



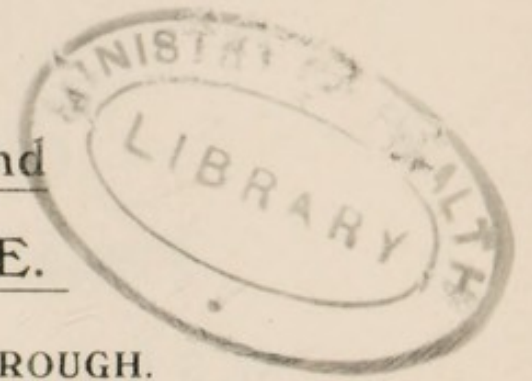

Sixty-Third Annual Report.

The Trustees and Committee have pleasure in submitting the Sixty-Third Annual Report, shewing the work done during the year 1929, with the usual Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet.

The Hospital was opened for the season on the 6th April, and closed to patients on November 9th. During that time 550 patients were admitted. Of these 210 were men and 340 women.

The total number of weeks of residence of the patients was 1,490. As compared with the previous year there has been an increase of 63 patients and 137 weeks of residence.

The usual subscription of £100 to the Scarborough District Nursing Association has been paid, and the continuous Free Tickets to the Scarborough Hospital and Dispensary have again been given and used.

The accounts for the past year (a certified copy of which follows this report) have been duly audited by Messrs. Robinson, Coulson & Kirkby, Chartered Accountants.

The Committee wish to draw attention to the fact that the total number of Convalescents admitted to the Institution during the past year viz.:—550, is greater than in any preceding year of its history, bringing the aggregate number of Convalescents admitted up to 17,026. Similarly the total of patients payments for the year exceeds that of previous years, owing largely to the Matron's constant and unfailing

co-operation, this increase of numbers and responsibility has only entailed a nominal increase of about ten pounds on the expenditure side of the accounts, which the Committee regards as highly satisfactory.

Although the Institution was originally intended by its Foundress, Mrs. Anne Wright, "as and for a Hospital for the cure of sick and lame persons, and who are wholly or partially destitute of the means of support," it was during the latter period of her life changed into a Convalescent Home, and as such it is to-day conducted.

The Trustees have, however, kept steadily in view the cause of the sick and poor as a secondary object of Mrs. Wright's endowments and when the Scarborough District Nursing Association was founded in 1909, the Trustees took an active part in its formation and constitution, and out of the surplus revenue of this Institution they have ever since regularly contributed £100 per annum to its support. Moreover, they have from time to time made supplementary grants of surplus income amounting in the aggregate to £1,107 9s. 0d., to promote the better equipment of the Association and to enable it to acquire free of debt the commodious premises in which it is at present established. The Trustees have freely subsidized this Nursing Agency with the object of giving effect and fuller expression to Mrs. Wright's original aims and aspirations.

The Committee sincerely thank all those who have so kindly rendered services to the Institution, particularly Messrs. Birdsall & Snowball, Hon. Solicitors to the Hospital, and also those from whom various gifts have been received.

SCARBOROUGH COTTAGE HOSPITAL.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

ORIGIN AND OBJECT.

The Institution was founded by the late Mrs. Annie Wright, as a home for the care and nursing of poor people. Acting under the original Trust Deed, dated 1st May, 1872, the Trustees, who are the governing body, are carrying on the Institution as a Convalescent Home according to the intentions of the Foundress.

I.—This Institution shall be managed by a Committee of Ladies and Gentlemen, who shall be elected by the Trustees at a meeting to be held annually in the month of March. The Committee at their first meeting shall elect a Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary out of their number, who shall act during the then ensuing year.

II.—The Committee shall meet at the Cottage Hospital at least once in each month, from April to October inclusive, and at such other times and places as the Committee may from time to time decide. Special meetings of the Committee may also be summoned by the Chairman or Secretary.

III.—Any of the Trustees or Committee may at any time visit the Hospital for the purpose of inspecting the same.

MEDICAL STAFF.

IV.—The Medical Staff of the Institution shall consist of two Honorary Consulting Physicians, two Surgeons, and one Honorary Dental Surgeon, to be appointed annually by the Trustees.

V.—Patients on admission to the Hospital shall be allotted in rotation to one of the Surgeons, each of whom shall attend at the Hospital once in each week or oftener if required. Should either of the Surgeons be unable to attend, he shall notify the other Surgeon and request him to attend for him.

VI.—No patient shall be attended by any medical man other than one of the Surgeons without the consent of the Committee.

THE MATRON.

VII.—The Matron shall be appointed by the Trustees at such remuneration and on such terms as the Trustees may think fit.

VIII.—The Matron shall personally superintend the Institution, and be responsible for its domestic management. Acting under the direction of the Committee, she shall engage and discharge all servants. She shall conduct all correspondence with the Subscribers and applicants for admission. She shall receive and keep an accurate account of all Subscriptions and Patients' Board Money; prepare the Annual List of Subscribers and Donors, and furnish the same to the Secretary, with such statistics as may be necessary to enable him to prepare the Annual Report. She shall forward the Annual Reports and Tickets of Admission to the Subscribers, and generally perform such duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the Committee. She shall also conduct family prayers, night and morning, and give facilities to any Clergyman, Minister, or other person to visit any inmate who may desire to have religious ministrations of any kind, subject to the sanction of the Committee.

SUBSCRIBERS' PRIVILEGES.

IX.—Subscribers of one guinea and upwards are entitled to receive for each guinea a ticket or recommendation to the Hospital for three weeks. A Patient admitted by a Subscriber's Ticket is charged the sum of Thirteen Shillings per week. The Committee reserve the right to admit other Patients on payment of a weekly sum of One Pound; and also to charge a higher rate in cases which require special treatment or privilege. No person shall be admitted without a Medical Certificate in the form prescribed from time to time by the Committee.

X.—The Institution is not designed for cases of serious illness. Only those Patients, therefore, can be admitted whose disease is not in an advanced stage, and who can be reasonably regarded as convalescent. Cases of Infectious or Contagious Disease, Asthma, Chronic Bronchitis, Insanity, Hypochondriasis, Fits, Hysteria, or Phthisis are inadmissible. Boys under eighteen and girls under fifteen years of age are ineligible for admission.

PATIENTS.

XI.—Visitors are permitted to visit the Patients on Sunday and Thursday afternoons from two to four o'clock; and at such other times as may be permitted by the Matron. No more than two persons shall be allowed to visit the same Patient at one time.

XII.—Patients are required to bring a pair of slippers, two towels, and to pay for their own washing.

XIII.—Persons are not allowed to play at any game for money, or to bet, or gamble, or smoke in the Hospital. They are required to be in the Hospital by 8-45 at night, and to retire to rest as quietly as possible not later than 9-45. Lights will be put out at 10 o'clock, and must not be re-lighted without permission from the Matron.

XIV.—Patients are expected to attend a place of Worship at least once every Sunday.

XV.—Patients are not allowed to leave the Institution before the expiration of their time, except by leave of the Surgeon in attendance.

XVI.—Patients are not allowed to use any diet except that provided for them. They must not bring into the Institution, or take any intoxicating liquor during their residence at the Cottage Hospital. They are required at all times to comply with the orders of the Matron and the Surgeon.

XVII.—Any person wilfully breaking these Rules will be liable to be dismissed.

XVIII.—Any Patient having a complaint to make should address the same to the Honorary Secretary, or any member of the Committee.
