Wards, which presented a Festive appearance.

Many gifts were received, including a very welcome contribution from Princess Mary, and to all donors we express our thanks. To the Mayor and Mayoress (Coun. and Mrs. W. C. White) who paid a visit and distributed toys to the children we also say "thank you." Also to the Artistes—Madam B. Walley, Messrs. W. Horabin, J. Plait, H. Bray, J. Cottrell and S. Cottrell, who again so very kindly visited the Hospital and provided the entertainment for the patients.



### Patients.

Owing to the extensions the Hospital was from time to time partly closed during the year. In spite of this fact it is gratifying to know that 620 patients occupied beds during the year. 428 operations were performed. Other treatments were as follows:— X-Ray, 532; Ultra Violet Ray, 182; Therapy 143.

### Generally.

It is recognised in connection with these various efforts that there is a great amount of work, both by committees and individuals; and to all, in whatever capacity, they are associated with the work, the Management Committee of the Hospital wish to convey their grateful appreciation of their efforts, acknowledging that the good work could not continue unless they had the goodwill and support of the community. The Committee also desire to express their thanks for all gifts received.
