

Among the men who made a right choice of a career Harold Shrimpton is surely to be included. Hospital administration was the all-absorbing concern of his life. He devoted himself with unflagging zeal to the mastery of its intricacies until he became an acknowledged expert in this field. His advice was constantly sought by Birmingham hospitals other than the Children's, and readily given by him. Although his local duties were heavy, he accepted membership of national organisations which dealt with the work of voluntary hospitals, and his co-operation was highly valued.

Upon the Children's Hospital he lavished his knowledge and energies without stint. When he was appointed House Governor the hospital was small and comparatively unknown beyond the city. He became the dynamic force of its development, so that it gained recognition as among the foremost of this type of specialised hospital in the country. Every department received his personal supervision, and he was ever watchful to incorporate new methods and principles. He watched over the hospital's growth with the pride of a parent seeing a child growing taller and stronger.

He was always on the alert for opportunities to enlarge the hospital's usefulness in the treatment of sick children. To his initiative are due the erection of the new Babies' Block, which became his especial joy and pride; the acquisition at Malvern of School House for probationers and St. Cuthbert's for cases requiring lengthy treatment; and the transference to the hospital of the Hannah Guy Trust, which will provide a convalescent home for babies and young children where they will be accommodated together with their mothers.

The secret of Harold Shrimpton's successful work was his deep love of children. The young patients were his family. To walk with him around the wards was a memorable experience. He knew the youngsters by name, and they knew him. He had a cheerful word for all, particularly for those who were in pain. He regarded it as his mission to restore them to health and give them hope of a sturdy manhood and womanhood.

Medical and nursing staffs, as well as lay administrators, quickly learned to value his judgment and appreciate his whole-hearted devotion. He did all in his power to lighten their work and smooth away difficulties. He never spared himself to further the interests of the hospital. Despite the pain and discomfort of the disease which impaired his health, he worked on without relaxation to the end. The Children's Hospital, as Birmingham now knows it, is the enduring monument to his life's labour.

FOR THE YEAR 1945

THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT has pleasure in presenting to the GOVERNORS and SUBSCRIBERS the EIGHTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT and audited accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

During the year under review the Board has pursued its policy of providing the maximum facilities for the care and treatment of sick children, and the statistics set out below show that all departments of the Hospital have worked at very high pressure. For the purpose of comparison the corresponding figures of the previous year are also shown.

The Board feels that the foregoing particulars are adequate to emphasise to the Governors, subscribers and the general public the extent of the valuable work which is being performed by the Hospital in these difficult days for the alleviation of sick children.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE

The Bill on a National Health Service is at present before Parliament, and the Board regrets the approaching end of the voluntary hospital system. This has afforded an opportunity to many thousands of people to take a practical and personal interest in the welfare of the patients by voluntary contributions in money or kind, by participation in contributory schemes or works' funds or by service ungrudgingly given on committees and boards of management. The Board expresses the earnest hope that the introduction of a National Health Service will not diminish the personal and individual interest of a very wide public in the work of the Children's Hospital. Under the Bill, the general system of Regional Boards and Management Committees will not cover the teaching hospitals. It is proposed that the Minister will constitute for each teaching hospital or group of hospitals its own separate Board of Governors, including members nominated by the University, the Regional Board for the Area, the Senior Staff of the Hospital itself and members appointed after consultation with the major Local Authorities and other organisations concerned, including the previous Governing Bodies. The Board of Governors will, therefore, continue to be responsible for the general administration of its affairs

on behalf of the Minister, and it is hoped that under the new system the independence and individuality of the Hospital will be largely maintained in the interests of the patients.

INSTITUTE OF CHILD HEALTH

During the past year the Board has collaborated with the University and City Council in the establishment of an Institute of Child Health. It is designed to co-ordinate the activities of the Hospital, University and City Council, and to integrate all the curative, educational and preventive aspects of child care. It is the first complete scheme for a child health service to be established in this country, and it may well prove to be a model for other hospitals, universities and local authorities. It may be necessary at some future date to build an Institute of Child Health adjacent to the Children's Hospital, but for the present the work is being carried out at the Carnegie Institute and at the Hospital. It is hoped that all departments concerned with child health will eventually share in its activities. In fact, the Education Committee expressed a wish to take part in the scheme from its inception, and in the future other local authorities in the Midlands may realise the necessity of being associated with the Institute.

The management of the Institute has been entrusted to a Council composed of representatives of the Hospital, University and City Council. The head of the department is Dr. Leonard G. Parsons, Professor of Diseases of Children in the University, whose qualities of heart and mind and whose zeal for service to sick children have brought this Institute into being and been largely responsible for giving to it its unique character. The present Professor is a part-time officer, but his successor will devote the whole of his time to the post. The Professor is also consultant to the child welfare services of the City, Physician to the Children's Hospital and to the City Babies' Hospital. He is assisted by Dr. Jean Mackintosh, University Reader and Senior Maternity and Child Welfare Officer, and Dr. Mary Crosse, Lecturer in Child Welfare.

Honorary medical officers of the Hospital are available for consultation on request by members of the medical staff of the City, and one of the Hospital's Physicians holds consultative child welfare clinics at the Carnegie Institute. The Hospital has increased its staff by the appointment of four Registrars. Each Registrar works for two sessions a week in municipal child welfare or other clinics, while whole-time medical officers of the Maternity and Child Welfare and Education Committees of the City have been appointed clinical assistants in the out-patient and in-patient departments of the Hospital. The cost of the scheme, which will be shared equally by the three constituent bodies, is expected to be from £15,000 to £18,000 a year.

The Board is confident that the Institute of Child Health provides a great opportunity to raise the standard of health of children in the City and neighbourhood, and to train medical students, graduates, nurses and social workers in the care of children in sickness and in health.

ACCOMMODATION FOR NURSING STAFF

Reference was made in last year's Annual Report to the serious shortage of accommodation for members of the nursing staff, and your Board and House Committee have had this pressing problem constantly before them during the year. Accommodation is required for an additional hundred nurses, and it became clear that Wards 7 and 8 could not be re-opened until more accommodation was found. After inspecting a number of properties the Board purchased "Bushwood," 32, St. James Road, Edgbaston, for the sum of £6,000. "Bushwood," which was for many years a well-known nursing home, will accommodate from thirty-five to forty nurses. The Board is deeply grateful to Mrs. Douglas Marsh for kindly giving to the Hospital, in memory of her husband, the remainder of the lease of her house at 10, Church Road, Edgbaston, for a sisters' hostel. The house is at present requisitioned by a government department, but it is hoped that before the end of the year the sisters will be able to go into residence. In addition to the hostels at "Bushwood" and 10, Church Road, it will be necessary to provide more accommodation for nurses at the Hospital. Cubicles in the East Home have been converted into nurses' bedrooms, and the Board is at present considering plans for an extension to the West Nurses' Home.

POST-WAR RE-ORGANISATION

The Board has appointed a Sub-Committee on Post-War Re-organisation, which will review and, if necessary, re-organise the work of all departments of the Hospital. The Sub-Committee is giving careful consideration to plans for the post-war period, and it has already received valuable reports on Accounting and Costing, Stores and Storekeeping Procedure, the Engineering and Electrical Services, the Kitchen and Laundry. Many of the Hospital's ancillary services have become inadequate or out-of-date, and the Sub-Committee is actively engaged in preparing schemes for modernising or replacing them.

FINANCE

The problem of finance causes increasing concern. In the past your Board has usually, though not without difficulty, been able to pay its way, but henceforward, according to our estimates, the Hospital will be running into debt at the rate of several thousands of pounds a year. This is due partly to the high costs of supplies of all kinds and to increased salaries and wages, and partly to the reduction in the substantial war-time payments received from the Ministry of Health for services rendered under the Emergency Medical Scheme. The Revenue Account shows the income and expenditure during the year to be £73,234 and £78,957 respectively. The Birmingham Hospitals Contributory Association paid £30,551 as compared with £26,374 in 1944. Payments received from the Ministry of Health for services rendered under the Emergency Medical Scheme were £3,414 as compared with £7,624 in the year 1944, and this source of income is rapidly coming to an end.

HONORARY TREASURER

The Governors and subscribers will learn with regret of the resignation of Mr. G. O. Howard Smith, F.C.A., from the Board and the office of Honorary Treasurer. Mr. Howard Smith, who left Birmingham on his retirement from professional life, was intimately associated with the work of the Hospital from February, 1913 to September, 1945. During this time he held with distinction every office that it was possible for a member of the Board to hold. He was Honorary Treasurer from 1938 to the time of his retirement, Chairman of the House Committee in 1921, Chairman of the Board of Management from 1922 to 1924 and Chairman of the Finance Committee from 1928 to 1930. The Board desires to record its high appreciation of the long and eminent services which Mr. Howard Smith rendered to the Hospital, and to recommend that he be appointed a Vice-President at the Annual General Meeting. The Board has much pleasure in reporting that Mr. Norman G. Lancaster, M.B.E., A.C.A., kindly agreed to accept the office of Honorary Treasurer.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The Board records with deep regret the deaths, during the past year, of Mr. W. H. Perry and Mr. A. Tustain, and desires to express its appreciation of their valuable services to the Hospital. Mr. Perry was appointed to the Board in 1941. He took a keen and practical interest in the work of the Hospital, and played an important part in the negotiations of the Hannah Convalescent Home. By the death of Mr. Tustain the Board has lost a friend who always had the best interests of the Hospital at heart. Mr. Tustain, who was a generous subscriber and benefactor, had served on the Board since 1936.

The Board reports with the utmost regret the resignations during the year of Mr. E. E. Moore and Dr. Egbert Morland, M.D., F.R.C.S. Mr. Moore was appointed to the Board in 1923, and Dr. Morland in 1934. Mr. Moore and Dr. Morland were among the Hospital's best friends and staunchest supporters. In recognition of the long and notable services which Mr. Moore rendered to the Hospital the Board wishes to recommend that he be appointed a Vice-President at the Annual General Meeting.

DEATH OF MR. HAROLD F. SHRIMPTON, O.B.E., F.H.A.

The Board records with profound regret the death on May 25th, 1945, of Mr. Harold F. Shrimpton, O.B.E., F.H.A., House Governor and Secretary from 1918 to the day of his death, and desires to place on record its high appreciation of the eminent services which he rendered to the Hospital during his long and distinguished term of office. The Board recognises that Mr. Shrimpton played a very valuable and important part in the development of the Hospital which has to a great extent been due to his wise counsel and constant devotion. His courage and cheerfulness during his prolonged illness were the admira-

tion of all who came into contact with him, and his kindly nature and personal attributes endeared him to everyone. The Board, whilst deploring his passing, wishes to record gratitude for his distinguished services and respect to his memory, and extends to Mrs. Shrimpton an expression of deep sympathy and condolence in her irreparable loss. An appreciation by the Rev. Dr. A. Cohen, Chairman of the Board, of Mr. Shrimpton's life's work, appears on page 5 of the Report and is reprinted by kind permission of the Editor of the *Birmingham Post*. The Board accepted with gratitude a portrait of Mr. Shrimpton kindly presented by Mrs. Shrimpton.

APPOINTMENT OF HOUSE GOVERNOR AND SECRETARY

Mr. Arnold Tunstall, who held the office of Deputy House Governor from October 10th, 1944, was appointed House Governor and Secretary in succession to Mr. Shrimpton.

REPORT OF THE BRICK LEAGUE FOR THE YEAR 1945

THE BRICK LEAGUE HAS PLEASURE IN PRESENTING ITS
33RD ANNUAL REPORT

It was in July, 1913, that the first Brick-Laying Ceremony took place when 426 children, who had each contributed a guinea, had the privilege of laying a brick bearing their own initials. The Brick League was formed in October, 1913, with the object of developing the newly-awakened interest into a recognition of life-long responsibility towards the Hospital and its little patients. Its Founder was Mrs. Florence D. Player who died in April, 1945. She was a woman of magnetic personality—she loved the Hospital and she loved children, especially those whom she delighted to call her "Bricks." She maintained keen interest in the Brick League as its President, right up to the end of her life, and had the joy of seeing it grow into a strong and active organisation. During the thirty-two years of its existence the number of bricks purchased through its thirteen branches has been 2,646, of which 64 were purchased during 1945; the financial assistance given to the Hospital has totalled nearly £20,000.

The Brick League, while mourning the loss of a beloved President, realises that as long as interest is continued, the League will be a worthy memorial to Mrs. Player.

The Committee is glad to report that Mrs. Douglas Marsh has succeeded Mrs. Player as President.

Work in the Branches has gone on steadily throughout the year under the wise guidance of enthusiastic Presidents and Committees.

We have again made to the Hospital our Annual contribution of £120, which is spent on wool and materials to be made up for use in the wards. At Christmas we gave a number of soft toys for the wards and Babies' Block.

We have increased our interest in convalescent patients and are now supporting three Cots—at Rhyl, Charnwood Forest and Broadstairs; these are continuously occupied for varying periods by children from our Hospital.

Pound Day was held in April and was very well attended. After a short address by Miss Kathleen Elliott, one of our first Bricks, the children handed their gifts to Matron and afterwards visited the Babies' Block.

It is with great pleasure that the Committee records the increasing interest taken by children and young people in working for the Hospital they helped to build. One Branch has a strong and active junior committee; individual efforts carried out by children are numerous and include the following taken from Branch reports:—

“Four children of one family, helped by their Mother, made and sold goods and had £5 in hand before their Bring and Buy Sale.”

“The Junior Committee undertook all posters, fetching and returning chairs and china, all the games and competitions and two stalls of their own.”

“One girl's posies and packets of seeds were, as usual, a great attraction. The button-holes worn by everyone gave a festive air to the occasion.”

“Four young people all saved up half-pennies and bought two bricks with the collection.”

“Two girls went carol-singing and earned 12/-.”

“Our school money-boxes for the year contained over £10 in pennies and half-pennies. One daddy made a lovely Dolls' House which was raffled for £28 8s.”

“The children had one side of the hall and kept other visiting children amused with Hoop-La, Bucket Ball and other games.”

The successful year's work is due entirely to the infectious enthusiasm of our members under their Branch Presidents, of whom it is interesting to note that six became “Bricks” as children. Moreover, a number of early “Bricks” are members of Branch Committees. We thank most sincerely all those whose untiring efforts and loyal service have enabled us, not only to make the contributions already referred to, but also to transfer £1,180 to the Hannah Convalescent Home Fund.
