

CONSULTANT MEDICAL STAFF.

Sincere thanks are offered to the members of the Consultant Medical Staff for the efficient service given to the patients during the year under review.

ORTHOPÆDIC SURGEON.

Mr. R. Guy Pulvertaft, M.A., M.B. (CAMB.), F.R.C.S.—Following upon his appointment as Director of the Accident and Orthopædic Service of the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary, Mr. Pulvertaft's resignation in the early part of the year from his office of Honorary Orthopædic Surgeon was accepted with great regret. It was agreed to place on record the Board's appreciation of the splendid service given to the Hospital during his 10 years' service, during which time he had built up a splendid reputation in his specialty.

Mr. David F. Thomas, M.B., B.CH., F.R.C.S.—Following discussions with the Grimsby and District General Hospital on the advisability or otherwise of appointing a successor to Mr. Pulvertaft who would jointly serve both Hospitals it was agreed to proceed to the appointment of a full-time Orthopædic Surgeon to this Hospital. Mr. Thomas was appointed to this post, commencing his duties in early June, since when his skill and courtesy has gained for him the esteem of his patients and colleagues.

MEDICAL STAFF.

Surgical Registrar—Mr. V. P. McAllister, M.B., B.CH., B.A.O., M.CH., F.R.C.S. (ED.) who commenced duties as Resident Surgical Officer early in the year was appointed to this newly created post in September.

Orthopædic Registrar—Dr. W. H. Oldershaw, M.B., CH.B., was recruited for Specialist service in H.M. Forces in July and in view of the appointment of a full-time Orthopædic Surgeon it was agreed that this post remain vacant for the time being.

Anæsthetics Registrar—Dr. W. N. Rollason, M.B., CH.B., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., D.A. commenced duties in this office in April. This branch of medical science is becoming of increasing importance and the Hospital is well served in this specialty.

RESIDENT MEDICAL STAFF.

The resident establishment of the Hospital was increased to seven during the year.

Dr. Paul Stryks, M.D. (VIENNA) was appointed full-time Casualty Officer commencing duty on 10th February, 1947.

Dr. M. Hillel, M.B., B.S., M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P. was appointed as Senior House Officer in succession to Mr. V. P. McAllister.

EAR, NOSE and THROAT DEPARTMENT.

Eighteen beds and cots for the reception of child patients requiring operative treatment for tonsils and adenoids were brought into use in April and good progress towards the reduction of the heavy waiting list was made until August, when a national epidemic of infantile paralysis resulted in admissions being discontinued. No further admissions were made until after the year end, during which period the waiting list again reached a high figure.

Treatment of the deaf and the prescribing of suitable hearing aids is a branch of work which has been developed and will be expanded as circumstances allow.

PSYCHIATRY.

Arrangements have been made with the County Council whereby the services of a Pyschiatrist will soon be available at the Hospital on one half-day session weekly or one day fortnightly.

SEPTIC HAND CLINIC.

A daily clinic (excluding Sundays) for the treatment of septic conditions of the hand was started in August, 1947 and has been well attended. This clinic is under the supervision of Mr. W. H. Bailey, F.R.C.S.

SECOND OPERATING THEATRE.

It is pleasing to report that work on this theatre was completed in December and the theatre brought into immediate service. Equipment, fixtures and furniture are of the most modern design and the suite is a decided acquisition to the Hospital services.

RADIOTHERAPY CENTRE.

The installation of the electric lift was commenced in December and completed in February, 1948, since when it has proved to be of great benefit. Work was also commenced on the provision of a workshop for the Physicists Department and it is hoped this will be completed in a few months' time.

KITCHEN.

A second battery of Esse Cookers was installed in the kitchen and the refrigeration equipment was duplicated, the improved services contributing greatly towards the efficiency of this department.

STAFF LOCATION SYSTEM.

A calling system of coloured lights (with warning buzzer) controlled by the telephonist, was introduced in August and has proved most efficient as a time saver, in particular to outside callers who wish to contact members of the medical staff.

ELECTRIC CLOCKS.

The provision of electric clocks in all the wards and certain departments and offices was completed during the year. Grateful thanks are expressed to the Scunthorpe and District Clubs' Association for the kindly offer to organise efforts towards the cost of installation.

WIRELESS.

The restoration of the wireless service within the Hospital is now complete and as many patients as possible provided with pillow phone receivers. The assistance given by the Scunthorpe Male Voice Choir towards meeting the cost of this work is greatly appreciated.

FILM PROJECTOR.

The decision of the House Committee to purchase a 16 m.m. film projector complete with sound equipment is one which should meet with approval. This equipment will be used for the entertainment of the patients and staff and for staff educational purposes.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE ACT, 1946.

It is gratifying to be able to report that Lord Quibell, President, and Dr. J. W. Brown, M.D., F.R.C.P., Honorary Physician, were appointed by the Minister to serve on the Sheffield Regional Hospital Board. This Board has met on many occasions to discuss the regional planning and provision of hospital services and the grouping of hospitals where necessary and it is of interest that in this area the War Memorial Hospital, the Maternity Home, the Infectious Diseases Hospital and the County Infirmary, Brigg, will form a group to be administered by the local Hospital Management Committee. No indication has yet been received relating to the appointment of this local Management Committee but it is considered advisable to repeat that this Committee will have the duty of controlling and managing the hospitals within the group. It will have corporate legal entity, be free to undertake medical research, be free to receive gifts, legacies and contributions and to apply them for the purposes for which they are given. It will also be able to appoint all staff except senior medical staff, who will be appointed by a Sub-Committee of the Regional Hospital Board and Management Committee. This reassurance that local Management is to be a feature of the new service will be welcomed by many friends of the hospital and the opportunity is taken here of asking that the generous measure of support which has always been afforded to the Board of Management in the past shall be given to the new Management Committee when the occasion demands.

BLOOD TRANSFUSION SERVICE.

Thanks are again expressed to the many volunteer donors throughout the hospital area for their contribution to this service, the demands on which have grown steadily during the past ten years. This is a service which depends entirely on the voluntary principle and the necessity of maintaining it at the highest level will be appreciated.

LADIES' LINEN GUILD AND LIBRARY SERVICE.

The report of work and statement of accounts shown on pages 54 and 55 give a precis summary of the work done during 1947. It is regretted that the services rendered by the Linen Guild over many years were curtailed during the year, but it is pleasing to record that the Library service for patients and staff is being maintained in a very efficient manner. The new quarters provided for the library have contributed largely to this end and have received high commendation from visiting officials of the British Red Cross and St. John Hospital Library organisation. The Board of Management is very appreciative of the voluntary service given by the members of the Linen Guild and Library and looks forward with confidence to a long and happy continuity of this association.

APPRECIATION OF SERVICES RENDERED.

NURSING STAFF.

Alderman O'Dowd, J.P., Chairman of the House Committee, welcomed Mrs. Hall and spoke with warm appreciation of her service to the hospital during her fourteen years as Matron. Mrs. Baxter, President of the Ladies' Linen Guild, gave a vote of thanks to Mrs. Hall and referred to the kindness, help and co-operation that had been given to the Linen Guild by Mrs. Hall during her matronship.

A full complement of Staff was maintained throughout the year, and it was also possible to recruit the extra staff needed for the additional Ear, Nose and Throat Ward opened in April and the Second Theatre opened in December.

A Hostel for Night Nurses was opened in Wells Street during April. The Staff are very grateful to the Board of Management for the amenities which have contributed much to the comfort of those resident at the Hostel. Despite restrictions, the Hostel is very well furnished and equipped with every comfort including "Deep Sleep" mattresses for all. The Senior Staff have bed-sitting rooms with Divans, electric clock and fire, etc. Owing to the fact that it has been impracticable to install central heating, fires were provided in the bedrooms during the winter. A 'bus service is provided to bring the Nurses to and from duty. A Resident Warden, who was a Social Welfare Officer for E.N.S.A. during the war, is in charge of day to day arrangements.

DOMESTIC STAFF.

The staffing position for Resident and Non-resident Staff is excellent, and a full complement has been maintained throughout the year.

The arrangements made for certain types of deaf patients to have the loan of hearing-aids have proved a great boon to many who have visited the Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic during 1947.

Following examination by the Specialist, audiometer tests are now carried out by a technician and the most suitable aid is then loaned to the patient free of charge for one week. Although many patients have passed through our hands only those who have satisfied the specialist that an aid would be beneficial are recommended to obtain one and during the year six patients have been given the joy of hearing again.

All patients in this category are recommended to attend lip-reading classes held at the Scunthorpe Evening Technical School and are told about the Hard-of-Hearing Club which has been formed in the town. This Club, as well as giving lip-reading practice, enables patients to enjoy social activities which otherwise they would avoid because of their disability.

DIABETICS.

These patients have again been helped in many ways and twenty-five new diabetics have been registered with the Diabetic Association.

RESETTLEMENT OF DISABLED PERSONS.

We place on record our appreciation of the services given by the Local Office of the Ministry of Labour through the Scheme for the Resettlement of Disabled Persons. Thirty patients have been registered under the Scheme, advice given and suitable employment found, where necessary. Additional to this, three patients have been supplied and fitted with artificial limbs.

It is also pleasing to record that the Ministry of Pensions has provided one of our ex-service patients with a hand-propelled chair.

DISTRICT NURSES.

Our thanks are due to the Scunthorpe District Nurses' Association for the help they have given by attending patients in their homes to do daily dressings, give insulin injections, and help in many other ways after discharge from Hospital. To these unfailing helpers we extend our warmest appreciation.

DIVERSIONAL THERAPY.

Our efforts with regard to diversional therapy have not been as successful as we would have liked during 1947. The reason for this being that it has been more difficult to obtain materials and the fact that Mrs. Beacock, our instructress, was for health reasons, unable to visit the Hospital during the latter part of the year. We hope, however, to have this in full swing again very shortly.

VOLUNTARY CAR SERVICE.

This service, organised under the auspices of the Red Cross, has given valuable help in the past twelve months.

We record our appreciation of the untiring efforts of Mrs. King, the local organiser, to make this service a success and to the drivers who have responded so generously to our many calls for assistance.

CANTEEN.

The Canteen has again proved to be a great boon to patients and visitors alike.

To give more regular service a full-time Canteen worker was appointed in June, 1947. During the year the total revenue amounted to £295/9/6; the profits will be passed on to the Samaritan Fund.

OUT-PATIENTS' HALL.

Efforts have been made to make the Out-Patients' Waiting Hall a little more attractive for those who have, of necessity, to wait at the various clinics. Small tables and a magazine stand have been provided by the Board of Management and Mr. A. A. Jones of Appleby very kindly presented us with ten shell ashtrays.

SAMARITAN FUND.

Considerable help has again been given to many patients through this Fund. £179/1/2 was spent on convalescent treatment, surgical appliances, transport, etc. for patients who were unable to meet these expenses themselves.

Three children were sent to a Convalescent Home in Bournemouth.

The income for the year amounted to £178/6/7, to which has to be added the further sum of £15/0/0 interest due on the investment of £500.

Although in July, 1948 our hospital will be taken over by the State under the National Health Service Act the Minister of Health has agreed that the Samaritan Fund shall remain untouched by the change over. As this Fund was raised for a specific purpose, the Minister, in making his decision has recognised the necessity of Almoners having money available to give immediate help to patients. This decision will undoubtedly prove advantageous to patients and will be warmly received by those who so kindly helped to establish the Fund.

The position being clarified we can now confidently ask our generous public to support this deserving medium of providing special assistance and after-care for necessitous patients.

## SCUNTHORPE AND DISTRICT WAR MEMORIAL HOSPITAL LADIES' LINEN GUILD.

#### 13th ANNUAL REPORT.

At a General Meeting of Members of the Guild held on February 4th, 1947, the following decisions were made:—

- In view of the coming State Control of Hospitals, the work of the Guild as a Gift Society to cease.
- The considerable amount of material in stock to be placed at the disposal
  of Matron. (The members of the Sewing Party expressed their willingness to continue making up this material, and mending, until such times
  as their services be no longer required).
- 3. The balance of the funds of the Guild to be used for the purchase of more linen, with the exception of £10, which was to be held in reserve for payment of repairs to the sewing machines should such be needed. Any balance from this £10 to be handed to the Library.
- 4. The Library for the Patients to continue to function under its separate Committee.

It is pleasing to note that in the Guild's 12 years of work, ending December 31st, 1946, no less than 16,700 articles of linen had been provided at a cost of over £4,400. This represents the entire replacement of worn linen from 1938 onwards, in addition to considerable contributions to the equipment of new wards.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

The year 1947 has been for the Library its most progressive year since its formation in 1937. For eleven years librarians have worked under great difficulties in a small room never intended to be used as a library. Wards were visited twice a week during all that time and as many as 51,000 books must have been given out to patients.

In 1947 the Library Committee were able to move the library into its new quarters, a big, well-equipped, well-lighted room in the basement of the hospital. Here for many months the helpers have been busy cleaning, repairing, classifying and cataloguing the books for re-distribution in the wards.

At their last General Meeting, the Linen Guild handed over their remaining assets to the Library, and Linen Guild members were asked to transfer their subscriptions to the Library Fund, as running expenses are fairly considerable; also there is a shortage of good modern books and with the present high price of books very few can be bought. 1947 ended with £24/15/5 in the Library Fund and the Committee are grateful to the members who have already transferred their subscriptions. They also appreciate the help and equipment provided by the hospital authorities which have greatly encouraged them in their work.

During 1947 the Library has become affiliated with the Red Cross and S. John Hospital Library and is thus able to obtain many advantages, such as materials for book-binding, repair materials, library trolleys, etc. The Librarian and two assistants have recently visited the London Headquarters for special training, so that now the Scunthorpe Hospital has three qualified Red Cross hospital librarians on its voluntary staff.
