## 29th ANNUAL REPORT

For Year ending 31st December, 1926.

---

The Committee have pleasure in presenting to you their Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ending 31st December, 1926.

The amount of income for the year under review has amounted to £1,741 18s. 9d., which, when compared with £2,073 2s. 11d. for 1925, shows a decrease of £331 4s. 2d.

The continued depression and disputes have had a somewhat serious effect on the most of the Institutions as large numbers of our working class subscribers have not worked for a considerable time; but in spite of the depression our record during 1926 will compare favourably with previous years, and we would take this opportunity of expressing our grateful thanks to all who have assisted us, and we think we can look forward with great hope for better times during 1927. And may we point out to those who have not already commenced to subscribe, how possible it is that they may need the benefits of the Institution, and how necessary it is that they should support it with their financial help while they are in a position to do so. The Committee hope that this will serve as an appeal to the generous support of all the workmen employed by the various contractors, etc., in the district of Hebburn.

The expenditure for the year has amounted to £2,022 13s. 9d., which, when compared with £1,782 1s. 1d. for 1925, shows an increase of £240 12s. 8d. This increase is accounted for by having carried out various additions, alterations and repairs, such as the purchase of an up-to-date sterilizer, and, owing to the scarcity of coal, the purchase of and fitting up of two new gas cookers, increase of painting and decorating account, and other items which will not occur



again for some time. All these items are accounted for in the Financial Statement, which will be found on page 13.

We have many proofs of appreciation from late patients for the kind treatment received from the Doctors, Matron and Staff of the Institution.

The House and Finance Committees have carefully controlled all items of income and expenditure and at the same time are keeping up the requirements of the Institution with every consideration for the comfort of the patients and Staff.

We desire to record our sincere thanks to Messrs. A. Reyrolle & Co. for their valuable services in looking after the X-Ray Apparatus and Electric Lighting, also for the supply of the necessaries in connection therewith at cost price, and for fitting up same free of charge by their staff. Also the Firm for their valuable assistance in handing over the sum of £50 16s. 0d. to our funds, being the proceeds of their 5th Annual Sports. We would also tender our thanks to all who assisted in making the sports a success.

The Fourth Annual Whist Drive and Dance was held in St. Andrew's Institute, Hebburn, on Friday, November 26th, 1926, which proved very successful, and from which we benefitted by the sum of £41 9s. 3d. The music was provided by Messrs Nutt Bros.' Orchestra; and we desire to thank Messrs. A. Davison and H. Brice for again working the limelights, and Messrs. Nutt Bros. for return of £1 towards the Whist Drive and Dance. This is shown in the total of £41 9s. 3d.

We would also place on record our high appreciation for the splendid services rendered in connection with the supper by Mrs. Purves, Mrs. Anderson and the various members of the Hebburn Co-operative Women's Guild. To the donors of the prizes for whist drive and other gifts in kind which were collected by Mrs. Purves, Mrs. Anderson, and members of the Guild and Mr. John T. Hunter; also to the committee of St. Andrew's Institute for again granting the use of their Institute free of charges, which in itself, is a good donation towards our funds.

A very interesting ceremony took place at the Infirmary on Saturday, 11th December, 1926, when a beautiful wireless



set was presented. Mr. T. W. Rowlinson presided, and the presentation of the wireless installation on behalf of the Hebburn and District Radio Society was made by Mr. H. W. Clothier (of Messrs. A. Reyrolle & Co.) and accepted on behalf of the Governors and Staff by Mr. T. Beck, Secretary. Mr. Clothier, in his remarks, said he had very great pleasure in presenting the wireless set, which consisted of a 3-valve set and beautiful oak cabinet with ten pairs of headphones, and stated that the Marconi royalties had been paid for the wiring. He felt sure it would prove a great boon to the patients and Staff of the Institution; and he might mention that the amount required for the installation had been raised by the members of the Hebburn and District Radio Society by the arranging of concerts, football and public subscriptions. And to Mr. J. H. Dawe, for loan of Hebburn Theatre; and Jarrow Brotherhood Orchestra, for providing the concert in the Theatre. Messrs. Foxall, Anderson, Brown and other members of the Radio Society explained the working of the various parts of the set.

We desire to place on record our sincerest thanks to the members of the Old Jarrovians Amateur Dramatic Society for rendering their very interesting comedy, "**Tilly of Bloomsbury**," at the Theatre Royal, Hebburn, on the 28th April, 1926, which proved highly successful and benefitted the funds of our Institution to the extent of £15.

We would also thank Mr. J. Graham, of Jarrow, and Mr. G. H. Pawsey, Hebburn, joint hon. secretaries, for their great interest in organizing the comedy; also to Mr. A. R. Stevens, Mr. C. Neville Binns, and to all those whose names are too numerous to mention, who assisted in making the entertainment such a great success. Also to Mr. Sanderson, Jarrow, for posting the bills for comedy free of charge.

Our thanks are also due to Mr. Dawe, of the Royal Theatre, Hebburn, for his kind consideration in handing over the sum of £7 1s. 0d., being proceeds of whist drive held in connection with the Staff, etc., of the Theatre Royal, Hebburn.

At a meeting of Governors held 14th December, 1926, John Campbell Carr-Ellison, Esq., was unanimously elected a



Life Governor of the Institution for his practical interest in the work and the regular return of the rent as a donation to the Funds of the Institution, and we are pleased to report that he has accepted the same with pleasure.

**In Memoriam.**—We desire to place on record our regret on the loss to the Institution by the death of Dr. J. B. Simpson, of Bradley Hall, Wylam, who had been a Trustee of the Institution since its inception.

The Governors have appointed Mr. John T. Hunter (of Messrs. A. Reyrolle & Co., Hebburn) to fill the vacancy of Trustee caused by the death of Dr. Simpson.

The Football Committee again ran the Football Cup Competition and the funds benefitted by £4. This shows a decrease of £57 5s. 9d. on the previous year, accounted for by the difficulty experienced in getting the final ties arranged and the poor gates owing to slackness of trade, etc.

The sum of £12 10s. 0d has been received from Mr. Geo. Fletcher, being the result of the Hebburn Day Schools' Annual Collection. The Committee appreciate this very much, as it is made up of small amounts by children, and our thanks are due to Mr. Fletcher, head master, Hebburn Colliery School, for his great interest, and also those who assist him from time to time in this work.

It will be interesting to know that we have received from the School Children's Fund since its inception by Mr. Fletcher in 1909, the sum of £161 13s. 10d.

We have received the sum of £5 from the investment of £100 5 per cent. War Stock, presented by the members of



the Hebburn Sewing Party, which has been primarily used for the upkeep of the bed dedicated to the memory of our local lads who paid the supreme sacrifice in the Great War.

In carrying out the conditions of the investment of the £140 in North Eastern Railway 3 per cent. irredeemable stock by the friends of the late Alfred Fellows, the dividend derived therefrom has been used for the upkeep of the Alfred Fellows Cot which is placed in the Ellison Infirmary. We are helped by so many people that we are unable to print all their names, but we are none the less grateful to all.

We desire also to place on record our appreciation and thanks to the Wallsend & Hebburn Coal Company for supply of coal, Messrs. Palmers & Co., Hebburn, for firewood.

In acknowledging the generous contributions, the Committee desire to thank all who have contributed in any way, also the firms and companies for the facilities afforded for deducting the contributions from wages, and to all officials of the same for their valuable services.

We desire to again record our thanks to Mr. R. McConway, manager of the Hebburn Branch Bank of Liverpool & Martins, Limited, for his valuable services as Hon. Treasurer of our Institution and he will be pleased at any time to receive subscriptions at the Bank, Prince Consort Road, Hebburn.

In conclusion, the Committee expresses its grateful thanks to all who have shown their sympathy with the work of the Institution during the past year, whether by individual subscriptions or by the promotion of benefit entertainments; and we trust that the work which it has been their privilege to carry on, may continue to receive the liberal support of all who have the interests of the Institution at heart.
