Annual Report of the Board of Management, 1943

The Board of Management presents to the Subscribers the Annual Report of the work of the Hospital, and the Honorary Treasurer's Statement of Accounts for the year.

The number of In-patients treated to a conclusion was 2,858, a decrease of 77, and the daily average of beds occupied 135, a decrease of 1.6, as compared with 1942. The weekly cost of each patient was £3 18s. 6d. compared with £3 13s. 6d. in the preceding year.

The number of new Out-patients was 15,183, being an increase of 1,127, and the total number of attendances was 72,864, an increase of 3,953.

The Income, after transferring £983 6s. 1d. to the Legacy Account was £39,393 14s. 8d., an increase of £2,955 8s. 10d., and Ordinary Expenditure £34,550 18s. 11d., an increase of £1,855 6s. 4d.

After allowing for Extraordinary Expenditure, and transferring \pounds 3,436 15s. 9d. to pay off the Overdraft on the Building Extension Fund, there remains a credit balance of \pounds 694 1s. 11d.

The Contributory Scheme shows a gross increase of $\pounds 1,177$ over 1942, and the opportunity is taken of congratulating not only the organiser, Mr. Stanley Davis, but also the many voluntary collectors whose untiring work in keeping the advantages of the Scheme before the public is not always fully appreciated.

Payments to other hospitals for treatment of our members has increased by £412 and after transferring £1,000 to the Medical Staff Fund, there is a net decrease of £235 for the year.

The Contributory Scheme is an excellent example of the whole Voluntary Hospital organisation. While primarily it's object is to provide protection in time of sickness, it also offers an opportunity to all to show a personal interest in their own hospital, and a readiness to assist those who are obliged to seek it's aid. The Board desires to render it's warmest thanks to all who by gifts and personal service have contributed to the welfare of the Hospital and its patients.

Mr. Norman Morgan, a Vice-President, generously carried out the re-surfacing of the front drive as a parting gift on leaving the district, and the Board desires to express it's thanks for so valuable a gift.

- The Gloster Aircraft Company Ltd.—£600 to endow a bed in memory of the late Gerry Sayer.
- The Cheltenham Bowling Club, and Sheet Metal Section of the Gloster Aircraft Company Ltd., have also given a donation of £668 to name a bed.

Lieut.-Colonel Sandeman Allen has been temporarily released from service duties to augment the depleted surgical staff. As an expression of gratitude for the valuable services Mr. Victor Bonney has rendered to the Hospital, the Board has invited him to accept the post of Honorary Consulting Gynaecologist.

To the regret of the Board Mr. N. W. Payne was obliged, for reasons of health, to resign the Honorary Treasurership, and Mr. Ruffell Gibbons has been appointed in his place.

While awaiting the publication of the White Paper on Health Services, the Board has had under consideration how best the Hospital can serve the public in the days that are to come. It has been represented on the County and City of Gloucester Joint Consultative Hospital Committee, and has expressed it's readiness to co-operate in any scheme for the benefit of the community as a whole, stressing that it's first obligation must be to those who, in the past, have looked to the Hospital for treatment. In addition, it was felt that the Hospital should have some definite plans of it's own for the future, so that when building is again possible it should not be found unprepared, and in the meantime have ready concrete proposals to lay before those whose responsibility it is to plan for the nation as a whole. A Sub-Planning Committee in consultation with the Hon. Surgical and Medical Staff has drawn up a comprehensive scheme which when completed will bring the Hospital up to the highest standards. In the meantime it has only been possible to undertake certain temporary additions, but the hut erected in the forecourt has done much to overcome congestion in the Out-Patient Department.

During the year both the Rushcliffe and Hetherington reports have been adopted, and are now in operation.

In spite of much extra work thrown on it's members the Honorary Surgical and Medical Staff has given it's usual time and skill to the welfare of the patients, and the fact that it's work has so often been abundantly rewarded with success, is in no small measure due to the constant supervision and care of the Matron, Miss Fox-Davies, and her nursing staff.

There are also those whose work, while less spectacular, is none the less essential to the smooth running of the Hospital, and the Secretary, Mr. Cumming Smith and his assistants, are to be congratulated on the way they have undertaken the many extra duties imposed on them.
