





CAMERON HOSPITAL,

WEST HARTLEPOOL.

A T a meeting of the West Hartlepool Town Council (as it was then called) held on 4th July, 1899, a letter was received from Captain Watson Cameron offering, on behalf of Mrs. Cameron, the widow of the late Alderman J. W. Cameron, Miss Hannah Cameron, and himself, with a view to perpetuating the name of the late Alderman Cameron, to provide £20,000 for the Corporation to build (and partly endow if they thought fit) a Hospital within the Borough of West Hartlepool, to be called the "J. W. Cameron Hospital."

After due consideration it was resolved that the offer be accepted, and the thanks of the Council were tendered to the donors for their extreme generosity.

In connection with the erection of the Hospital, a Committee of the Town Council was appointed to act in conjunction with Captain Cameron, to arrange the details and take the necessary steps to carry out the scheme. The Committee consisted of the Mayor (Councillor Pyman), Alderman Furness, Alderman Clarkson, Alderman Rickinson, Councillors Sargeant, Macfarlane, Bland, Gray, Robson, Dyer, Proud and Hardy.

A piece of land, comprising about 3 acres, was acquired in Serpentine Road by the Corporation from Sir Christopher Furness on 26th March, 1900, the purchase price for this being £2,500.

On 27th November, 1899, competitive designs for a 100 bed hospital were invited, but it was decided that a portion only (sufficient to accommodate 25 beds) be erected at that time, the estimated cost not to exceed £12,000. Prizes of £100 and £50 each were offered for the two best designs, Messrs. Pye & Bacon receiving the first award and Mr. R. Dunipace, the second. Accordingly the former were appointed architects to the Corporation for the Cameron Hospital on 28th June, 1900.

Many meetings of the Hospital Committee were held to discuss and decide upon all the thousand and one little details that have to be considered in connection with new construction, and it was not until April, 1902, that tenders were invited for the erection of the buildings. The tender of Messrs. Watt Bros., of West Hartlepool, amounting to £13,481 12s. 10d., was accepted on 2nd June, 1902, and the Clerk of Works (Mr. W. D. Robson) was appointed on 9th July of the same year.

Two years was the time allowed for its completion and, at last, a definite practical move was being made. Progress was slow, however, for many difficulties were encountered and had to be overcome. For instance, in excavating the foundations at the South-East part of the site a considerable bed of sand was found, and it was necessary for piles to be driven and steel girders fixed embedded in concrete.

In April, 1904, nearly two years after its commencement, the erection of the Hospital was so far advanced that the Hospital Committee felt it time to draw up a scheme for its management, and Works and large employers of labour in the town were asked to appoint representatives to meet the Committee to consider the matter. It was also recommended that the administration of the Hospital be handed over to a Board of Managers to consist of the Mayor and five members of the Corporation to be elected annually by the Council, together with 12 representatives of yearly subscribers of £1 1s. 0d. or upwards to be elected annually by such subscribers, and also representatives of workmen, public bodies, etc., in the proportion of one representative for each £25 subscribed or collected per annum.

Steps to be taken to raise subscriptions for the maintenance of the Hospital were also considered at this time. A meeting of representatives of workmen was held, and they submitted their proposals to subscribe to the Hospital and also appointed their representatives on the Committee of Management.

The Hospital, at last completed, almost six years after the magnificent offer of Captain Cameron, was formally opened by the late Sir Christopher Furness, M.P. for the Hartlepools, and the Hospital was announced as ready to receive patients in May, 1905. The total cost of the building and equipment amounted to £20,480.

Large numbers of people assembled to see the opening, and, in declaring the Hospital open, Sir Christopher said— "To the extent of its capacity and of its circumstances the Hospital at Hartlepool has given efficient public service, but the rapid growth of our population made it evident that other accommodation was needed, and there could have been no more timely offer than that which the Corporation of West Hartlepool received at their meeting in July, 1899, in a letter from Captain Cameron proposing, on behalf of Mrs. Cameron, Miss Cameron and himself, to provide £20,000 for the Corporation to build and partly endow, if they thought fit, a Hospital within the Borough of West Hartlepool. present building will be a worthy and enduring memorial to one who, both in his capacity as a public man and as a private citizen, won the admiration and no small share of the affection of his fellows. Nearly the whole of the gift was spent on the site, building, furniture and equipment of the Hospital. There is accommodation for 25 patients in the two wards, but the building is so planned that additional wards can be provided whenever they become necessary; and there is an intention also, in case of need, to arrange children's cots in the two large rooms of the administrative block. The purpose of the memorial teaches what is probably the highest aim of human beneficence: that of caring for those who, because of disease or accident, call for all the sympathy and help their fellows can give and for the most skilful treatment that science can offer. The Cameron Hospital, if not the largest in the country, can boast of being one of the best equipped institutions of the kind."

The Hospital then consisted of 1 male ward, 1 female ward, theatre and ancillary rooms.

In the remaining eight months of its first year of existence 233 patients were admitted, the average duration of stay being 28½ days. 113 cases were also treated in the Out-Patient Department.

Subscriptions during the first year amounted to £557, workmen's contributions £358, donations £530, and church collections £47. Expenditure was £1,287, and the Treasurer had a balance in hand of £301.

Innumerable gifts of furniture, equipment, etc., were received, well testifying to the very great interest taken in the Hospital and all it stood for.

At that time the Committee considered a proposal of Sir Christopher Furness with reference to one common fund for the Hartlepool and Cameron Hospitals, but, after due consideration, it was decided that the proposal was not practicable.

Very soon after the completion of the Hospital, in June, 1905, owing to the need for additional accommodation, it was decided that the women's ward should be used for male patients, that the two large rooms in the administrative block, with adjoining rooms on the first floor, should be used for women and children respectively, and that part of the nurses' quarters be removed to the second floor. By this arrangement 41 patients' beds were provided.

In November, 1905, a Joint Sub-Committee, consisting of six members each of the two Hospitals, was formed to consider and, if possible, draw up a scheme for the joint management of the Hospitals, and certain proposals, including one financial board for both hospitals, were made to the Managers, but, in the case of Cameron Hospital, the scheme was not agreed to.

A year later, however, a proposal, in order to secure adequate financial support for both Hospitals, that a Joint Financial Committee, representing the Governing Bodies of the two Hospitals and the Subscribers thereto, be formed to receive endowments, donations and subscriptions, and to allocate the same for the benefit of the Hospitals, was considered, but again turned down, and it was decided that it was desirable that in addition to the separate funds of each Hospital a Central Fund be formed, the same to be administered by a Committee with representatives from the two Boroughs. This was the foundation of the Hospitals Trust of the Hartlepools, which now has a capital of £38,000 odd, the income from which is divided equally between the two Hospitals. Each Hospital now receives £825 annually from this source.

The demand for hospital accommodation was gradually becoming more and more pressing, and in October, 1912, Alderman J. F. Wilson announced to the Committee that he would be pleased to offer a sum of £1,000 as a thankoffering for his recovery from a serious accident two years previously, to provide a Ward at the Hospital. This very kind offer was accepted, and it was decided that a female ward was most necessary and that it be called, as it is now, the

"Alderman Wilson" Ward. It was completed in November, 1913, and opened by Colonel Sir W. Thomlinson, V.D., D.L., J.P., on the 22nd of that month, the total cost amounting to £1,600, including furniture and equipment.

And then came the War with all its upheavals. as might be imagined, affected the hospital rather considerably, with its staff, male and female, being required for active service; but adequate arrangements were able to be made and, as those who were resident here then will know, the good work carried on and Cameron Hospital earned its fair share of honour in the nationally humane work. North and South Wards (25 beds) were prepared and used for the treatment of military cases, the "Wilson" Ward was used as a men's ward, and the Children's Nursery was delegated to women. Arrangements were also made for the erection of a marquee in the hospital grounds which would accommodate 50 beds. In fact, practically the whole hospital was placed at the disposal of the Military Authorities, and it is gratifying to note that, in spite of this, as far as the general public was concerned, no inconvenience was experienced by the admission of military cases.

On the lamentable occasion of the bombing of Hartlepool by German warships on 16th December, 1914, 190 cases (40 of them serious) were admitted to the Cameron Hospital and tended—an achievement which called forth the greatest praise to the medical and nursing staffs, who worked incessantly for many hours without rest.

At the end of 1917 the then Mayor (Councillor Edgar) offered very kindly to provide a further permanent Ward, but owing to the acute shortage of materials and labour then prevailing, the Ministry of Munitions, whose licence was required, could not see their way clear to acquiesce in its erection.

"Normanhurst"—now the School—was commissioned as a temporary Hospital for disabled soldiers, and was administered under the aegis of the Cameron Hospital.

In 1920, the provision of a Children's Ward was mooted, but the estimated cost of £15,000 apparently caused the project to be deferred.

Application was made to the General Nursing Council in 1922 for recognition as a Training School for Nurses and, subject to the fulfilment of certain conditions, provisional approval was granted for this.

To meet the still growing needs it became vitally necessary in 1923 and 1924 that further accommodation be provided, and it was decided to extend South and Wilson Wards to provide 24 additional beds, build two verandahs, an orthopædic department, and—an integral part of any extension—additional accommodation for nurses; but only one verandah ("Wilson") and the orthopædic department were undertaken.

Councillor Mrs. Wilson laid the foundation stone of the latter on 31st July, 1926, and it was formally opened on 30th April, 1927, by Mrs. Gray, wife of Dr. Gray, who took a great interest in this phase of the work of the hospital. This department is intended mainly for out-patients, but in-patients may be wheeled on a trolley or in a chair into the treatment rooms. The cost of that building is not definitely known, but Alderman J. W. Wilson raised about £1,700 by his Samaritan Fund towards the cost of the department.

Up to 1929 the Hospital had its own laundry, but owing to the old age of the machinery and the inability to purchase new through lack of funds, work was discontinued, and since then all the laundry work of the hospital has been done by contract.

Once more, in January, 1930, the question of accommodation became acute, and it was decided to build a Children's Ward and a verandah to the South Ward. The Children's Block is situated at the West End of the main corridor and is a complete unit consisting of a main ward, a spacious verandah, a small observation ward, kitchen, stores, bathroom, etc. The ward and verandah accommodate 20 patients and, with the 6 additional beds in the new verandah on South Ward, the total capacity of the hospital rose from 50 beds to 76. The cost of the extensions and equipment and furnishing was £4,500, but here again Alderman Wilson's Samaritan Fund most generously paid for the equipment and furnishing. The Children's Ward was opened by the late Mr. Ley Chalton on 28th March, 1931.

Still feeling the urgent need to meet the demands of the population, 1933 found the Committee beginning negotiations for the latest additions to the Hospital, i.e., a new Out-Patients Department, a new X-Ray Department, increased accommodation for nurses, and enlargement of the boiler house. This work was necessary, and commenced in May, 1934. The new Out-Patient Department was commissioned for service in December, 1934, and the remainder of the work completed by February, 1935, the total cost of which, including equipment, amounted to £2,000.

And so we arrive at the present, as we are to-day, able to treat and maintain 76 in-patients. We have excellent facilities for the curing of the sick and injured—Four Wards, with accommodation for 34 men, 22 women, and 20 children; a modern Out Patient Department; X-Ray Department; Orthopædic Department (including massage, electrical and radiant heat treatments); Ophthalmic, Ear, Nose and Throat and Dental Clinics, and we have quite recently secured the honorary services of one of the finest gynæcological specialists (Mr. E. Farquar Murray). We can treat every case of illness or injury except, of course, infectious and chronic cases, provision for whom is made elsewhere.

The Cameron Hospital is situated in an ideal position—outside the town almost, on a rising slope, surrounded by practically countryside, and facing in such a direction that the wards obtain the maximum of sunshine.

The need for more accommodation is still felt, especially in the Female Ward. As will be seen in the Report for the year's working, the matter of extending the Hospital is now well in hand.



EXTRACT FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS

--- OF ----

Cameron Hospital, West Hartlepool.

Objects

2. The objects of the Hospital shall be the reception and treatment of patients who have sustained injuries or are suffering from diseases (infectious or contagious cases excepted) requiring surgical or medical treatment, and who reside within the Boroughs of West Hartlepool or Hartlepool or such other Districts as the Management Committee may from time to time decide, on such conditions as may be agreed upon.

Cost of Maintaining

3. The cost of maintaining the Hospital shall be provided for by public subscriptions, donations, bequests, the interest arising from funds held in trust for the benefit of the Hospital, and by donations made by patients or friends.

Free Benefits

4. The free benefits of the Hospital shall be available to persons who are not in a position to provide themselves with private medical attendance. Other persons may be admitted, provided the patients or their friends subscribe to the funds of the Hospital such sums as shall be determined by the House Committee.

Subscriptions -when due

9. Subscriptions for the current year are due on the first day of January in each year, and are payable in advance.

Discontinuance of Subscriptions

10. All Annual Subscribers shall be considered as continuing their subscriptions until they signify the contrary to the Secretary or Treasurer.

Subscribers Vote at Meeting

11. Every Annual Subscriber of £1 1s. 0d. or more shall be entitled to vote at the General Meeting of the Subscribers or at any Special Meeting as hereinafter provided.

Special Meeting

14. A Special Meeting of Subscribers and Representatives shall be summoned at the request of the Committee of Management or at the request of twelve Subscribers or Representatives by application to the Committee of Management.

Admission

76. Emergency cases shall be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other applicants seeking admission shall present themselves any time, Sundays excepted, at 9.30 a.m. for examination by the House Surgeon. If found suitable they will be admitted so far as the accommodation of the Hospital admits.

Accepted Cases

78. Accepted cases for which there is no immediate room will be sent for by the House Surgeon as vacancies occur.

79. The following cases are ineligible:

Those who upon examination are deemed incurable or not likely to receive permanent relief;

Those suffering from Phthisis or Mental Diseases, and those whose complaints are likely to be so tedious as to preclude the admission of more urgent cases;

Those whose admission might endanger other patients.

Obey Directions

82. Patients shall obey the directions of the Medical Staff, the House Surgeon, the Matron and the Nurses.

Bringing Food or Liquor to Hospital

83. Patients shall be permitted to supplement the diet provided by the Hospital with fruit, eggs and other light foods, subject to the approval of the Doctor or Nurse in charge. No medicine or intoxicant shall be brought into the hospital by or for the use of any patient.

Handing over Valuables

86. Patients on admission shall hand to the Matron all money or valuables, and shall be given a receipt. The Hospital will not be responsible for any loss through neglect of this precaution.

Visiting

88. Relations and friends may visit patients under the following conditions:

On	Wedesdays	 	from 2.0 p.m. to 3.0 p.m.

No other visits will be allowed except by permission of the House Surgeon or, in his absence, the Matron.

Number

89. Each patient is allowed two visitors only at a time. Each visitor is allowed to see one patient only. Ward to ward visiting is not allowed.

Children visiting

90. Children will be admitted as visitors if in charge of a responsible person, subject to Rule 89.

Infectious Visitors

91. Visitors in whose household any infectious disease prevails will not be allowed to visit the Hospital.

Contributory Schemes and Workmen's Contributions.

The Committee value the large amounts received from firms under this heading and thank those by whose efforts the amounts are collected and remitted to the Hospital. At the same time the Committee would welcome those firms who have not yet joined the Scheme to do so. Particulars of the Scheme can be obtained from the Secretary.

Coronation and Jubilee Celebrations.

To mark the Coronation of their Majesties and the Jubilee of the County Borough of West Hartlepool, the Corporation organised celebrations which resulted in a sum of £759 being paid to the Hospital.

Extensions Fund and Extensions.

The proposed extensions comprise a 10-bed extension to the Wilson Female Ward and a new Nurses' Home for 28 nurses. The estimated cost is approximately £13,000 which is to be borne as to 75% by the Commissioner for the Special Areas and as to the balance of 25%, i.e., £3,250, approx., by the Hospital. By the end of the year under review, £2,333 5s. 2d. had been received. The Committee is sure that the townspeople of West Hartlepool, realizing the Hospital's need, will not neglect to complete the amount required.

The detailed plans, specifications and bills of quantities of the extensions have been prepared by the Hon. Architect, Mr. F. Durkin. These have been submitted to the Ministry of Health and have been approved and tenders for the building work have been invited. It is anticipated that building will be commenced in late Spring.

Broadcast Appeal.

The B.B.C. has kindly granted permission for the Committee of this Hospital to broadcast a Weeks Good Cause Appeal, for Funds on Sunday, 26th June, 1938. It is hoped that the Appeal will be made on our behalf by Mr. Compton McKenzie, the eminent author.

Endowments.

During the year the following Endowment was received-

Mrs. C. R. Grainger, £500, for the endowment of a cot.

The Hospital has also become entitled to a legacy of £500 under the Will of the late Mr. John Abbey. The sum will be brought into account when received.

The Committee welcome these generous tributes to the work of the Hospital.

Property.

The buildings of the Hospital have been maintained in a good state of repair.

Equipment.

The whole of the equipment of the Hospital has been carefully maintained. In addition, the following items of equipment have been purchased:—

All of the eleven nurses entering for the State Examination were successful; seven passing the final examination and four the preliminary examination.

Secretary.

Mr. C. S. Kay was appointed Secretary in June 1937 in succession to Mr. M. H. Boone, who resigned on being appointed to the Chester-field Royal Hospital.

Ladies Hospital Guild.

The Ladies Hospital Guild again needs our special thanks for the splendid work during the year. In all, £159 7s. 10d. was collected, and all bed linen, garments, etc. needed by the Hospital during the year has been provided by the Guild.

Association of Friends of Cameron Hospital.

The Association has continued to give invaluable support to the Hospital and in the course of the year has contributed £460 0s. 0d. In addition a large measure of credit is due to the Association for their share in organising and running, under the aegis of the Corporation, the events of Jubilee and Coronation week.

The Association has recently undertaken the collection and distribution of collecting boxes.

Since the close of the year, it has been arranged for the number of representatives of the Association on the Management Committee to be increased from 2 to 5. In so doing, the Committee have had in mind, not only recognition of the services of the Association but also the prospective value of their co-operation in the conduct of the affairs of the Hospital.

The Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen.

The Association of Local Tradesmen was formed to give an opportunity to small tradesmen to make provision for themselves and their dependents by paying an annual subscription to cover the cost of treatment at the Hospital, should it be required. At the end of this year—the first full years of its formation—the total number of members is 180 and this number is increasing. The actual amount received by the Hospital for the general funds during the year was £76 0s. 0d. and £9 7s. 7d. Extension Fund. It is felt that the Association is a very live organisation and an increasing source of financial support.

CONCLUSION.

The Committee concludes its Report in grateful acknowledgment of the help of all employers and workmen's representatives in connection with the collection of contributions; the local press for much free publicity during the year; Cinemas for showing lantern slides; Mr. Edwards for his work in connection with the wireless set; Toc H for maintaining the Hospital Library; the Association of Friends for its never failing help; the Association of Local Tradesmen, the Ladies' Linen Guild, donors of gifts in kind, helpers with our Egg Collection, Flag Day, Pound Week, House-to-House Collection, the Honorary Medical staff, the Honorary officers—Treasurer, Solicitor and Architect, the clergy and choirs; and the many others too numerous to mention, by whose small but invaluable services, the work of this Hospital is furthered.

It is one of the greatest features of the Voluntary System that service is rendered by people of all walks in life. It is not possible to thank all individually, but the Committee would like to record its appreciation of all that is done by our many friends..



SOME QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

Management

Q. Who controls the Hospital?

A. The Subscribers who annually contribute One Guinea or upwards to the general funds of the Hospital. They appoint a Management Committee, which is the executive body. The Management Committee appoints a House Committee and a Finance Committee, the former being responsible for the internal organisation of the Hospital and the latter superintends and manages the finances.

Medical Staff

Q. How many doctors are there on the Staff?

A. There are eleven Honorary Medical Officers, who are local practitioners, and they are responsible in the first case for all patients admitted into the Hospital. There are five Honorary Consultants, one Honorary Dental Surgeon, one Anaesthetist and one Resident Medical Officer.

Classes of Patients admitted Q. What classes of patients does the Hospital admit?

A. This is a General Hospital, admitting most patients for which it has accommodation. Patients suffering from consumption, mental disorder, infectious or incurable diseases, unlikely to benefit by treatment or normal obstetric cases, are not admitted.

What to go to obtain treatment Q. What do patients have to do to obtain treatment at the Hospital?

A. Patients can only be treated, except in the case of emergency, upon the recommendation of a general medical practitioner. This means that patients must first see their own medical adviser, who will refer them to the Hospital for treatment should he or she consider this advisable.

Letters of Recommendation

Q. Are Letters of Recommendation issued to Subscribers?

A. Yes, one for each Guinea subscribed.

Contributory Scheme O. Has the Hospital a Contributory Scheme?

A. Yes, a very simple one, and the Secretary will be pleased to supply particulars on request.

Paying Patients Q. Is there accommodation for paying patients?

A. Yes, Eight.

Training for Nurses Q. Is the Hospital a recognised Training School for Nurses?

A. Yes. The Hospital is recognised as a training school by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales, and prepares students for the State Examinations, the course of training being three or four years, depending upon the candidate's age.

Nursing Staff

Q. What is the number of Nursing Staff, and are there qualified Nurses in each Ward?

A. The nursing staff numbers 35. The aim of the Committee is to have two qualified Nurses in each Ward.

Economical Administration Q. How does the administration of the Hospital compare with others?

A. An examination of the statistics issued shows that the cost of maintenance compares very favourably with that of similar Hospitals.

State Support Q. Is the Hospital supported by the State?

A. No. This is a voluntary Hospital, relying upon voluntary gifts to cover cost of maintenance. No support is received from the State or Municipalities, except an annual subscription from the West Hartlepool Corporation.

Debt

- Q. Is the Hospital in debt?
- A. Yes, unfortunately, to the extent of nearly £2,000.

Beds

- O. How many beds are there for patients?
- A. 76-Men 35, Women 21, and Children 20.

Assured Income

- Q. Has the Hospital large endowments?
- A. No. The assured income of the Hospital is very low. In 1937 the income from investments was £1,942, whilst the expenditure on maintenance was £9,932.

Viewing the Hospital

- Q. Can I see round the Hospital?
- A. Yes, the Management Committee would like you to do so. Please apply to the Secretary for an appointment.

Radium

- Q. Has the Hospital any radium?
- A. No. In special cases radium is obtained on hire.

Complaints

- O. Are any complaints made against the Hospital?
- A. Very, very few. Complaints are thoroughly investigated. The welfare of the patients is always the first thought, and the Committee has increased the accommodation as far as funds have permitted.

How to help the Hospital

- Q. How can I help the Hospital?
- A. Apart from ordinary subscriptions and donations—which will always be welcomed—you can contribute through your place of employment or you can take a collecting box and put something into it regularly. You can also render valuable assistance by voluntary service:

(a) By persuading your friends to help the Hospital;

- (b) By first seeing the Hospital and then telling the public about its great work;
- (c) By gifts in kind and by supporting the Hospital appeals or entertainments generally;
- (d) By joining the Association of Friends;
- (e) By joining the Ladies' Hospital Guild; or in any other manner that may suggest itself to you.

YOU CAN BESTOW ADDITIONAL BENEFIT TO THE HOSPITAL WITHOUT COST TO YOURSELF, IF YOU COULD AGREE TO THE FOLLOWING SCHEME:

All Subscribers to the Hospital who pay Income Tax pay their subscriptions out of Income upon which they have already paid Income Tax. Consequently, an Annual Subscription of £1 1s. 0d. represents a gross amount of £1 7s. 7d., assuming the Income Tax to be 4s. 9d. in the £.

If a Subscriber is prepared, however, to covenant by deed undertaking to pay a regular annual subscription for a period of seven years, it is possible for the Hospital to recover from the Inland Revenue Department the tax which has been paid by the Subscriber. This additional benefit arises under Section 20 of the Finance Act, 1922. An Annual Subscription paid under such a covenant can be treated as a nett payment after deduction of Income Tax.

Under the Scheme, a Subscriber will pay the Hospital his or her usual subscription of £1 1s. 0d. or more, and the Hospital will then be able to claim repayment of 6s. 7d. for each £1 1s. 0d. subscribed. The £1 1s. 0d. subscription will thus appreciate to £1 7s. 7d., which amount will be shewn in the Hospital records.

The Scheme cannot be made retrospective and can only apply to subscriptions that are paid after the necessary Deed has been signed and, of course, only to those who pay Income Tax.

The Secretary will arrange the recovery of tax each year, the only additional trouble to the Subscriber being the signing of a yearly certificate to the effect that the Subscription has been paid out of taxed income.

In the event of the death of the subscriber, the covenant becomes void.

Any Subscriber who is willing to adopt this scheme is requested to complete the Form of Covenant and send it to the Secretary.

REPORT

OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO THE SECOND ANNUAL MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATION OF FRIENDS

THE Executive Committee has pleasure in presenting its Second Annual Report in respect of the year ended 30th September, 1937. Interest in the work of the Association has been well maintained and the results may be regarded as highly satisfactory. In certain of the wards the need has, however, been felt of a body of supporters who would not necessarily serve on the ward committees but who would be ready and available to assist in various ways on particular occasions and constitute a valuable supporting influence behind the Committee themselves.

To enable this need to be met and also to facilitate the proper maintenance of a live register of membership of the Association, your executive has drafted an additional rule with regard to ordinary membership which will be presented for your consideration and adoption a little later.

Since the last annual meeting the Executive have adopted the procedure of transferring from the Association Account to that of the Hospital General Account such sums as can appropriately be so transferred at the end of each quarter. This arrangement is convenient both to the Hospital and the Association and it is of interest to state that the following amounts have been transferred since the last Annual Meeting:—

It will thus be seen that during the year the Association has transferred £349 16s. 10d. to the Hospital General Account and when it is borne in mind that the Association last year held its two principal functions as part of the Corporation Jubilee Celebrations and that under these arrangements the proceeds of these functions did not

pass through the Associations' account, the result of the year's work is, as previously indicated, very good.

It is of interest in this connection to state that a careful estimate of the proceeds of the Associations's two main events in the Jubilee Week amounts to approximately £125.

In addition to this, the Association itself and the individual Ward Committees and Members have assisted extensively in connection with other functions so that it may justly claim for the Association that it has been responsible for very material financial assistance to the Hospital. It will further be observed from the balance sheet that expenditure has been kept to a very low figure—a factor which has further contributed to the actual financial assistance rendered to the Hospital.

It would be of interest to note that the Hospital Management Committee has recognised the value of the Association's work by granting to the Association two seats on the management committee. To these, your executive elected the President and Councillor H. Bailey, and it will be for this Meeting to elect these representatives on the Management Committee together with the other officers of the Association in due course. It has been found that this further link with the Hospital Management has been of great value to the Association.

Another event of the year was the resignation of our honorary General Secretary, Mr. M. H. Boone, who relinquished his post on appointment as Secretary and Superintendent of the Chesterfield Royal Infirmary. Mr. Boone was closely associated with the formation of the Association of Friends and his untiring work is deserving of full appreciation. To fill the vacancy thus caused, your Executive appointed Mr. C. S. Kay, who succeeded Mr. Boone at the Hospital and in this way too, contact between the Association and the Hospital is usefully maintained.

Unfortunately the year that has passed has not been free from loss to the Association, and it is necessary to record with great regret the passing of Mrs. Warnes who was an indefatiguable member of the Park Ward Committee since its inception, and of Mr. M. H. Groves who was the Association's honorary auditor. The work and personality of these two supporters is remembered with grateful appreciation.

It remains to express the gratitude of the Executive Committee to all those who have by their work or financial support enabled the Association to continue to give such a good account of itself, and to express confidence that during the year that has already begun, the Association may go forward from strength to strength.

Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen.

THERE are those in this area who are ABLE but DO NOT support their Hospital, who, if sickness or accident came upon them, would be obliged to seek the help of the Hospital and would expect to receive free treatment. Such patients now often occupy beds to the exclusion of those who DO subscribe.

In justice to REGULAR SUBSCRIBERS, this Association has now been formed to provide an avenue for those self-employed persons and their families who, it is known, desire to subscribe to the Cameron Hospital in a small way and for whom there has heretofore been no organisation available.

Membership of the Association is limited to self-employed persons only.

The Annual Subscription is 10/- per shop or establishment not to include any employees or children over 16 years of age. For children over 16 years and up to 21 years an additional subscription of 4/- per annum will be payable, and for persons (single) over 21 years 10/- per annum, provided they are not employed elsewhere.

Subscriptions may be paid annually on 1st November, or quarterly on 1st November, 1st February, 1st May and 1st August, IN ADVANCE.

THE BENEFITS OF THE SCHEME are to provide free treatment at the Cameron Hospital to members and their families under 16 years for any period as an indoor or outdoor patient, when recommended by their doctor. Members being admitted to the Hospital as paying patients will receive a reduction of 25% from the account for hospital charges.

All monies collected will be paid by the Association to the Cameron Hospital on 30th April and 31st October in each year, and will be devoted to ordinary maintenance purposes.

THE FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CAMERON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION OF LOCAL TRADESMEN.

THE Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen was commenced on November 1st, 1936, as a means whereby self-employed persons and their families could subscribe to the Hospital, and in return be entitled to the benefits of free treatment, or at reduced fees in the case of paying patients.

During the year ended October 31st, 1937, 180 members were enrolled. Of these, 3 are deceased and 7 have ceased to be members.

The total subscriptions collected for this first year of the Association was £90 1s. 0d. At the end of the first half-year, a cheque for £50 was given to the Hospital out of subscriptions, and a further cheque will be handed over out of the second half-year's subscriptions.

During the year the Committee organised four social functions, each in the form of a Whist Drive and Dance.

The first, held in the Town Hall on February 19th, 1937, was in aid of the Extensions Fund, and a sum of £10 17s. 0d. was given to this Fund, as proceeds from this event.

The second was held at Seaton on March, 15th, 1937, and £1 was given to the Hospital from the proceeds.

The third event, on May 19th, was in connection with the Jubilee Celebrations of the town, and the Whist Drive and Dance proceeds on this occasion amounted to £22 2s. 7d.

The fourth function, held on October 20th, unfortunately was not a success, and showed a small loss.
