

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of Governors and Subscribers was held at the Infirmary on Saturday, the 25th February, 1939, the President, the Right Hon. the Earl of Lichfield, presiding.

The notice convening the Meeting was read by the Secretary.

Reports of the General Committee together with the Auditor's Report and Statement of Accounts and the Almoner's Report were presented.

The President moved that the Reports and Accounts be adopted and circulated to the Subscribers as usual, and in doing so stated that up to a year ago he had always been able to say they had balanced their budget, but this year they had an adverse balance of £4,000. However, with the steps they were taking to meet the increased expenditure, he hoped very much that in a few years' time he would again be able to say that they had a balance on the right side.

This Annual Report was not the usual routine report, but contained two matters of great importance and progress in connection with the Infirmary. He referred to the opening of the new block and the launching of the contributory scheme. Before dealing with these two matters he would like to refer to some of the items of income and expenditure during the year and make comparisons with 1937.

From the balance-sheet for the past year they would see that receipts had increased by £1,570, which was most gratifying at a time when money was so tight and taxation so high. He hoped receipts in ordinary income would continue at that level, and he would like to make it clear that the inauguration of the contributory scheme did not mean that it was no longer necessary to organise whist drives, dances, and other efforts on behalf of the Infirmary. It was extremely necessary that those special efforts should continue owing to the Infirmary's having sold many securities, with a corresponding reduction in their income, while overhead charges had been increased. Unless everyone in the country districts continued to raise money, however small the amounts, the hospital would not be able to give as efficient a service to the public as it should. It was imperative that efforts should not be relaxed.

It was satisfactory to note that subscriptions had increased though donations were down, which was practically all due to the fact that the Carnival and Pageant Committee had not sent in their greatly appreciated cheque in time for it to be included in last year's accounts. This was received at the beginning of February, and amounted to £600. Donations for 1938 showed a decrease of £900. The amount received from the Hospital Saturday fund had increased by £1,300, but that was a fund which would gradually disappear now that there was a contributory scheme in operation. From

other contributory schemes they had received £106 less than the previous year. The increase of £1,030 in the income from paying patients was due almost entirely to the new private wards, and the only other matter to change in receipts was Bank interest, which had decreased by £119.

With but one exception, expenditure had increased under every head all increases being fairly substantial. Surgery and dispensary expenditure showed a small increase of £22, but domestic expenditure had increased by £950. The chief amount of increase was £456 on fuel, while water, gas and electricity accounted for another £446. Wages and salaries had shown a big increase of £1,960 due to the increased Nursing and Domestic Staff necessary for the new extensions. He remarked that they were being continually urged to increase the staff in order to bring in a 48-hour week, and that was a matter which would raise the question of permanent accommodation for the nurses. Increases in expenditure had also been shown in administration (£92), establishment (£328), and finance (£91).

Referring to the new extensions, Lord Lichfield said he could confidently say that despite the huge cost they now had a very fine addition to the hospital and a magnificent new wing, of which they could be justly proud. He hoped the public would make full use of the private patients' rooms which had been incorporated in the new building. They supplied a service that had long been needed in Stafford and district, and the governors would like to see them fully occupied as they should certainly produce a profit. Naturally, they were not anxious to see the private wards occupied from an illness point of view, but from the point of view of the hospital.

Out of the total income of £1,872 from paying patients last year, £1,608 was produced by the private wards in the new block, the daily average number of beds occupied up to the end of December being seven. The Board of Management and the staff believed that if the daily average were 10 the private wards would be self supporting. Up to the end of December the loss on these wards was £500. That was perhaps only natural since the wards would have to become known before they would be fully used. Since January there had been a daily average of 11 occupied beds, and if that figure could be maintained the wards would be completely self-supporting. The service in the wards was excellent, and the Board of Management had received many letters of thanks for the treatment received.

With regard to the contributory scheme, it was yet too early to say more than that those responsible for its working and organisation were well satisfied with the progress that had been made. Up to date about 17,000 persons had joined the scheme, the bulk of them coming from the factories and works in Stafford, while about 2,000 were from the country districts. The reason there were so few members from the districts was due to the fact that they had been unable to get the scheme properly launched into the country, but it was hoped to do so in the near future. There were many people such as shopkeepers, licensed victuallers, farmers, agricultural workers, and domestic servants who thought that because they were not employed in factories they were not able to join the association. He would point out that anyone whose income came within the prescribed limits could join the association, and that in the country districts they had honorary collectors who were prepared to give details to anyone interested in the scheme.

While the first intention of the scheme was to benefit the Infirmary, it was recognised that some members would require treatment at outside hospitals, and arrangements were being made whereby contributors would receive treatment at other hospitals without extra charge. "We give the scheme our blessing, but it will not be until the end of 1940 that we shall know what the full benefits of it are going to be."

His Lordship concluded by expressing thanks to all workers, the matron

(Miss E. Crawley), and her staff.

Mr. J. R. H. Laidler, chairman of the Board of Management, seconding the adoption of the reports, referred to the regrettable absence of Lady Lichfield, and said they deplored her prolonged and somewhat serious illness.

Reviewing the financial position of the hospital, he said they would see from the report that the number of patients had increased by approximately 25 per cent., while expenses had also increased by approximately the same percentage, which indicated that the hospital management had been as careful as in past years.

He emphasised the needs of the hospital, despite the assistance of the contributory scheme, and pointed out that even with the contributory scheme in operation, they would still require an income of £10,000 extra to that produced by the scheme in order to keep the hospital going, so that it was

essential that special efforts should still be made.

He appealed to Staffordians far and near to realise that this hospital, one of the oldest in the Country, needed their financial help, and now was the time to give it. The people were doing tremendously good work and putting their shoulders to the wheel, but he felt there were many Staffordians up and down the country who, if they knew the position, and the tremendous amount of useful work done, would help towards increasing the income from donations.

Mr. Laidler read a letter from Mr. G. H. Nelson, Chairman of the English Electric Company, in which he enclosed a cheque for £500 from the company. Mr. Laidler expressed appreciation of the assistance given. He said he hoped industrial economics would be so successful in the coming year that others

would be able to follow in the footsteps of this company.

Stating that they were very perturbed about the shortage of nurses, Mr. Laidler said it arose from many causes. A lot of people had the idea there was a lot of housemaids' work to do; they thought that the salaries were poor and the hours long; and, even if thinking these things true and they still had a desire to enter the nursing profession, many went to the larger hospitals. It did not follow that the biggest were the best, however, for the Staffordshire General Infirmary provided tuition in the training of nurses quite equal to any provincial hospital.

Apart from that, there is a much happier spirit in the institution than he had known exist during his fifteen years' association with it, and that again was reflected in the increased happiness of the patients. "Nurses are not housemaids," he emphasised. "We have an excellent domestic staff here."

As to the salaries and conditions of service, he pointed out that these were reasonably good, and were tending to improve. A nurse who commenced at 17 years received £25 in her first year, £30 in her sceond, £35 in her third, plus board residence, laundry and uniform material, and became a staff nurse at 21, when she received £65 to £75 a year. If she became a Sister, she received £80 to £100 a year, plus board and laundry. There was also a superannuation scheme, through the medium of which all staff nurses could participate and retire at 55 years on a pension of between £90 and £95 a year, or a lump sum of £1,000 or more. So it would be appreciated that conditions in the nursing profession were not as bad as some people believed them to be. He considered that there was every inducement for young people who considered that they had a flair for the nursing profession to come along and join a noble profession.

On behalf of the Management, he thanked everyone who had assisted

in the work.

The resolution was then put to the meeting and unanimously adopted.

AN EXCELLENT ATMOSPHERE.

Moving a vote of thanks to all who had in any way assisted the work of the institution during the year, the Mayor said the atmosphere of the Infirmary to-day was excellent, and the service being given was really magnificent. Miss Joyce seconded, and the vote was carried with acclamation.

Tribute to the very material help Lord Lichfield had been able to give the Institution during the year was paid by Mr. F. M. Bostock in proposing his re-election as president.

Mr. J. Salmon seconded, and the motion was carried unanimously.

On the motion of Mr. T. B. Steadman, seconded by Mr. J. Liversage, J.P., Major Moat was re-elected hon. treasurer.

On the proposition of the Deputy Mayor (Mr. Gordon Amies), seconded by Mr. T. Whitehouse, Mr. W. H. Westhead was re-elected hon. auditor.

Mr. Whitehouse took the opportunity of congratulating the Committee in recognising the enormous amount of voluntary work done by the honorary auditor by electing him a Vice-President of the Infirmary.

PRESENTATION OF AN "IRON LUNG."

The Deputy Mayoress (Mrs. F. G. Am'es) formally presented to the Institution the "iron lung" and oxygen tent purchased out of the fund she started during her year of office. It was a very happy day for her when she was able to obtain the amount required for an iron lung, she said. She paid a warm tribute to the people of Stafford and the surrounding district for their generosity, and to her personal friends, and said the fund grew beyond all her expectations so that it became possible to purchase not only an "iron lung" but an oxygen tent as well. She hoped that both would be of great use in the future. (Hear, hear.)

Formally accepting the gifts on behalf of the Infirmary, Lord Lichfield said he hoped it would never be necessary to use them, but no hospital was complete without such equipment. They were extremely grateful to Mrs. Amies for the way in which she undertook to raise the money. They all realised that she did it at a time when she was Mayoress, which meant that she was very much occupied with other public business. That made them all the more grateful to her. He added that both Coun. and Mrs. Amies had always had the welfare of the institution at heart, as they knew from the work the former had done as chairman of the Stafford Pageant and Carnival Committee. "I assure you that our thanks are very sincere for the great trouble you have been to in this matter," he added.

Dr. J. M. Holmes added his thanks on behalf of the honorary medical staff. He explained that the "iron lung" was known as the Drinker respirator, and its main purpose was to provide a method of giving prolonged artificial respiration. If necessary, it could be kept up for months, or even years—they would have read of the American boy who was brought back from China in one. The need for the apparatus was very limited—he had only known two cases requiring such apparatus in the three and a half years he had been associated with the institution—but when the need arose, having such apparatus at hand would prove of great help.

As to the types of cases that could be treated by the "iron lung," he mentioned cases of drowning and gassing. If such cases could be rushed to the institution in time, the apparatus might prove effective in resucitating them.

The apparatus itself, he added, was far better in construction than the "iron lungs" Lord Nuffield was giving to institutions. There had been a lot of criticism in the medical press that the Nuffield "iron lung" would not stand up to hard wear and tear because of its wooden construction. The "iron lung" the Stafford institution now had, however, was made of metal, and would last for very many years. He mentioned that the oxygen tent had been used eight times already.

A vote of thanks to the President for presiding concluded the meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT. 1938

- 1.—The General Committee have pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Seventy-third Annual Report, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts for the year 1938.
- 2.—The outstanding event of the year was the completion of the new extensions which have cost £32,571 12s. 0d. They were officially opened by the Right Hon. the Lord Horder, G.C.V.O., M.D., F.R.C.P., on Saturday the 7th May, 1938. The Ceremony was largely attended and from every point of view was a great success.

The extensions provide a complete and up-to-date X-Ray, Sunlight and Massage Department on the ground floor, with a large room under the Children's Ward for future extensions. This is at present being used as a recreation room for the Nursing Staff.

The first floor is divided into two wings; one comprises a Male Ward unit for 18 beds together with a two-bed side ward and the usual sanitary annexes, linen room, duty room and bathroom. In the other wing is the Children's ward unit, consisting of 14 beds with a two-bed Isolation ward attached. Conveniently situated between the two wings is a large ward kitchen to serve both the adult and children's ward. On the south and west elevation is a continuous sun balcony, cantilevered out from the main walls. This is protected throughout its full length with sun blinds, which may be folded back into the wall when not required.

The whole of the second floor is planned as a private patients' unit consisting of 14 separate wards, each fitted with built-in wardrobes, washbasins, a luminous call system by each bed and connection to the public telephone. All beds are provided with wireless with the exception of the children's ward where a loud speaker system is installed.

Special attention has been given to the installation of sterilizing equipment to each ward unit. The three floors are served by a bed lift and each duty room is connected by a private telephone with the main exchange.

The building is heated by means of low pressure hot water to provide a minimum in the wards of 65° when the temperature outside is at freezing point.

The comfort of the patients has been specially provided for by the installation of a Dunlopillo Mattress to each bed. This the Committee feel will be much appreciated by all who use them.

A new Casualty Department has also been provided by the vacated Children's Ward and this department is now capable of meeting any emergency.

At the Opening Ceremony advantage was taken to Dedicate four Cots, namely:—

The Harrowby Cot.
The Lotus Cot.
The George Elliott Cot.
The Eckersley Cot.

These Cots were presented to the President by :-

The Countess of Harrowby.
Miss Thomson.
Mr. R. W. Bowen.
Mr. J. Whitehouse.

After the President had accepted the gifts on behalf of the Infirmary they were Dedicated by the Chaplain, Rev. G. H. Maydew, to the Glory of God and for ever to be used for the needy sick of the Infirmary.

Following upon the Official Opening, the general public were invited to visit the new block and many parties of twenty or more were conducted over the building.

- 3.—With the completion of the new building additions to the Staff became necessary; the Honorary Medical Staff recommended that a third Resident Medical Officer should be engaged and this was done. Sisters, Nurses, X-Ray, Massage and Domestic Staff had to be secured and in addition a highly qualified working Engineer has been engaged.
- 4.—The extension made it necessary for the Kitchens to be enlarged and brought up to date. This much-needed improvement has been done; the walls of part of the corridor and the Kitchens have been tiled, new equipment has been purchased and our Kitchens are now worthy of the Institution.

Your Committee have also had the drive in front of the main building re-surfaced and this is a great improvement.

The cost of these improvements has been met from the Renewals Fund.

- 5.—Bearing in mind the deficiency in the 1937 accounts and the large additional expense now incurred, your Committee formed the opinion that it was absolutely necessary to inaugurate a Contributory Association without further delay. This was done in association with the Hospital Saturday Committee; the Governors unanimously approving of it at a Special Meeting held on the 22nd July, 1938. At the same time the Finance Committee were requested to consider the formation of a Subscription Scheme to secure Hospital treatment for those persons whose income is above that laid down in the Contributory Association. The first Executive Committee of the Association are:—The Chairman of the Board of Management, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Chairman of the Honorary Medical Staff, six members of the General Committee of the Association and three members of the General Committee of the Infirmary.
- Mr. C. Share has been appointed Organiser of the Association. It is anticipated that the Scheme will very considerably help in the present financial difficulties of our Infirmary.
- 6.—With the introduction of the Contributory Association it became necessary to revise the Rules of the Infirmary and this was done by the Governors at a Special Meeting held on the 16th December, 1938.
- 7.—The Committee deeply regret to report the loss the Infirmary has suffered by the death of Mrs. Ashworth, a valued member of the Board of Management, and Doctor A. E. Hodder, who was an Honorary Anæsthetist for 15 years and who had, so recently as 1937 been elected an Honorary Physician.

They also have to report the resignations (owing to their leaving the District) of Dr. G. R. S. Stewart, who for seven years was an Honorary Anæsthetist, and Dr. B. H. Shaw, Honorary Consulting Psychiatrist.

8.—The following appointments have been made, namely:-

Mr. B. S. Carter is the son of Mr. G. A. Carter, our Aural Surgeon.

9.—Miss C. M. Courtenay resigned her position as Matron at the end of March to take up an appointment as Matron of the West London Hospital.

Miss E. Crawley, D.N. (Leeds), late Assistant Matron at Chester Royal Infirmary, was appointed Matron and commenced duties at the beginning of April.

- 10.—The Rev. G. H. Maydew resigned his position as Chaplain, owing to his departure from the District, and the Rev. Spencer Cope has been appointed to the vacancy.
- 11.—For some time it has been felt that one member of the Honorary Medical Staff should be responsible for all the sick Staff at the Infirmary. Your Committee submitted the subject to the Honorary Medical Staff and in association with them Dr. J. Macdonald Holmes was invited to do this. Dr. Holmes consented to do so in an entirely Honorary capacity.
- 12.—The number of In-patients treated during the year was 2,484 against 2,003 in 1937, an increase of 481, the average length of stay was 15.94 days as compared with 16.79 days in 1937.

The average cost of each patient, less an estimated amount for Out-Patients and Casualties was £7 7s. 8d. as compared with £7 6s. 3d. in 1937.

The number of Patients admitted to the Wards resulting from Motor Accidents was 72 against 71. The cost of these patients was £576 5s. 6d. £234 1s. 1d. has been reclaimed under the Road Traffic Act. This includes £32 2s. 6d. Emergency Fees and £50 17s. 4d. in respect of Patients treated before the year under review. 116 Motor Cases were also treated in the Casualty Department as compared with 59 in 1937.

13.—The number of Out-Patients was 2,758 as against 2,618 in 1937, an increase of 140. The number of Patients examined in the X-Ray Department was 3,254 as against 2,860 the previous year, an increase of 394.

There were 10,178 treatments in the Massage and Electrical Department as against 8,554, an increase of 1,624, and 3,220 Ultra Violet Light Treatments as compared with 2,294, an increase of 926.

There were 1,036 attendances in the Orthoptic Department as compared with 1,209 in 1937, a decrease of 173.

14.—The ordinary income for the year was £15,405 17s. 3d. against £13,833 9s. 8d., an increase of £1,572 7s. 7d. It will be observed from the Accounts that the deficit is £4,040 3s. 11d., and in considering this, your Committee have to bear in mind that with the new block working for a full year, the deficit will be even greater and must be considered a very serious matter.

16.—The ordinary expenditure was £19,446 1s. 2d. against £15,345 5s. 10d., an increase of £4,100 15s. 4d.

17.—The extraordinary expenditure amounts to £700 11s. 6d. and includes additional alterations to property, Foregate Street, £130 9s. 0d., provision of

additional ventilators in the Operating Theatre, £58 9s. 3d., extending the roof light in the Operating Theatre, £181 9s. 6d., and the preliminary cost of setting up the Contributory Association, £330 3s. 9d.

- 18.—Hospital Saturday.—The amount received was £6,864 against £5,550 last year, an increase of £1,314. It is very gratifying to your Committee to notice that this Fund has continually shown increases since its reorganisation, and should form a very good nucleus for the Contributory Association.
- 19.—Hospital Sunday.—Contributions from the various places of Worship amount to £233 15s. 0d. as against £276 last year, a decrease of £42 5s. 0d. Your Committee have noticed that these contributions are falling off very considerably and desire to urge the Clergy to use their best endeavours in order to increase the Contributions from this source.
- 20.—Donations amount to £1,129 8s. 0d. against £2,052 7s. 11d. last year. It should be noted that nothing was received from the Pageant and Carnival Committee for 1938, apart from the collection made at the British Legion Rally and which was specially earmarked to go to the New Building Fund. The Committee desire to mention, however, that the sum of £600 was received early in February, 1939. They also desire to express their thanks to the Ex-Mayoress, Mrs. Gordon Amies, for the splendid effort she has made in securing an Iron Lung and Oxygen Tent for the Infirmary and for the work that Mr. and Mrs. Amies have done in connection with the Carnival and to the Committee generally.

Your Committee are most grateful to all who have arranged for efforts of any kind and trust that income from this source will continue.

I should like to express my gratitude, and I am sure that of the whole League, to Miss Crawley for her help and advice, and for the splendid way in which she has reorganised the administration, storage, and laundering of the linen in the Hospital.

AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR 1938

1, MARTIN STREET,

8th February, 1939.

To the Governors of the Staffordshire General Infirmary.

My Lords, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to report that I have examined the Books and Accounts of the Infirmary for the year ended 31st December, 1938.

The total cost of the New Block, including the alterations to the Casualty Ward and Ambulance entrance, and incidental works, amounted to £29,472 12s. 0d., of which £2,108 11s. 3d. remains to be paid. To meet this expenditure the Bank Account has been overdrawn, and as further investments are now being sold to pay this off, the dividend income will be still further decreased in future.

During the year the sum of £3,099 0s. 0d. has been spent on the equipment and furnishing of the new wing. As the Furniture and Equipment of the Hospital are not valued in the Balance Sheet, a corresponding amount has been deducted from the Capital Account.

Ordinary expenditure during the year amounted to £19,446 0s. 0d., an increase of £4,101 0s. 0d. above last year's figure; and ordinary income was £15,405, an increase of £1,572 0s. 0d.

The Infirmary's Contributory Scheme came into operation on 1st January, 1939, and it is to be hoped that the serious deficiencies which have been experienced in the past two years will not be continued.

I have pleasure in reporting that I find the books and accounts of the Infirmary to be very well kept, and that they have been submitted for audit in the usual careful and efficient manner.

All Convalescent cases sent away, and Surgical appliances supplied have been carried out with little or no cost to the Hospital. Particulars of expenditure and refunds appear in the Withering Samaritan Fund and Sir Smith Child's Fund balance sheets.




