## Report for the Year 1938

The year was an eventful one for the Hospital in many ways.

Miss Holman and Miss Willis left to take up other work; the Committee and Staff very much regret losing them, but were most fortunate in getting Miss B. J. D. Reid as Matron. Miss Reid has had great experience in similar hospitals, her last post being as Matron for over 11 years at the Bath and Wessex Children's Orthopaedic Hospital.

In June a Garden Fête was held at the Hospital. This was the first event of its kind in the history of the Hospital and was a great success. The thanks of the Committee are extended to all who took stalls, to Mrs. Foskett and the V.A.D. who were responsible for the tea, and many others who helped in various ways. The nett result was £116 6s. 8d.

In spite of the large sum received from the Fête and £177 10s. 2d. from the Sevenoaks Players' Pantomime "Dick Whittington," for which the Committee are most grateful, the Expenditure during the year exceeded the Income by £194 11s. 7d. There was very heavy but non-recurring expenditure. A new up-to-date Aga cooker (costing £105 beyond the allowance on the old one) was installed. This has four times the oven capacity and so saves using gas for cooking and in the long run will be more economical.

"Hope Lodge," a house belonging to the Hospital and standing in its grounds, originally owned by Miss Jackson and Miss Rose, has been let for 21 years but became vacant in September, when it was felt that a Nurses' Home should be provided. The House has been thoroughly overhauled and structural alterations have been made on the bottom floor to convert it into a self-contained flat for the gardener. It is hoped to let the gardener's present cottage, after putting in a bathroom and making other improvements. The rent



for this will, however, be less than that received in the past for "Hope Lodge" and as the Hospital will have to bear all the cost of maintenance and repairs to the latter, as well as the extra salaries for increased staff which has necessitated taking over the house, it will be seen that a considerably larger income will be needed in future.

On the Receipts side two Legacies were received, £5 from the late Miss Lucy Quinnell and £50 from the Executors of the late Mr. James Henry Stephens.

Payments for patients were down by over £166, this being due to the fact that the Hospital was not quite full during the latter part of the year. There is a definite decrease in the number of children suffering from Surgical Tuberculosis. For this reason the Committee, after consultation with the Kent County Tuberculosis and Orthopædic Officer, propose to amend Rule 1 to include ordinary Orthopædic cases, as well as Tuberculous glands. It is anticipated that there will thus be no difficulty in keeping all the cots occupied.

The daily average was 41, as against 44 in 1937. The lower average increases the Statistical Cost, which was £1 16s. 9d. compared with £1 10s. 10½d. The **Total** cost (see page 23), was £2 0s. 4d. compared with £1 13s. 4½d. in 1937. These figures do not include the cost of Education which was £196 10s. 0d.; including this the weekly cost worked out at £2 3s. 2d. Besides this there was Capital Expenditure to the amount of £241 18s. 7d.

The patients during the year came, 44 from Kent, 8 from Surrey, 1 from London and 1 from Essex. Fifteen were discharged as convalescent and one died of tubercular meningitis.

The school year was a very successful one; the children were kept busy with handicrafts, working for the Fête in June and the annual Sale of Work in December. Some of the work achieved quite a high standard and the Sale of



Work realised £30 10s. 11d. The visitors were delighted with the small children's rendering of "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" and many expressed a wish for it to be repeated, that they might bring their friends. Only two of the performers were over 8 years old and "Snow White" was 8 that day. Eleven of these children, all under 8 at the time, entered for a Drawing Examination at the Royal Drawing Society in the summer ; all passed and eight gained honours.

The Committee much regret the resignation of Mr. Walter Perks owing to failing health ; he was a very active member of the Committee for nearly 30 years and the Hospital owes him a great debt of gratitude for his ready help and service at all times. Mrs. Halfhead and Sir David Chadwick, K.C.M.G., were welcomed as new members of the Committee.

Mr. Devitt was reluctantly obliged, on doctor's orders, to relinquish the position of Acting Chairman in July. Major Pym kindly consented to carry on as Chairman for the present, although the work of the County Council had increased since January, 1938. Mr. Devitt said he would continue to assist Major Pym as Vice-Chairman as far as he was able.

The Reverend F. W. Argyle, Rector of Sevenoaks, kindly consented to take the place of the Reverend E. L. Langston as Honorary Chaplain. The parish workers of St. Nicholas, members of Toc H and others were very good in coming to take services on Sundays and to see the children on other days. The Committee thank all these and all who helped with Scouts, Guides, Cubs and Brownies ; also Mr. King and assistants for cutting the children's hair ; Messrs. Stevenson for winding the clocks ; members of the V.A.D. and others who helped in the Wards ; Toc H for collecting and delivering over 1,000 eggs ; Miss Kelly and Miss Lewis and their pupils at the Open-Air School, Kippington, for



many gifts and "Father Christmas," and all who gave clothes, food, toys and books, as well as those who by Entertainments, etc., helped the Hospital Funds, as shown below :

Mrs. Latter very kindly gave a specially constructed blackboard for use in Rose Ward and the Sevenoaks Brownies presented a cupboard for the use of the Hospital Guides and Brownies in memory of Miss G. E. Ealey, a former teacher at the Hospital and Brown Owl in the Sevenoaks District, who died in 1937.

The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester and many others sent gifts for Christmas and the children had a festive time. The Misses Green of Eltham gave Matron a bright new shilling for each child, to be used at her discretion. She suggested starting a savings account for each and this was warmly approved by the Misses Green, the children and their parents. So every child now has a savings account, which can be added to week by week, or as the children have money to spare.

The Hospital lost by death several subscribers, among them Col. F. T. Fisher, for many years a member of the Committee and Honorary Treasurer, Mrs. Hovenden and Mr. James Attfield. In memory of Mrs. Hovenden donations instead of flowers for her funeral, amounting to £17 14s. 0d. were given to the Hospital. It was thought that it would be her wish that the money should be devoted to some special needs and two oak trolleys for the use of the Teachers, a very nice globe, and a blackboard for Hugh Ward similar



to the one given by Mrs. Latter, were bought, all these things being of direct benefit to the children.

Mr. Attfield left some money to charities at the discretion of his son, Mr. A. J. Attfield, who kindly allocated £250 to this Hospital as an endowment. The Committee are most grateful. The money was not received until 1939, so is not shown in the accounts for 1938.

The Pound Days, organised once more by Mrs. Whitcombe, aided by an energetic band of helpers, resulted in £33 6s. 6d. in money and 3,707 lbs. in kind, a record amount.

The thanks of the Committee are tendered to the Consulting Surgeons, the Honorary Dental and Ophthalmic Surgeons, the Medical and Surgical Officers, the Anæsthetists, Mrs. Bishop, Masseuse, the Matron and all the Nursing Staff for their loyal and willing co-operation ; also to Messrs. S. Cronk and Co. who continue Mr. Sidney Cronk's good work of auditing the Accounts free of charge. They wish particularly to thank Mr. Percy F. Potter, Honorary Architect and Surveyor, for his services in making plans for the alterations at "Hope Lodge" and the Cottage and superintending all the builder's work at the Hospital and "Hope Lodge" during the year. Mr. Potter has prepared a plan for a new Dining Room at the Hospital on the same level as the Kitchen. This would be a great boon and save much work in carrying meals to and from the lift. It would also automatically give more balcony space for the patients. There has never been a separate dining room at the Hospital, meals having been served in the Nurses' sitting room and the Board room. It is hoped to carry out these improvements as soon as funds permit. It is estimated that the cost might be £500.

**RULES**  
**OF**  
**The Children's Hospital for the**  
**Treatment of Hip Disease**  
**SEVENOAKS**

---

**NAME AND OBJECTS**

1. The Hospital shall be known as the Children's Hospital for the Treatment of Hip Disease, and the main objects of the Hospital are the cure and relief of children suffering from such disease. Children suffering from any Tuberculous disease (other than pulmonary) may also be admitted at the discretion of the authorities of the Hospital.

**MEETINGS**

2. A meeting of the Subscribers and Donors to the Hospital shall be held once every year in either the month of March or of April. The Chairman of the Committee of Management shall preside at all meetings of Subscribers and Donors ; and if through accident or otherwise he be not present, the meeting shall elect a chairman. The business of an Annual Meeting shall be to consider and pass the Report and Accounts for the preceding year ; fill up, if thought fit, any vacancies among the officers ; elect members of the Committee of Management and a Treasurer or Treasurers ; transact any business submitted by the Committee



of Management ; and also any other business, if the Chairman of the Meeting shall decide it is proper for disposal at the meeting and not inconsistent with these Rules. The Committee of Management may at any time call a Special Meeting of Subscribers and Donors, to transact any business ; and shall call such a meeting if requested in writing by not less than seven Subscribers or Donors of not less than £1 each during the preceding year. Not less than seven days' notice of a meeting shall be given. The following persons shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Annual and Special Meetings, viz., the President, Patrons, Patronesses, Life Governors, Trustees, Treasurers, Honorary Officers, Members of the Committee of Management, Subscribers during the preceding year and Donors of not less than £1 during the preceding year.

### COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

3. There shall be a Committee of Management, which shall consist (in addition to *ex-officio* members) of not less than five nor more than twenty members. At the Annual Meeting each year the Committee of Management shall retire (but shall continue in office until the end of the meeting) and persons to act as Members of the Committee of Management for the ensuing year shall be elected. Retiring members shall be eligible for re-election without notice. Not less than five days' notice in writing by subscribers of not less than £1 during the three preceding years, shall be given the Secretary of the intention to propose any person (not being a retiring member) as a Member of the Committee of Management. The Committee of Management may fill up any vacancies in their number, provided that the total number of members of the Committee, in addition to *ex-officio* members, shall not at any time exceed twenty. The Committee of Management



may from time to time delegate all or any of its powers to a sub-committee, or sub-committees, consisting wholly or partly of members of the Committee, and may define the terms of such delegation and revoke or alter the same. The Committee of Management shall have the superintendence, control and management of the Hospital and its property and affairs. No one but a Donor of £10 or Annual Subscriber of £1 shall be eligible for election as a member of the Committee of Management.

### TRUSTEES

4. There shall be not less than three Trustees. The existing Trustees shall continue in office. Should any vacancies occur in the office of a Trustee, the person nominated by the Committee of Management shall be appointed to fill the vacancy ; but it shall not be obligatory to fill any vacancy so long as there are three Trustees. The Trustees shall be *ex-officio* members of the Committee of Management. All real and leasehold properties, and all investments belonging to the Hospital shall be vested in the Trustees who shall have or arrange for the custody of the documents relating thereto. Such documents shall, when possible, be kept by the Bankers of the Hospital. The Trustees shall deal with all properties and investments of the Hospital for the time being invested in them, and the income thereof, as the Committee of Management shall direct. Monies to be invested shall be invested in accordance with Rule 6. The Trustees shall incur no responsibility for acting on resolutions of the Committee of Management.

### TREASURER

5. The Treasurer or Treasurers shall be appointed at each Annual Meeting. A retiring Treasurer shall be eligible for re-election ; but five days' notice in writing by Sub-



scribers of not less than £1 during the three preceding years, shall be given the Secretary of the intention to propose any person (not being a retiring Treasurer) as a Treasurer. The Treasurer or Treasurers shall receive subscriptions, donations and legacies, and shall give, or authorise any person or persons to give receipts for the same. A Treasurer shall, *ex-officio*, be a member of the Committee of Management. Any casual vacancy in the office of Treasurer may be filled up by the Committee of Management.

### INVESTMENTS

6. All monies requiring investment shall be invested in the names of the Trustees, according to the direction of the Committee of Management, in any manner in which, according to the law for the time being in force, trust monies may be invested, or in the purchase of land of any tenure, with or without building, which it may be thought desirable to acquire for the purposes or protection or benefit of the Hospital. Provided nevertheless that any property given to the Hospital may be retained in the same state of investment and that any directions by a Donor as to investment of any money or property given by him to the Hospital may, whenever possible, be carried into effect. It shall not be necessary to change any existing investments.

### BANKERS

7. The Westminster Bank Ltd., or such other Bankers as may from time to time be appointed by the Committee of Management, shall be the Bankers of the Hospital. All Subscriptions and pecuniary donations and legacies for general purposes, and the income of investments and other receipts shall be paid to an account to be kept at the Bank ; and cheques may be drawn on such Bank by any Treasurer, or by any person or persons authorised for that purpose by the Committee of Management.



## LIFE GOVERNORS, ETC.

8. The Committee of Management may from time to time elect as President, Patron, Patronesses, Life Governors, and Honorary Officers of the Hospital, persons who by subscriptions, donations, or otherwise, have promoted or are thought likely to promote the objects or efficiency of the Hospital. A Life Governor who shall give a written notice to the Secretary, shall be entitled to receive notices of meetings of the Committee of Management, and to attend and vote at such meetings.

## CONTRACTS AND LIABILITIES

9. No Trustee, Treasurer, Member of the Committee, or Officer shall be personally liable for or in respect of any contract entered into, or liability incurred by him for or on behalf or on account of the Hospital. The Funds and property of the Hospital only shall be responsible and answerable for such contracts and liabilities and for all claims arising out of the carrying on of the Hospital.

## AUDITOR

10. The Accounts of the Hospital shall be audited every year by an Auditor appointed at each Annual Meeting.

## ALTERATION OF RULES

11. These Rules may be added to or altered at any meeting of Subscribers and Donors, provided notice of the intention to propose the additions or alterations is given by the notice calling the Meeting. No addition or alteration affecting any Trustee or Treasurer shall be made without notice to him, so as to enable him to attend and vote at the meeting.
