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





## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING,

#### Monday, 31st March, 1947.

The Chair was taken by the President, Col. Sir Edward Warner, BART, D.S.O., M.C., who extended the thanks of the Board of Management to the Borough of Walthamstow for their courtesy in allowing the meeting to be held in the Council Chamber.

The following resolutions were passed :-

- 1. That the Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting, be taken as read, approved, and signed by the Chairman.
- 2. That the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts be adopted.
- 3. That Mr. E. C. Ruggles-Brise be re-elected as Honorary Treasurer.
- 4. That the following gentlemen be appointed for the ensuing year and that a vote of thanks be accorded to them for their services:—

Honorary Solicitor, C. G. Houghton, Esq. (Messrs. G. Houghton & Sons); Auditor, Mr. Leonard Clarke (Messrs. Clarke How & Co.).

5. That the following be re-elected to serve on the Board of Management:—

- 6. That our very grateful thanks be accorded to the Medical, Nursing and Lay Staffs for their services during the year.
- 7. That our very grateful thanks be extended to all Voluntary Organisations and Honorary Chaplains for their invaluable help and support.
- 8. That our very grateful thanks be given to our President for his services in the Chair, and to our Chairman, Mr. D. Cleave Cross.

Sir James Slade, J.P., presented a Cheque to Miss K. E. Haywood, A.R.R.C., for £124 6s. 6d., from the Life Governors of the Hospital, in appreciation of the services she had rendered as Matron for the past twenty-five years.

Miss Haywood, in her reply, expressed the hope that Miss Houstoun would receive the same support in her work as she had received. She was also delighted to know that the Hospital was proceeding with its plans for future development.

# Report of Board of Management.

The Board of Management beg to submit their Seventieth Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

Obituary.—It is with deep regret that the Board have to record the death of the Lady Leucha Warner who has been a Patroness of the Hospital since 1896 and whose services to the Hospital are gratefully remembered. The Board wish to express their sincere sympathy to Sir Edward Warner and other members of the family.

With deep regret also, the Board have to record the death of Mr. A. T. Collier who was Chairman of the Hospital from 1912 to 1921 and was a Trustee until the time of his death. Throughout his life he had always shown a keen and personal interest in the work and welfare of the Hospital.

Board of Management.—In addition to the regular monthly meetings of the Board of Management, the Finance, House, Appeals, Catering, Nursing and Building Committees have met every month and we should like to place on record our appreciation of the valuable services given by the members.

Medical and Surgical Staff.—Dr. P. H. Tooley, M.D., M.R.C.P., has been appointed Honorary Psychiatrist and leave of absence was given to Mr. John Bentley, F.R.C.S.Eng., to take up a Travelling Fellowship in America. The Board wish to congratulate Mr. Bentley on the high honour conferred upon him. Mr. E. S. R. Hughes, F.R.C.S.Eng., was appointed Temporary Honorary Surgeon during Mr. Bentley's absence.

The resignation of Dr. D. Naldret White, Temporary Honorary Physician was received upon his accepting an appointment as Assistant Professor of Medicine at Queen's University, Canada. His resignation was very much regretted and the Board wish to place on record their appreciation of his work and services to the Hospital.

Dr. P. Tettmar, D.M.R.E., was appointed as Assistant Radiologist and Mrs. Stonnell as Chiropodist to assist the Honorary Orthopædic Surgeons.

The Board of Management wish to record their warmest thanks for the unceasing work of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff and the Resident Medical Staff. The high standard of their work is very sincerely appreciated. The Board of Management confirming the recommendation of the Medical Committee, approved in principle the payment of Part-Time Visiting Medical Staff and an application has been made to the Ministry of Health for a Block Grant for payment as from the 1st January, 1947.

Nursing Staff.—The Board desires to express its grateful thanks to the Matron, Miss M. D. Houstoun, and to the Nursing Staff for their continued loyalty and services given to the patients. The value of their work is shown by the number of letters received from grateful patients expressing their gratitude for the attention and care they have received.

During the year 13 Nurses passed the Final State Examination and 14 passed the Preliminary Examination.

The Nursing Committee meets regularly every month and detailed consideration is given to the education and welfare of the Nursing Staff.

All the recommendations of the Ministry of Health to increase the salaries of the Nurses and for the improvement of their conditions have been adopted.

During the year Sister Metcalfe, Sister Johns, Sister Trew and Sister Boss have resigned. They all held their appointments at the Hospital for many years and the Board desire to record their sincere thanks for the faithful service they have given.

Miss K. E. Haywood, A.R.R.C.—At the Annual General Meeting held in March, 1947, Sir James Slade presented a cheque to Miss Haywood from the Life Governors of the Hospital in appreciation of the services she had rendered as Matron of the Hospital for the past 25 years.

Preliminary Training School.—It is the wish of the General Nursing Council that all Hospitals should have a Preliminary Training School, where Nurses undergo training before entering the wards. This is for a period of not less than two months duration for theoretical and practical instruction. We associated ourselves with the Prince of Wales Hospital, Tottenham, when they formed a Training School at Hadley Common in 1944 and we guarantee to send twelve Student Nurses each year. Thirteen Student Nurses attended the School last year and we are hoping to increase our number of places to sixteen. The Board, however, consider it desirable that we should have a Preliminary Training School attached to the Hospital as soon as possible and if a suitable property should become available every effort will be made to acquire it.

Number of Nursing Staff.—The total number of full-time Nursing Staff is 53 including the Matron, 12 Sisters, 6 Staff Nurses and 34 Student Nurses. In addition we have 5 Physiotherapists, 5 Radiographers and 2 Pupil Radiographers.

Nurses' Representative Council.—The Nurses' Representative Council has met on three occasions during the year and many useful suggestions have been made concerning their welfare and their work. These were all carefully considered by the Nursing Committee and where possible adopted.

Part-time Nurses.—At the beginning of the year an appeal was issued by the Ministry of Health for part-time Nurses to relieve the acute shortage of Nuring Staff in Hospitals. The response to the appeal in this district was very gratifying and we now have 15 part-time Nurses.

Appointment of Assistant Matron.—Sister Young, the House-keeping Sister was appointed Assistant Matron and is combining this office with the duties of Sister Housekeeper. The Board much appreciate her loyal services.

Pharmaceutical.—Penicillin was issued free to the Hospital by the Ministry of Health until July, 1946, but the total expenditure for 1947 amounted to £1,514, this sum being only £440 short of the total drug bill for 1939.

It is no exaggeration to say that with the discovery of Penicillin Science has given to mankind one of the most valuable weapons for the constant fight against disease.

The dispensing for the Out-Patients' Department, in particular, is showing a considerable increase.

Pathological Laboratory.—This Department is under the supervision of Dr. F. Marsh who visits the Hospital twice a week. The number of routine investigations carried out this year amounted to 3,859 as compared with 3,738 in 1946.

Christmas Activities.—Both patients and staff had a most enjoyable Christmas. Every ward was decorated and had a large Christmas tree. Each patient received a parcel from Father Christmas. A cinema show was provided for the children's ward and a pantomime was given by artistes from the Palace Theatre, Walthamstow. Doctors and Sisters, Nurses and Domestic Staff all had their Christmas Dinner during the week.

Voluntary Workers.—The Board wish to express their grateful thanks to all those who once again have helped the Hospital in so many ways. Special mention must be made of the work of the Ladies' Linen League in Walthamstow and Leyton, of the Old

Patients' Association, the Connaught Hospital Horticultural Society, and in this connection we would specially mention the Hon. Sec., Mrs. M. Courtney; to Mrs. D. Cleave Cross and the Ladies of the Inner Wheel Rotary Club, Leyton, who visit the Hospital twice a month and have formed themselves into a sewing party. Ladies of the Women's Section of the British Legion who help mend the Hospital linen. To Mrs. Courtney, Miss Fassan, Miss Newton and the Walthamstow and Highams Park Cadets for their help in To Mr. C. A. Clark, of Loughton, for his weekly the Wards. supply of fruit and vegetables and to Mr. Douglas Lamb, for executing repairs to the Hospital car free of cost, to the Churches in the district for their Harvest Festival Gifts, to Messrs. G. Houghton & Son, Honorary Solicitors, for their valuable help and advice on all legal matters. The Board also wish to place on record their sincere thanks to the Chaplains of the Hospital (Rev. Canon G. D. Oakley, M.A., R.D., and the President of the Free Church Council) and their colleagues for administering to the spiritual needs of the patients and staff. Thanks are also due to the Press for their support.

Services Rendered.—The total bed capacity of the Hospital is 118 beds including 10 single bed private wards. The number of In-Patients admitted during 1947 was 2,285 compared with 1,940 in 1946; new Out-Patients numbered 19,342 compared with 17,139 last year. The total attendance of both "new" and "old" Out-Patients was 95,815 compared with last year's total of 90,274.

Renewal and Repairs to Buildings and Equipment.—The work under this heading shows a considerable increase. Much of this should have been done during the war years but had to be deferred. The Hospital has been re-decorated internally and externally this being very much needed after the structural precautions and black-out had been removed. The new Kitchen, Nurses' Dining Room and additional Maids' Bedrooms are extensions and improvements which have met a long felt want. The mattresses in the wards have been re-conditioned and converted into spring mattresses an improvement which is very greatly appreciated by the patients. A considerable quantity of new linoleum has also been laid in the various Departments and the stocks of linen and crockery which had become low during the last few years have been replenished.

No. 16, Orford Road is rented from the Walthamstow Borough Council and has been furnished throughout for the use of the Medical and Nursing Staff. The advice and help given by Mr. W. E. Wrighton in this respect is much appreciated by the Board.

Alterations have also been made in the boiler house thereby increasing the working space. A new boiler and storage cylinder of larger capacity have been installed at a total cost of £1,022.

The forecourt and side of the Hospital has been re-surfaced with tarmacadam and the appearance of the Hospital has been considerably improved thereby.

The Night Nurses' Home was in a very bad state of repair both internally and externally. It was agreed that certain essential repairs were necessary and these were carried out at a cost of £756. The furniture in the Wards and the Nurses' Home was also in a bad condition and has been repaired and re-polished. In this connection the Board desires to thank the Cheeribug Club for providing 3 bookcases, 10 occasional tables and a mahogany desk costing £191 for the Nurses' Home and the Secretary's office.

A new Gastroscope costing £143 has also been provided by the Cheeribug Club and this instrument is a very important addition to the Theatre equipment. Other important apparatus bought during the year included an Audiometer for the Ear, Nose and Throat Department. This was presented by the Connaught Hospital Horticultural Society. Three Dressing Trolleys, Examination Couch, Electric Bladder Suction Machine, Cystoscope and Air Cushions were also purchased and presented by the Connaught Hospital Old Patients' Association at a cost of £111. Mr. Ercolani also very kindly defrayed the cost of a new Stainless Steel Ward Cleansing apparatus. A mobile Dental Engine costing £77 10s. 0d. was bought for the Dental Department and an Anæsthetic Table (£92) for the Main Theatre.

Finance.—The total income from all sources was £66,716, an increase of £26,862 from the previous year's figures. Income from Voluntary sources, including the Central Funds, fell by £3,397 to a total of £9,638. Expenditure exceeded income by £11,955 in spite of the fact that every economy compatible with efficiency has been exercised.

The cost of maintenance rose by 44% from £54,598 to £78,672 indicating the rising cost of living, and increases in salaries and wages necessitated by various official recommendations. The loan from Barclays Bank has been reduced by £750 bringing the total outstanding to £12,000. The overdraft at the end of the year was £12,243.

Endowment Fund.—Under pressure from the Ministry of Health the Endowment Fund was examined in order to ascertain whether any of these investments could be used for general purposes and as a result some of the investments were sold.

Building and Equipment Fund.—This Fund amounting to £11,828 at the beginning of the year has nearly all been used to pay the cost of the extensions to the Main Kitchen, Nurses' Dining Room, additional Maids' Bedrooms and the New Teaching Unit for Nurses.

Ministry of Health.—In March the Board of Management became very concerned over the Finances of the Hospital and a discussion took place between representatives of the Hospital and officers of the Ministry of Health. It was stipulated that the Hospital must realise the General Fund Investments to meet current needs and when these were exhausted, the Ministry provided financial assistance to the extent of £32,000.

Annual Subscriptions.—The income from annual subscriptions in 1947 was £1,067 as compared with £1,129 in 1946. The Board is very grateful to all the Annual Subscribers for their continued support and in particular to the following for their generous gifts:—

Space will not permit details of smaller amounts to be given but the Board would like to place on record their grateful thanks to the Street Collectors, Depot Holders and Factories for supporting Alexandra Rose Day and Hospitals Day, to the firms and their employees who gave so generously to the Firms' Weekly Collections, to the Walthamstow Cricket Club, to the Connaught Hospital Regatta Committee, to the local firms who supported our various efforts and those who assisted by taking collecting boxes.

Connaught Hospital Contributory Scheme.—This Scheme has been in existence for over 23 years and has paid £40,461 to the Hospital in respect of treatment given to members, but with the coming of the National Health Service its activities will cease. It has been decided to terminate the Scheme on the 30th June, 1948. The Board would like to take this opportunity of conveying their sincere appreciation and thanks to all the Honorary Branch Secretaries and local firms for their loyal and generous support.

Gifts in Kind.—During the year numerous gifts in kind have been sent to the Hospital by its many friends. It is impossible to detail these, but the Board of Management wishes to express its sincere appreciation for these welcome gifts. Some of these have been previously recorded in the report.

Special mention should also be made of the valuable gifts of food and clothing received from the Colonies and from the Canadian Red Cross.

Ladies' Linen League.—As in past years, the Ladies' Linen League has continued to render invaluable service. The Board particularly wish to mention Mrs. M. E. Harris of the Walthamstow Branch and Mrs. E. M. Porrer of the Leyton Branch. The following is a brief report and list of the items provided by each branch during the year:—

Walthamstow.—We have a total of 89 members. Four quarterly meetings were held. 804 articles were made and included bed and cot sheets, draw sheets, operation gowns, children's jackets, pillowslips, sterilizing towels, doctors' caps, etc.

Total expenditure £88 5s. 5d.

Leyton.—Draw sheets, pillowslips, basin and diet cloths, sterilizing and face towels, cot sheets, bibs, tray cloths and toilet covers. 286 items were made.

Value £60.

For all this help the Board wish to express their grateful thanks to the ladies for their efforts and for their sustained interest in the welfare of the Hospital. New Library Service.—The new library service was organised in May by the Walthamstow Librarian, Mr. Eric Leyland, for the patients and staff and it is very much appreciated. The Library Staff attend twice a week and take the books to the bedside of every patient. About 1,500 books are issued monthly and any book may be reserved. The Nursing and Domestic Staff also make full use of this service.

#### EXTENSION OF HOSPITAL — 300 BEDS

Proposed Plans.—The Board of Management appointed Mr. Lionel G. Pearson, F.R.I.B.A., to prepare a block plan for the enlargement of the Hospital to 300 beds in accordance with the recommendations contained in the Hospital Survey, 1945. It was considered very desirable that preliminary plans should be prepared without delay in order that concrete proposals could be sent to the Ministry of Health for approval to be ready for the time when extensions can be undertaken.

Possible Sites.—The Walthamstow Borough Council has agreed in principle to the sale of the Old Town Hall site to the Hospital and this will include No. 16, Orford Road and the land adjoining. The Church School is to become vacant in July and the acquisition of the School site and play ground by the Hospital is to be discussed with the Diocesan Education Committee. The present School building could be adapted for many useful purposes until such times as proposed extensions can be commenced.

Short Term Extension Policy.—As a short term policy it was decided that we should build a new Pathological Laboratory, Rehabilitation Department and provide additional accommodation for Patients' Records.

The present LABORATORY consists of one small room in which, perforce, are kept all the stores and the equipment available for the examination of the specimens—great in both numbers and variety—provided by patients in the wards and from the multitude of Out-Patients. It is not possible for our small Laboratory to satisfy all the demands made upon it and the work has to be limited to the number of specimens that can be effectively examined by the small staff at present employed. Only by expansion can the flow of specimens be effectively dealt with.

Rehabilitation.—Rehabilitation has developed into an essential part of Hospital treatment and it is of the highest importance for injured persons that they should return to maximum activity as soon as possible. Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy and Recreational and Gymnastic Therapy should be available for men and women, both Out-Patients and In-Patients.

Records.—Medical records assist in the care of the patient in the particular illness from which he suffers by recording, acurately and scientifically, all the known facts of the patient by those who are attempting his cure. They are also of incalculable importance if the patient is ill again whether from the same or some other condition.

The importance of these Departments and the necessity for their extension was brought to the attention of the Board by the Medical Committee and the Board instructed the Architect to prepare block plans, copies of which were sent to the Ministry of Health. We have since been informed that these have been referred to the North-East Metropolitan Regional Hospital Board for their approval and we can only await their decision.

Lay Staff.—The Board of Management records its appreciation of the high standard of work and efficiency which all members of the Lay Staff have maintained during the year. This includes the clerical and technical staff, porters, resident and non-resident domestic staffs.

Staff Dance.—The Annual Staff Dance held in January was greatly enjoyed and the occasion was marked by presentations to Miss K. E. Haywood, the late Matron, upon her retirement.

Ball and Cabaret.—On the 7th March, 1947, a ball and cabaret was held in the Assembly Hall. This was organised by Mr. W. E. Wrighton, Mr. I. V. Coote, D.L., J.P., and Mr. W. E. Chamberlain and the occasion was a great success. The Board desire to express its thanks for the valuable work done by these members.

Extension of Visiting Hours.—In addition to the regular visiting hours on Wednesday and Sunday, adult relatives and friends will be able to see patients on Tuesday and Friday evening, except in the Children's Ward.

Food.—It is now possible to serve breakfast to patients at 7.30 a.m. instead of 6 a.m., an adjustment much appreciated by the patients, as is also a cooked supper which is now provided.

In the Out-Patients Department the canteen service has been maintained throughout the year.

Feeding in Hospitals for many years has been a secondary consideration. King Edward's Hospital Fund for London has published two reports recently on this very important subject and recommends that the aim of every Hospital should be to reach the standard of a good hotel, where the food is of good quality,

well cooked and attractively served. They recommend the appointment of a Catering Officer and a Dietician. The Catering in this Hospital is the responsibility of the Catering Committee and the reports received from patients speak in praise of the food and service provided.

Conclusion.—This has been a year of preparation for the advent of the National Health Service. The Buildings have been overhauled and most of the equipment and apparatus has been repaired and renewed where necessary. The Hospital is therefore in a very strong position to play its part when the "appointed day" arrives on the 5th July, 1948.

The new Act provides for a unified and co-ordinated hospital service and freedom for the patient from financial worry during illness. It is our earnest hope that it will be of inestimable benefit to the community.

### Almoner's Department and Samaritan Fund Report.


This year has been a very interesting and varied one. An ever increasing number of patients have attended for consultation and treatment which has led to a proportionally greater number of people being referred to the Almoner's Department for assistance. While conditions are very gradually improving, reminders of the recent war still inevitably encroach upon our everyday lives. A patient and mother who is becoming daily more harassed by cramped and poor housing conditions is sent by the doctor to see if a word from the Almoner will achieve the long hoped for accommodation. The numbers of serving soldiers admitted after returning from duty overseas and of ex-servicemen, referred by the Ministry of Pensions for treatment, have decreased considerably.


Many more surgical appliances have been supplied this year—260 as against 174 in 1946. One patient, who has recently been supplied with an artificial leg, was brought into the Casualty Ward two years ago having injured his foot and ankle so badly that it had to be amputated. This is surely a shattering blow to anyone, especially one with the added responsibilities of being the breadwinner of a family. After many operations he was finally discharged home to await his artificial limb. Alas, after a few hours

at home he slipped on his crutches and fractured the already injured leg above the knee; this meant a further three months in hospital, but in spite of all these adversities our patient remained always bright and extremely cheerful. Now he has at last been fitted with his new leg and is walking well. We have, together with the co-operation of the local Employment Exchange, arranged for him to have a period of training under the Government Scheme so that he may complete his re-habilitation. Surgical appliances are, of course, also supplied for many other purposes—hearing aids for the deaf, corrective splints for children, spinal jackets and abdominal belts being just a few of the appliances frequently ordered for patients.

A large number of patients were sent to convalescent homes, both at the seaside and in the country, to recuperate after operation or illness. A period of rest, usually about three weeks, or longer in exceptional cases, at a suitable convalescent home, will bring colour back to pale cheeks and effectively help the patient over the difficult interim period between the time they are discharged from hospital and their return to full duty. Most of our patients return to see us, looking so much better that it is hard to recognise them as the people we last saw tucked up in bed in one of our wards. Although a certain amount of discipline, with regard to diet and activity, has to be enforced, the patients usually say what a wonderful time they have had and how sorry they are to have to return. In this connection, we receive valuable help from the local Invalid Children's Aid Association in arranging convalescence for the children attending hospital.

Several patients have been sent to Hospital Spas specially designed for those crippled with rheumatism and allied complaints. A good esprit de corps exists among these patients, who are well known to one another by virtue of having treatment at our Physiotherapy Department, and various articles that are in short supply at the moment—such as bathing suits, which are essential for a course of spa treatment—are exchanged between them so that each patient is sent away fully equipped. Optimism runs high in these patients and all depart with a great air of expectancy. One patient who has two young children is very crippled about the feet and ankles with polyarthritis. She finds it increasingly difficult to get about and to run her home; she has been advised to have a pair of surgical shoes as it is now practically impossible for her to wear her own ordinary shoes, and their arrival is anxiously awaited. We have also just managed to secure a vacancy for her for a course of treatment at one of the Spa Hospitals.





EW OF FUTURE DEVELOPMENT

Luckily those patients who have been ordered courses of treatment such as the above this year have been covered, as far as the expense is concerned, by a hospital contributory scheme. Many, however, who are ordered appliances and convalescence cannot afford to pay the whole amount themselves, or even a part of the cost. Some of the money we recover from National Health Insurance Approved Societies and Hospital Contributory Schemes, some from the Social Welfare Authorities and in many cases of distress, the Glasspool Trust will offer valuable and much appreciated assistance. Even so, in many instances, there still remains a deficit which the Samaritan Fund is called upon to cover.

In conclusion, we await with interest the introduction of the new National Health services during this coming year and trust that it will bring increasing facilities for helping those who are sick and in trouble.


#### ADMISSION OF PATIENTS.

The Hospital is open to receive patients from Walthamstow, Wanstead, Leyton, Leytonstone, Chingford, and other parts under the following conditions, viz:—

Accidents and Cases of Emergency will receive immediate attention at any hour of the day or night.

In-Patients must bring, or be preceded by, a recommendation from their medical attendant, who should also certify that they and their homes are free from any contagious or infectious disease or complaint.

In all cases it should be ascertained beforehand if a vacant bed is or will be available.





Out-Patients should attend the respective Clinic at the Out-Patients' Department.

In-Patients and Out-Patients who are not members of a Contributory Scheme are expected to contribute towards the cost of treatment and maintenance according to their means, but no patient will suffer through inability to do this.

Paying Patients, who will be accommodated in single bed private wards, should request their medical attendants to arrange beforehand with the selected member of the Hospital Visiting Staff respecting fees and date of admission. The Hospital charge for these private rooms, inclusive of maintenance and all ordinary medicine, is 8 guineas per week. A further charge of 1 guinea is made for the use of the Operating Theatre if required, and scale charges for X-Ray, pathological examinations and expensive drugs and medicines.

#### VISITORS TO PATIENTS.

- 1. Patients may be visited by their friends on Sunday between 2 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. (Children's Wards, 2 p.m. to 3 p.m.), and on TUESDAY 7.30 to 8 p.m., Wednesday 2 p.m. to 3 p.m., and on FRIDAY 7.30 to 8 p.m., subject to the consent of the Medical Officers. Children are not allowed to visit patients in the evening.
- 2. Not more than two visitors will be allowed to each patient at the same time, and not more than six for each patient on any one day, each child counting as one visitor.
- 3. Two Visitors' Cards will be issued to the next-of-kin of each patient on admission to Hospital, which must be given up on discharge. These cards must be shewn to the Hall Porter before going to the Wards, and then handed to the next two visitors before they can be admitted, and so on.
- 4. Visitors are particularly requested to keep to the bedside of the patient they visit, and must not visit the Hospital at all if there be any infectious disease in their homes.
- 5. Nothing whatever must be given to the patient without the sanction of the Matron, or Sister in charge of the Ward.
- 6. In case of serious illness, friends may visit patients at other times with the consent of the Doctor and Ward Sister.
  - 7. No children are allowed to visit the Children's Wards.

No children under 12 years of age to visit any Ward, except under proper control.

# GROWTH OF THE HOSPITAL SINCE ITS FOUNDATION IN 1878.

- 2 BEDS 1878 Cottage Hospital for Sick Children founded by Mr. & Mrs. Edward Tudor, with the co-operation of Mr. & Mrs. George Baker, at North Road, Wood Street, Walthamstow.
- 6 BEDS 1880 New Hospital for Children was built in Salisbury Road, with six beds, again with the generous assistance of Mr. & Mrs. Tudor. The number of beds was subsequently increased to eight.
- 19 Beds 1894 The house Holmcroft was presented by Mr & Mrs. H. J. Casey and a General Hospital with nineteen beds, contained in two wards, was established on the present site.
  - 1894 H.R.H. the late Duchess of Connaught and the late.

    Lady Leucha Warner graciously consented to
    become patronesses.
- 35 Beds 1897 Extensions were completed increasing accommodation to thirty-five beds. New building opened by H.R.H. the late Princess Mary, Duchess of Teck.
- 45 BEDS 1903 Accommodation increased to forty-five beds with a well-equipped new Out-Patients' Department, Operating Theatre and Casualty Room. The new Duchess of Connaught Ward was named.
- 46 BEDS 1914 A new X-Ray Department was installed, a Pathological Laboratory built, and the bed total increased to forty-six by the addition of an Observation Ward.

- 50 BEDS 1917 A further four beds were added bringing the total to fifty.
  - 1919 A large plot of ground purchased and presented by Mr. John C. Gillett for future extensions.
- 90 Beds 1927 The Leyton and Leytonstone Ward and Thomas Worton Ward incorporating ten private wards, together with the new Nurses' Home to accommodate forty-one Sisters and Nurses, were opened by H.R.H. the Duke of York (now His Majesty the King). This increased the accommodation to ninety beds.
  - 1928 By gracious permission of H.R.H. the late Duke of Connaught the Hospital was renamed the Connaught Hospital.
- 100 BEDS 1928 Various changes to Princess Mary Adelaide and Hibbert Wards, together with the addition of a new Sanitary Block to Connaught Ward, enabled us to increase to one hundred beds and become a recognised Training School for Nurses.
  - 1930 Purchase of building and ground for the establishment of a Physiotherapy Department at Comely Bank, for massage and electrical treatment.
  - 1930 Enlargement of the Nurses' Home, giving fourteen additional bedrooms.
- 118 BEDS 1934 Mathews Ward, so kindly presented by Alderman A. M. Mathews, J.P., in memory of his wife, and the Keene Sun-Ray Room, presented by Mrs. Keene to the memory of her husband, were opened by H.R.H. Prince Arthur of Connaught. The accommodation was thereby increased to one hundred and eighteen beds.

The whole Hospital was placed on a war footing, blast walls erected, emergency lighting plant installed, and many parts of the building reinforced.

Although a Casualty Hospital treating air-raid victims and service cases, at least 60 per cent. of our work was still service to the ordinary civilian sick. Ten additional beds were provided for emergency purposes, bringing the total to 128.

- 1943 The installation of a new Victor X-Ray plant at a cost of £2,000.
- 1945 New Wireless Apparatus installed, giving each patient a choice of two programmes.
- 1945 Wartime reinforcements were dismantled and the Hospital redecorated throughout and restored to its pre-war tidiness.
- 1945 The decontamination room built during the war was reconstructed internally and equipped as an X-Ray Therapy Department for the treatment of skins.
  - 1946 Considerable improvements were effected by enlarging and re-equipping the Kitchen, reconstructing and extending the Nurses' Dining Room. Additional bedrooms were built for the domestic staff.
  - 1946 A new and well-equipped Teaching Unit for Nurses' training was erected in the grounds of Comely Bank.
  - 1947 Reconstruction of the basement and installation of larger boilers.


