*Children are treated in the case of Boys up to the age of Twelve, and of Girls up to the age of Sixteen.*

No orders or recommendations are necessary, the suffering of the child is the title to admission. Patients are admitted from any distance, on the approval of the Receiving Medical Officer, Children's Hospital, Gloucester.

The limited means of this Hospital make a contribution towards cost of maintenance a necessity where Parents are in a position to afford it.

Parents who are full contributors to the Gloucester Royal Infirmary should send with the Child at its admission the signed certificate. This will cover the maintenance cost.

When there is not room in the Hospital for all the Patients recommended at one time, the most urgent cases are selected and admitted; the other cases are made Out-Patients or postponed till there is a vacancy. No child suffering from any infectious complaint can be received.

# REPORT

## of the Committee of Management for 1942.

---

### **Col. J. H. Collett.**

In making report of the work of the Children's Hospital for 1942 our first thought is the great loss suffered by the death of Col. J. H. Collett, C.M.G., D.L., J.P., which occurred with tragic suddenness on November 8th. Col. Collett had many associations during his active and useful life, but it may be said that none made a stronger appeal to him than the Children's Hospital. To it he gave his best, was a member of the Council for a great many years, and after the death of Major Gambier Parry he took over from him that detailed interest in those day-by-day incidents connected with the Hospital life. Though these engaged an enormous amount of his time, gave trouble and responsibility, they were always met with unfailing patience, sympathy and wisdom. He served as Honorary Treasurer for many years and lately, on the death of Mr. Shelley, was Chairman of the Management Committee.

Always endeavouring to keep the Hospital up to date and efficient he had anxious times when our finances were low, and it is largely due to his foresight and judgement that our financial position is so much better than it used to be.

Such men as Col. Collett are sadly missed and many there are who will recall with pleasure a happy association with him, but none more than his Colleagues and Staff of the Children's Hospital.

### **Canon F. Sewell.**

Before the Report was ready for the Press we learned with deep regret of the death of Canon Sewell. This is not the place to enlarge on his great service to the Diocese and the community generally, particularly in the cause of education in which he was a great leader and bonnie fighter.

In spite of his many engagements he gave much of his time and invaluable advice to our Hospital and, since the death of Major Gambier Parry had been Chairman of the



Council. A man of great force and character, strong sense of humour and iron will, he always knew what he wanted and how best to achieve it; his judgement was excellent and knew no fear, so that in more than one crisis his inflexibility and courage brought us to a right solution of our difficulties. He never missed a Council Meeting despite his great age, and presided with his old ability at our meeting last November. His death, so soon after that of Col. Collett with whom he worked in amity and concord for many years, makes an even wider gap that will be difficult to fill.

#### **Miss Vera N. Miles.**

It is proper in this Report to make mention of the invaluable aid that we have received from Miss Vera N. Miles who has so kindly taken up the duties of Honorary Secretary, thereby relieving some of the work of Sister Superior and her Staff. Her capabilities and cheerful nature are very welcome in sometimes sad surroundings.

#### **General.**

The year 1942 has been one of steady work and development in the Hospital. All but one of the long-standing cases have been discharged, and the increased number of beds have been well occupied throughout the year. Children between the ages of 1 and 4 years have been admitted to the New Ward which has been kept well filled.

#### **Finance.**

Owing to the increase *per capita* Maintenance Grant from the Royal Infirmary, and to the generosity of our many supporters, including all who helped with and contributed to the Flag-Day, our financial position at the end of the year was comparatively satisfactory, and we record to all our grateful thanks.

#### **Post War.**

We cannot however, rest. It is necessary to look ahead to post-war demands, and in order to meet the increased financial burden that will come upon us, we need ever-increasing support; we know that you will not fail us in this post-war consideration. We are planning to provide new and extensive accommodation for the benefit of the children of Gloucestershire, as soon as practicable after the cessation of hostilities.



### **Kit Tanner Memorial.**

The sum of approximately £250 has been given in memory of the Rev. Kit Tanner and has been invested until after the war when a Nurses' Lecture and Study Room is to be erected in his memory.

### **Preliminary Training of Nurses.**

It has been decided to apply for approval as a recognised training school for nurses as soon as developments can be carried out; in the meantime a one or two years' course is given and the probationers pass on to recognised schools for their full training.

### **Emergency Medical Service.**

A number of children have been admitted under this scheme.

### **Christmas.**

We had the pleasure once again of welcoming the Mayor and Mayoress and the Sheriff and his Wife, with some of the Councillors; we greatly appreciate the interest thus shown year by year.

In spite of war restrictions, the children had many presents both on Christmas Day and at the distribution of the Christmas Tree on the 28th. This was made possible by the efforts of many of the schools and other friends who sent such wonderful home-made toys.

### **Medical Staff.**

Once again we record our deep debt of gratitude to the Medical Staff. In spite of the heavy burden thrown upon them by war conditions, they continue to give unstinted service to the work of the Hospital and to take a keen interest in all that concerns its development and improvement.

### **Thanks.**

We cannot close this report without expressing our thanks to all who gave voluntary help, and especially to the faithfulness of the Needlework Party; to the Needlework Guild of the Royal Infirmary League and the Catholic Needlework Guild who have again kindly helped us with gifts of clothing and household goods. For the gifts received through the Red Cross; to the Scouts of St. Mary de Lode;



to the Girls of Denmark Road High School who gave valuable service during their holidays. And to all who have helped by means of the Harvest Festivals. And to the many others, too numerous to name, who by their generous gifts of kind and money have eased our way in this difficult war period.

One special mention must be made—Miss Rowles has given valuable and steady voluntary help in the wards for the past 18 months, she leaves us to be married, and to her we extend both our thanks and our sincere good wishes for her future happiness.

Lastly we again thank the Honorary Auditors, Messrs. Duart-Smith, Baker and Price for their continued help.

Owing to war restrictions, this report is necessarily curtailed.
