ANNUAL REPORT

1944.

The Governors beg to submit the 84th Annual Report of the District Infirmary.

The restrictions due to war conditions again render it impossible to give as fully detailed a report as the Governors would desire to place before the subscribers.

Early in the summer, following upon representations by the Government through the Ministry of Health, the Governors closed the wards of the Summers' Wing and Women's Ward No. 2, so as to release nurses for service in large war hospitals. The national situation had made such a step imperative, and though the Board realised that it would involve hardships upon the local community they felt they had no option in the matter. Accordingly, the daily average number of beds occupied by patients has been only 130.56 as compared with 152.65 in the previous year. As a consequence the "waiting list" has soared to abnormal heights—and for some time past has exceeded 500. The Governors deplore this fact, but they feel that the public will appreciate the situation. It is gratifying to be able to announce that the Ministry have now agreed to the resumption of normal working, and in the early future the Summers' Wing will again be brought into use.

Throughout so difficult a year the medical and surgical staffs and the nursing personnel have given cheerful and devoted service, and many deserving cases have been followed up and helped through the efforts of the Almoner.

The Chairman of the Board, Mr. Arnold Kenyon, has been elected to a seat on the Cotton Districts Convalescent Fund, Manchester, in succession to Mr. Thomas Frederick Kershaw, who felt that he could no longer continue to hold office, and to whom the thanks of the Governors have been extended.

The Chairman, the Deputy Chairman, and the General Superintendent have attended meetings of the Regional Council of the British Hospitals Association on several occasions, and are keeping in touch with the developments of hospital policy as outlined in the Government's White Paper and with other efforts to safeguard the position of voluntary hospitals.

Mr. Clegg and the Assistant Secretary have represented the Infirmary at various meetings in connection with the Contributory Scheme movement.

The Governors congratulate their colleague, Alderman George Lewis Flint, J.P., on the conferment upon him of the Honorary Freedom of the Borough of Stalybridge. A similar honour was later in the year conferred upon Mr. Carey Megaw Bowden, J.P., who had recently resigned his position as Alderman. To mark his appreciation of the action of the Ashton-under-Lyne Borough Council and his interest in the Infirmary, Mr. Bowden made a gift of £1,000 to endow a bed in honour of his father, the Rev. Andrew Bowden, who was the Secretary of the Infirmary for 16 years up to his death in 1901.

The Governors wish to record their thanks to Alderman Harry Sheard, J.P., for his good work as a representative of the Co-operative movement. He has been succeeded by Mr. James Bennison.

Work in the Special Departments—Radiological, Massage, and Electricity, Fracture and Orthopædic, Maternity and Child Welfare, Venereal Diseases and Pathological Research—has again been carried on with considerable success under difficult conditions.

FINANCES.

The various accounts, duly audited and certified as correct, will be found later on in this Report. Increased expenditure on maintenance has involved a deficit of £6,084 2s. 10d. on General Purposes Account, making with the

deficit brought forward from the previous year a total indebtedness of £25,285 7s. 9d., which the Governors deplore, but which they were powerless to prevent.

(d) THE THOMAS OLDHAM BEQUEST—

This Estate is in process of being wound up by the Executors of Mr. Oldham in the United States of America. The total receipts since 1939 have been £29,691, of which £133 has accrued in 1944.

The Governors respectfully suggest that in view of the difference in money values brought about by the war many firms could well afford to increase their annual contributions.

Under the heading "Donations, Free Legacies, etc." it will be noticed that there is an increase in receipts as compared with 1943.

Sincere thanks are accorded to the Mayors of Mossley, Dukinfield, Stalybridge, Hyde, and the Mayoresses of Ashton and Dukinfield for their efforts during the past year, and to all the various agencies, societies, and individuals who have so willingly given valuable financial help.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME AND OTHER WORKPEOPLE'S COLLECTIONS.

The Contributory Scheme has again been of great value to the workpeople of the district and their dependents. The gross amount received under this heading was £19,614, out of which the agreed proportion to the Medical Board accounted for £1,533, and the sum of £7,040 was paid to other Contributory Schemes for treatment given in other hospitals to members of our Scheme. This was a much larger sum than was paid in the previous year, when it was £4,020, and it was not counter-balanced by receipts from other Schemes (which amounted to £4,159) for their members who were treated in the District Infirmary; so that the net sum available for the use of the Infirmary from this and the Hospital Saturday Collections (which amounted to £567) was £11,608, as compared with £13,875 in the previous year. The greatly increased payments to other Contributory Schemes may have been partly due to the fact that on account of Wards closed by Government action many members were driven to seek treatment elsewhere, for which our Scheme had to pay.

It is clear to the Governors that the rate of weekly contributions needs to be raised, and the re-opening of closed wards should result in fewer patients having to be treated in outside hospitals.

The thanks of the Board are tendered to the District Committees, the collectors, office staffs, and others who have so willingly given their services in forwarding the good work.

THE NURSING AND TECHNICAL STAFF.

The results of a full year's increased scales of pay to the Nursing Staff under the provision of the Rushcliffe Committee's recommendations and of other workers under the scales of the British Hospitals Association and the Hetherington Committee in regard to female domestic labour are reflected in the accounts, which show that £19,816 has been

paid in wages in the year under review, as compared with £18,238 in the year previous. Additional provision for superannuation for nurses and officers has followed as a result.

OBITUARY.

The previous report gave a full account of the beneficent work of the late President, Alderman Ada J. Summers, who died in the early days of 1943 whilst the Report was in preparation. Her ever-ready help and encouragement are greatly missed.

Dr. William Hugh Hughes died in March. He had been connected with the work of the Infirmary for 45 years, eleven of which were given in active service as an honorary surgeon. His father before him had a long record of service.

Mr. Herbert Howarth, for many years a representative of the Ashton and District Workpeople's Committee and latterly an Elective Governor, passed away in August. He was a tireless worker for the Infirmary and was proud of his connection with the Board.

During the compilation of this Report, Miss Constance Lawton, J.P., the representative on the Board of the Mossley Workpeople's Committee, died with tragic suddenness. For ten years she had acted as the Honorary Secretary of the Mossley Committee, following her father, Mr. Herford Lawton, J.P. Her interest in the welfare of the Infirmary was real and enlightened.

To the regret of the Board, Mr. Walter Lunt, F.C.A., whose firm Messrs. Wainwright, Son, and Co., had audited the accounts of the Infirmary for forty-two years, passed away very suddenly at the end of November. Mr. Lunt always took the keenest interest in the work, his advice was greatly valued, and his integrity was beyond all question.

PLANT AND EQUIPMENT, &c.

After prolonged negotiations with Government departments and vexatious delays, the additional steam boiler has been installed and has made for greater efficiency in the steam service. After the war it will be necessary to spend considerable sums in modernising the steam and heating service. Renovations of various kinds are urgently necessary in the wards and various departments, but cannot at present be undertaken. A large sum has, however, been expended on internal painting, which could no longer be delayed. An enlargement has been made to a ward kitchen, and two sectional heating boilers have had to be replaced. An electro-

cardiograph was purchased at a cost of £242 and will help in the diagnosis of heart affections. The Ashton-under-Lyne Workpeople's Committee have kindly provided some new cots, dinner wagons, and other accessories and are installing a refrigerator for the Children's Hospital.

The Co-operative Cot Committee have maintained in good condition the wireless installation and have provided some cots, a dinner wagon, and other useful gifts.

It has been found necessary to amplify the water supply to the Laundry and Boiler House, and an auxiliary main has been brought in from the Fountain Street side of the premises.

ACKNOWLEDGMENTS.

It is the pleasing duty of your Board to thank all who so willingly assisted the Infirmary during the year. A steady flow of gifts in money, useful commodities, and much self-denying service have helped to make the work of the hospital fruitful of great good. The Stamford Park Committee maintained throughout the year gifts of vegetables which have been very acceptable. The various ladies' committees of several districts and the long-established Ladies' Work Society, who raised the sum of £169 to purchase materials, have helped to make up some of the materials into useful garments, and provided equipment for some of the wards. Ladies of the sewing parties attending at the Infirmary on two afternoons each week have again given devoted service which has been highly appreciated. The Ashton Branch of the Women's Voluntary Service administered on several days each week the Out-patient Canteen, and on Saturday afternoon ladies and gentlemen of the Ashton Workpeople's Committee continued this useful work. The Police and Ambulance authorities have again been of valuable help to the staff. To those members of the Board and friends who made gifts to the Christmas Dinners Fund, hearty acknowledgments are tendered. It is not possible to specify by name all who have given devoted aid to the institution, but the Governors are deeply gratified by the encouragement received from all sections of the community.

CONCLUSION.

Your Board do not feel justified in prophesying as to the future of the voluntary hospitals. Despite White Papers and Government pronouncements, they are, however, convinced that the District Infirmary will long be called upon to minister to the health of the local community.

Almoner's Report.

The past year has seen steady progress in the development of social work for the Infirmary patients. In their many and varied difficulties they have been helped to make the best use of their own capabilities, and through the resources of the family and official organisations have been shown how to obtain the greatest benefit from their treatment. During the year three artificial legs have been obtained, and special help has been given to obtain surgical belts and orthopædic appliances for 25 other patients. I have sent 16 patients for convalescence to homes at Southport, Grange-over-Sands, Ilkley and West Kirby. In 12 cases there have been special home difficulties which needed arranging before the patient could take advantage of treatment.

If variety is the spice of life then an Almoner's life is well seasoned, for there is every variety of interest. The door may open to admit a man discharged from the Services with routine forms for completion, followed by Sister to say that one of her patients, ready for discharge, has heard from the landlady that she cannot go back to her lodging. The patient waits another day or two while arrangements are made for her admission to a hostel, her clothes are brought and an escort is found to show her the way. In the meantime the doctor may ask you to arrange family difficulties for a patient who needs Radium treatment. You make suitable suggestions but later hear from the Christie Hospital that the patient did not arrive, and on visiting you find that the apparent difficulties were only camouflage for the patient's own fears caused by neighbours' idle chatter. A request for the Doctor to explain and reassure her about what the treatment is like results in her admission at the next appointment.

In one case I was asked to help a woman who needed sanatorium treatment for tuberculosis. That could easily be arranged, but she had to wait some time for a vacancy, and in the meantime there was every chance that she might infect her two children, for the family was poor and in a small house. I therefore sent the children away for two months to a convalescent home to build up their own resistance and prevent their infection. Another man who has been a cripple for some years has been helped and encouraged to start a business at home and his change in outlook from cheerful resignation to hopeful independence is most gratifying.

The Annual Statement of the Honorary Medical Staff.

The War continues to limit the activities of the Infirmary through reasons of shortness of staff and limitation of number of beds available. At the same time some progress continues to be made in the field of diagnosis and treatment. As regards the former, a mobile electrocardiogram has now been purchased and has been considerably used both in the Medical Out-patient Departments and the Wards, and has proved of great value in the diagnosis of heart disease.

This year, too, has seen the introduction to the Infirmary of Penicillin, and although so far not used extensively, the results have been very gratifying.

The amount of work in the Fracture and Orthopædic Department has caused the Board of Governors to decide on appointing a Casualty and Orthopædic Registrar to assist the Fracture and Orthopædic Surgeon.

Although it has been found impossible to carry out large-scale plans for rehabilitation work, a start in this direction has been made this year in Ward 1, and has proved of value in helping the recovery of long-standing cases.

The Honorary Medical Staff has noted with pleasure the inception of a Prize-Giving and Reunion Day for the Nursing Staff. The event was held on 29th July, and was such a success that it has been decided to make this a yearly event. It is felt that such an event in a teaching hospital engenders a spirit of loyalty amongst past members of the Nursing Staff and implements esprit-de-corps amongst those still serving here.

The untimely death of Mr. Duncan, L.D.S., Honorary Assistant Dental Surgeon, at the early age of 41, after a short illness, came as a shock to all members of the staff. He was an extremely popular member of the staff, and his loss will be greatly felt by everybody.

The Ante-Natal Clinic and Maternity Department has again shown a considerable increase in the number of admissions.

The Medical Board extends to the Matron and the Nursing Staff its thanks and its appreciation of the excellent work performed during another difficult year of war conditions.
