

INCREASE OF SUBSCRIPTIONS BY RECOVERY OF INCOME TAX.

By virtue of the Income Tax Act, 1918, and subsequent Finance Acts, it is possible for the Hospital to effect an increase of its income by the recovery from the Inland Revenue Department of the Income Tax that has been paid by its subscribers in respect of their subscriptions. To enable the Hospital to do this, however, it is necessary that each subscriber should enter into a legally binding contract to pay the Hospital an annual subscription of a definite amount during a period of at least seven years.

The agreement is terminable by death, so that a subscriber's estate would not be liable for subsequent payments of the subscription.

EXTRACT FROM THE RULES AND REGULATIONS

of

Cameron Hospital, West Hartlepool.

Objects

2. The objects of the Hospital shall be the reception and treatment of patients who have sustained injuries or are suffering from diseases (infectious or contagious cases excepted) requiring surgical or medical treatment, and who reside within the Boroughs of West Hartlepool or Hartlepool or such other Districts as the Management Committee may from time to time decide, on such conditions as may be agreed upon.

Cost of Maintaining

3. The cost of maintaining the Hospital shall be provided for by public subscriptions, donations, bequests, the interest arising from funds held in trust for the benefit of the Hospital, and by donations made by patients or friends.

Free Benefits

4. The free benefits of the Hospital shall be available to persons who are not in a position to provide themselves with private medical attendance. Other persons may be admitted, provided the patients or their friends subscribe to the funds of the Hospital such sums as shall be determined by the House Committee.

Subscriptions —when due

9. Subscriptions for the current year are due on the first day of January in each year, and are payable in advance.

Discontinuance of subscriptions Treasurer.

10. All Annual Subscribers shall be considered as continuing their subscriptions until they signify the contrary to the Secretary or Treasurer.

Subscriber's Vote at Meeting

11. Every Annual Subscriber of £1 ls. 0d. or more shall be entitled to vote at the General Meeting of the Subscribers or at any Special Meeting as hereinafter provided.

Special Meeting

14. A Special Meeting of Subscribers and Representatives shall be summoned at the request of the Committee of Management or at the request of twelve Subscribers or Representatives by application to the Committee of Management.

Admission

76. Emergency cases shall be admitted at any hour of the day or night. Other applicants seeking admission shall present themselves at any time, Sundays excepted, at 9-30 a.m. for examination by the House Surgeon. If found suitable they will be admitted so far as the accommodation of the Hospital admits.

78. Accepted cases for which there is no immediate room will be

sent for by the House Surgeon as vacancies occur.
79. The following cases are ineligible:—

Ineligible Cases

The following cases are ineligible:—

Those who upon examination are deemed incurable or not likely to receive permanent relief;

Those suffering from Phthisis or Mental Diseases, and those whose complaints are likely to be so tedious as to preclude the admission of more urgent cases;

Those whose admission might endanger other patients,

Obey Directions

82. Patients shall obey the directions of the Medical Staff, the House Surgeon, the Matron and the Nurses.

or Liquor to Hospital

Bringing Food83. Patients shall be permitted to supplement the diet provided by the Hospital with fruit, eggs and other light foods, subject to the approval of the Doctor or Nurse in charge. No medicine or intoxicant shall be brought into the hospital by or for the use of any patient.

Handing Valuables 86. Patients on admission shall hand to the Matron all money or valuables, and shall be given a receipt. The Hospital will not be responsible for any loss through neglect of this precaution.

Visiting

88. Relations and friends may visit patients under the following conditions :-

> On Saturdays from 2-30 p.m. to 3-30 p.m. On Sundays ... from 3-0 p.m. to 4-0 p.m. On Wednesdays... from 2-0 p.m. to 3-0 p.m. On Thursdays ... from 6-30 p.m. to 7-30 p.m. (for male visitors only)

No other visits will be allowed except by permission of the House Surgeon or, in his absence, the Matron.

Number

89. Each patient is allowed two visitors only at a time. Each visitor is allowed to see one patient only. Ward to ward visiting is not allowed.

Children visiting

90. Children will be admitted as visitors if in charge of a responsible person, subject to Rule 89.

Infectious Visitors

91. Visitors in whose household any infectious disease prevails will not be allowed to visit the Hospital.

Finance Committee 35. The Finance Committee shall, subject to the control of the Management Committee, superintend and manage the finances of the Hospital and shall, in particular, initiate, foster and manage schemes for increasing the income of the Hospital.

Investments

40. The Finance Committee shall, subject to the approval of the Management Committee, invest in the name of the Trustees all money for investments.

REPORT

OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1945.

THE Management Committee has much pleasure in submitting to the Subscribers its 41st Annual Report, together with a Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

The Year's Work.

The Statistics set out in the Table forming an appendix to the report, show the volume of work undertaken during an exceptionally busy year, especially in the wards where the total number of persons admitted and treated is the highest on record. The waiting list has been kept low and operational work has been heavy. The Out-patients, X-Ray and Orthopaedic Departments have each been working to the maximum of their accommodation. The E.N.T., Orthopaedic and T.B. Clinics have imposed an increasing strain on the limited waiting room space in the Out-patients' Department. The reception of casualties during the sessions of the clinics in the Out-patients' department has presented a problem which is being resolved by the carrying out of alterations in the Orthopaedic Department which will provide a subsidiary casualty reception room there.

Finance.

The table set out overleaf affords a comparison of income and expenditure for the past ten years. The apparent surplus for the year may well be regarded as satisfactory, but the Committee feel constrained to offer some observations against a complacency which in their view cannot safely be indulged.

The date for the coming into force of any National Hospital Scheme remains uncertain and meantime the efficiency of our hospital is conditioned by our continued financial stability.

Expenditure has risen steeply, has continued to rise since the close of the year and there is no apparent alteration in that trend. Since the beginning of the war up to the present time normal expenditure on repairs and renewals has not been possible and there has thus been accumulating a large liability against which the adequacy of the appropriations already made can only be a matter of conjecture.

The amount received from Government grants for services under the Emergency Medical Service has risen from £5,938 in 1944 to £6,376 in 1945 but will show a severe decline in the future.

The admirable spirit which has produced these results has been illuminated by instances of a critical and stimulating attitude to them on the part of the workpeople's representatives themselves. Representatives have looked at these increases in the light of our greatly increased costs and have gene further in demonstrating to their own members the comparison between the total of their contributions on the one hand and the actual cost of the treatment their members have received on the other.

Legacies.

During the year the following legacies were received:

Reference was made in the last year's report to the WILSON BROWN bequest; a bequest of a reversionary interest in the entire residuary estate of the late Mr. John Wilson Brown of Woodlands, Wooler Road, West Hartlepool, who died in September, 1943. In February of this year Mrs. Wilson Brown joined in the ceremony of naming the South Ward the "Wilson Brown Ward" and of unveiling a commemorative tablet.

List of Subscriptions.

As paper is still in very short supply lists of subscriptions will not be published in this report but will be available in the Secretary's office.

Audit.

The books and accounts have been audited by Messrs. W. T. Walton & Son, Scarborough Street, West Hartlepool, and the Committee extend to them grateful thanks for a service which by reason of claims for state grants, etc., becomes increasingly onerous.

Emergency Hospital Scheme.

Your Committee has at the request of the Ministry of Health continued to reserve beds for the use of service personnel, and this reservation has been subject to substantial grants. The Ministry gave notification that the number of beds so reserved were to be reduced from 20 from the 1st April, 1945, and indicated that there would be a further reduction in the near future.

Richardson Convalescent Home.

The late Mr. R. T. Richardson of Barnard Castle in 1932 left practically the whole of his estate for the provision of a convalescent home at Barnard Castle, and this home will soon be ready for use. One half of its 24 beds are for the use of convalescents from the R.V.I. and Darlington War Memorial Hospital, and the other 12 beds are to be allocated to Durham County and N.R. Yorks Hospitals. Your Committee has agreed to make an annual subscription of £3 3 0 and in return it will be possible every year for eleven convalescents from this Hospital each to have a fortnight's rest in pleasant surroundings.

Association of Friends.

A total contribution of £750 within the year is most gratefully acknowledged. Your Committee records too its recognition of the manifold difficulties under which the Association has been working throughout the war. These difficulties continued to increase and culminated in the lamented death of the President, Mr. H. R. Fordham, to which reference is made elsewhere in this

report. In relation to so important an association your Committee must report events as at the moment of writing rather than as at the end of the year. In this sense it may be said that the Association has taken on a new lease of life under the presidency of Mr. J. W. Hooker and we look forward not only to a continuance of their essential financial support, but rather and with especial emphasis to the undertaking of a whole range of activities which the phrase "Friends of the Hospital," will call to the mind and which will be needed in increasing measure as our hospital comes to take its place in the projected National Scheme.

Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen.

Attention is directed to the excellent progress made by the Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen. Owing to war-time conditions, and shortage of helpers, the work of the Association was for a time greatly retarded. A number of new workers are now with the Committee, and their combined efforts are bearing fruit, as is evident from this year's donation to the Hospital of £219. In addition to their contributory scheme collections they have organized a Sunday evening concert at the Empire Theatre, West Hartlepool, and other smaller efforts.

Cameron Hospital Association of Clubs.

This, the youngest Associate Committee of the Hospital, has had another year of hard work in the Clubs of the town, reaping much benefit for the Hospital. Its many efforts have enabled no less a sum than £200 to be passed over to the general funds. Our Friends in the Clubs have done very well indeed.

Property and Alterations.

Every endeavour has been made to maintain the Hospital property in relation to the limited material and labour available, but much work remains to be done as soon as restrictions are eased. A large part of the interior has been cleaned and painted, and your Committee has accepted a Tender for very essential exterior painting.

The return to the Hospital of the Orthopaedic Building, used by the Local Authorities during the war as a First Aid Post, has greatly relieved the pressure on the main premises and has resulted in greater efficiency in the treatment of patients attending for Orthopaedic Treatments, but many alterations are necessary before the Department is up to its previous standard.

Black-out materials, and the major portion of the wartime blast baffles, have been removed, considerably lightening the various wards, departments, and living quarters. It will be possible to claim a grant from the Ministry of Health for removal of the brick walling.

Plans are afoot for the much needed extensions and improvements to the kitchen. A food trolley, the gift of the local Chamber of Trade, was a splendid addition to our equipment.

Honorary Officials.

The Committee acknowledges its indebtedness to the Honorary and Assistant Treasurers, Mr. H. P. Lloyd and Mr. D. Mole, the Honorary Architect, Mr. F. Durkin, and the Honorary Solicitor, Mr. F. W. J. Webb, for professional services.

Nursing Staff.

Exceptional difficulty has been experienced in maintaining the numbers of our nursing staff. This has become a national problem in which our Hospital in common with smaller hospitals generally is at a special disadvantage. As a result of continuous effort your Nurses Staffing Committee have been able to achieve a reasonable close approximation to establishment, but in view of the nation-wide shortage of nurses it has been found necessary to take our own steps to stimulate recruitment to the profession. Parties of selected school girls have been shown round the Hospital and a scheme is now under consideration whereby girls at school leaving age may become associated with the hospital and their general education continued with the assistance of a subsistence or maintenance grant from our funds until they become of age to be enrolled as Student Nurses.

Student Nurses are being sent for a period of eight weeks to the Preliminary Training School at Sunderland Infirmary. The Scheme has proved most successful and almost all those sent by us have returned to the Hospital to complete their training.

The co-operation of subscribers is asked in helping to stimulate recruitment by making known the very desirable conditions of service now attaching to nursing as a career.

It continues to be the practise for an elected representative of each grade of the nursing staff to meet the members of the Nurses' Staffing Committee at their regular meetings. An opportunity is thus afforded of making representations as to the conditions of service of the Nurses and of making constructive suggestions as to the working of the Hospital. This form of liaison has proved of great value and is being extended to the domestic staff along similar lines.

Ladies' Linen Guild and W.V.S.

The Ladies' Linen Guild is again to be congratulated for its good work in providing all the linen required by the Hospital. The sewing party, recruited from the W.V.S. has given its services one afternoon per week throughout the whole year, making up and marking many articles. The work of both these organisations given freely and willingly has been invaluable.

Gifts from Red Cross Society of America.

Our American friends have nobly assisted the Hospitals with many very generous gifts, and all have been of great use in the Hospital. The gifts are far too varied to enumerate, but each article has been put to extremely good use. We are also indebted to Mr. J. Wilkinson, The Stockton Hospital Secretary, and Mr. G. T. Holt of the Hartlepools Hospital for undertaking local Hospital distributions.

Waste Paper Collection.

The Durham Paper Mills Ltd., has now ceased this useful war-time service. and handed over the final cheque of £388. In the war years this firm has donated over £2,000 from paper salvaged. The people who saved this paper, and the firm who collected, are to be congratulated on a splendid effort.

Obituary.

The Committee has to record with deep regret the deaths during the year of Mr. A. Frame a life governor, who was a works representative on the first Management Committee, Mr. A. McGlashan, a Vice-President of the Hospital for many years, and Mr. H. R. Fordham.

Mr. Fordham had served the Hospital as masseur for upwards of 25 years with conspicuous devotion to duty. He had also been an indefatigable worker for the Association of Friends since its inception and for the last three years as its President. He will long be held in affectionate and respectful memory by your Committee and a host of friends and grateful patients. The Memorial Fund authorised by your Committee is still open and contributions are invited either to the Honorary Treasurer at the National Provincial Bank, or to the Secretary at the Hospital. An announcement of the closing of the Fund will be made at an early date.

Honarary Medical Staff.

The Committee is deeply conscious of the gratuitous service of the Honorary Medical Staff who so continuously give of their best for the large number of patients flowing through the Hospital, and we wish to record here our sincere gratitude to them.

Secretaryship.

The Committee accords a welcome to Mr. C. S. Kay on his return from war service to his position as Secretary. It has also

recorded in the minutes its highest sense of appreciation of the services of Miss P. M. Betts throughout her tenure of the Secretaryship in the absence of Mr. Kay.

Thanks.

Cordial thanks are extended to the inumerable supporters of the Hospital, who by their gifts of money or in kind, have enabled the work of the Hospital to be maintained. We are also grateful to members of the Toc H, for the splendid service they freely give in the maintenance of the Hospital Library and Wireless Set, to the ladies of the W.V.S. in taking charge of the telephone switchboard each evening. The Clergy and Ministers of all denominations for their ministration to the sick, and to many others with greater or lesser degrees of service, all of whom have this year and in past years helped the Hospital to achieve its high standard of efficiency.

Conclusion.

The report is written with but little reference to the proposed National Health Service. At the close of the year the Government's proposals had not been published and at the moment of submitting this report the scheme lacks the accuracy and definition of statute. Nevertheless, the matter dominates our thoughts and conditions our activities. It may well be that the Voluntary System as we have known it is about to pass away, but your Committee is confident that the survival of the spirit of that system is called for as never before, to permeate and humanise a new, a more comprehensive and better hospital system for the greatest good not only of the greatest number but of everyone. The Committee feels itself to be working not so much in the shadow cast by the coming of great events, but rather in the light of their opportunity.

OF THE

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

in respect of the year ended 30th September, 1945.

The Executive Committee has pleasure in presenting its Annual Report for the year to 30th September, 1945.

President and Vice-Presidents.

During the year the Association has been guided by Mr. H. R. Fordham, who, for his third year as President, continued to exert himself in many ways in the interests of the Association. Unfortunately, since the close of our year, we have suffered a grievous loss in the sudden death of Mr. Fordham. The Hospital and the Friends have lost a faithful employee as well as an untiring worker, and he will be greatly missed by countless people in all walks of life. Also during the year we lost the services of Mr. J. E. Robson, who, though not a very frequent visitor to our meetings, was always to be relied upon whenever he could help us in any way. Our remaining Vice-Presidents have served us well, and we desire once again to express our sincere thanks to Mrs. Horsley for her invaluable support.

Ward Committees.

The only ward which has functioned individually during the year has been the Seaton Village Ward, and we would take this opportunity of thanking Mrs. Wyatt for keeping the flag flying in her ward until it is possible to obtain more help.

Finance.

For the second year in succession our contribution to the Cameron Hospital has shown a drop when compared with the previous year and for the twelve months to 30th September, 1945, our transfers to the Hospital amounted to £750 as against £800 in the previous year. The biggest single item on our revenue side has been the Christmas Raffle (218 6 5), the huge success of which was due in the main to our President. A most pleasing

donation of £40 was received from Mr. Wood, who gave us the option of this sum of money or a plot of land as a token of his appreciation of services he had received from the Hospital. Individual donations have continued to be received from various sources, and the Ladies' Bowling teams have again sent us donations from their season's activities.

Conclusion.

It is regretted that our Report is not so bright as we had hoped, but strenuous efforts are being put forward to revive the Association and to make it into that active force it was two or three years back. There is little doubt that the work of the Association must continue, and we are confident that we shall not appeal in vain for willing and energetic workers. We extend our thanks to all who have assisted us in any way whatever, and at the same time express the hope that their support will continue in increasing measure.

Objects and Conditions of Membership.

THERE are those in this area who are ABLE but DO NOT support their Hospital who, if sickness or accident came upon them, would be obliged to seek the help of the Hospital and would expect to receive free treatment. Such patients now often occupy beds to the exclusion of those who DO subscribe.

In justice to REGULAR SUBSCRIBERS, this Association has now been formed to provide an avenue for those self-employed persons and their families who, it is known, desire to subscribe to the Cameron Hospital, in a small way and for whom there has heretofore been no organisation available.

Membership of the Association is limited to self employed persons only.

The Annual Subscription is 13/- per shop or establishment not to include any employees or children over 16 years of age. For children over 16 years and up to 21 years an additional subscription of 5/- per annum will be payable, and for persons (single) over 21 years 13/- per annum, provided they are not employed elsewhere.

Subscriptions may be paid annually on 1st November, or quarterly on 1st November, 1st February, 1st May and 1st August. IN ADVANCE.

THE BENEFITS OF THE SCHEME are to provide free treatment at the Cameron Hospital to members and their families under 16 years for any period as an indoor or outdoor patient when recommended by their doctor. Members being admitted to the Hospital as paying patients will receive a reduction of 25% from the account of the Hospital charges.

All monies collected will be paid by the Association to the Cameron Hospital on 31st October in each year and will be devoted to ordinary maintenance purposes.

Further particulars of the scheme may be obtained from the Hon. Sec., or member of the Committee of the Association.

Annual Report for Year ended October 31st, 1945.

On October 31st, 1945, the Local Tradesmen's Association came to the end of its 9th year.

The number of subscribers on the books was 168 as against 164 the previous year.

The total amount of the subscriptions during the year was £101 5 3, in addition to which we have received a donation of £50.

We have to thank Mrs. Burton of Seaton Carew for her efforts in organising a whist drive to start the social fund of the Association, a fund which can be drawn on for expenses for concerts etc. The thanks of the Committee also go to Mr. Greenwell and Mr. Barnes for promoting a dance at the Boilermakers' Club for the same purpose. The proceeds from these two functions were £3 3 0 from Mrs. Burton and £3 7 0 from Mr. Greenwell.

On Sunday evening, 25th November, a concert was given at the Empire Theatre by the Vestertainers, the proceeds of which were to be divided as last year—two thirds to the Cameron Hospital and one third to Hartlepools Hospital..

We are deeply grateful to the Management of the Empire, Mr. A. E. S. Barker and the W.H.O.D.S. Vestertainers, also to Miss Betts and Mr. Appleyard who have worked so strenuously to achieve the grand success of the concert.

As the result of this effort the Cameron Hospital, through the Local Tradesmen's Association, will benefit by the sum of £69 6 8, being the two thirds share of the proceeds.

We were very pleased to welcome back Mr. G. Thacker as a member of the Committee. He has been abroad on active service and hopes to be able soon to be a regular worker again when he is finally demobilised.


Out of this year's subscriptions and donations we propose to give a cheque for £150 from the Cameron Hospital Association of Local Tradesmen.
