ANNUAL MEETING OF SUBSCRIBERS.

On Tuesday night, January 29th, the Annual General Meeting of the Subscribers to these Institutions was held in the Museum Hall, Selby, under the presidency of Mr. W. T. Everatt, J.P., C.C., who was supported by the principal Officers and a numerous attendance of Governors and Subscribers.

THE SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Mr. BRABBS read the Report as printed on pages 7 and 8.

The CHAIRMAN thought the Report was an excellent one, and covered the doings of the Hospital for the past year, and on the proposal of Mr. J. H. Dixon it was adopted.

THE MEDICAL REPORT

was presented by Dr. TODD, who said their work was covered by the report. He saw in the report there was no mention of the X-ray work, and he mentioned that 127 exposures of Violet Rays had been made. The Out-patient Department during the year had been busy and the work well done.

THE TREASURER'S STATEMENT

as audited, was presented, and shewed increased payments by patients. The total receipts had been £2,353 15s. 4d., and the payments £2,320 18s. 2d. The statement was accepted, and the Treasurer thanked for his services, as was also Mr. J. W. Pickles for his work as auditor, to which position he was unanimously re-appointed.

ELECTION OF GOVERNORS.

At the outset a letter was received from Mrs. Cochrane, notifying that, as she was leaving the town shortly, she would not be eligible for re-election on the Board of Governors.

The CHAIRMAN expressed regret at the news that Mrs. Cochrane was going to leave them, and said she had been an excellent member of the Board, and he thought no lady had worked so hard. They owed her a deep debt of gratitude, and he moved that they record the fact on their minutes.

Mr. J. H. Dixon seconded, and said they all regretted that Mrs. Cochrane was leaving, and he agreed that it was right that they should place on their records what she had done for the Hospital. She seemed to fit in where she was wanted.

The resolution was unanimously adopted, and with the addition of Mrs. A. L. Cochrane, the seven other retiring Governors were re-elected, viz., Mrs. Scott, Mrs. Ullathorne, Messrs. W. J. Hanlay, T. Hall, A. L. Cochrane, H. A. Middlebrook, and P. Cheesman.

VOTE OF THANKS TO MEDICAL AND NURSING STAFF.

Mr. W. J. HANLAY proposed this resolution, and bore eloquent testimony to their service, which was one of the most important positions in connection with the Hospital. Money was all right — they could not get on without it, but the medical and nursing staff were the main stay and vital part of their work. They heard sometimes of men who had a lot of money dying through neglect, which showed them very plainly that money could not keep them alive. But medical science and nursing skill had so improved that they heard of wonderful healing and restoration to health. There was one thing—they must not expect too much of them, for they were human, like themselves. He commented on the fact that 438 persons had been in the Hospital, so that they could imagine what the staff had to do.

Mr. J. H. DIXON seconded the resolution, and agreed with all Mr. Hanlay had said. Last year they were told the expense would not be justified, but as they looked back and saw that there had been an increase of 119 cases on last year, they were bound to feel that very important work had been done. He referred to the arduous work of the staff at all hours of the day and night, and it was all voluntary, which made it all the more a blessing. He assured them that their work was appreciated, and he instanced a case of gratitude. He bore testimony to the excellent work of the nursing staff, and they ought to tell them how much they were indebted to them.

The CHAIRMAN gave his meed of praise as one who went down to the Hospital a good deal, and said they had an excellent staff. He intimated that they were going to have a tennis court, which had bucked them up, and would please them greatly.

The resolution, which was approved, was responded to by Dr. SOMERS, on behalf of the medical and nursing staff, who stated that they were gratified with the appreciation shewn by the resolution.

GIFTS TO THE HOSPITAL.

Mr. SIDNEY CLARK intimated at this stage that he had great pleasure in handing over a cheque for £350, the amount obtained from the Home Collection Box Committee, and represented sums obtained from boxes and proceeds of concerts during the past year, and stating that £150 of the amount had been subscribed by the surrounding villages. During the three years they had handed over £900, and proved that the small amounts did really mean a big thing.

Mr. A. WALKER then handed in three cheques—£21/0/6, £60/14/8 and £568/4/10—from the Working Men's Committee, and stated that these, with the £350 just handed in, made a total of £1,000. They had had a very successful season, and he really did believe that the Committee did feel their responsibility since the new Hospital was erected. They had put their heart and soul into the work and were going to get more money. He believed it was £40 more than last year, so they could see that they were still carrying on the good work.

Mr DIXON referred to the work of those who had taken a great part in the Home Collection Boxes and country concerts, and said all had worked very hard because they all felt that everything should be done in the villages. He moved that they be thanked.

The CHAIRMAN, from the chair, proposed thanks to the Working Men's Committee for their generous cheques, amounting in all to £1,000, and said it was an excellent start. He said last year that somewhere about £1,000 should be obtained, and it had come, and would go towards helping them on the way in 1929. He spoke of the work in connection with 3,000 collection boxes, and it was no slight job for the Secretary, Mr. Clark. He referred also to the work of Mr. Dixon, who had made the arrangements for the concerts, and they were grateful to him.

Mr. A. L. COCHRANE seconded, and said the amount of money was tremendous, for most of it was brown money. It reflected credit on the comparatively small band of men who had set out to do this work.

The resolution was agreed to.

THANKS TO THE CHAIRMAN.

Mr. STANILAND proposed this resolution, and said that the best thanks was the splendid report which they had received that night.

Mr. WALKER seconded, and said they had had happy meetings.

The resolution was adopted, and Mr. EVERATT expressed his thanks, and said it had been pleasing work, though heavy, and he had enjoyed it. He thought they could congratulate themselves on the good results. He spoke of the prophecy of three years ago, and how the building had gone on, and was built, and was paid for, and they had got the income for the year. This, he thought, was a sufficient reply to their critics of three years ago, and they had got a Hospital which would be a lasting one, and very useful for the people of the district. The most pleasing thing was that they built it at a cost of £18,000, and they had got £2,000 for this year. They had practically raised £20,000, and there was no other town the size of Selby where the people were as keen as at Selby—wonderful in their generosity, and it was gratifying to be Chairman of that wonderful Institution, and to be in a position to say that "we owe no man anything." Mr. Everatt then spoke of the need of a small ward for children, and said that he should not be satisfied until one was built. It need not be an expensive one—it would be an extension in the region of the X-ray room, where they could build a place to take in eight or ten small cots. Concluding, he asked them to put their shoulders to the wheel, so that in the coming years their successors would say, "What a splendid War Memorial we have." (Hear, hear).

PRESENTATION TO MR. S. BRABBS.

The CHAIRMAN remarked, before the meeting separated, that there was one other little matter—it was to propose a vote of thanks to their Secretary, Mr. S. Brabbs, for his splendid work during 1928, and at the same time he (the speaker) wanted to explain that he was

appointed Hon. Secretary to the Building Fund, and carried on the work, and was still doing so as such. The Governors granted a donation of £50 for his services, but Mr. Brabbs kindly gave it back to the Hospital by buying £50 of War Loan, and the Governors felt that they would like to present him with a small token of their esteem and appreciation of his services, and he asked his acceptance of a gold wristlet watch, which bore the inscription: "Presented to S. Brabbs by the subscribers to the Selby War Memorial Hospital, 1928." He handed the gift over to the recipient.

Mr. BRABBS briefly returned thanks for the Chairman's remarks, and also for the handsome present. He had enjoyed the work.

THE ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE

Year ending 31st December, 1928.

In presenting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1928, the Governors of the Selby and District War Memorial Hospital and Brooke Dispensary are happy in congratulating all concerned upon the fact that the year's accounts show a credit balance of £32/17/2, which balance has been added to the deposit account.

In 1928, 702 patients received medical treatment at the Dispensary; 438 were also admitted to the Hospital, of whom 159 were men and 279 were women and children, there being an increase of 119 on the year 1927. The table of cases dealt with by the Medical and Surgical Staffs show the details of the principal operations, etc., during the period under review, which, it may be reiterated, "Includes many who may have been cured or relieved of some painful disease, which, but for the help of our Institution, must have had a fatal termination."

The seriousness in the nature of the cases dealt with has shown no deterioration (rather the reverse), whilst the influx of more and more motor vehicles on the main roads around Selby has resulted in a corresponding increase in road and street accident cases.

The Annual Subscriptions and Donations have yielded £936/2/3, an increase of £494/6/10 on the previous year.

The total income amounts to £2,353/15/4, and the total expenditure to £2,320/18/2, which shows the credit balance of £32/17/2, as stated in the first paragraph.

There has been no diminution in the gratitude of patients and their friends for the treatment rendered by all those concerned in the Hospital organisation, which gratitude has been demonstrated, not only by expression, but also by material donations as far as means allowed, all of which is highly gratifying to the Staff and to the Governors.

During the year the dark cloud of unemployment has, it is gratifying to note, been lightened to a considerable extent by trade revival in the town, and this has resulted in the Committee of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund being enabled to assist our common cause to an extent which the Governors regard with unstinted gratitude.

The Annual Hospital Sunday Fund Collections, which were taken in all our places of worship on 2nd December, when appropriate special services were held, yielded a handsome total of £49/12/11. To all the clergy and congregations, with those who similarly helped in the surrounding villages, the Governors tender their grateful thanks.

For the skill, the zeal, and the devotion displayed by the honorary Medical Staff and the Medical Officer to the sick and injured who came under their care during 1928, the Governors express their deep indebtedness, which indebtedness they ungrudgingly extend to the Matron, the Nurses, and the whole of the Hospital household, whose devotion to duty and the labour of love they have undertaken is beyond all praise.

For their manifold efforts in the raising of funds, the Governors express their best thanks to the organisers and artistes of the benefit concerts and other entertainments held during the year, to the donors of the many various spontaneous gifts, to those who made special Christmas presents, and to all who, however humbly, gave their mite to the noble cause.

The local Press, by its sympathetic reports and references, are also entitled to the best thanks of the Governors, which thanks are hereby heartily tendered.

Our War Memorial Hospital is now firmly established as one of the most important and essential local Institutions. It is regarded by people of every grade of society as being an indispensable adjunct to the well-being of the town and district in which they have a direct share and interest; the knowledge of this gives renewed confidence to the Governors in again appealing to one and all for their continued sympathy and practical help in this great and noble work of aiding the sick and suffering members of our community; all can help in one way or another, so this report and appeal cannot be more fittingly supplemented and closed than by quoting the comforting words of the Psalmist:—**Blessed be the man that provideth for the sick and needy: the Lord shall deliver him in the time of trouble."**
