REPORT FOR 1944.

1944 was a very difficult year for the Hospital. Owing to renewed enemy activity early in the year, and the strain on the Nursing Staff of constantly moving the children to the Refuge rooms, it was decided in May to reduce the number of patients from 36 to 28 ; then in July, with the frequent attacks by flying bombs, when the children had to remain indoors practically all the time in the sandbagged rooms and passages, and when most of the children in the district were being evacuated, the Committee decided, in agreement with the Ministry of Health, to close the Hospital temporarily. Mr. Moreton was able to take 6 at the Alexandra Hospital, 3 were sent home, and the Ministry of Health transferred the other 19 to the Stanmore Branch of the Royal National Orthopædic Hospital, from where they were shortly afterwards sent to Orthopædic Hospitals in Scotland. The average number of beds occupied during the time the Hospital was open was 32, but over the whole year, for statistical purposes, it was only 18, making a large increase in the weekly cost per patient.

The Hospital closed on July 25th and was still closed at the end of the year, but the Matron and Secretary remained, with a little daily domestic help. The rest of the staff all found other posts.

When a flying bomb fell in South Park several windows were broken in both Wards and other minor damage done.

The evacuation of the patients made the financial position very serious. It was hoped that the income from Subscriptions, Donations and Investments might be sufficient to meet the reduced expenditure, but by the end of the year there was a deficit of over £570. To reduce this a sum of £100 was transferred from the Samaritan Fund, so that the figure shown in the Accounts is £470 10s. 4d.

One large item of expenditure was the lagging of the hot-water pipes, at a cost of £97 13s. 6d. to economise fuel. This was urged by the Ministry of Fuel and Power, and has resulted in a considerable saving in coke.

Some subscribers, to help the Hospital in the emergency while no Maintenance Fees were coming in, increased their subscriptions, and many welcome donations were received.

Friends of the late Mr. F. D. Ibbett, who had expressed a wish that instead of flowers at his funeral money should be given to this Hospital, generously contributed a total of £57 14s. od. £25 of this, given by the Rotary Club of Sevenoaks, was earmarked for new cots, and it is intended to put the whole amount, eventually, to that use. £6 5s. od. was also given in Memory of Mrs. F. Currey, who always took a great interest in the Hospital, being a great lover of children. The Committee regret the loss of these two and several other friends and supporters who died during the year.

The Presbyterian Church continued to hold the Sunday morning Services at the Hospital, and generously gave a total of £22 1s. od. to the funds for the use of the room. The Women's Section of Toc H also continued to use the room for their Monday evening meetings, and gave donations to the funds. The Wardens' Post is still retained in case of need.

Major P. G. Thompson resigned from the Committee, as he expected not to be returning to Sevenoaks, and Miss E. A. Amsden and Miss D. Coleman were elected as members.

The Hospital Lodge became vacant by the death of Miss Byron, who had rented it for four and a half years, and the Committee decided to let the gardener and his family live there again. The bottom Flat at Hope Lodge was let to Miss C. C. Drummond.

The "Blue Bird" Fund again received generous contributions from dances, etc., the opening of the grounds of "Emmetts," Ide Hill, and "Hillside," Sevenoaks, and other donations. A list of these is on page 9.

The Savings Group again beat all its previous records up to the time the Hospital closed.

The Committee extend their most grateful thanks to all who helped the Hospital by giving their services in many ways, as well as those who gave donations in money or kind. They also warmly thank all the Officers and Staff, the Hon. Auditor, Mr. G. Young, and especially the Matron and Staff for the arduous work carried out during the period of intense enemy activity, and Mr. Moreton for his invaluable help and advice during this trying time.
