# ANNUAL REPORT

1947

---

The Governors have pleasure in submitting to the Subscribers the 87th Annual Report of the District Infirmary.

## THE PRESIDENT.

With feelings of sincere regret the Governors have to report the death on December 20th, 1947 of their President, Mr. Herbert Knott, J.P. In a life exceeding 91 years in duration Mr. Knott had a wonderful record of service for social amelioration, but it is only his work for the Infirmary which can be touched upon here.

As a young man of twenty-five, he succeeded his brother, Mr. John Frederick Knott, as a Governor of the Infirmary in 1881. He threw himself into the work with devotion and energy, he encouraged the late Mr. John Summers to become a Governor, and together they brought about many changes resulting in the modernisation of the hospital and the improvement of the conditions under which not only the patients, but the staff lived. Mr. Knott was made a Trustee at an early stage of his career, he was twice elected a Vice-President, and when his friend, Mrs. Ada Summers, died at the end of 1943 he succeeded her as President. Mr. Knott was the soul of honour, a generous supporter, and to the last retained a deep and abiding interest in all that went on within the walls of the hospital for which he had been so faithful a worker for close upon sixty--seven years.

Mr. Carey Megaw Bowden, J.P., has been nominated to the Presidency. In one way or another Mr. Bowden has been connected with the work of the hospital for close upon half a century, for in the distant days when his father was Secretary he helped him in some of his duties. He has been a Subscriber for many years, and when he was made a Freeman of Ashton-under-Lyne in 1944, gave £1,000 to endow a bed in honour of his father. In all the special funds which have been raised in recent times he has been a participant, and has always shewn a keen desire to ameliorate the lot of the suffering.

The work of the year has been carried out with abundant energy and a large measure of success. The staff difficulties mentioned in recent previous reports have again at times



been very acute, and the administrative heads and the Ward Sisters have had to strain every nerve to cope with the increased volume of work. From the Visiting Medical and Surgical Officers, the Resident Staff, the Matron and all concerned loyal and devoted service has been received.

The brief summary which follows gives at a glance the salient facts as regards the cases dealt with.

#### FINANCE.

The accounts, duly audited and certified as correct, will be found later on in this Report.

Owing to the continued increases in wages and salaries dictated by the National Joint Negotiating Committee (Hospital Staffs), the British Hospitals' Association and the Rushcliffe Committee for Nurses &c., our wages bill (including administrative staff salaries), has soared to the high figure of £34,521, which is an increase of £6,156 on the previous year—itself a new high record. Added to this the higher prices of all the commodities we need has imposed a burden which has not been offset by any appreciable increase of income.

The Annual Subscribers have, with few exceptions, continued their valued support, and the Workpeople have again exceeded all previous records. However, a total income for maintenance of £47,208, as compared with an outlay of £67,527 cannot but be regarded as a serious matter, resulting as it did in a deficit for the year on General Purposes Account of £20,319. This gap has been partially reduced by a transfer of



£20,000 from the legacy bequeathed by the late Thomas Oldham (U.S.A.), but the total funds are worse off by that amount, and the total accumulated deficit on this account is now £29,563.

The Governors have been powerless to stem the rapid growth of expenditure, and are only sorry that they will not be able to hand over to the Government a hospital free of debt. There is, however, another side to the picture. Under the provisions of the National Health Services Act, the Infirmary will be compelled to surrender to the State its endowments, valued at current prices at a quarter of a million pounds. These endowments comprise money bequeathed or given to the Infirmary during a period of over 86 years. Most of these sums were invested when received, and the Infirmary has enjoyed the income which of course has steadily grown as the capital sum increased. There will also be some small subsidiary funds to transfer to the State.

At the time of preparing this Report the Governors are still without any guidance from the Manchester Regional Committee of the Ministry of Health as to the future conduct and management of the Infirmary, but it is expected that it will be linked up in some form with neighbouring hospitals, so as to comply with the Government's desire to have units of a thousand beds under one general management.

The Infirmary has been greatly helped during the year by the munificence of Miss Marie Rodocanachi, who gave in memory of her brother, Dr. Ambrose John T. Rodocanachi, a sum of £3,805, and jointly with her sister, Miss Hypatia, a further sum of £143 10s. These sums were placed to "Special Fund Account," as was also a legacy of £1,462 19s. 7d. bequeathed by Mr. Charles Orrell, of Manchester, who had business associations with Ashton-under-Lyne. Out of this Fund various improvements and special equipment have been paid for, and a house purchased for staff purposes. The roadways around the Infirmary have also been re-surfaced, and one of the tennis courts re-laid.

The sincere thanks of the Board are tendered to the Mayors and Mayoresses of Ashton, Stalybridge, Hyde, Dukinfield and Mossley, to the Chairmen of District Councils, the Stamford Park Committee, and to all the various agencies, societies, bowling leagues and individuals, who have so willingly given financial help or personal service. In this acknowledgment we must include the people of many of our Colonies and Dominions, as well as the United States, who have sent parcels of food or goods which have been very welcome. The police and ambulance workers of the district have again been of great help. To the Toc H organisation we are indebted for our library service, which has provided reading matter for the patients in our wards.

**LADIES' WORK SOCIETY AND SEWING PARTIES.**

The Ladies' Work Society, under the Presidency of Mrs. G. W. Page, has again actively helped in the work of providing amenities for the patients and staff. The Society provided funds to purchase 24 air rings, an electric sewing machine, an electric clock, 6 woodmet trays, 2 Dunlopillo mattresses, cretonne, and a quantity of wool for making into garments for the patients.

The members of the Sewing Parties have met at the Infirmary on Mondays and Thursdays to help in the making up, mending and marking of hospital linen, and carrying on other useful work for the good of the institution and its patients. Their devotion to the cause is worthy of all praise. Three of the members who have given most loyal and faithful service



for many years, viz., Mrs. Cropper, Mrs. Revill and Miss B. Broadbent, of the Stalybridge section, have resigned. They are deserving of sincere thanks, and the Matron appeals for volunteers to take their place.

Members of the Women's Voluntary Service have again administered the Canteen in the Waiting Hall on several days each week, and on Saturday afternoons the Ashton and District Workpeople's Committee have given faithful service in this connection.

### **CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME AND OTHER WORKPEOPLE'S CONTRIBUTIONS.**

The gross receipts of £26,760 under the Contributory Scheme are the highest yet recorded, and as a smaller sum was paid for services rendered by outside hospitals than in the previous year, there is a net total of £16,771. In addition there have been collections apart from the Scheme amounting to £418. The net total of the workpeople's efforts as a whole is therefore £17,189, as compared with £15,452 in the previous year. These figures reflect credit on all concerned, and the district committees and their collectors are to be congratulated upon their efforts to help their fellow-workers and the institution.

### **THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS**

The loss sustained by the Infirmary in the death of its revered President, Mr. Herbert Knott, has already been referred to. Death also removed Alderman Harry Laming, J.P., one of the Mossley representatives who, during his Mayoralty, had raised substantial sums for the Infirmary funds. Mr. James Roscoe Ramsden, of Hyde, also passed away during the year. For some time prior to his election as a Governor he had devoted himself to the cause of the sick and needy, and the Board deeply regretted his death after ten years' service as a Governor. The Governors wish to thank Messrs. James W. Jackson, John Schofield, John Thomas and Victor Wykes, for their interest and service as representatives of the Workpeople's Committees. In their places the various Committees have nominated Messrs. J. Hedley, Fred Ogden, L. P. Doolan and J. E. Pascoe.

### **THE MEDICAL BOARD.**

Mr. Philip Bleasdale, M.B.E., F.R.C.S.E., as Chairman, and Dr. Hugh Selbourne, M.D., M.R.C.P., as Honorary Secretary, after a strenuous year's work, have been re-elected for a



further term by their fellow-members. Mr. Thomas Moore, F.R.C.S., found it necessary to give up his post as Honorary Assistant Surgeon, and has been thanked for his services. On the suggestion of the Ophthalmic Surgeon, Dr. S. H. Faulkner, an Orthoptic Clinic was instituted, and Mrs. Macaulay was placed in charge of it. It is regretted that ill-health has prevented Mr. W. S. Brindle, F.R.C.S., from taking part in the work of the Infirmary, and the Governors wish him a speedy recovery. Mrs. Barbara E. Chadwick, M.B., Ch.B., has been appointed a Visiting Anæsthetist. The Honorary Consulting Pathologist, Dr. Leonard White, died in October. He had during the years 1915 to 1930, given useful service as a Pathologist. During the year Mr. Joseph Edward Judson, a Consulting Honorary Surgeon who, in his day had given devoted service, passed away at Bournemouth, where he had resided for some years for reasons of health. The Governors feel confident in assuring the Medical Board that the Subscribers and the people of the district as a whole are grateful for the fine service which continues to be rendered—at all hours of the day and night—by the visiting staff. Many letters are received each year, which record the thanks of patients or their families for the ministrations of the medical and nursing staff.

#### **THE NURSING AND TECHNICAL STAFFS.**

Another year of heavy pressure on the resources of the Infirmary has caused anxiety to an already depleted staff, working under the matronship of Miss M. E. A. Marshall, S.R.N. She has been admirably supported by the Sisters, who have many times sacrificed some of their leisure hours by remaining on duty to minister to specially difficult cases. Miss Elsie Cook, S.R.N., the Assistant Matron, was appointed Matron of the Whitehaven and West Cumberland Hospital, and left with the good wishes of all. Miss Gwendoline Dolben, S.R.N., has been promoted to fill the post, and Mrs. Sutcliffe has taken her place as Home Sister. Miss L. Flintoff, a former Sister who, in 1929, was appointed Sister Tutor, resigned office during the year after rendering valuable service, and the results she obtained from her pupils were invariably good.

The Nurses' Prize Day and Re-union was held on September 6th, when the prizes and certificates to successful nurses were presented by Mrs. Rhodes, the wife of the Member of Parliament for Ashton-under-Lyne, Mr. Hervey Rhodes.

Every effort has been made to recruit the nursing staff and to comply with the requirements of the General Nursing Council. The attention of parents of healthy girls desirous of



serving the best interests of their country is drawn to the advantages of a nursing career. During their three years' training student nurses receive much better pay than in pre-war times, they are comfortably housed, well fed, and have many amenities. The training teaches them to think for themselves, and to be ready to meet emergencies. When their short apprenticeship is over there are well paid openings as Staff Nurses, and very soon there are opportunities to the ambitious and those who are really interested, to become Sisters of wards or special departments. Nursing is one of the noblest professions, and it deserves every encouragement to maintain its high standards.

The Governors lost the service by death of a faithful servant in Mr. Harry Hobson, M.S.R., who had occupied for 29 years the post of Chief Radiographer, working under Dr. J. Blair Hartley, the Visiting Radiologist. Mr. John James, M.S.R., who came from Greenock Royal Infirmary with high credentials, was appointed to succeed Mr. Hobson.

### **THE FUTURE.**

On July 5th the National Health Services Act will be brought into operation, and the Infirmary will become the property of the State, but the Governors are anxious that voluntary gifts should still be made. Such gifts, whether in the form of annual subscriptions, workpeople's collections, donations, etc., will be under the control of the Infirmary authorities, and will be utilised for research, amenities and special objects which the Act does not cover. As yet nothing is known as to the composition of the Management Committee which the Manchester Regional Committee will presumably set up. It is to be hoped that whatever happens when the change-over takes place, the interests of the patients will be paramount, as they have been during eighty-seven years of voluntary management, and that opportunities will still remain for the exercise of that patience, skill and sympathy which have been so freely given to countless thousands of our fellow citizens by hospital doctors, nurses and boards of management.



## Almoner's Report.

---

The introduction of the new Health Services Act and the Children's Charter heralds the reorganisation of the social structure and the shadow of change has been felt throughout 1947.

During the year close contact has been maintained with voluntary organisations for social service and with State agencies, in order to give adequate help and advice to all requiring such assistance. Emergencies have arisen, and it has been necessary on several occasions to take entire charge of a household in order to ensure hospital treatment for a vital member of a family unit. Children have been placed with relatives or in suitable homes, after consultation with the Children's Officer, and arrangements have been made for the payment of rent and other essential items of expenditure. Nothing can be left to chance, and contact is maintained from the outset, during treatment and on the patient's return home. In several cases when patients have been advised not to return to former occupations, suitable employment has been found in conjunction with the Ministry of Labour. Ex-service patients have been referred to appropriate departments after an assessment of their needs.

Each day presents problems, and the records contain details of numerous contingencies that have arisen during the year. Delicate domestic situations have required much thought, and numerous economic difficulties have been encountered, apart from the routine matters of transport and similar everyday occurrences. The scope is almost inexhaustible. Convalescent treatment has been arranged for eighteen patients, and surgical belts and appliances have been obtained for thirty-three other patients. Home visits have been made from time to time in order to obtain a clear picture of domestic circumstances, and a complete understanding of the difficulties. Visits have also been made at the request of a "follow up" clinic.

It is impossible to prophesy changes that will take place during the next five years, but one can foresee that much co-operation will be needed if chaos is to be averted.

## The Annual Statement of the Honorary Medical Staff.

---

The Honorary Medical Staff have had an active year, and changes have taken place which have enhanced the prestige of the Infirmary.

The post of Resident Surgical Officer has been recognised by the Royal College of Surgeons of England for the Diploma for the Fellowship.

The post of Resident Anæsthetist has also been approved for the Diploma in Anæsthesia.

Owing to illness we were unfortunate in losing the services of Mr. Brindle, who was obliged to resign his appointment of Assistant Surgeon.

Mrs. B. Chadwick, residing in the Ashton area, was appointed Visiting Anæsthetist, and Mrs. M. Macaulay was appointed Orthoptist, her department being under the supervision of the Ophthalmic Surgeon, Mr. S. H. Faulkner.

The Honorary Medical Staff were sorry to lose Miss Flintoff, who retired after 23 years of good and loyal service, first as Sister, and for the last 18 years as Sister Tutor.

The Consulting Staff has suffered by death, the loss of two of its oldest members, viz., Mr. Joseph Edward Judson, who gave useful service as a Surgeon between 1905 and 1919, when he retired for health reasons, and Dr. Leonard White, the first holder of the office of Pathologist from 1915 to 1930.

The Chairman and Secretary of the Medical Board were instrumental in the establishment of a Blood-Bank to serve the Infirmary, and this has materially improved our amenities for the immediate treatment of severe medical and surgical emergencies.

The Honorary Medical Staff also wish to express their grateful thanks for the co-operation and untiring help given to them by the Nursing Staff under the direction of the Matron.

The examination results have been maintained at a consistently high level. The difficulties of staffing the wards, and the curtailment of so much valuable clinical material make the results all the more remarkable.

The Chairman and Secretary of the Medical Board also wish to express their thanks for the support shown them by their colleagues, and for the help given them by Mr. Oliver, the General Superintendent, and his staff.

# District Infirmary Subscribers' Last Meeting

## Governors to Give All Help to New State Management

**A**LTHOUGH there was a valedictory note about the proceedings on Saturday at the last annual meeting of subscribers of the District Infirmary, before nationalisation, the general feeling expressed by several speakers was that when the Infirmary ceases to be a voluntary hospital in July the financial resources of the State should ensure the provision of a modern and efficient hospital service.

The chairman of the Board of Governors (Mr. Arnold Kenyon) presided, supported by Mr. C. M. Bowden, elected president in succession to the late Mr. H. Knott. Mr. W. H. Andrew (deputy-chairman), Mr. E. Hurst, Mr. L. Radcliffe, Mrs. B. Wood, Dr. P. Bleasdale, Mr. F. Oliver (Superintendent and secretary), the Matron (Miss M. E. A. Marshall), and Mr. S. Croasdale.

### A Unique Occasion

Mr. Kenyon, moving the adoption of the annual report, said that this was a unique occasion since, after 87 years, this was the last annual meeting of subscribers to be held before the new National Health Services Act came into operation. There would probably be a winding-up meeting before the change-over. Expressing thanks to the medical and nursing staffs, he said the past year had been a harassing time for the Matron because of the shortage of nursing staff and the impossibility of obtaining additional nurses. He said he supposed it was an "open secret" that they were losing the services of the Matron, and on behalf of those present he wished Miss Marshall luck and happiness for her forthcoming marriage to Mr. G. C. R. Watts, Master and Steward at the County Hospital.

After referring to losses which the Infirmary had sustained during the year in the deaths of the president Mr. Herbert Knott, Alderman H. Laming, Mr. J. R. Ramsden, and Mr. H. Hobson, their chief radiographer for 29 years, Mr. Kenyon said that all of the patients he had spoken to spoke highly of the attention they had received whilst in the Infirmary. In the future subscriptions and workpeople's contributions would not be required on the same scale as formerly but they were hoping that some scheme

would be introduced to raise subscriptions for the provision of after-care treatment and other amenities which were not covered by the Act.

### "English Genius Will Make New Scheme Work"

If it had not been for the voluntary hospitals, and the work done in past years by private individuals, it would not have been possible to introduce the new Health Service. The present Board of Governors would disappear but he hoped they would not lose their interest in the welfare of the sick of the neighbourhood. It would be their endeavour to hand over the institution in as good a condition as possible, and to fall in entirely with the new management and help them in every way possible (hear, hear.). The scheme might not be all that it should be, but the English people had a genius for making things work and they would make the new scheme work, but only by using past experience and by pulling together.

### Linked Up With Area 16

Mr. W. H. Andrew, seconding the chairman's proposition, said that nationalisation, of which they were within four months, meant that the old Board of Governors would cease to exist, and that the District Infirmary with three infectious diseases hospitals, one small general hospital, and two maternity homes, would be linked up as Area No. 16. The new board might be constituted of representatives from all these interests, as well as of representation from the borough health authorities of Ashton, Stalybridge, Dukinfield, Hyde, Mossley and Glossop and certain members from the medical staffs.

It was true that, finally, a house management committee would be formed to run each individual hospital, but only with very limited powers. Thus there was a completely new set-up. It meant a parting with many old friends with whom one had sat for many, or few, years, and a break with that friendly intimacy which had always existed between governors, nurses, and doctors.

Whilst the Workpeople's Infirmary Committee would not continue as one of the chief sources of income of the Infirmary, it would continue as a raiser of money for extra comforts and services so welcome to a patient. It was a high testimonial to the spirit of that committee that when its power as principal agent ceased, its members still wished to carry on their noble work of helping the sick.



## "Nation's Health the First Charge"

"The future result of all such changes," said Mr. Andrew, "is entirely unknown and can hardly be forecast. All political parties are agreed that a comprehensive medical service of some kind is not only inevitable, but desirable; for the health of the nation should become the first charge on the Government and its money. How such a service should be founded and carried out is a matter for argument and, perhaps, of great differences of opinion. We can only promise to do our best with whatever power is left to us (either individually or as a body) to help on the work in which so many of us have been engaged for so long, and so keenly, both on the Board of Governors and outside."

### A Magnificent Spirit of Enthusiasm

Regarding the present Board of Governors, his own experience was that no matter from whence the members were drawn; and no matter what interest they were elected to serve; there had been a magnificent spirit of enthusiasm, and a high intelligence in carrying out the duties of the Board. No fresh spirit that might come in could improve on the spirit in which they at the Infirmary had all worked together for the common good of mankind. The past years had formed a great chapter in the history of the Infirmary's service to the district; they hoped that good might come of the new scheme, and that the future might hold something even better in store than had been the case in the past.

Thanks to the Board of Governors and the hon. solicitor and treasurer, were accorded on the proposition of **Mr. J. S. Dawson** (Mossley), seconded by **Mr. E. Baldwin** (Hadfield).

On the motion of **Mr. Leonard Radcliffe**, seconded by **Mr. Walter Lees** (Greenfield) the meeting tendered its grateful acknowledgments to the honorary medical officers.

**Dr. P. Bleasdale** (chairman of the Medical Board) responding, said the Infirmary had always been a happy and pleasant institution to work in. Whatever happened under the new Service, he thought they would find that the work would go on in the same way. On behalf of the medical and nursing staffs he expressed good wishes to the Matron and her future husband, and said that she had always been "a very loyal and pleasant colleague to work with."

### No Complaints at Saddleworth

**Councillor H. Bradbury** (Saddleworth), proposing the election of **Mr. C. M. Bowden** as president, and the re-election of the members of the Board of Governors said that as the representative of the Saddleworth Medical Charities, he could say that in ten years he had never received a complaint from a Saddleworth patient who had received treatment at the Infirmary. He did not regard the occasion as their "swan song" but as a rededication to help the sick and make the new Service a success. There would be plenty of work for them to do outside. **Mr. A. Jones** (Stalybridge) seconded.

**Mr. Bowden** returning thanks, said that on Monday, July 5th, the management of the hospital would be taken over by the Government. He hoped that those who had supported the Infirmary in any way in the past would not withdraw their interest. He believed the State would do a splendid work in providing the necessary medical and nursing services, but there were many things which the State, bound by a certain amount of red tape, could not provide. He would like to see a committee formed to administer a fund to help the sick before and after hospital treatment.

**Mr. Bowden** referred to the sterling service which had been given to the Infirmary for 46 years by the superintendent and secretary, **Mr. F. Oliver**. When he took over the secretaryship in 1902 the subscriptions were £872 as compared with the present figure of £6,000. The workpeople's contributions, which were then £665 were now over £20,000. He had nobly played his part on behalf of the Infirmary which he loved.

**Mr. Oliver**, in reply, recalled that he became secretary in succession to **Mr. Bowden's** father who held the office with distinction for 16 years. His task had not always been an easy one. There had been times when he had been greatly discouraged but there had been other occasions when he had been really touched by expressions of appreciation from members of the Board. **Mr. Oliver** mentioned the great assistance he had received for 33 years from **Mr. Croasdale**, and announced his intention to retire at the end of June.

Thanks were accorded **Mr. Kenyon** on the proposition of **Mr. E. Hurst**, who recalled his 12 years' devoted service as chairman.

**Alderman J. D. Doyle** (Glossop), seconding, said that one thing they had to remember in connection with the new service was that there would be no shortage of funds to purchase equipment and erect buildings, such as had created difficulties for those who had devoted their time in the past to carrying on the work of the hospital.

### To Surrender Endowments Worth £250,000

The annual report stated that the total income for maintenance was £47,208, compared with an outlay of £67,527, the total accumulated deficit on the General Purposes Account being £29,563. Although the Governors would not be able to hand over a hospital free from debt, the Infirmary would be compelled to surrender to the State its endowments valued at a quarter of a million pounds. The gross receipts of £26,760 under the Contributory Scheme were the highest recorded. The net total of the workpeople's efforts was £17,189. Of the 200 beds normally available, an average of 160 were in use. The number of patients treated to a conclusion was 4,189. The total cost per occupied bed was £377 12s. 3½d., the total cost of each in-patient being £13 12s. 6½d. During the year, 13,816 new out-patient cases were admitted and made 73,157 attendances.
