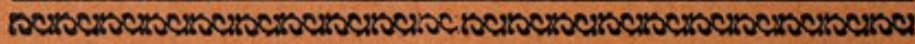

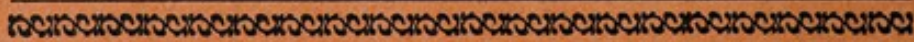

EXTRACT FROM
THE RULES AND REGULATIONS
of
Cameron Hospital, West Hartlepool.

- Objects** 2. The objects of the Hospital shall be the reception and treatment of patients who have sustained injuries or are suffering from diseases (infectious or contagious cases excepted) requiring surgical or medical treatment, and who reside within the Boroughs of West Hartlepool or Hartlepool or such other Districts as the Management Committee may from time to time decide, on such conditions as may be agreed upon.
- Cost of Maintaining** 3. The cost of maintaining the Hospital shall be provided for by public subscriptions, donations, bequests, the interest arising from funds held in trust for the benefit of the Hospital, and by donations made by patients or friends.
- Free Benefits** 4. The free benefits of the Hospital shall be available to persons who are not in a position to provide themselves with private medical attendance. Other persons may be admitted, provided the patients or their friends subscribe to the funds of the Hospital such sums as shall be determined by the House Committee.
- Subscriptions—when due** 9. Subscriptions for the current year are due on the first day of January in each year, and are payable in advance.
- Discontin-
uance of
Subscriptions** 10. All Annual Subscribers shall be considered as continuing their subscriptions until they signify the contrary to the Secretary or Treasurer.
- Subscriber's
Vote at
Meeting** 11. Every Annual Subscriber of £1 1s. 0d. or more shall be entitled to vote at the General Meeting of the Subscribers or at any Special Meeting as hereinafter provided.
- Special
Meeting** 14. A Special Meeting of Subscribers and Representatives shall be summoned at the request of the Committee of Management or at the request of twelve Subscribers or Representatives by application to the Committee of Management.
- Admission** 76. Emergency cases shall be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other applicants seeking admission shall present themselves at any time, Sundays excepted, at 9-30 a.m. for examination by the House Surgeon. If found suitable they will be admitted so far as the accommodation of the Hospital admits.
- Accepted
Cases** 78. Accepted cases for which there is no immediate room will be sent for by the House Surgeon as vacancies occur.
- Ineligible
Cases** 79. The following cases are ineligible :—
Those who upon examination are deemed incurable or not likely to receive permanent relief ;
Those suffering from Phthisis or Mental Diseases, and those whose complaints are likely to be so tedious as to preclude the admission of more urgent cases ;
Those whose admission might endanger other patients.

Obey Directions 82. Patients shall obey the directions of the Medical Staff, the House Surgeon, the Matron and the Nurses.

Bringing Food or Liquor to Hospital 83. Patients shall be permitted to supplement the diet provided by the Hospital with fruit, eggs and other light foods, subject to the approval of the Doctor or Nurse in charge. No medicine or intoxicant shall be brought into the hospital by or for the use of any patient.

Handing over Valuables 86. Patients on admission shall hand to the Matron all money or valuables, and shall be given a receipt. The Hospital will not be responsible for any loss through neglect of this precaution.

Visiting 88. Relations and friends may visit patients under the following conditions :—

On Saturdays from 2-30 p.m. to 3-30 p.m.

On Sundays from 3-0 p.m. to 4-0 p.m.

On Wednesdays... .. from 2-0 p.m. to 3-0 p.m.

On Thursdays from 6-30 p.m. to 7-30 p.m.

(for male visitors only).

No other visits will be allowed except by permission of the House Surgeon or, in his absence, the Matron.

Number 89. Each patient is allowed two visitors only at a time. Each visitor is allowed to see one patient only. Ward to ward visiting is not allowed.

Children visiting 90. Children will be admitted as visitors if in charge of a responsible person, subject to Rule 89.

Infectious Visitors 91. Visitors in whose household any infectious disease prevails will not be allowed to visit the Hospital.

Finance Committee 35. The Finance Committee shall, subject to the control of the Management Committee, superintend and manage the finances of the Hospital and shall, in particular, initiate, foster and manage schemes for increasing the income of the Hospital.

Investments 40. The Finance Committee shall, subject to the approval of the Management Committee, invest in the name of the Trustees all money for investments.

REPORT

OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE OF THE CAMERON HOSPITAL FOR THE YEAR 1940.

THE Management Committee has much pleasure in submitting to the Subscribers its 36th Annual Report of the work of the Hospital, together with a statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December, 1940.

The Work of the Hospital.

The work undertaken by the Hospital during the past year is set out on the table which forms an appendix to the Report.

The volume of work undertaken has not varied greatly as compared with that of the past few years, except in the case of Orthopaedic treatments, the number of which has considerably decreased. This decrease is due to the Orthopaedic building being at present used by the local authorities as a First Aid Post, and our limited accommodation.

The number of In-Patients treated too, is less, owing to the Emergency Hospital Scheme restrictions at the beginning of the year, later relaxed, and to evacuation. The waiting list is, fortunately, correspondingly small : and no hardship has resulted.

Finance.

The total income for the year amounted to £16,087 an increase of £6,099 over that of the preceding year whilst expenditure totalled £14,599 an increase of £3,845 compared with 1939.

In spite of the difficulties caused by the war, subscriptions and donations to the Hospital have been maintained and increased—especially contributions by the workmen of the town—and we again have pleasure in recording that the income from the latter

source is the highest ever received. The figure for this and the previous three years is given for comparison :—

Patients' contributions have declined—probably owing to the facilities available to contributors—but this decrease is more than compensated for by the workmen's increased and continued efforts.

The 1940 Flag Day receipts—£220—are worthy of special note, as they constitute a record. Great credit is due to all those concerned for their work in this connection.

During the year legacies have been received from the executors of the late Miss Ada Christopher-Brown (£100), the executors of the late Richard Newton (£322 17s. 3d.); and the final proceeds of the legacy from the estate of the late J. R. and M. Mowbray (£653 0s. 9d. and £1833 6s. 8d. in 2½% Consolidated Stock) have come to hand.

In view of the fact that the townspeople were being called upon in greater degrees to contribute to the ever increasing number of war charities, it was decided that the House-to-House Collection should be deferred for at least the year under review.

The following donations received were especially earmarked by their donors for the particular purpose of purchase of equipment, and these generous donations will be expended suitably as the need arises :—

Items of expenditure all show an inevitable increase consequent upon the war, and the addition of the Wilson Ward extension and Nurses' Home.

Much of the increased expenditure is compensated for by the Government grant made to cover that proportion of the expenditure assumed by the Ministry of Health in connection with the Emergency Hospital Scheme.

Subscribers are reminded of the facilities available under the Finance Acts whereby a covenant may be given for an annual subscription over a period of years, or for the duration of the war. By this the Hospital is able to obtain a refund of the Income Tax, thus increasing the subscription for the Hospital's benefit. Annual subscribers are particularly recommended to enter into these covenants, particulars of which may be obtained from the Secretary.

PROPERTY.

The whole of the kitchen equipment has been modernised, at a cost of £599. As the equipment installed will provide for a larger number of patients in case of air raids, the Government will assist in the cost to the extent of approximately £150. Parts of the interior of the Hospital including the kitchen have been painted, and the buildings have been carefully maintained. Emergency exits for use in case of fire have been provided in the Men's North Ward, and Nurse's quarters, (situated immediately above the Out-Patient department) whilst a sound-proof door in the corridor has been provided for the Night Nurses' quarters in the new home.

A small electric suction pump has been installed in the Boiler House to overcome possible flooding of that place.

An oxygen pipe line and apparatus has been installed over five beds in each of two wards, and should prove a useful acquisition in normal times as well as in case of war emergency, for which purpose it was installed.

The two large Hospital gates have been removed to allow of freer access to the Hospital by large ambulances in case of air raids.

The stock of Surgical and Medical appliances is being replaced.

EMERGENCY HOSPITAL SCHEME AND A.R.P.

Prior to the outbreak of war the Ministry of Health supplied a large number of additional beds for use in case of local air raids. The Ministry has, however, recently reviewed the position and has advised a reduction in the number to make for greater ease in nursing and longer retention of patients.

In addition to providing the beds the Ministry has supplied bedding, etc., and surgical equipment, and these together with the facilities which were already available at the Hospital will ensure as efficient a Hospital service in case of air raids as was previously available.

A large reserve Water Tank to store 7,000 gallons is being built, brick baffles have provided for vital hospital door-ways and windows, and brick walling will be built to replace present sand-bagging when the bags perish.

In addition, all Hospital windows have been covered with netting to protect patients and staff against the danger of flying glass. The cost of the protective work just enumerated is subject to Government grants on an agreed scale. In addition to this protective work, much consideration has been given to fire protection; stirrup hand pumps, buckets, scoops, shovels, and sand are well distributed throughout the Hospital, and all lofts have been made easily accessible and the necessary ladders are handy for use.

The two Porters will be available during "Alerts" and the Nursing Staff are well trained in all types of fire fighting. In addition, we have the knowledge that local A.F. Squads are stationed at posts adjacent to the Hospital.

Several gentlemen have kindly volunteered to, and do, attend the Hospital in the capacity of Stretcher Bearers in case of air raids. In response to a request from the local authorities two members of the Hon. Medical Staff have volunteered to become members of a Mobile Surgical Unit for service wherever required in the nearby district. Members of the Nursing Staff stand by for service with this unit and we may expect the help of such a unit from other nearby towns if required.

Association of Friends of Cameron Hospital and Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen.

Great credit is to be accorded to the energetic workers connected with these two organisations for the magnificent way they have carried on their work in spite of war restrictions. Neither of these Associations has had the same measure of success as in pre-war days, but they hold together, and no opportunity is missed to recover ground lost or explore new forms of efforts.

It is greatly regretted that during the course of the year under review Mr. K. P. Walker, the first President of the Association of Friends, was transferred by the Railway Company to another town, and had to sever his long connection with the Association.

His valuable services to the Association will be greatly missed and his successor, Coun. J. Fenwick, will undoubtedly have a hard task to maintain the high standard set by Mr. K. P. Walker.

Mr. J. Fenwick is, however, working very energetically, and hopes to produce even better results from the Association than ever before.

Ladies' Hospital Guild.

We are very grateful for the splendid way in which the Guild has provided the Hospital with linen etc., this past year. They have undoubtedly had a most difficult time, especially in view of the increased capacity of the Hospital, but their efforts have been most successful.

Nursing Staff.

During the year, seven Nurses were successful in passing the State Examinations. Lectures were given by the Honorary Medical Staff and the Sister Tutor.

The health of the Nursing Staff has been exceptionally good throughout the year. We attribute this to the shorter hours of duty, and the facilities available for recreation in the new Nurses' Home, which are much appreciated.

Your Committee decided that in view of the seriousness of the war situation during the summer time, all holidays should be cancelled. It was, however, possible to give the Nursing Staff adequate rest periods.

The Committee recently decided to create two new posts, that of House-keeping Sister and the other of Radiographer. Both these posts have been filled, and the experiment has proved well worth while.

We are indebted to Chief Fire Officer E. C. Waters, his Assistant Mr. T. Saint, and Sgt. R. Waggott for lectures on Fire Fighting. Their efficient tuition is reflected in the able manner in which the Nursing Staff respond when called upon for Fire Drill.

The Committee records with grateful appreciation the splendid gift by the Nursing Staff of rubber floor covering to the corridor leading to the Men's North Ward. The Nurses' gift, which was obtained from money raised by small efforts, is well appreciated, and has been a suggestion to the Committee to consider the question of the provision of this flooring for the whole of the Hospital Corridors. The Works Committee is at present considering the matter.

Orthopaedic Department.

Owing to a Government Order, we are not allowed to use Diathermy in this department unless the apparatus is adequately screened to prevent radio interference.

It would have been difficult to provide this screening and an approach was made to the Hartlepool Hospital to give treatments, if necessary, to the few Diathermy patients on our lists, and it is pleasing to record that this aid is to be given.

Egg Collection.

There was not the same success with the Egg Collection owing to food rationing and shortage of eggs.

We did however collect 9,354 eggs, and the Committee gratefully records its appreciation of the help of all donors and those who helped in the collection in any way.

Hospital Grounds.

An effort was made by Matron and the Nursing Staff to cultivate part of the Hospital grounds for the production of vegetables. Moderate success was attained, but they experienced difficulty in obtaining additional voluntary labour.

Mr. Johnson the farmer, has volunteered to plough up as much of the Hospital land as possible and plant with seed potatoes.

Personal.

In addition to those Members of the Committee already recorded as serving with H.M. Forces, or abroad on war service, Dr. George Strain has joined the R.A.F. The temporary vacancy caused by his leaving has been filled jointly by Drs. A. R. Muir and L. J. Stone.

Thanks.

The Committee again tenders grateful thanks to the members of the Honorary Medical and Surgical and Nursing Staffs for their valuable services during the year.

We must also express our appreciation of the many supporters of the Hospital, who in addition to contributing to our funds, have forwarded gifts of all kinds for the patients and staff, and organised Whist Drives, Dances, etc., on our behalf.

There are also many persons to whom we must express our appreciation for large or small services of varied nature.

We cannot conclude without expressing our appreciation to the local press for their regular attendance at our meetings, and for the valuable aid they have given in the way of publicity.

YOU CAN BESTOW ADDITIONAL BENEFIT TO THE HOSPITAL **WITHOUT COST TO YOURSELF**, IF YOU COULD AGREE TO THE FOLLOWING SCHEME:

All Subscribers to the Hospital who pay Income Tax pay their subscriptions out of Income **upon which they have already paid Income Tax**. Consequently, an Annual Subscription of £1 1s. 0d. represents a gross amount of £1 16s. 6d., assuming the Income Tax to be 8s. 6d. in the £1.

If a Subscriber is prepared, however, to covenant by deed undertaking to pay a regular annual subscription for a period of seven years, or to termination of the war, it is possible for the Hospital to recover from the Inland Revenue Department the tax which has been paid by the Subscriber. This additional benefit arises under Section 20 of the Finance Act, 1922. An Annual Subscription paid under such a covenant can be treated as a nett payment after deduction of Income Tax.

Under the Scheme, a Subscriber will pay the Hospital his or her usual subscription of £1 1s. 0d. or more, and the Hospital will then be able to claim repayment of 15s. 6d. for each £1 1s. 0d. subscribed. The £1 1s. 0d. subscription will thus appreciate to £1 16s. 6d. which amount will be shewn in the Hospital records.

The Scheme cannot be made retrospective and can only apply to subscriptions that are paid after the necessary Deed has been signed, and of course, only to those who pay Income Tax.

The Secretary will arrange the recovery of tax each year, the only additional trouble to the Subscriber being the signing of a yearly certificate to the effect that the Subscription has been paid out of taxed income.

In the event of the death of the subscriber, the covenant becomes void.

Any Subscriber who is willing to adopt this scheme is requested to complete the Form of Covenant and send it to the Secretary.

REPORT

of the Executive Committee presented to the Fifth Annual Meeting of the Association of Friends of the Cameron Hospital in respect of the Year ended 30th September 1940.

We have pleasure in presenting to you the following Report on behalf of the Executive Committee for the year ended 30th September, 1940.

ASSOCIATION

The first monthly meeting of your Executive Committee to be held during the Association's financial year just passed, took place soon after the outbreak of War. The Committee was then faced with a big problem as to the future of the Association at least during the period of the War, as it was generally agreed that the Association would not now be able to function to the same extent as in peace time.

After consideration the Committee unanimously agreed that the Association must carry on but with such activity as would be possible under Wartime conditions.

PRESIDENT

It was with great pleasure that we all learned that Mr. K. P. Walker had been appointed to a more important position with the Railway Company in Middlesbrough, but it was with great regret that we learned that this new appointment would necessitate his resigning from the Presidency, which position he has so ably filled since the inauguration of the Association.

This resignation coming at such a difficult time was a severe blow to us, but Coun. V. D'Alby, a Vice-President, who has been actively connected with the Association since its inception and who incidently has been a very active worker on the Fete Committee has stepped ably into the breach. He will, we hope, be able to help in keeping the Association together until more normal times.

It was decided by your Committee that some form of appreciation of Mr. Walker's magnificent work should be made, and your Committee subscribed a small sum for the purchase of a token of our regard, and this was handed over to him at a specially organized Whist Drive & Dance held in June last.

VICE-PRESIDENTS

I now wish to express our appreciative thanks to all Vice-Presidents for the valuable help rendered during this past year. That help has been ungrudgingly given in many ways, and we are again looking forward to their aid, and earnestly hope for their re-election.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Owing to the black-out, it was found that many Members could not attend meetings at the appointed times, and as this was seriously affecting the work it was decided to change the times, and your Committee is now meeting once per month, but much earlier in the evening.

WARD COMMITTEES

It is greatly regretted that very few Wards are now functioning as a whole, the reason of course is obvious as mentioned in the paragraph headed "Membership." It is, however, very pleasing to record that those Wards who are still holding together are doing magnificently, despite conditions imposed in these difficult days.

MEMBERSHIP

There has been a considerable decline in membership numbers this year, and this decline is not to be wondered at considering that those many people who in peace time work vigorously for the Hospital are now working equally hard, if not harder on essential A.R.P. work, also in addition, a large number of Ward Officials is serving with H.M. Forces.

It is hoped however, that those Wards which are functioning to the full will continue to maintain if possible a full membership.

FINANCE

The amount handed over to the Hospital this year is £150 a considerable decrease on the previous year's total. The decrease is to a large extent due to the fact that owing to difficulties in obtaining transport and labour, and war time restrictions, we had very reluctantly to give up the idea of holding our main annual money making effort, i.e. the Hospital Fete, which in previous years has brought in approximately £140 on each occasion.

As we have mentioned in another part of this Report, a number of Ward Committees through many reasons are not functioning. Those Ward Committees had each been doing good service by running small efforts, which though not making large profits in themselves by their very numerousness meant quite a good income to us.

There is also a large decrease in the total amount gathered from the Collecting Boxes. This decrease cannot however be attributed to lack of interest in the Boxes by the townspeople, but rather by our own difficulty in not being able to obtain the help of volunteers to open boxes more regularly. Every effort is however, being made to have all boxes collected at an early date, but those of our Friends who may not have had the usual collector round will appreciate our difficulty and assurance that this matter will be remedied as early as possible.

ANNUAL DINNER AND DANCE

In February of this year, we were again able to hold our popular Annual Dinner & Dance, which proved a great success from every point of view.

CONCLUSION

This Fifth year of the Association of Friends has been the most difficult yet experienced owing to the many restrictions imposed by the War, but in spite of all these difficulties, the Association is still holding up its head, and will so continue to do until such times as it is possible to have the help of those many people at present called to other duties.

Finally we must record our grateful appreciation of the numerous band of workers who have in any way helped in our efforts.

THERE are those in this area who are **ABLE** but **DO NOT** support their Hospital who, if sickness or accident came upon them, would be obliged to seek the help of the Hospital and would expect to receive free treatment. Such patients now often occupy beds to the exclusion of those who **DO** subscribe.

In justice to **REGULAR SUBSCRIBERS**, this Association has now been formed to provide an avenue for those self-employed persons and their families who, it is known, desire to subscribe to the Cameron Hospital, in a small way and for whom there has heretofore been no organisation available.

Membership of the Association is limited to self employed persons only.

The Annual Subscription is 10/- per shop or establishment not to include any employees or children over 16 years of age. For children over 16 years and up to 21 years an additional subscription of 4/- per annum will be payable, and for persons (single) over 21 years 10/- per annum, provided they are not employed elsewhere.

Subscriptions may be paid annually on 1st November, or quarterly on 1st November, 1st February, 1st May and 1st August, **IN ADVANCE.**

THE BENEFITS OF THE SCHEME are to provide free treatment at the Cameron Hospital to members and their families under 16 years for any period as an indoor or outdoor patient when recommended by their doctor. Members being admitted to the Hospital as paying patients will receive a reduction of 25% from the account of the Hospital charges.

All monies collected will be paid by the Association to the Cameron Hospital on 30th April and 31st October in each year and will be devoted to ordinary maintenance purposes.

THE FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CAMERON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION OF LOCAL TRADESMEN.

On 31st October, 1940, the Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen completed its fourth year of existence.

The previous year showed a decline in the amount of subscriptions paid, and this last year, unfortunately, there is a further reduction.

At the beginning of the year, that is, the first few months of the War, things were very difficult for the smaller tradespeople, but in the latter half of the year, there is an encouraging improvement shown, which we hope will continue steadily during the next financial year.

Many small businesses have been compelled to close down owing to War difficulties. Some have given up to go into work of national importance and therefore subscribe to the Hospital through their place of work.

For precisely the same reasons, this Committee has been considerably reduced, making a shortage of Collectors.

The number of members who have subscribed at all during the year is 120, but we have promise of several new members.

At the Annual Meeting we propose to hand over to the Hospital a cheque for £70 out of subscriptions.

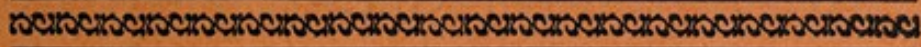
