# Annual Report of the Board of Management, 1942

The Board of Management presents to the Subscribers the Annual Report of the work of the Hospital, and the Honorary Treasurer's Statement of Accounts for the year.

The number of In-patients treated to a conclusion was 2,935, an increase of 38, and the daily average of beds occupied 136.6, an increase of .6, as compared with 1941. The weekly cost of each patient was £3 13s. 6d. compared with £3 7s. 8d. in the preceding year.

The number of new Out-patients was 14,056, being a decrease of 1,824, and the total number of attendances was 68,911, a decrease of 4,539.

The Income, after transferring £890 135. 11d. to the Legacy Account was £36,438 5s. 10d., an increase of £7,052 18s. 1d., and Ordinary Expenditure £32,695 12s. 7d., an increase of £2,544 11s. 3d.

After allowing for Extraordinary Expenditure, and transferring  $\pounds$  3,300 for reduction of Overdraft on the Building Extension Fund there remains a credit balance of £85 18. 11d., but there is still the sum of £3,495 owing to that Fund.

This result may be considered satisfactory, and is largely due to the great increase in the Workers' Contribution Fund, and Mr. Stanley T. Davis deserves much credit for the efficient manner in which he has organised this Scheme, though of course the extra penny upon contributions has been a very considerable help. A deep dept of gratitude is due also to the Collectors for their most excellent work in this connection. The support given by the public has been really splendid, and the Board deeply appreciates this assistance. Among the larger donations may be mentioned £500 from Mrs. Jennings-Campbell, and a similar amount from the Silver Thimble Fund—both for the endowment of a Bed—and in addition £524 from the Cheltenham Horticultural Show. These gifts have been a very material benefit to the Hospital, and the Board thanks most sincerely all those poncerned.

As building operations on a large scale are out of the question for the time being it has not been possible to effect any radical improvement in the Out-Patient Department, although this is most urgently needed. The Board, however, as a temporary measure has purchased a hut which is placed in close proximity to that Department, and will at any rate do something towards relieving the congestion which has long been one of our principal difficulties.

A meeting was held with representatives of the Children's Hospital, Battledown, with a view to complete amalgamation of the two Institutions, but they decided it was better to await the Government's declaration of policy before coming to a definite agreement. The arrangement whereby our Contributors can be admitted free of all charge to that Institution still remains in force.

Upon the advice of our Medical Staff screens are being erected in the Children's Ward as a safeguard against the spread of infectious disease, and although this will reduce to some extent the available beds it was considered only wise to take every precaution in this direction.

During the year Mrs. R. S. de Havilland, who for many years took great interest in the work of the Hospital, passed away. We also regret to record the death of Miss S. M. Scott whose work in the Massage Department was so highly appreciated; while through enemy action we lost our Head Cook, Miss Nellie Dix and her sister the Head Laundress, Miss Winnie Dix, both of whom for over twenty years had rendered loyal and faithful service to the Hospital. The Rev. C. Cousens Petch, who for 16 years has been our Honorary Chaplain, has now resigned. Mr. Petch took a great interest in the welfare of the Institution, and was always willing to help in any way that might be required. In his place the Rev. E. J. M. Eldridge has been appointed, and with the help of the Rev. C. E. Graham Swift the Board is satisfied that the duties of Chaplain will be efficiently performed.

The Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff, although depleted in number, has none the less carried on the work of the Hospital with remarkable skill; while the value of the services rendered by the Matron, Miss Fox-Davies, together with her Sisters and Nurses, can hardly be over estimated.

The Secretary, Mr. Cumming Smith, and his assistants, have indeed had an arduous task in filling up innumerable forms, in addition to their ordinary work, and they deserve high praise for the skilful manner in which they have performed that work.
