



ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of Governors and Subscribers was held at the Infirmary on Saturday, the 24th February, 1940, the President, the Right Hon. the Earl of Lichfield, presiding.

The following ladies and gentlemen were present, namely:—The Right Hon. the Earl of Lichfield, His Worship the Mayor of Stafford (Councillor H. Joynes), Miss Cartwright, Mrs. Henn, Mrs. Phillimore, Mr. and Mrs. Williams, Messrs. F. M. Bostock, H. J. Bostock, S. Brocklehurst, T. Bromage, Rev. P. Buchan, Messrs. P. W. Dodd, W. Dibb, O. J. Finlow, W. H. Garbett, W. V. Hodgens, J. R. H. Laidler, Rev. L. Lambert, Messrs. A. F. Newbrook, W. Northwood, W. T. Parker, H. Poole, T. Raworth, J. T. Roberts, J. Salmon, C. H. Shardlow, H. E. Shaw, G. Smallshaw, G. T. Tinkler, P. E. Tomlinson, T. Whitehouse and A. E. Collins.

The notice convening the Meeting was read by the Secretary.

Reports of the General Committee together with the Auditor's Report and Statement of Accounts and the Almoner's Report were presented.

The President moved that the Reports and Accounts be adopted and circulated to the Subscribers as usual, and in doing so stated that the increase in income of £4,779 was not entirely due to the Contributory Scheme, although it was due to that scheme in great measure. "When we went into the Contributory Scheme," he said, "a lot of us, including myself, felt that we might lose a certain number of our annual subscribers. Well, so far not only have we not lost any, but the subscriptions have gone up by about £450. It is a very satisfactory start-off. I should explain that the increase in subscriptions is nearly entirely due to the magnificent donations we get from the chairman of directors of the English Electric Co. I can only say how grateful we are to him and his company for the way they support this hospital. I know from private letters how grateful the Company is for the treatment given to its employees at the Infirmary, and that it is only too glad to help in any way it can."

Lord Lichfield spoke of the increased income from paying patients and from motor claims, and in regard to the former said that the private wards were doing very well, and were very popular. They just about paid their way last year, the average daily number of patients being 9.65. There were fourteen rooms, and if they could get an average number of patients of twelve or thirteen, the private wards would more than pay their way. He commented that the charge for them was really very cheap.

Turning to the operations of the Hospital Saturday Committee up to the time of the commencement of the Contributory Scheme, Lord Lichfield said that it had kept on increasing the size of its contributions for many years, and the question had been asked whether it could not have increased its income to the level expected from the Contributory Scheme. The answer definitely was "No." The amount that the Hospital Saturday Fund had raised entirely by voluntary effort during the past seventeen years would only come to about the total which would be raised under the Contributory Scheme in five years. He did not think there was a hope that voluntary work could have brought in the income now needed to run the institution efficiently.

THE CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME GROUND WORK.

"I am, and I believe everybody else is, very pleased at the way the Contributory Scheme has worked so far," he went on. "As most of you know, the brunt of the work in the first place fell on Mr. Bostock as chairman of the Finance Committee. They did a tremendous amount of ground work, and got the fullest information they could before they drew up their scheme. Since then, the Executive Committee, many of the members of which were members of the Hospital Saturday Committee, under the leadership of Mr. W. V. Hodgens, has done a tremendous amount of hard work. I thank him and his committee for the work they have done. Mr. Hodgens went out of his way to get every detail about this scheme and find out the position and working of schemes in other towns, and I should like to congratulate him.

"During the time that the Hospital Saturday Committee functioned, I believe I am right in saying that its annual expenditure never exceeded about £12. Under the Contributory Scheme, the expenditure is considerably more, but that is inevitable. The Scheme brought in £9,000 last year, but that is not the whole amount collected. Besides that £9,000 there was an expenditure of £624, there is a balance at the bank of £543, and we paid to other Contributory Schemes a matter of £750. In total, the amount collected under the Scheme, therefore, was in the neighbourhood of £10,000. I think that if all goes well in the future we shall be able to get an income of about £12,000. There are still a great number of country districts which have not yet been explored, and this is a work for the future. I think we all agree that the Contributory Scheme's first year has been extremely satisfactory."

£55 A DAY.

In seconding the adoption of the report and accounts, Mr. J. R. H. Laidler, J.P., chairman of the Board of Management, paid a warm tribute to the practical interest taken by Lord and Lady Lichfield in the welfare of the Infirmary, and went on to say that during the past year the Institution had made progress in several interesting directions. It had had, for instance, a very low death rate—out of every hundred patients who went in for medical or surgical treatment, about 94 came out fit and well. That was a very remarkable record indeed. The stay of patients had decreased by an average of about half a day, and more money was being received under the Road Traffic Act than hitherto.

Mr. Laidler alluded to the fact that the Institution had reached the proud position of being 175 years old, and in discussing the finances, said that its expenditure last year of about £20,000 did not seem very large. It was seen in its right perspective, however, when one found that the Institution was costing £55 every day, seven days a week. That the money was forthcoming to keep the Institution running spoke volumes for the interest taken in it by the people of the district. The Institution was still run democratically, he said. It was owned by the people who kept it going, and it was run on their behalf.

With regard to finance generally, he said he was sorry to notice, in connection with the Hospital Sunday effort, that out of about eighty-eight churches mentioned, twenty-four had "nil" against their names. It seemed a great pity because even a small donation from each would be a help to the Institution. It did not seem fashionable for people to go to church nowadays, and he deplored the fact.

A CLASS I. INSTITUTION.

Mr. Laidler commenting on the Government Emergency Hospital Scheme, stated that the £3,452 they had received was for the provision of certain services in the event of casualties occurring. The hospital, he said, was graded Class 1, and under the scheme would provide 330 beds. In addition, they had the offer of Ingestre Hall, the beautiful home of the Earl and Countess of Shrewsbury, as an annexe. They all sincerely hoped that these services would never be needed.

In conclusion, the speaker paid a warm tribute to the staff for the efficient manner they had carried out the various duties allotted to them.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

The thanks of the governors to all who had assisted the work of the Institution during the year were proposed by the Mayor (Coun. H. Joynes), who said he was proud of the continued progress of the Infirmary, and of the fine nursing staff who ministered to the patients.

The Rev. Peter Buchan seconded, and spoke of the loyalty and devotion of those who worked in the hospital, and of the amazing amount of time given to the welfare of the Institution by many hundreds of ladies and gentlemen. He confessed that what he had seen in the Institution, and of the work done on its behalf had impressed him tremendously, and gave him great hope for the future of mankind.

The vote was carried with acclamation.

Lord Lichfield was re-elected President on the motion of Mr. F. M. Bostock, who eulogised his practical interest in the Institution, and said he had been particularly helpful in getting the Contributory Scheme going.

Lord Lichfield assured the meeting that he would continue to do his best for the Infirmary.

Major W. Moat was re-elected hon. treasurer, and Mr. W. H. Westhead, hon. auditor.

Mr. Laidler mentioned that he had received a letter from Mr. W. Peach, J.P., in the following terms: "Please enter an apology for my absence from the meeting. Old age and infirmity, combined with acute and continuous pain from neuritis, prevents my attendance. I am 85 next April, and am realising that 'I have had my day altho' I have not ceased to be.'

"Although absent in body, I shall be with you in spirit. My interest in the welfare and progress of the Infirmary is unabating, and will never cease.

"To a great extent I live in the past. I have many happy memories of byegone days, but none of them are more gratifying and interesting than the many years I was actively associated with our Infirmary.

"To-day the Institution bears the mark of progress, efficiency and good prospects for the future.

"In conclusion, he expressed his sincere congratulations and kind regards to all who have helped, from the President, Lord Lichfield, and his good wife, Lady Lichfield, down to the men and women who have played their part in the Pageant, contributory scheme, and other splendid efforts. I would ask them to 'take off their hats to the past, and take off their pats to the future!' They form a union of those who love, for the help of those who suffer. More power to their elbow.

"To all workers and friends of the Infirmary I send pleasant thoughts of the past, kind greetings for the present, and every good wish for the future."

P.S.—I have been reminded by one of my valued friends that if I am alive on November 9th this year I shall reach the jubilee (50 years) of my election as Mayor of Stafford in 1890, which (he thinks) will be a remarkable and, possibly, a unique event in the annals of the borough.

On the motion of Mr. W. V. Hodgens, it was agreed that a letter be sent to Mr. Peach expressing the meeting's appreciation of his good wishes, and reciprocating them.

The Meeting then resolved itself into a Special Meeting for the purpose of receiving a recommendation from the General Committee that the second paragraph in Rule 29 be deleted and that the following be substituted, viz.:—

"All Legacies shall be paid into the Capital Account and invested."

The recommendation was unanimously approved and adopted.

On the proposition of Mr. H. J. Bostock, a hearty vote of thanks to the President for presiding concluded the Meeting.

The Governors were afterwards shown a Film which had been specially prepared, showing the Infirmary's activities and introducing the benefit to be derived by joining the Contributory Association.

ANNUAL REPORT, 1939

- 1.—The General Committee have pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Seventy-fourth Annual Report, together with the Audited Statement of Accounts for the year 1939.
- 2.—The number of In-Patients treated during the year was 2,467 against 2,484 in 1938, a decrease of 17: the average length of stay was 15.39 days as compared with 15.94 days in 1938.

The average cost of each patient, less an estimated amount for Out-Patients and Casualties was £7 18s. 0½d. as compared with £7 7s. 8d. in 1938.

The number of Patients admitted to the Wards resulting from Motor Accidents was 98 against 72. The cost of these patients was £739 17s. 4d. £503 8s. 6d. has been re-claimed under the Road Traffic Act. This includes £61 5s. 6d. Emergency Fees and £116 12s. 2d. in respect of Patients treated before the year under review. 117 Motor Cases were also treated in the Casualty Department as compared with 116 in 1938.

3.—The number of Out-Patients was 2,307 against 2,758 in 1938, a decrease of 451. This no doubt may be attributed to the Emergency. The number of Patients examined in the X-Ray Department was 3,304 as against 3,254 the previous year, an increase of 50.

There were 14,845 treatments in the Massage and Electrical Department as against 10,178, an increase of 4,667, and 2,535 Ultra Violet Light Treatments as compared with 3,220, a decrease of 685.

There were 1,276 attendances in the Orthoptic Department as compared with 1,036, an increase of 240.

- 274 Cases were treated at the Fracture Clinic since its inception in August.
- 4.—The ordinary income for the year was £20,185 11s. 7d. against £15,405 17s. 3d., an increase of £4,779 14s. 4d. In addition to this £3,452 was received from the Government Emergency Hospital Scheme, towards the cost of Casualty Service due to the War.

- 6.—The ordinary expenditure was £20,274 18s. 8d. against £19,446 1s. 2d., an increase of £828 17s. 6d.
- 7.—The extraordinary expenditure amounts to £879 4s. 1d. This includes purchase of an Electro-cardiagraph, £132; Sandbagging, etc., for Air Raid Precautions, £96 15s. 11d. (attention should here be called to the fact that all Labour in connection with the sandbagging was done voluntarily by our own Staff and a body of helpers who worked unceasingly for several days when war broke out); Installation of Heating Apparatus in the Houses adjoining the Infirmary, £83 10s. 0d.; Oswestry Orthopædic Hospital in respect of services to a Patient, £68 10s. 0d.; Additional Preliminary Expenses in connection with the Contributory Association, £43 3s. 11d.; Loss on Sale of Investments, £455 4s. 3d.
- 8.—Hospital Saturday.—The amount received this year is £832 3s. 11d., of which £269 12s. 3d. was the result of the Alexandra Rose Day Effort for Stafford and District, organised by the Office Staff.

This is the last occasion on which income will be received fro the Hospital Saturday Fund, as it is now incorporated in the newly-timed Contributory Association, and has acted as an excellent nucleus for the same. Since its inception in 1873 £68,284 183. 11d. has been handed over to the funds of the Infirmary. Of this, £51,533 was received since its reorganisation in 1922.

- 9.—Contributory Association.—The amount received from the Contributory Association during the first year of its existence was £9,000, which your Committee feel is an excellent result, and they desire to pay tribute to all the workers in connection with this organisation.
- 10.—Hospital Sunday.—Contributions from this source have again shown a considerable reduction and £152 was received as against £233 15s. 0d. last year, a decrease of £81 15s. 0d. Following as it does on a decrease of £42 5s. 0d. the previous year is unfortunate. Your Committee do appreciate the efforts of those Clergy and Ministers who have advocated the needs of the Infirmary in their respective places of Worship, and although the income from this source is considerably less than formerly, we rely on those concerned to do their best for us.
- 11.—Donations.—These amount to £1,474 7s. 11d. against £1,129 8s. 0d. last year. They include £580 from the Pageant and Carnival Committee as a result of their 1938 effort (it should be here stated that £500 was received in January, 1940, in respect of their efforts for 1939), £115 was received as the result of the County Ball per Miss Parker-Jervis, £100 from the High Sheriff (R. Copeland, Esq.), £80 10s. 0d. from the Mayoress of Stafford (Mrs. Joynes) as a result of a Flag Day organised on behalf of the Fracture Clinic.

Your Committee are most grateful to all these donors and to all who have kindly arranged efforts of any kind during the year.

- 12.—The Country Districts Penny Fund is another of those regular sources of income which will disappear from future accounts of the Infirmary. In the present Accounts £124 0s. 10d. is shown, and the Committee accord a special word of thanks to all the ladies who have done so much for this Fund for so many years.
- 13.—The Ladies' Linen League have again had a successful year and have collected £236 1s. 7d. Of this amount £191 10s. 9d. was spent in the purchase of Linen and £21 9s. 8d. in providing Italian Cloth in order to help with the Black-Out.

The President, the Countess of Lichfield, has asked all the Branches to do their utmost to keep up the activities of the League in order to meet all demands that may be made upon it.

Your Committee much appreciate the efforts of the League and hope that the President's Appeal will be complied with.

- 14.—Contributions in respect of Patients amount to £4,575 17s. 4d., an increase of £1,396 0s. 3d.; paying patients being responsible for £2,857 1s. 2d. This is an increase of £984 6s. 11d. on the previous year's figures.
- 15.—Dividends and Interest amount to £1,407 14s. 4d. which is the lowest since 1912 and is accounted for by the sale of so much Capital for the Extensions.
- 16.—Renewals Account.—During the year decorations were carried out in the Nurses' Home at a cost of £297 10s. 0d. Kitchen extensions were completed and the balance of £307 0s. 5d. paid. A new oak floor in "B" Ward was provided at a cost of £107 3s. 9d.; re-decorating "B" and "D" Wards, House Surgeon's Room, Laboratory, etc., and cleaning in other Wards cost £270 3s. 5d., and Fire Alarms were renewed at a cost of £59 12s. 6d.

- The Committee deeply regret to report the death of two of the Constant Staff, Mr. Herbert Marson who was for many years a member of the Honorary Surgical Staff of the Infirmary, and Dr. J. D. Davies, who held the position of Honorary Anæsthetist for a period of 14 years.
- 18.—Mr. C. S. Walker, F.R.C.S.E., of Stoke, was appointed Fracture Surgeon. The Clinic was opened in August and is doing exceedingly good work.
- 19.—War Emergency.—Dr. J. MacDonald Holmes, Dr. W. J. McIntosh, and Mr. A. Wynn Green have been called up for Military Duties, and a Sub-Committee has been set up to deal with all Emergency appointments to the Honorary Medical Staff during the period of War. A Regulation was also approved, giving power for temporary appointments to be made to the Honorary Medical Staff of persons holding qualifications other than those provided in the rules.

Doctor Evelyn Campbell was invited to carry on the work of Mr. A. Wynn Green during the Emergency and this she very kindly consented to do. No further appointments have been made.

Under the Emergency Hospital Scheme our Infirmary is designated a 'Class I.' Hospital, able to accommodate 330 patients. The Out-Patients' Department will be used as a First Aid Post.

By kind permission of the Earl and Countess of Shrewsbury and with the approval of the Ministry, Ingestre Hall will be used as an annexe to the Infirmary should the need arise.

- 20.—On the strong recommendation of Mr. Wynn Green your Committee decided to appoint a dispensing Optician to the Infirmary. The position was advertised and Messrs. Rayner were appointed.
- 21.—The gift of an Iron Lung and Oxygen Tent was made by the Deputy Mayoress (Mrs. Gordon Amies), the money for this having been subscribed by friends of the Infirmary in Stafford and District.

Advantage was taken at the Annual General Meeting for the presentation of these gifts and a full Report of the proceedings was included in the last Annual Report.

- 22.—Vice-President.—During the year Mr. W. H. Westhead was elected a Vice-President of the Infirmary in recognition of his valuable work as Honorary Auditor.
- 23.—Life Governors.—During the year Mr. C. Harper and Mr. J. Machin were elected Life Governors of the Infirmary on the nomination of the Pageant and Carnival Committee.
- 24.—The Rev. Spencer Cope, M.A., resigned from the position of Chaplain and the Rev. Leslie H. Morgan, M.A., Vicar of St. Paul's, Stafford, was appointed to the vacancy.
- 25.—Considerable time has been given to the question of an extended Benefit Scheme for persons whose Income is beyond that laid down in the Rules of the Contributory Association but in view of the present National Emergency it has been decided to continue the present arrangement for a further period of twelve months.

AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR 1939

1, MARTIN STREET,

To the Governors of the Staffordshire General Infirmary.

MY LORDS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to report that I have examined the Books and Accounts of the Infirmary for the year ended 31st December, 1939.

Further Donations amounting to £56 0s. 11d. were received during the year for the new Building Fund, and these have been added to the General Capital Account.

The Ordinary Expenditure for the year amounted to £20,275, being £809 greater than last year.

The Income amounted this year to £23,637, an increase of £8,232, the surplus Income over total Expenditure being £2,483.

It will be seen that the amount received from the Contributory Association during the year is £9,000. In addition a sum of £236 15s. 6d. was received in respect of members occupying private wards. It is probable that the future annual income from this source, even assuming no further increase in membership, will be greater than the amount received during the year under review, owing to the fact that in many cases the contributions collected from the Employers are one quarter in arrear, and thus the Contributory Association has only received three quarters' income in these cases.

In view of the fact that this year's accounts show a surplus, and that the income from the Contributory Association is likely to increase, it appears appropriate at this juncture, to suggest that in future all Legacies received should be treated as capital receipts and invested, instead of being treated as income of the year in which they are received. This procedure, I think, carries out the spirit of Section 29 of the Infirmary Rules. It will also have the effect, over a period of years, of replacing the investments which were sold in order to meet the expenditure on the new building, and eventually restore, and perhaps increase the Infirmary's Dividend Income. The Legacies received during the year ended 31st December, 1939, have been treated in this manner, and are now held on deposit with Lloyds Bank, Limited, pending investment. There is also on deposit with Lloyds Bank, Limited, a sum of £2,000 representing monies received during 1938 in respect of Endowment of Cots and Beds, and it is suggested that these monies should now be specifically invested.

I have pleasure in reporting that I find the books and accounts of the Infirmary very well kept, and that they have been submitted for audit in the usual careful and efficient manner.





FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

The Executive Council has pleasure in presenting the first Annual Report together with the Audited Statement of Accounts for the year 1939.

- 1.—As governors of one of the oldest voluntary hospitals in the provinces it was perhaps natural that the governors of the Staffordshire General Infirmary should be loath to depart from the voluntary principle which had served so well for over 170 years. However, the adoption of contributory schemes by neighbouring hospitals tended to limit voluntary donations to our own Infirmary, the recent extension of which was demanding a considerable increase in income. It became clear that it was to the work-people of the district that the hospital must look for further support; consequently at a special meeting of the governors on July 22nd, 1938, it was decided that a contributory scheme should be brought into force on January 1st, 1939.
- 2.—The governors entrusted the preliminary arrangements to the Finance Committee and Mr. A. E. Collins, Secretary of the Infirmary, was appointed Honorary Secretary of the scheme. It was decided to obtain an Organiser with previous experience of a contributory association, and Mr. C. F. Share, formerly Contributory Scheme Officer to the Worcester Royal Infirmary, took up his duties on October 1st, 1938.
- 3.—The constitution and rules of the new association were drawn up by the Finance Committee and approved by the General Committee of the Infirmary. It was then emphasised that the rules might require amendment in the light of experience. This has proved to be the case and certain amendments are being submitted to you.
- 4.—The rules of the association provide that the executive management of the association shall be entrusted to an Executive Council, consisting of twelve members, as follows:—
 - (a) The Chairman of the Board of Management and the Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Staffordshire General Infirmary.
 - (b) The Chairman of the Honorary Medical Staff of the Staffordshire General Infirmary.
 - (c) Six members of the General Committee of the Association appointed at the Annual Meeting.
 - (d) Three members of the General Committee of the Staffordshire General Infirmary appointed by such Committee.

It was arranged that the Hospital Saturday Committee should appoint six members to serve on the Executive Council pending the first annual meeting of the new association and the following were appointed:—Miss Cartwright Messrs. H. Poole, G. Smallshaw, S. Jones, S. Brocklehurst and J. T. Roberts. Representatives appointed by the General Committee of the Infirmary were Mrs. Henn, Mr. W. V. Hodgens and Mr. H. E. Shaw. The Executive Council so formed, together with the Chairman of the Board of Management, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, and the Chairman of the Honorary Medical Staff of the Infirmary, held its first meeting on the 18th October, 1938. Up to the 31st December, 1939, the Executive Council has met on eighteen occasions.

5.—The first year of any organisation is necessarily a trying one with man unforeseen problems and difficulties. It has been so with our contributory association, but the Executive Council is of the opinion that the position generally is satisfactory, membership on the 31st December, 1939, being as follows:—

The Executive Council desires to express its gratitude to everyone who has in any way contributed to the success of the scheme, and in particular to employers, delegates and to the voluntary collectors in country districts.

- 6.—The formation of ward committees in Stafford presented some difficulty and just at the time when it was thought that the difficulties had been overcome, war was declared. The Executive Council has abandoned the proposal for the moment, but it is hoped that every member of the General Committee will do his utmost to obtain new subscribers.
- 7.—During the year the Executive Council has endeavoured by all possible means to advertise the value of membership of the association. A film has been prepared showing the services which our Infirmary renders to the public, and arrangements are being made for it to be shown throughout the district. The Executive Council tenders its sincere thanks to Mr. S. G. Dix and Mr. F. A. Young who have made the film.
- 8.—Since the welfare of the patient is the final objective, it is essential that there shall be close and harmonious working arrangements between all hospitals and contributory schemes. The friendly spirit which exists between our association, neighbouring hospitals and other contributory schemes is therefore a matter for deep gratification and moreover is of inestimable value in preventing friction in overlapping areas. In Eccleshall, where the North Staffordshire Voluntary Hospitals Contributory Association had been operating for some twelve months prior to the introduction of our own scheme, a Joint Committee has been formed. The membership cards of contributors contain the names of both organisations and the money collected is divided in direct proportion to the amount of work done by each hospital. Avoiding duplication of effort, the Eccleshall Joint Committee made remarkable progress and the arrangement is working satisfactorily. Reciprocal arrangements have been made with contributory schemes all over the country, in the endeavour to secure that wherever a contributor or his dependents may be they shall be cared for, should the necessity arise, at the nearest hospital without cost to themselves. During the year our contributors have been treated at hospitals as far removed from Stafford as London, Liverpool and Dumfries.
- 9.—The Council recognised early that the friendly co-operation of the Rugeley District Hospital and the Annabelle Lady Boughey Cottage Hospital, Newport, was desirable in the best interests of contributors. It is therefore gratifying to record an arrangement with the governors of the Rugeley District Hospital whereby persons in that area shall join our association and, in case of need, receive treatment at the Rugeley Hospital, the association making payments in respect of the treatment at agreed rates. The Executive Council desires to express its appreciation of the manner in which the governors of the Rugeley District Hospital have co-operated in what may be considered a joint scheme. It has not yet been found possible to complete as close an arrangement with the Annabelle Lady Boughey Cottage Hospital, Newport, but of course our contributors can receive treatment at that hospital without expense to themselves.

- 10.—The Wolverhampton Eye Infirmary is one of the very few hospitals not now associated with a contributory scheme. Since many patient from Stafford are compelled to attend there for special treatment, it was essential that an arrangement should be made which would enable our contributors to do so free of charge. The Executive Council was anxious that any arrangement should be satisfactory to all interested parties and realised that the Wolverhampton Eye Infirmary had received considerable financial support in the past from workpeople in this district. It was therefore agreed that a subscription of 200 guineas should be made to the Eye Infirmary for the first year, during which time a record would be kept of the numbers of contributors treated at Wolverhampton, and future annual subscriptions based accordingly.
- 11.—Should a contributor prefer to be treated in the private wards of our own hospital, arrangements have been made for him to do so at a charge of three guineas per week instead of the usual five guineas per week. Medical fees, in such cases are a matter of private arrangement between the patient and the physician or surgeon concerned.
- 12.—Arrangements have been made with the Staffordshire County Council, the Shropshire County Council and the County Borough of Wolverhampton, whereby our contributors admitted to hospitals under the control of those authorities will be exempt from any charge, the contributory association undertaking payment at an agreed rate.
- 12.—The British Hospitals Contributory Schemes Association was founded in 1930 to co-ordinate contributory schemes throughout the country. It is pleasing to record that our association has now been admitted to associate membership.

Common problems occasioned by the outbreak of war are being considered by the British Hospitals Contributory Schemes Association, which has recommended that the dependents of a contributor serving with H.M. Forces shall remain entitled to the full benefits of contributory schemes provided that the contributor is in receipt of service pay only. This recommendation has been accepted by your Executive Council and has been communicated to all employers and honorary secretaries concerned.

- 14.—The Audited Statement of Accounts for the year 1939 is attached and calls for little comment. It should be remembered, however, that many firms forward contributions quarterly in arrear, and that our accounts for the year were closed on December 31st last. Consequently in the case of many firms contributions for the last quarter of the year are not included in the statement. Such sums will be included in the accounts for the current year.
- 15.—It is intended to embody this report and the statement of accounts in the Annual Report of the Staffordshire General Infirmary, and to publish therein a detailed list of contributions received between January 1st and December 31st, 1939, from the various firms and district committees incorporated in the scheme.
