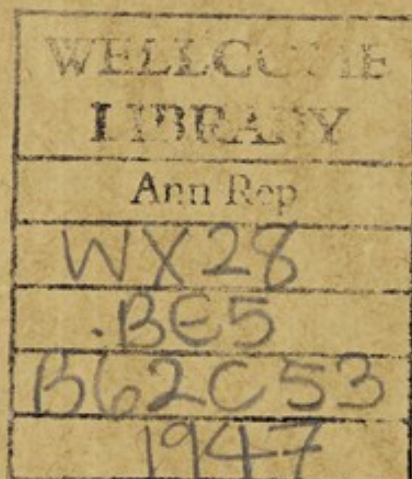

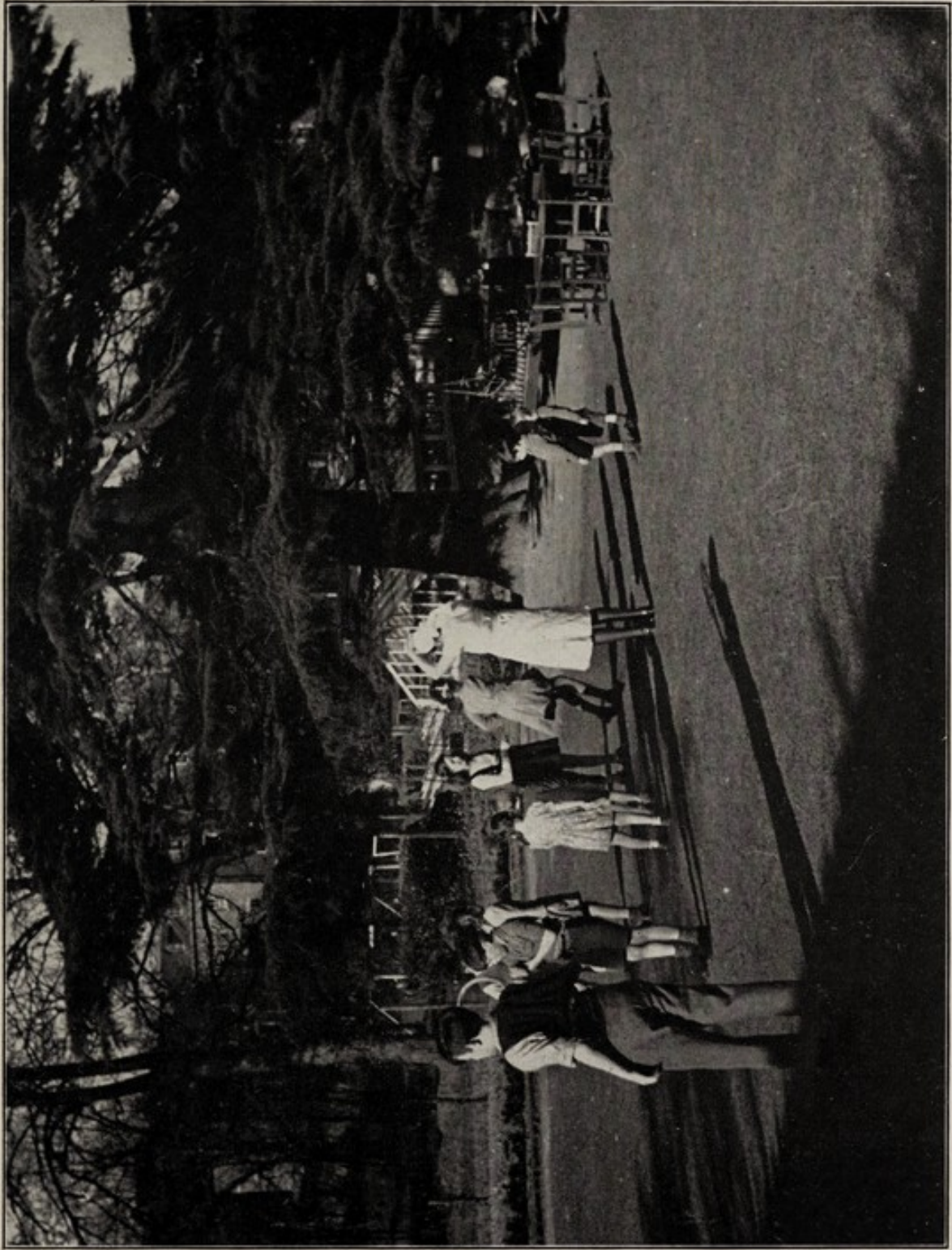

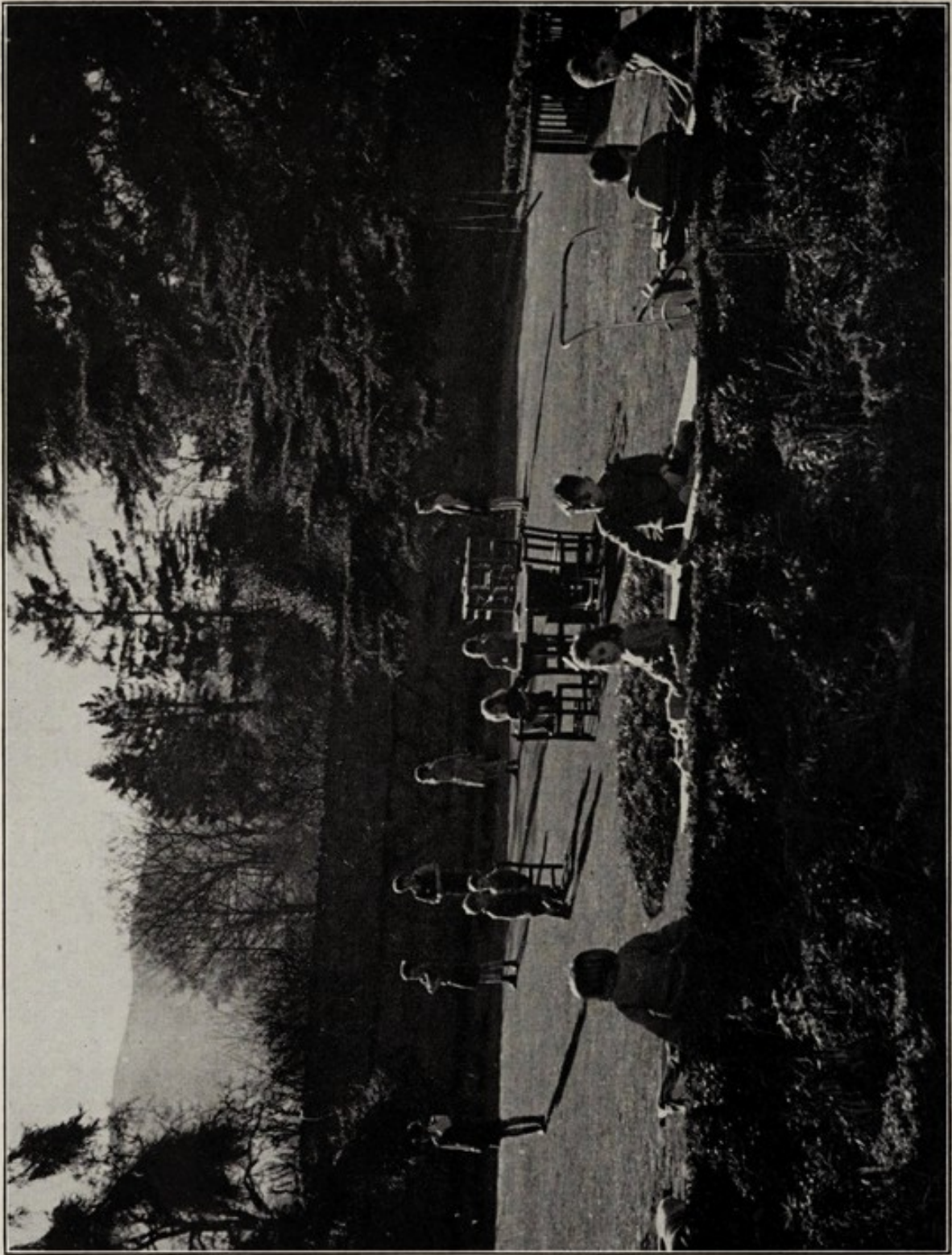

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT
FOR THE YEAR 1947

THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT has pleasure in presenting to the GOVERNORS and SUBSCRIBERS the EIGHTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT and audited accounts for the year ended 31st December, 1947.

The work of the Hospital throughout the year has been developed to maintain the high standard of the treatment of sick children, which has always been the established policy of the Board. The statistics set out below indicate the number of patients treated in all departments of the Hospital.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT

The Board announces with gratification that the Minister of Health has designated the Children's Hospital, including St. Cuthbert's Auxiliary Hospital, Malvern, as part of the Teaching Hospital of Birmingham. The Board is confident that in this way the Hospital's high reputation for the care of sick children in the Midlands, the teaching of undergraduates, the advancement of the paediatric services in the Birmingham region and the training of paediatricians, can best be assured for the future.

As yet, little is known of the future organisation of the Teaching Hospital. Preliminary discussions have, however, been held by the hospitals designated as the Teaching Hospital, with particular reference to the constitution of the Board of Governors and the representation on it of the existing Boards of Management.

Many decisions, directly and indirectly connected with the forthcoming National Health Service, have been taken to accord with the Board's desire that the Hospital should be functioning with the maximum efficiency when nationalisation takes place.

INSTITUTE OF CHILD HEALTH

The Board has pleasure in including again in the Annual Report (pages 13 to 17) the review of the Council of the Institute of Child Health. Benefits derived from close co-operation between the Hospital, the University and the City Corporation through the Institute are many and varied.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The Minister of Health has given his approval, in principle, to the scheme for the nurses' home extension and the extension of the pathological and bio-chemical departments. Detailed plans have been prepared and submitted to the Minister. The Board regrets that owing to the shortage of building materials, the Minister has postponed indefinitely consideration of the plans for new operating theatres, for alterations to the Leonard Parsons block, and new buildings for teaching and for the special departments.

Permission has not yet been obtained for the open-air ward at St. Cuthbert's Auxiliary Hospital, Malvern, but it is hoped that this necessary extension will be begun during 1948.

Following a special visit to St. Cuthbert's and School House, the Preliminary Training School, the Board approved an extensive scheme of redecoration and re-equipment for both buildings.

The modernisation of the Hospital kitchen and the replanning of the dining rooms have been completed. Two new lifts are being installed as an important part of an improved meal service. The first deliveries of the new laundry machinery have been made, and work on the electrical services is in progress. The Board has also approved the principle of excavation beneath the extension to the laundry, so as to provide additional accommodation for stores. Plans have been put forward for adding a storey to the department of physiotherapy for the occupational therapy department.

It is hoped that the Ministry of Education will agree to the establishment of a special school at St. Cúthbert's, Malvern. The Regional Medical Officer of the Ministry has inspected the premises, and indicated that the facilities were adequate.

These additions and improvements are considered by the Board of Management to be essential to the Hospital's development and expansion.

FINANCE

The excess of expenditure over income for the year to the extent of £63,054 4s. 2d. is the inevitable consequence, on the one hand, of higher costs of all supplies and of nationally agreed increases in salaries and wages, and on the other hand, of a decline in income from investments and donations and an accumulation of arrears of payments due for the treatment of patients under the Education Act, 1944. Expenditure has

been authorised only in so far as this was essential for the maintenance of a high standard of service.

The National Health Service Act provides that any gift made to a particular hospital after the "appointed day" may be retained by that hospital for use in accordance with the wishes of the donor. The Board, therefore, earnestly hopes that all subscribers and donors will continue their generous support, and assist to supply the many needs of patients and staff that will not be provided for in normal maintenance grants from the Government.

On the 7th September, Mr. E. H. Lynall, Chairman of the House Committee, broadcast an appeal for the Hospital in the Midland Regional Service. The broadcast raised a substantial sum of money (details of which appear elsewhere in the Annual Report), and the Board expresses its grateful thanks to Mr. Lynall and to all who contributed to the appeal.

The Board offers congratulations to Dr. A. V. Neale on his appointment as Professor of Child Health, University of Bristol, and to Brigadier R. A. Broderick, Honorary Consulting Dental Surgeon, on his appointment as Honorary Dental Surgeon to The King.

OBITUARY

The Board records with profound regret the deaths of Emeritus Professor B. A. Lloyd, Ch.M., F.R.C.S., Honorary Consulting Surgeon, and of Mr. C. H. Howkins, C.B.E., D.S.O., M.R.C.S., L.D.S., R.C.S., Honorary Consulting Dental Surgeon. Professor Lloyd and Mr. Howkins served the Hospital with great distinction and loyalty for many years as members of the Honorary Medical Staff, and their work will be long remembered.

REPORT OF THE BRICK LEAGUE FOR THE YEAR 1947

THE BRICK LEAGUE HAS PLEASURE IN PRESENTING ITS 35TH ANNUAL REPORT

Mrs. Winwood has joined the Committee, and we have been glad to welcome Mrs. Winterton, who has become President of our Solihull Branch and has formed a new Committee.

There are now thirteen branches in Birmingham and districts around, each branch having its own president and committee. It is chiefly due to their continued enthusiasm and help that we can report another successful year.

The attendance at the Hospital on "Open Day" in April was a record—over 200 members and friends being present. A cheque for £3,000 was presented by Susan and Judith Parsons to Mr. H. F. Dowler, Chairman of the Board. This represented the Brick League's savings for several years for the building of an open-air ward at Malvern. It is a matter of sincere regret that so far the necessary permits for building have not been received.

We have again supported convalescent cots in four Hospitals—at Rhyl, West Kirby, Broadstairs and Charnwood Forest. The Almoner's Report shows that eighteen children occupied these cots for periods varying from seven weeks to five months.

Realising the importance of the occupational therapy which Miss Dallas and her assistants are carrying on at the Hospital and at Malvern, we have made generous grants towards equipping the two departments with furniture, looms, tools, cupboards, benches, materials, etc., and our Christmas gift to the Hospital was a portable radio set for Miss Dallas's use.

We have also provided 250 stainless steel mugs for use in the Hospital and 50 for St. Cuthbert's, Malvern. We have made our usual contribution to the Hospital of £100 which Matron will spend on wool for knitting. Smaller items include a grant to St. Cuthbert's for provision of magazines, also one to Matron for gifts of books to children who spend birthdays in the Hospital.

All these gifts have been made possible by work done in our branches, which have contributed money raised by bring and buy and jumble sales, whist drives, dances, savings, etc. We again commend individual efforts made by children, as mentioned in several Branch reports.

Ninety-seven bricks were sold during the year.

Some members in most branches have knitted "pull-overs" for older children and coatees for babies, and for this help Matron is very grateful.

The Brick League register, kept at the Hospital, contains a long list of children who have brought or sent personal gifts of toys, books, magazines, puzzles, balloons and sometimes eggs. In December a number of children brought wrapped parcels, labelled ready to give to a boy or girl patient for Christmas.

It is difficult to estimate all that the Brick League owes to Lady Parsons who, at the end of the year, intimated her wish to resign from the Presidency of Branch 10 at Four Oaks and Sutton. She has since agreed that her resignation shall not take effect before September, 1948. Lady Parsons was a Founder Member of the Brick League and has been a branch president for 34 years. Her love for the Hospital, her magnetic personality, and her unfailing enthusiasm, have always kept her Branch very active, and we thank her most sincerely. She has not only raised money for the work of the Brick League, but she has interested and trained a generation of children who, we hope, will carry on the good work.

It is interesting to note that since its inception by Mrs. Player in 1913 the Brick League has contributed—including cot endowments—no less than £22,874 to the Children's Hospital.

INSTITUTE OF CHILD HEALTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNCIL FOR 1947

The year under review has witnessed a consolidation and extension of the activities of the Institute.

(a) Undergraduate Teaching

The principal reason leading to the formation of the Birmingham Institute of Child Health was a desire to improve general medical standards in relation to the care of the child in health and disease with equal emphasis on both the preventive and remedial aspects. It has been estimated that up to fifty per cent of the practice of the average family doctor is concerned with children and therefore the necessity for general practitioners to be well versed in the care of children, both in sickness and in health, is very important. The future of the nation depends on raising the standards of health of the child and this can be best achieved by

increasing undergraduate instruction. Medical students must receive a full and balanced training in order that their knowledge with regard to the nutrition and development of normal healthy children is on as high a level as their care and management of sick children.

The arrangements for such training in Birmingham University have been planned to make it as comprehensive as possible. During their three months attendance at the Children's Hospital, students spend over a quarter of their time in the study of the healthy child, including instruction in methods of preventive medicine as applied to child health in the routine work of the Local Authority. They are given an opportunity to see for themselves from an administrative as well as a clinical angle how a modern health department discharges its duties and responsibilities as they relate to child welfare. Visits are paid to antenatal and child welfare clinics, to the premature baby unit at Sorrento, to day and residential nurseries, to the various activities of the School Medical Service and to the Tuberculosis Department. Health education and the scope and character of health visiting, together with the importance of a study of the home environment and economic standards, also receive emphasis. They obtain an insight into the work of the domiciliary midwifery service, together with the arrangements for the care of the unmarried mother and the deprived child. It is considered that training on these lines will enable the general practitioner of the future to accept full responsibility for both the maintenance of health as well as the prevention and treatment of disease. By these means there will be attained a fusion of two health services which in the past have been separated and unco-ordinated.

(b) Co-operation Between Personnel of Local Authority and Children's Hospital

This association between the child when well and the child when ill has been further strengthened by arrangements whereby the Children's Hospital registrars have included in their duties responsibilities for two sessions a week at the Local Authority Clinics, and six medical officers from the Birmingham Local Authority attend the practice of the Hospital as clinical assistants on two half-days a week. These arrangements have enabled the Hospital medical officers to have a first-hand practical knowledge and experience of the work of the child welfare services and to emphasise its place, character and importance in the tutorial instruction given to medical students. Furthermore, this liaison with the Local Authority and Hospital medical officers has been mutually advantageous and in practice has worked smoothly and efficiently.

(c) Postgraduate Training

The importance of providing facilities for postgraduate training has been appreciated by the Institute since its formation. Broadly speaking, there are three types of postgraduate training: (1) for those

doctors who intend to specialise in paediatrics; (2) for general practitioners wishing to have their knowledge refreshed and brought up to date, and (3) for medical officers who wish to specialise in administration with special relation to child health and who, at the same time, desire to extend their clinical knowledge. It is necessary to provide different arrangements for these three groups. In general it has been realised that the opportunities and facilities for such postgraduate training in this country are still very limited in both scope and character, and the experience of the last twelve months has demonstrated the necessity for its extension. All the world over the importance of child health and welfare is being increasingly appreciated, and Institutes of child health must provide as complete and comprehensive a training as possible. This has been brought to notice by the number of applications received from postgraduate students, not only in this country, but also in the British Empire and many foreign countries in Europe and elsewhere. Many of these students are not only desirous of obtaining clinical instruction but also of receiving training in administration to enable them to organise child welfare departments in their own countries. During 1947 the Institute has been able to accommodate postgraduate students from India, Palestine, Italy, Poland, Malta and South Africa. In addition, foreign visitors who wished to be conversant with the functions, activities and administrative arrangements of the Birmingham Institute of Child Health have included representatives from Egypt, Italy, Spain, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Sweden, West Africa, Australia, Denmark, Malay States, Holland and Germany.

Unfortunately, it has not been possible to provide accommodation for all applicants, as it is felt that the acceptance of more than a limited number would militate against the efficiency of the training both on the clinical and administrative side. Therefore preference has had to be given to those recommended by the British Council, the Indian Government, the British Postgraduate Medical Federation, the Ministry of Health, the Director of Graduate Studies, Birmingham University, and allied organisations.

In addition to the above, many requests have been received for appointments as part-time clinical assistants for a period of twelve months to enable such applicants to qualify to sit for the diploma in child health of the Royal College of Physicians of London and the Royal College of Surgeons of England. It is regretted that under present circumstances most of these requests have had to be deferred for the time being owing to lack of facilities. With the kind co-operation of Dr. Newsholme, Medical Officer of Health, and Mr. Kelman, Medical Superintendent, Selly Oak Hospital, it is hoped that it will be possible to give a few such applicants the training and experience they desire in the children's department of Selly Oak Hospital. At the request of Professor Wynn, Director of Graduate Studies, registrar and residents appointments have been granted to ten ex-Service medical officers who wished to study and improve their knowledge of paediatrics and child health.

(d) **Paediatric Research**

During the year under review the staff of the Institute have continued to devote as much time as possible to research and investigation into a number of the problems of child health. The subjects dealt with are too numerous and varied to detail, but the following examples will give some idea of the scope and range of this work :

- (1) The nutrition of premature infants. This work is sponsored in part by the Medical Research Council and is being carried out at the premature baby unit at Sorrento.
- (2) Protein digests in premature, wasted and marasmic infants.
- (3) Infections in infancy—nature, reactions and treatment.
- (4) Protein and fat metabolism in coeliac disease.
- (5) Aplastic anaemia, kernicterus and other haematological problems.
- (6) Causes of still-birth and neo-natal death.

In this connection, all such cases occurring in the Local Authority maternity homes are submitted to an autopsy in the Pathological Department of the Children's Hospital. The number of such examinations during 1947 was 176.

The Maternity and Child Welfare Department of the City are also collaborating with the Social Medicine Department of the University in some social survey studies.

Tuberculosis and Streptomycin

At the request of the Ministry of Health, 8 beds in the Children's Hospital have been set aside for a study of the place and value of streptomycin in the treatment of tuberculous meningitis and miliary tuberculosis. Arrangements have been made for the necessary detailed investigation of such cases, and the work is proceeding. To assess the value of any treatment of tuberculosis must take some considerable time.

Cerebral Palsy

In June, 1947, the "Midland Spastic Association" was formed for promoting the welfare of children suffering from cerebral palsy, and Professor J. M. Smellie and Dr. J. M. Mackintosh were elected members of the Council. The aims and objects of this Association include the ascertainment and, as far as is practicable, the registration of all children suffering from spastic palsy and allied conditions. It has been estimated that among Birmingham's 144,000 school-age children there are probably about 170 spastics, and in addition there must be some 110 under 5 years of age.

Under arrangements made through the Institute of Child Health, a clinic has been opened at the Children's Hospital to undertake a

diagnostic survey of as many of these children as possible. At this clinic the children are given a detailed clinical examination and an educational psychologist assesses their intelligence. It is hoped that investigation on these lines will shed light on the causes of these conditions and the best forms of treatment. A day school for educable spastic children is to be opened at Carlson House, Victoria Road, Harborne, staffed by trained physiotherapists, speech therapists, occupational therapists and teachers working in close collaboration with medical and surgical specialists.

Abnormalities in the Growth of the Jaws in Children

Professor H. F. Humphreys, Director of Dental Studies, has, with the co-operation of the Council of the Institute and the Maternity and Child Welfare Sub-committee of Birmingham City Health Committee, initiated an investigation into some of the above named abnormalities. In the first place this will be carried out at the toddlers' clinics. Professor Humphreys has been granted financial aid from the Medical Research Council for this investigation.

Bronchiectasis

Mr. W. G. Pollack has generously donated a fund to be devoted to research into the prevention and cure of chest ailments in children. Accordingly, plans are under consideration for research into bronchiectasis, in the first place on clinical grounds.

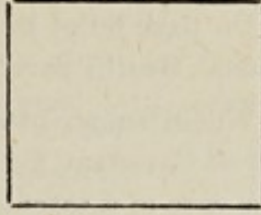

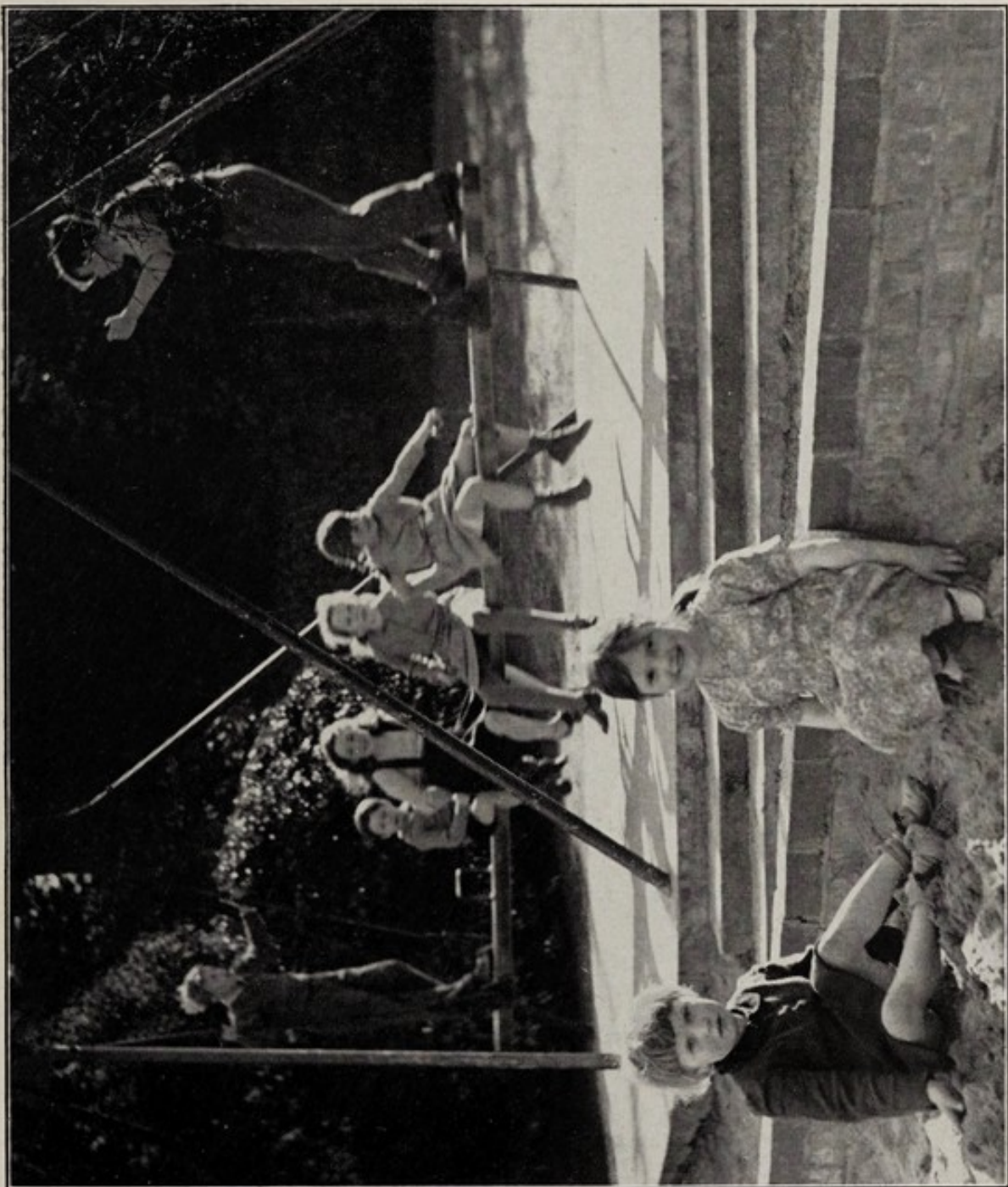
