ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING,

Monday, 25th March, 1946.

The Chair was taken by the President, Col. Sir Edward Warner, BART., D.S.O., M.C., who extended the thanks of the Board of Management to the Borough of Walthamstow for their courtesy in allowing the meeting to be held in the Council Chamber.

The following resolutions were passed: -

- 1. That the Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting, be taken as read, approved, and signed by the Chairman.
- 2. That the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts be adopted.
- 3. That Mr. E. C. Ruggles-Brise be re-elected as Honorary Treasurer.
- 4. That the following gentlemen be appointed for the ensuing year and that a vote of thanks be accorded to them for their services:—

Report of Board of Management.

The Board of Management beg to submit their Sixty-Ninth Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1946.

At this time last year discussion in the Hospital world centred around the probable nature of the hospital service organisation which would be proposed under the impending National Health Service Bill. To-day we are no longer concerned with the Bill. It was duly published in the Spring, debated in and out of Parliament, and by November had become the Act, amended and improved in some particulars from its original form, but remaining substantially the measure first introduced by the Minister. The Act will duly come into operation in 1948. The year 1946 will therefore be truly said to have been a momentous one in the annals of Voluntary Hospitals. This will of necessity bring many changes in policy and administration to the Connaught Hospital but we hope that whatever the future may bring the interest of the patient will be the first consideration.

Extension to the Hospital.—During the year alterations to and enlargement of the Main Kitchen and Nurses' Dining Room and additional Bedroom accommodation for Domestics were commenced and are nearing completion. The extensions to the Kitchen will enable a much better food service to be maintained to both patients and staff and the additional accommodation provided in the Nurses' Dining Room has long been overdue.

One of the outstanding features of the year was the building of the New Lecture Unit for Nurses in the grounds of Comely Bank, and this has proved a most valuable and useful addition to our training facilities, comprising as it does a Lecture Hall and Demonstration Class Room, with the necessary ancillary accommodation, and fitted with modern equipment.

The total cost of these extensions will amount to approximately £10,000 and we are grateful to King Edward's Hospital Fund for London for a grant of £500 towards this expenditure.

Emergency Medical Service.—We continue to reserve twenty beds for Emergency Medical Service patients and the payments this year by the Ministry of Health amounted to £4,938 as compared with £7,647 in 1945.

Board of Management.—It was with sincere regret that the Board accepted the resignation of Sir James B. Slade, J.P., as their Chairman, in April, and they desire to place on record the great esteem in which Sir James has been held during the many years he has been associated with the Hospital.

Mr. D. Cleave Cross was appointed to succeed Sir James Slade, and Dr. Douglas R. Blunn was appointed Vice-Chairman of the Board of Management and Chairman of the House Committee.

Hearty congratulations are extended to Ald. A. G. Bottomley, O.B.E., M.P., a member of the Board, upon his appointment as Parliamentary Under-Secretary for the Dominions.

Obituary.—The Hospital sustained a very sad loss in March by the passing of Mr. F. J. Coutts, M.D., M.B., B.S., F.R.C.S., Chairman of the Medical Committee.

Mr. Coutts was a member of the Honorary Medical Staff for thirty-two years and his name and work will always be gratefully remembered by the Hospital and its staff. We have lost a fine Surgeon and a wise Counsellor.

It was also with very sincere regret that the Board report the passing of Mr. Tudor Edwards, M.A., M.D., M.Ch., F.R.C.S. He served the Hospital for many years as a member of the Honorary Medical Staff and later as a Consultant Surgeon.

Medical Staff.—It was with very sincere regret that the Board accepted the resignation of Dr. J. C. Hawksley, M.D., F.R.C.S., who succeeded Mr. Coutts as Chairman of the Medical Committee, and Mr. O. V. Lloyd Davies, M.S., F.R.C.S. They both served the Hospital with distinction and greatly enhanced its reputation since their appointment ten years ago.

Dr. A. M. Stewart-Wallace, M.D., M.R.C.P., D.P.M., was appointed to succeed Dr. Hawksley, and Mr. J. Bentley, M.B., B.S., F.R.C.S., to succeed Mr. Lloyd Davies.

During the year Dr. J. E. G. Pearson, D.M., M.R.C.P., accepted a commission in the R.A.F., and during his absence Dr. D. Naldrett White, M.A., M.R.C.P., was appointed to deputise for him.

We welcome the return of our Orthopædic Surgeon, Mr. C. H. Gray, and Dr. L. H. Lerman (Hon. Anæsthetist), from H.M. Forces. The Board desire to thank Mr. W. D. Park, M.S., F.R.C.S., who has deputised for Mr. Gray during the past four years.

Dr. Douglas R. Blunn was appointed to succeed Dr. J. C. Hawksley as Chairman of the Medical Committee.

During the year Dr. H. A. C. Mason, M.S., B.S., was appointed as Honorary Psychiatrist but very shortly afterwards, owing to pressure of work, he had to resign. Dr. P. H. Tooley, M.D., has been appointed to succeed Dr. Mason.

The Board of Management express their sincere thanks for the fine services of the Honorary Medical Staff during the year.

Post Graduate Course.—The first Post Graduate Course was held in April and proved a success. It is hoped it will be possible to organise a further week-end course.

Retirement of Miss K. E. Haywood, A.R.R.C.—It was with very sincere regret that the Board received the resignation of Matron. Miss Haywood has given nearly twenty-five years of faithful service and the Board wish to record their very sincere appreciation and gratitude for her untiring devotion to duty. No one could have done more in helping to achieve the splendid reputation which the Hospital enjoys for its high standard of nursing and care for the patients. The Matron leaves with cordial wishes from all that she will have good health, long life and happiness in her retirement.

Appointment of Miss M. D. A. Houstoun, D.N.—Miss Houstoun has been appointed to succeed Miss Haywood as Matron and commenced her duties in February, 1947. She received her General Training at St. Mary's Hospital, Paddington, where she has held Senior Nursing and Administrative appointments. She comes to us with excellent recommendations and we extend to her a very cordial welcome.

Nursing Staff.—Your Board also report that Sister A. B. Banks has retired after nineteen years' service. She combined the duties of Assistant Matron, Sister Tutor and Home Sister. The Board record their sincere thanks for all she has done on behalf of the Nurses and the Hospital. Her Students achieved a splendid record of success in the State Examinations and her work as Assistant Matron was excellent.

We welcome Miss B. W. Ford, B.A., D.N., who has been appointed to succeed Sister Banks as Sister Tutor.

The work of the Nursing Staff has again been of a very high order and the Board extend to them their sincere thanks.

The Nurses' Examinations during the past year have been very satisfactory and the results are as follows:—

Final Štate Examination ... 10
Hospital Certificate Examination ... 11

During the year seventeen new Student Nurses were admitted but five of these proved unsuitable for further training.

This year the prizes were very kindly given by Mr. F. G. Pentecost and presented to the Student Nurses by Mrs. Pentecost. The finalists were Nurses E. V. Panniers, H. Maddox, V. Bennett, J. Stewart-Jones, P. M. Jones, M. Simmons and V. Farrell.

During the year a Nurses' Representative Council was formed, the principal objects of which are to enable the Nursing Staff to discuss matters concerning their work, efficiency, comfort and welfare. The Council is representative of all sections of the Nursing Staff and they are thus able to make representations on all matters to the Nursing Committee.

Immediate Urgent Needs.—During the year the Medical Committee have urged that adequate accommodation should be provided for keeping medical records, that the Physiotherapy Department should be extended to provide for rehabilitation work, and that our present department for Pathological investigations be extended.

Superficial X-Ray Therapy Unit.—The decontamination room built during the war has been converted into a Department for Skin Therapy.

A new X-Ray apparatus has been installed and it is hoped that it will soon be possible to commence treatment.

Comely Bank—New Equipment.—Much of the equipment and apparatus in the Physiotherapy Department has become obsolete and has had to be replaced.

Decorations.—After the removal of the Air-Raid precautions the Hospital badly needed redecorating and the Ministry of Health granted a licence to do the work, both internally and externally, at a cost of £2,500.

King Edward's Hospital Fund.—The annual visit of inspection by representatives from the King's Fund was made in July and we were very pleased to welcome them. They saw most of the Wards and Departments and the new Nurses' Lecture Unit, and were satisfied in every way with the services provided.

V.D. Department.—In July your Board met Representatives of the Essex County Council to resume discussions regarding the establishment of a V.D. Department. It was agreed that we should allow a building to be erected in the grounds of Comely Bank and the County Council will be responsible for all capital and maintenance expenditure—the Nursing and Lay Staff will be provided and supervised by the Hospital. The Ministry of Health has

approved the Scheme and building operations will be commenced in the very near future.

Dedication of Beds.—It is with the greatest pleasure that the Board report that during the year the following beds were dedicated. Their sincere thanks are extended to all the donors:—

Old Patients' Association Cot.

Leytonstone and Leyton Footballers' Bed.

Connaught Hospital Horticultural Society Bed.

Finance.—A year of heavy expenditure closed with a deficit on the Income and Expenditure Account amounting to £14,743.

The Hospital found itself in financial difficulties mainly as a result of salary increases to all grades of staff recommended by the National Joint Council.

The financial position has been discussed with the King Edward Hospital Fund for London and on their recommendation the Board has decided to make an application to the Ministry of Health for assistance.

The cost per occupied bed has risen from £6 14s. 8d. in 1945 to £7 8s. 9d. in 1946.

Almoner's Department and Samaritan Fund Report.

This has been a very busy and interesting year, a breathing space, as it were, in which to assess the gradual return to peacetime conditions and to make preparation for the possible changes that may lie ahead.

In our work, we are still reminded of the war in many ways. No week passes without an ex-Service man being referred by the Ministry of Pensions to Hospital for treatment for some disability incurred during the fighting A certain number of civilian air raid cases stll have to attend Hospital—one in particular comes to mind—a housewife of 40, with an injury to her leg which has necessitated its being in plaster for the past two years. On her frequent visits to Hospital she is always cheerful and smiling. She receives an allowance from the Ministry of Pensions and any leg support she may have to wear later will be paid for by them, but nothing can adequately compensate her for such unmerited suffering.

During the past year, a number of patients have been sent to Convalescent Homes for a period of rest and recuperation. Most prefer to go to the seaside and this year, as more Homes re-open after being closed during the war, it will be possible to arrange this more easily. To see a man who, perhaps, has been in Hospital for two months with a gastric ulcer, come back after a few weeks at the sea, looking as brown as a berry and feeling a different person, is something very rewarding.

Many types of surgical appliances have been supplied during the year, from trusses to artificial legs. Several Hearing Aids were supplied but these are very expensive and there were several occasions when the Samaritan Fund had to be called upon to help. One, supplied to an elderly lady of over 70, seemed to have the astonishing effect of restoring her own hearing to a certain extent; at all events, she came rejoicing to Hospital and, recounted, how, walking along the street one day, she realised she could hear a dog barking and, stopping abruptly in the street she exclaimed, "I can hear! I can hear!"

The money for surgical instruments and for convalescence is provided from many sources—from National Health Approved Societies, Contributory Schemes, the Social Welfare Authorities and local agencies such as the Glasspool Trust, whose help is valuable and greatly appreciated. Sometimes, there still remains an outstanding balance, and here, the Samaritan Fund must help in small things such as assisting necessitous patients with their fares to Hospital for treatment or in paying for the cost of extra milk for a patient for a few weeks.

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

The Hospital is open to receive patients from Walthamstow, Wanstead, Leyton, Leytonstone, Chingford, and other parts under the following conditions, viz:—

Accidents and Cases of Emergency will receive immediate attention at any hour of the day or night.

In-Patients must bring, or be preceded by, a recommendation from their medical attendant, who should also certify that they and their homes are free from any contagious or infectious disease or complaint.

In all cases it should be ascertained beforehand if a vacant bed is or will be available.

Out-Patients should attend the respective Clinic at the Out-Patients' Department.

In-Patients and Out-Patients who are not members of a Contributory Scheme are expected to contribute towards the cost of treatment and maintenance according to their means, but no patient will suffer through inability to do this.

Paying Patients, who will be accommodated in single bed private wards, should request their medical attendants to arrange beforehand with the selected member of the Hospital Visiting Staff respecting fees and date of admission. The Hospital charge for these private rooms, inclusive of maintenance and all ordinary medicine, is 7 guineas per week. A further charge of 1 guinea is made for the use of the Operating Theatre if required, and scale charges for X-Ray, pathological examinations and expensive drugs and medicines.

VISITORS TO PATIENTS.

- 1. Patients may be visited by their friends on Sundays between the hours of 2 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. (Children's Wards, 2 p.m. to 3 p.m.) and on Wednesdays between the hours of 2 p.m. and 3 p.m., subject to the consent of the Medical Officers.
- 2. Not more than two visitors will be allowed to each patient at the same time, and not more than six for each patient on any one day, each child counting as one visitor.
- 3. Two Visitors' Cards will be issued to the next-of-kin of each patient on admission to Hospital, and these must be given up on discharge. These cards must be shown to the Hall Porter before the Visitors proceed to the Wards, and then handed to the next two Visitors before they can be admitted, and so on.
- 4. Visitors are particularly requested to keep to the bedside of the patient they visit, and not to visit the Hospital at all if there be any infectious disease in their homes.
- 5. Nothing whatever must be given to the patient without the sanction of the Matron, or Sister in charge of the Ward.
- 6. In cases of serious illness, friends may be admitted at any reasonable hour.
- 7. No children are allowed to visit the Children's Wards. No children under 12 years of age may visit any Ward, except under proper control.
