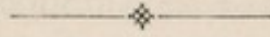

IN presenting the fifty-first Annual Report, the Executive Committee beg to express their sincere thanks to all who have contributed to the support of the Hospital during the past year by means of donations or subscriptions, in cash or kind, and to those who have supported and helped its work in other ways.

YEAR'S RECORD IN THE HOSPITAL.

The total number of in-patients admitted was 256; of whom 109 were males and 147 females, whilst the number of casualties dealt with amounted to 732.

MEDICAL REPORT.

We have much pleasure in submitting to you our Annual Report on the Medical Work of the Hospital for the year 1926.

The figures given, relating to the record of the year 1926, show that the hospital has done a considerable amount of work during that period. The cases admitted amounted to 256, which is a slight decrease from the corresponding number of the previous year, which amounted to 311 cases. As against that, however, 732 casualty cases were attended to as against 558 in the year 1925. The number of operations amounted to 194 as against 229 in the previous year. Of these operations 16 were performed by specialists who kindly came down from London to help us in more difficult cases. In this connection we take the opportunity of thanking Mr. Grant Massie, Mr. Rowlands, Mr. Bonar, Mr. Walford and Sir Thompson Walker for their help. The increase of the casualty work is very striking and shows that the hospital fulfils a very important function in the treatment of accidents and other emergencies occurring in the neighbourhood.

We were particularly unfortunate during the year in losing the services of our Matron, Miss Bewsey. She resigned last August. She had been with us for six years and had given of her best to the hospital. She was indefatigable in her work and did everything in her power to promote the well-being of the institution. Latterly her health had failed, and we wish her every success in the new post she has undertaken at Swanage, where the work will be somewhat lighter. We owe much to her, and she will be greatly missed. Our present Matron, Miss Round, entered on her duties in August, and during the short time she has been with us, she has done excellent work. We tender her and her staff our sincerest thanks.

Our thanks are also due to Mr. H. P. Tait, the Hon. Dental Surgeon, to Mr. Ede, the Hon. Radiographer, Miss French, the Hon. Masseuse, and Miss Hobson, the Lady Almoner, all of whom have done excellent work.

We hope that in the near future the work of erecting the new hospital will be commenced. As mentioned in many of the previous reports, the present building is quite out of date, and the work done can only be carried out with the greatest difficulty and inconvenience both to doctors and nurses.

FINANCIAL.

Income and Expenditure.

The total income for the 1926 amounted to £2,106/4/0, but, as £167/10/0 of this sum was derived from legacies and is consequently earmarked for investment, being capital, the income from ordinary sources was £1,938/14/0, almost £100 less than in 1925. The expenditure amounted to £1,818/17/2, about £25 more than in 1925. The diminished income is wholly explained by the falling off in receipts from patients' payments—£274/15/9 in 1926, as against £470/12/10 in 1925.

Ladies' Collections, Flower Day, &c.

The Committee feel that they owe a special debt of gratitude to Miss Johnson and the lady collectors for their successful labours last year which resulted in the collection of £244/10/6, the largest amount that has so far been obtained in any year since the inauguration of the Ladies' Collection. Flower Day receipts showed an increase of £12 on those of 1925, and the change from July to May was fully justified by this result. The sincere thanks of the Committee are due to the ladies who took charge of depôts, to their helpers who sold flowers, and all who helped to make the day such a conspicuous success. Pound Day gifts in kind are valued at £80, and about £22 in money was also received, which figures show little variation from those of last year. The Committee thank most heartily the band of ladies and gentlemen who put in so much hard work in the service of the Hospital, and above all the donors of the gifts.

To mark their appreciation of the gifts which came from the various schools, the Committee directed the Hon. Secretary to forward a 14-day Hospital Letter to the Headmaster or Headmistress of each of the schools contributing.

Teddington and District Amalgamated Societies.

The Committee are pleased to report that, in spite of the long period of industrial stress through which we have recently passed, the collections of the Amalgamated Societies resulted in a cheque for the substantial sum of £100. The Committee beg to convey to Mr. Cornwill and the members of the Amalgamated Societies their warmest thanks for their generous support.

Annual Hospital Flower and Vegetable Show.

For several reasons the Show was not so successful as last year, but it is satisfactory to be able to report that Messrs. A. Rogers, A. Kirby and the Committee, in spite of the difficulties with which they had to contend, succeeded in handing over to the Hospital the very useful sum of £46. The Committee also wish to convey their thanks to Mr. C. Neilson, Messrs. Cockerell, and the 3rd Teddington Boy Scouts for their help in running the Show.

Hospital Sunday Fund.

The Committee wish to convey their thanks to the Churches of St. Alban, St. Mark, St. Peter & St. Paul, Christ Church, and the Church of the Sacred Heart, Hampton Wick, for holding collections on behalf of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund, and thereby indirectly benefiting the Hospital.

Linen Guild.

The Linen Guild has issued its Second Annual Report, from which it appears that the value of the linen contributed by members of the Guild amounts to close on £38. In addition to this, linen to the value of £7/5/3 has been purchased out of subscriptions received and a balance of £13/12/3 remains in hand. The Committee beg to convey to Madame Mottu, Mrs. Parmeter, and the members of the Guild their sincerest thanks for their labours throughout the year, which have culminated in such a splendid result. The Guild has now constituted itself a permanent and indispensable branch of the Hospital work, and the Committee are confident that the Third Annual Report will be able to show still greater progress.

Matron.

The Committee accepted Miss Bewsey's resignation with the deepest regret, but having regard to the fact that she had been medically advised that the state of her health rendered residence on the south coast in the highest degree desirable, they felt that they had no option in the matter. Miss Bewsey combined with exceptional skill as a surgical nurse the qualities of an admirable manager, and by her wise economy contributed in no small degree to the satisfactory state of the Hospital finances which has obtained during the last few years, but in no way at the expense of the inmates.

In her stead the Committee have been fortunate in obtaining the services of Miss E. Round, formerly Assistant Matron of the Victoria Hospital, Wallasey, and they have every hope that she will prove an efficient successor to Miss Bewsey.

Obituary.

With great regret the Committee record the deaths during the year of Mrs. Cowan, Mr. H. Matthews, Mr. H. Pullman, J.P., all of whom were Life Governors of the Hospital.

Hospital Savings Association.

Twenty-one patients presenting the Association's vouchers were treated in the Hospital during the year as against 10 in 1925.

The Committee feel that they ought to correct the idea, largely prevalent among subscribers to the Association, that the payment made by it to the Hospital in respect of a patient wholly covers the cost of maintenance of the patient. This is far from being the case now, though when the scheme was first inaugurated the rate of payment fixed meant a profit to the Hospital of some 5/0 per week in respect of each patient admitted. It was soon apparent that the finances of the Association were inadequate to maintain this rate of payment and the scale was successively whittled down until in the quarter ended July 31st last, the Hospital was only receiving about half the cost of maintenance per patient. For the current year the scale has been fixed at 3/0 per day, or distinctly less than half the cost of maintenance per patient, with a share of any surplus remaining at the end of the year. At the same time it must be borne in mind that a proportion of the Association's members, if admitted to the Hospital as ordinary patients, would probably not be able to pay at the same rate as the Association pays for them, if at all, and so it is, perhaps, on the whole, worth while to continue to admit Association members.

New Hospital.

The legal questions which have to be dealt with in connection with the extension of the Trusts under which the land in Hampton Road was purchased, the extended scheme of a Health Centre having materialised since that purchase, are still under consideration. Meanwhile, the plans of the New Hospital have been approved by the Committee, and the Architect has been instructed to take the necessary steps to enable tenders to be invited as soon as they can be issued.

Auditor.

The Committee desire to express their sincere thanks to Mr. E. T. Wood, A.C.A., for his great kindness in once more auditing the Hospital Accounts.
