Annual Report of the Board of Management, 1941

The Board of Management presents to the Subscribers the Annual Report of the work of the Hospital, and the Honorary Treasurer's Statement of Accounts for the year.

The number of In-patients treated to a conclusion was 2,897, an increase of 223, and the daily average of beds occupied 136, an increase of 3, as compared with 1940. The weekly cost of each patient was £3 7s. 8d. compared with £3 4s. $3\frac{1}{2}$ d. in the preceding year.

The number of new Out-patients was 15,880, being an increase of 2,222, and the total number of attendances was 73,450, an increase of 10,360.

The Income, after transferring £1,025 17s. 1d. to the Legacy Account was £29,385 7s. 9d., an increase of £1,074 3s. 7d., and Expenditure £30,293 6s. 8d., an increase of £1,867 17s. 7d., leaving a deficiency of £907 18s. 11d., but this is more than covered by money due from the Ministry of Health.

The Board is deeply grateful for the really splendid financial support given by the public on every occasion that an appeal has been made, and it is largely owing to this that the Balance Sheet presents a far more favourable appearance than might have been expected, considering the times in which we are living.

It is not possible to mention all by name who have given assistance, but it is hoped they will rest assured that what they have done has been of materal benefit in carrying on the work of the Institution, and a great encouragement to those responsible for the administration.

The chief source of Income for some time past has been the Weekly Contributory Scheme, and as there seems little chance of the present heavy expenditure being reduced, it was resolved that these payments be increased by one penny a week.

It is difficult to say exactly how much this will bring to the exchequer, but it will certainly be something very considerable. To the credit of the Contributors be it said that so far as is known not a single objection has been made to this increase, and it has indeed by many been heartily welcomed.

A Resolution has been passed that an allowance of one guinea a week be made to any member of this Scheme who is admitted as a Private Patient, and who has been a Contributor for not less than three years immediately preceding the date of admission. The number of Out-patients treated during the year has completely broken all previous records, and it is a matter of regret that under existing conditions it has not been found possible to provide adequate accommodation in that Department, for this is by far the most urgent need of the Hospital at the present moment, and will certainly be put in hand as soon as circumstances permit.

The Board also has under consideration the long list of patients awaiting admission to the Wards, for although serious cases are admitted at once there are doubtless others who suffer much inconvenience because of the delay in obtaining treatment. The matter is complicated by a great increase of population in the district, and also because a certain number of beds have to be reserved for possible casualties due to enemy action.

Attempts are being made to reduce this congestion, but up to the present time no definite arrangements have been made, though negotiations are now in progress which, if successful, will effect a definite improvement.

Those who are acquainted with the invaluable services rendered by the Nursing Staff will be pleased to hear that their salaries are now increased to the scale set forth by the Ministry of Health—the Ministry paying a certain proportion of the increase. Apart from benefit to the Nurses themselves, this is interesting because it is the first time the Ministry had made any grant of this kind to Voluntary Hospitals, and may be the forerunner of more extensive grants of a similar nature in the future. It should be clearly understood that this grant—and it is hoped any future grants—will in no way interfere with the Voluntary System, though they will, of course, be subject to certain conditions.

At the outbreak of War the Board joined whole-heartedly in efforts to help the Authorities in making provision for treatment of Air Raid casualties, and much accommodation has been placed at their disposal, while a constant stream of Voluntary Nurses have been receiving instruction, and in many other directions also has assistance been rendered. It is pleasing to be able to record that when occasion has arisen for treatment of these casualties the arrangements have proved entirely satisfactory. In this connection most useful help has been given by the fire watchers under the guidance of Mr. A. J. Thompson.

In order to secure, as far as possible, safety for the inmates, sandbags originally were placed round the building, in accordance with the usual custom in vogue at that time, but the Ministry of Health has now replaced them with baffle walls, which are certainly more suitable.

In these troublous days no one will be surprised to hear that many new problems have now to be faced in Hospital Management, and

it has not been possible to run the Institution with that smoothness to which, in the past, we have been accustomed. None the less, considering the difficulties that have to be overcome the general result has been surprisingly successful, and reflects the greatest credit upon our principal officials, for it is only through their ability and untiring energy that this result has been achieved.

One of the problems to be faced is the rationing of food, which even in a private house may sometimes cause trouble, but is here a highly complicated affair involving a great deal of thought and consideration, and has given the Matron many an anxious hour.

Then, in order to comply with Government requirements, a vast number of forms, returns and details, have to be filled up, and this has thrown a heavy burden upon the Secretary, Mr. J. Cumming Smith, and his assistants, who deserve much praise for the competent manner in which they have handled the situation.

The Domestic Staff is sadly depleted, and it would have saved a great deal of trouble if Hospital Service had been made a reserved occupation from the start, instead of waiting until so many had drifted into other employment. The situation, however, has been to some extent relieved by the action of the senior members, who have given many years of faithful service to the Hospital, and now willingly take upon themselves additional responsibility, thus showing a striking example of loyalty and devotion to duty.

The Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff has shown that skill and efficiency which we have long learned to expect, while the Sisters and Nurses, under the guidance of that most excellent of Matrons, Miss Fox-Davies, have fully maintained the high reputation which they have so justly earned.

Mention should also be made of those Doctors who, although not officially connected with the Hospital, have yet given most valuable assistance, and to these we tender our sincere thanks.

Mr. Weaving, long a respected member of the Board, passed away during the year, and his loss is much regretted.

Owing to restrictions upon the use of paper the Lists of Subscribers and Workers' Contributions have been omitted, but as soon as the position becomes more normal it is hoped the former practice may be resumed.
