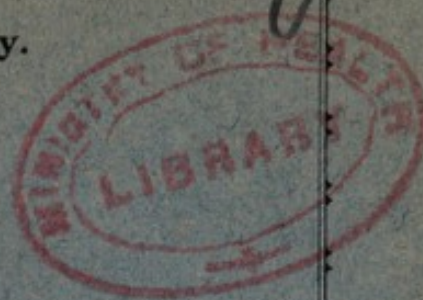

*Children are treated in the case of Boys up to the age of
Twelve, and of Girls up to the age of Sixteen.*

No orders or recommendations are necessary, the suffering of the child is the title to admission. Patients are admitted from any distance, on the approval of the Receiving Medical Officer, Children's Hospital, Gloucester.

The limited means of this Hospital make a contribution towards cost of maintenance a necessity where Parents are in a position to afford it.

Parents who are full contributors to the Gloucester Royal Infirmary should send with the Child at its admission the signed certificate. This will cover the maintenance cost.

When there is not room in the Hospital for all the Patients recommended at one time, the most urgent cases are selected and admitted; the other cases are made Out-Patients or postponed till there is a vacancy. No child suffering from any infectious complaint can be received.

REPORT

of the Committee of Management for 1943.

Personnel of the Committee.

The Rev. Canon Sears. It is desired to place on record the valuable service which Canon Sears has rendered to the Hospital during the many years he has served as a Member of the Management Committee; he was most regular in his attendance, far-seeing in his judgment and quick to recognise the importance of seemingly small details; his guidance is greatly missed. We wish him every happiness in his retirement.

We welcome to the Committee Mrs. J. H. Collett, Mrs. Frank Gardner and Mr. R. V. Rowles.

General.

The figures show a definite increase in the work of the Hospital, and especially during the latter part of the year, the beds have been filled almost to capacity.

The Committee have given special consideration to the kitchen equipment and the linen stock. With the help of Mrs. Collett and Mrs. Gardner, the Sister Superior made detailed list of requirements for these departments. The kitchen range which was beyond repair has been replaced by an Esse Cooker and essential utensils have been supplied. The necessary permit was obtained to put the linen and blanket store in good order, but this raised a question of a place in which to keep the stock and it was decided to build a linen store-room; this has now been done.

Refrigerator. A Hospital size refrigerator for general use was urgently needed and through the kindness of Special Superintendent John Newth and Members of G I Division of the Gloucestershire Special Constabulary, this was given and installed, free of cost to the Hospital; we record our grateful thanks.

Finance.

Owing to increase in the cost of living and of all necessities, it has been necessary to raise the Maintenance charge for the in-patients. The position was discussed with the Board of the Royal Infirmary and we record our thanks for the increase of 10/6 per capita which they agreed to pay from April 1st.

Flag Day. The Flag Day produced £430 5s. 4d. and we are grateful to all who gave so cheerfully, and to all who helped in many different ways to make the day such a success, particularly to those who sold flags, in spite of rain. Our thanks are also due to Mr. Sutcliffe who acted as Hon. Treasurer, and to Mr. Richards and Mr. Mundy who worked so untiringly for its organization.

Legacies and Memorial Gifts. The latter have been considerable, and the money so marked is used to purchase specific requirements for the Hospital or Nurses' rooms. In order that a complete list may be readily available to the public, it was decided to enter all names in a book which is kept in the main hall. A most suitable and handsome book for this purpose was provided by Mrs. Chappell in memory of her brother Mr. H. W. Williams.

Entertainments. Substantial help has been given during the year by special events organized on behalf of the Hospital. Some of the proceeds have reached us through the channel of War Charities, and to these and to all who have interested themselves on our behalf we express our appreciation.

Gifts in kind. The low cost of provisions is due to the fact that, in addition to home grown garden produce, many gifts in kind have been received throughout the year; this very material help cannot be recorded in detail in the Report but every gift, small or large, is of real value.

Rushcliffe Report.

The Committee has adopted the scales of salaries and other recommendations for the Nursing Staff, as set out in this Report.

St. Lucy's League of Nurses.

In order to keep in touch with former nurses, a League has been started and matters of interest connected with it will be published on a separate leaflet.

Colonel J. H. Collett Memorial Fund.

The sum of over £1,000 has been raised and the money will be invested until after the war, when it is hoped that in the new Hospital building a ward will memorise his name. A letter of thanks to the donors was published in the Citizen on April 11th.

Mr. Spencer Shelley Memorial.

A considerable sum of money in memory of Mr. Spencer Shelley, for many years Chairman of the Committee of Management, has been given by Major Ackers and friends. It has been expended upon a Refrigerator for the Toddlers' Ward so as to benefit the children whose interest he had so much at heart.

Christmas.

The gifts of home-made toys were most welcome and greatly appreciated. The Mayor and Mayoress with the Sheriff and his Wife, accompanied by Councillors, again showed their interest in the work by visiting the Hospital on Christmas Day. The children had a happy party on December 28th when Father Christmas gave presents from well-laden trees.

Medical Staff.

Once again it is our pleasure to express on our own behalf and that of the Parents of the children our sincere appreciation of the untiring service and interest of the Medical Staff.

Thanks.

Voluntary help is still given generously in spite of increasing difficulties owing to war conditions. In particular we would thank the Needlework Party who came to the Hospital every Monday; The Needlework Guild of the Royal Infirmary; The Red Cross and the American Junior Red Cross; many Schools and Parishes; and many other friends; and finally the Hon. Auditors, Messrs. Duart-Smith, Baker and Price.

Mrs. Ackers.

We cannot issue this Report without expressing our deep sympathy to Major Ackers in the sudden death of his wife. Mrs. Ackers, though not directly connected with this Hospital, was a real friend. She and Major Ackers have been most generous in their frequent gifts of luxuries from their garden and greenhouses. These gifts she often brought herself and her interest in particularly ill children was personal. She would enquire after such a child and sometimes a special fruit which had been appreciated, was sent again in a few days with an enquiry.
