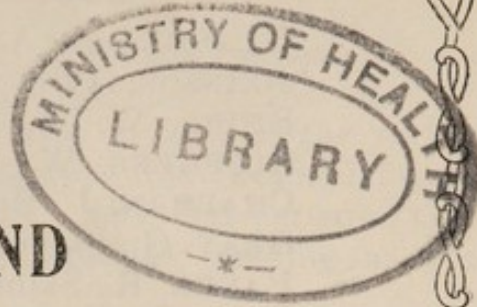

REPORT.

THE Council beg to report that during 1927, 45 Patients have been under treatment in the Hospital, being 29 more than last year. 3 deaths have occurred in the Hospital during the year, 41 Patients have been discharged cured or relieved, and at the end of the year 1 Patient remained under treatment. The days in Hospital have been 644, as against 178 last year. 191 Out-patients have had their injuries attended to at the Hospital, making a total number of 1,862 visits.

The total income has been £948/5/4, as against £653/9/3 in 1926. The expenditure has been £849/17/4, as against £719/18/2. The average cost of maintaining the Hospital per day—£2/6/6 8. Average cost of each Patient per day—£1/6/4 7, and the average number of Patients per day—1.76. During the year it has been necessary to carry out considerable repairs to the buildings, and the expenditure includes the sum of £76/2/11 in respect of this work.

In accordance with agreement, the sum of £20/4/1 has been returned to the North Skelton Workmen in consideration of cases from North Skelton Mines being admitted into Skelton Hospital free.

The Council again desires to express its appreciation of the work of the Brotton Hospital Cup Committee, by whose efforts the sum of £25 has been handed over to the Hospital, also to tender thanks to all subscribers and donors for their continued support.

It is proposed to hold a Carnival and Gala in Brotton during the coming summer, the proceeds of which will be devoted to Hospital purposes. It may be mentioned that the Hospital is open at all hours of the day and night, and, apart from accidents to workmen, is being increasingly called upon to treat cases of accidents on roads and elsewhere. The Council, therefore, have the fullest confidence in appealing to the public for their co-operation, and in asking their assistance to make the Carnival a thorough success, and so help forward the good work of the Hospital. The date of the Carnival has been fixed for the second week in July. Full particulars will be announced in due course.

The thanks of the Council are again tendered to the Matron and Staff, the Medical Officers, Auditors and Officials for the satisfactory manner in which the work of the Hospital has been carried on during the year.

Since closing the accounts for the year the Council has received a donation of £8 from the Committee of the Farmers' and Tradesmen's Ball. This item will be included in the accounts for 1928, but the Council wish to take this opportunity of expressing thanks for this kind donation.

Subscriptions for 1928 are now due.
