#### Convalescent Patients.

Through the medium of the Cotton Districts Convalescent Fund 13 patients have been sent to Convalescent Homes. Seven were assisted by the Satterfield Charity.

#### Private Patients.

214 private patients were admitted to the 14 beds set aside as Paying Wards, compared with 127 in 1943.

#### District Nurses.

The Board is much indebted to the Manchester and Salford District Nursing Institution for valuable assistance rendered in making 114 visits to patients in their own homes.

#### Traffic Accidents.

63 patients were treated as a result of traffic accidents compared with 82 in the previous year. £40 7s. 5d. has been recovered towards the cost of treatment under this heading.

#### Income and Expenditure.

Total ordinary income including legacies received free of any condition amounted to £72,313 against £63,903 in the previous year, an increase of £8,410.

The total expenditure amounted to £79,862 against £65,803, an increase of £12,959 or 19.7%. This is in large measure due to higher rates of salaries and wages, and the extra cost of maintaining service patients since D-Day.

The Motorists Association has been working enthusiastically towards the endowment of a Motorists' Bed, and it is gratifying to report that they have almost reached their objective.

#### Hospital Saturday Fund.

£15,292 has been received during the year from the Hospital Saturday Fund and the Board is deeply grateful for this most valuable support. The amount represents a decrease of £1,000 compared with the previous year, due in some measure to a lesser number of members admitted as a result of fewer civilian beds being available for half of the year.

The value of the services rendered to the voluntary hospitals throughout the country by contributory schemes is of a very high order. Apart from the total income they collect (over ten million pounds annually) they provide an excellent outlet for voluntary effort. It is greatly to be hoped that means may be found whereby their continuance in the new Health Service is assured.

#### Adelphi Lads Club.

The work of Rehabilitation referred to in the last Annual Report has grown considerably and has necessitated the use of larger premises. The Adelphi Lads Club has kindly come to the Hospital's assistance, and their excellent gymnasium and the adjoining rooms are now in full use throughout the week. The benefit to patients

cannot be over-emphasized for the period of incapacity has been greatly shortened. What is equally important is that the patient's regular pre-occupation in getting fit has done much to counteract the inevitable boredom associated with convalescence.

#### Sunday Entertainments Tax.

The Board wishes to thank the Salford City Council for their allocation of £836 14s. 6d. from the amounts transferred in respect of Sunday Entertainments in city cinemas. The amount received under this heading in 1943 was £561 3s. 0d.

#### Post Graduate Education.

The report of the Inter-Departmental Committee on Medical Schools under the Chairmanship of Sir William Goodenough draws attention to the need for a comprehensive system of post graduate medical education: "Every doctor in the country should have opportunities for keeping in touch with the progress of medical science and of advancing his knowledge beyond the extent to which it is enlarged by the experience of his daily work." Two main types of teaching are contemplated, one for the practitioner intending to specialise in one or other of the many branches of medicine, and the second, for the general practitioner who, by reason of his war service or other causes, has been deprived of contact with the needs of the civilian population.

Salford Royal Hospital has been invited by the Victoria University of Manchester to take part in this work and Dr. G. J. Langley has been appointed Dean of Post Graduate Education. Shortage of accommodation is a serious difficulty, though a plan for the provision of temporary premises is at present under consideration by the Ministry of Health. It is hoped that before the next report appears substantial progress will have been made.

#### Industrial Medicine.

The University has instituted a Chair of Industrial Health, the first in the country, and the Board is pleased to report that Dr. R. E. Lane has been appointed to the Chair of the Department. Dr. Lane's work in the study and development of industrial health is outstanding, and his exceptionally wide experience of the problems of health in local industries will undoubtedly do much to ensure a wise and experienced leadership.

The Board wishes to congratulate Dr. Langley and Dr. Lane on their respective appointments and looks forward with confidence to the future with its rich promise of achievements in both these important fields of service.

#### Honorary Staff: Dr. J. L. Burn.

The Board is pleased to report that Dr. J. L. Burn, Medical Officer of Health, has accepted the office of Honorary Consultant Adviser in Hygiene. The Board welcomes this valuable link with the Public Health Sercice of the city and looks forward to a happy and profitable association with Dr. Burn.

#### School of Physiotherapy.

Miss E. S. Curtis has resigned her appointment as Principal of the School of Physiotherapy. The Board appreciates the excellent work which Miss Curtis did for the School during her 15 years as Principal, when a high standard of efficiency was reached. Miss A. Bodoano, who comes with wide experience, has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

#### National Health Service.

Discussions and criticisms of the Government's proposed new National Health Service have been going on in all parts of the country throughout the year. This is excellent in itself because the need for a health service formulated on the best possible lines is one which concerns vitally every man, woman and child. The importance of the function of the voluntary hospital in such a service cannot be overestimated or too widely appreciated.

A point which seems hardly to have received attention is the contribution which the voluntary hospitals will themselves make in the shape of their buildings and other physical assets (estimated to exceed thirty million pounds) as well as the incalculable value of the experience and skill of their staffs.

#### Almoner and Social Service Department.

The degree to which the patient's social environment and heredity affect his health is being more and more recognised by the medical profession. The patient's illness may be due to conditions of occupation or recreation; his recovery will certainly depend upon his mental attitude whilst in hospital, and his convalescence will be affected by the suitability of his social environment and the degree

to which he is able to adjust himself to new, and maybe vastly changed circumstances of life and work. All these things are the concern of the Almoner who has received a special training to equip her to work in co-operation with the doctor and to maintain a link with the patient after leaving the hospital.

The Board has decided to appoint an Almoner trained by the Institute of Hospital Almoners to undertake this important work.

#### Out-Patient Department.

With a desire to minimize the waiting time spent by patients in the Out-Patient Department, a scheme of appointments for all out-patients on their second and subsequent attendances has been adopted. The Board would have been glad to institute a more complete scheme to include also new patients on their first attendance, but this is not possible without adding materially to the burdens of the already overworked general practitioner. It is to be hoped that the present modified arrangement will result in eliminating unavoidable waiting.

#### Service Patients.

Since the invasion of Europe, the Board has provided 150 beds for wounded service patients and up to the end of the year 649 British and Allied servicemen and 50 P.O.W. have been admitted. The high courage and cheerfulness of our men is something which has to be seen to be believed. It is almost equalled by the warmhearted generosity and practical sympathy of the public.

One of the happiest features of the six months' experience has been the highly satisfactory standard of medical work performed in the advanced areas near the battle front with consequent excellent results to the men.

In order to minimize as far as possible interference with the accommodation available for the civilian population, the Board has been forced to increase the total number of beds to 300, equally divided between military and civilian patients, by inclusion of a greater number in each ward than is normally considered desirable by peacetime standards. In spite of this the amount of civilian work we have been able to do in the second half of the year has been necessarily limited, and it is hoped that some relief in the situation may be possible at no distant date.

#### Nursing School.

Twenty-five Nurses entered the Preliminary Training School and seventeen were accepted for training. Three nurses were accepted for two years training from other schools.

Fourteen nurses passed the Final State Examination and twenty-one the Preliminary. Seventeen nurses passed the Hospital Final Examination and R. Genevieve Comisky was awarded a Silver Medal with 75 per cent. Two book prizes were presented to Ilse Lasch and Agnes Finerty who gained 69 per cent and 68 per cent respectively.

Fourteen nurses have completed their training and have been directed to other posts by the Ministry of Labour. Sister Margaret Carroll has been transferred to W.S.4 Ward and Sister Anna Hogan to M.S.3 Ward. Sister Betty Mieville was appointed to the Urological Department and Sister Nesta Edwards to W.M.1 Ward on September 7th. Miss Ena Close was appointed Assistant Tutor Sister on October 23rd and Sister Leah Mitchell to M.M.2 Ward.

The Student Nurses Unit has been active during the past year—a small sale of work was held last May and the proceeds bought a sewing machine. A monthly social meeting takes place at Oakwood and there is a weekly P.T. class, and a fortnightly meeting of the Nurses' Christian Movement.

Three films have been shewn and a running commentary given by Mr. Sayle Creer which have been much appreciated. £5 has been sent to the Nursing Mirror P.O.W. Fund, £2 to the Edith Cavell Home for Nurses Fund and £1 to the Elderly Nurses Fund.

An exhibition of Student nurses work from all the Manchester hospitals was held at Crumpsall Hospital in the Autumn, Nurse Johnson and Nurse Gross were awarded prizes for their exhibits.

Twenty members of the Civil Nursing Reserve continue to attend the hospital weekly and have been helpful in escorting the military patients from the station and to other hospitals. The response to the appeal for voluntary part-time workers was very successful for a time and five willing juvenile workers are coming regularly from the Salford Education Authorities.

#### Pharmaceutical Department.

Due to war conditions the supply position respecting many drugs and chemicals has been acute, but has eased to some extent during the year. Much work is still entailed however, in devising efficient substitutes for items in short supply in order that treatment may be carried on with the minimum of interruption.

The present tendency towards the administration of drugs by injection, rather than by mouth, has made it necessary to provide facilities for the preparation of substances in a form suitable for this purpose and to this end, new plant for the production of water of the highest possible degree of purity has been laid down during the year.

#### Thanks.

The Board wishes to express its sincere gratitude to the members of the Honorary Staff upon whom has fallen greatly increased burdens during the past year. To have been entrusted with the important work of caring for our sick and wounded servicemen has naturally given great pleasure, but the task could not have been accomplished without the loyalty and devotion of all our staffs, resident and non-resident, and the Board welcomes this opportunity of thanking them for their unfailing help.

The hospital is usually most fortunate in receiving a full measure of voluntary service in cash and in kind, but during 1944 the volume of this assistance has surely reached a record high level. This has enabled us to give a welcome to all our patients, especially to our "service" ones which their courage and self-sacrifice so amply merits. To the generous and sympathetic public who have helped to make these things possible, the Board desires to tender heartfelt thanks.

## Annual Report of the Medical Board, 1944

The outstanding event in the hospital during the year has been the allocation of half our beds to military cases, and since D-day convoys have continued to arrive at the hospital at any time of the day or night. Despite their disabilities soldiers have a habit of remaining cheerful, and all staffs have welcomed them to the hospital—not only because of being glad of the opportunity of showing gratitude in a practical way, but because there is no doubt that the hospital is made a more cheerful and lively place by their presence.

The Medical Board considered in detail the provision to be made at the hospital for post-graduate teaching. It has been emphasized that our hospital must be ready to play its part in this work immediately after the war, and it is to be hoped that when the time comes we shall be able to offer attractive facilities for this important branch of medical education. The Board offers its congratulations to Dr. Langley on his appointment as Dean of Post Graduate Studies in the University of Manchester.

The changing conception of health services and the part to be played in these by the large voluntary hospitals is illustrated by two events during the year. In July Dr. J. L. Burn, Medical Officer of Health for Salford, was appointed Honorary Consultant Adviser in Hygiene to the Hospital, and by virtue of this appointment he joined the Medical Board. We welcome him as a colleague and regard this step as an important one, in that it should lead to closer co-operation between this hospital and the Municipal Health Authorities of Salford.

During the last few months the Medical Board has reviewed the place of social services in a voluntary hospital, and has compared those available at Salford Royal with other hospitals. As a result it has recommended the strengthening of our Almoner service. It is felt that in this way the hospital's service to its patients can be considerably improved.

Staffing difficulties have remained severe through the year, and as a result the work to be done by each individual has been heavy. The Board is grateful to the Resident Medical Staff, to the Nursing and Clerical Staffs and to the Domestic and Kitchen Staffs for the willing way they have undertaken these extra burdens, and for the very large contribution they have made to a satisfactory year's work.

The Medical Board wishes to place on record its gratitude to the Board of Management for its sympathetic and ready co-operation throughout the year. This has been a great encouragement, and it is felt that this happy relationship does much to maintain the efficiency of the hospital.

### Number of In-patients Treated.

### Convalescent Patients.

Through the medium of the Cotton Districts Convalescent Fund 9 patients have been sent to Convalescent Homes, and 6 assisted by the Satterfield Charity.

### Private Patients.

127 private patients were admitted to the 14 beds set aside as Paying Wards, compared with 137 in 1942.

### Traffic Accidents.

82 patients were treated as a result of traffic accidents compared with 267 in the previous year. £283 has been recovered towards the cost of treatment under this heading.

### Income and Expenditure.

Total income including legacies received free of any condition amounted to £64,129 against £64,170 in 1942, a decrease of £41.

There has been a decrease of £5,066 in the amount received from the Ministry of Health in respect of Casualty Beds, but increases under almost all other headings counterbalance this large amount, and the Board is much gratified that this is the case.

Total expenditure amounted to £65,641 against £57,757, an increase of £7,884 or 13.6 per cent. The most notable increase is in respect of salaries and wages which is £4,320, largely because of the adoption of the Rushcliffe Scale: Surgery and Dispensary £2,462 which is due to an increase in stocks of drugs and purchase of new equipment; and Provisions £1,217 due to higher costs and a marked increase in the number of patients admitted.

### Booth Charities.

For sixty years this ancient Charity has subscribed to the Hospital, since 1925 an annual grant of £2,000 has been received, and this has been further increased in the past three years. The Board wishes to record its sincere thanks for this most welcome support.

### Hospital Saturday Fund.

The Board acknowledges with gratitude the receipt of £16,293 from the Hospital Saturday Fund compared with £13,947 in the previous year, an increase of £2,346. This welcome contribution represents much enthusiasm and hard work on the part of the Hospital Saturday Fund Committee and their supporters to whom congratulations and thanks are due on the encouraging growth of the Fund.

### Sunday Entertainments Tax.

Salford City Council have generously allocated £561 3s. 0d. to the Hospital from amounts transferred in respect of entertainments on Sundays in City cinemas. This is acknowledged with much gratitude.

### Nurses' Memorial Fund.

Fourteen beds have been endowed in perpetuity to commemorate the devotion to duty of those nurses who made the supreme sacrifice during an air raid in 1941. H.R.H. the Duchess of Kent graciously consented to perform the unveiling ceremony on February 16th. The endowment is recorded on a Portland stone panel affixed to the wall of the temporary Nurses' Home and also on an oak panel of similar design in the Out-patients Department.

Her Royal Highness spent an hour in visiting several wards and departments. A large attendance of relatives and visitors were impressed by the sincerity of her sympathy, and the patients, for each of whom the Royal visitor had a cheery word, were at once captivated by her charm.

Before unveiling the memorial tablet the Duchess said: "This morning I was privileged to open a new Centre for nurses in Manchester, and in so doing I referred to the conditions under which nurses used to live and work in the 19th century, and also to the courage which they showed in those hard days. Happily that is long ago, but the same brave spirit is alive to-day in the women of this country, and when the war came they responded gallantly to the many calls made upon them.

"No one knew what might happen, but every preparation was made for the worst. It has never occurred to our people to abandon their posts, or their charges, during air raids, and the heroic staff of this hospital, like so many others, did not seek shelter. No less than fourteen nurses, taking a brief rest from their arduous duties in their own Home, were killed, and to-day we are paying public tribute to their memory.

"This simple memorial is, I am certain, all that they would have desired for themselves. Above all, they would have wished that there will be others, as there surely will be, who will come after them, to serve this hospital faithfully, as they did.

"How well you have carried on here, in spite of severe damage, is shown by the support you receive from the people of Salford. Their gratitude to the staff as a whole is evident, and they will not forget those fourteen brave women who were following in the footsteps of the pioneer nurses nearly a hundred years ago, who went out to help the Army in the Crimea and some of whom did not return.

"In unveiling these memorials, which I am proud to do, may I extend my sympathy to the relatives, whose courage in their sorrow I so deeply appreciate."

### The Inscription.

The assembly stood while the Duchess unveiled the tablet on which is inscribed:

"This panel records the names of fourteen nurses who lost their lives at the Hospital during an air raid June 2nd, 1941. Fourteen beds have been endowed in perpetuity to commemorate their devotion to duty." Then follow the names of the nurses: Sister Doris Preston, Staff Nurses Vera Creighton, Edith Haslam, and Maureen Lynch; Nurses Bridget Leonard, Margaret Lowery, Philomena McCrossan, Rose Moffatt, Margaret Owen, Helen Sheridan, Dorothy Burslem, Elsie O'Kell, Martha Stott and Doris Tyson; and the inscription concludes: "This panel was unveiled by H.R.H. The Duchess of Kent, February 16th, 1944."

### X-ray Apparatus.

Thanks to the generosity of Mr. J. F. Emery, M.P., Honorary Treasurer, the Board is very pleased to report that the X-ray Department has been equipped with a new diagnostic unit and a portable apparatus both of the latest design at a cost of nearly £3,000. The latter apparatus has already been installed and the diagnostic unit is being supplied under the Lease-Lend agreement.

### Daily Visiting.

An experiment has been made in extending the facilities for visiting patients in the wards. Visitors may see their friends in the Hospital on any day, usually in the evening, but also in the afternoon of Wednesday and Sunday. Experience so far has proved that this is a welcome concession.

### Accommodation for Nurses.

Consequent upon the destruction of the Nurses' Home the Board has been much occupied in providing temporary accommodation for nurses in the belief that the critical period of the war upon which we are entering may bring an urgent need for a full staff. At present several houses in Adelphi Place and Peel Street (near the Hospital) are in occupation but still more beds are required. To meet this need the Board has purchased a house in Radcliffe Park Road which will accommodate a further 17 nurses. When this is available for occupation the whole staff will be housed, at any rate temporarily; but it will be realised that the most pressing post-war need will be permanent accommodation.

### Nursing School.

Thirty-two candidates entered the Preliminary Training School and twenty-eight were accepted for training.

Six nurses came from other schools. Thirteen nurses passed the Final State Examination and twenty-five the Preliminary State Examination. Sixteen nurses passed the Final Hospital Examination and four book prizes were presented to Nurse Anna Hogan, Nurse Gabrielle Kartal, Nurse Marjorie Hilton and Nurse Mary McGeough, who gained over 70 per cent in the whole Examination.

Sixteen nurses completed their training, four were promoted to Sisters posts in the hospital :-

Nurse Margaret Carroll to the Urological Department;

Nurse Marion Makinson to M.S.4 Ward:

Nurse Jean Glover to the Ear, Nose and Throat Outpatient Department; and

Nurse Anna Hogan to Junior Theatre Sister.

Eight are taking their Midwifery certificate and four have joined the Services.

Twenty members of the Civil Nursing Reserve attend weekly to keep up their practical work and are regarded as part of the Nursing Staff.

### Honorary Staff.

During the year heavily increased demands have been made upon the energies of the honorary staff and the Board is under a deep debt of gratitude to them for their unfailing attention and unremitting care of the patients.

In order to cope with the increasing volume of work the following temporary appointments have been made:—

Honorary Assistant Orthopædic Surgeon—Mr. W. Sayle Creer.

Honorary Assistant Surgeon-Mr. R. W. Wyse.

### Staff.

The Board regret to record the death of Mr. Charles Copp, who for 20 years was senior radiographer. In spite of ill-health Mr. Copp carried out his work cheerfully and efficiently.

### Rehabilitation.

Rehabilitation is a new word, and was first mentioned in relation to the co-ordinated efforts towards recovery after a fracture, which is the most frequent single cause of permanent disability. It was regarded then as the function primarily of the Massage Department, and in a good many minds rehabilitation still means no more than physical medicine. Actually it reaches out far beyond that province bringing in occupational therapy and the amalgamation and maintenance of manual interests. The longer the war lasts the greater will be the number of the disabled, and, as it is "total" war, it is not this time a question only of the crippled soldier but of dealing with crippled civilians—men, women and children.

No one can predict the final number, which may well be formidable, and to it are constantly being added the victims of mechanised industry and transport and those handicapped by conditions following upon disease or congenital deformity. The country must accept the fact that a certain proportion of its citizens are permanently disabled, although in the great majority of cases not to such an extent as to unfit them for some employment. In this hospital we have, within our limited means, and our limited space, endeavoured for many years past to carry out the principles of treatment now styled "rehabilitation."

The increased need arising from the war has resulted in the part-time occupation of the gymnasium attached to the nearby Adelphi School for the purpose of organised games under the supervision of a trained gymnast. The Board is very grateful to the School Authorities for their ready co-operation in placing the gymnasium at the disposal of the Hospital free of any charge. Interest in this branch of work is rapidly spreading as is instanced by the rapid development of "centres" in all parts of the country.

### A National Health Service.

The Government has issued a White Paper outlining proposals for a new National Health Service. These proposals are provisional and are put forward for discussion and criticism by all who may be affected by the Scheme. It is a bold and constructive plan which offers a "free" comprehensive health service for everybody co-ordinated and directed by central authority. Local responsibility for the administration of health services would be continued, though it is certain that in most localities several local authorities will be acting together for health purposes.

Voluntary hospitals are not required of necessity to participate in the Scheme though they are urged to do so—indeed it is stated that their co-operation is essential.

Voluntary hospitals throughout the country have expressed themselves in full sympathy with the Government's intention of securing a co-ordinated hospital and consultant health service, available to all, regardless of income. They are, however, gravely concerned at the proposals for administration and finance. The suggested administration does not constitute that partnership between local authorities and voluntary hospitals which has been the avowed intention of successive Ministers of Health and which is an essential requisite to the effective participation of the voluntary hospitals. In the planning and administration of hospital services under the scheme, voluntary hospitals are to have no voice, in spite of the enormous capital assets and resources and the vast experience which they will be contributing to the common pool. It may be sound politics, in the narrowest sense of the word, that only the elected representatives of the people shall be entitled to administer public funds;

but can it be denied that the capital assets which the voluntary hospitals are bringing into the scheme will be themselves providing a vast income? It would seem to be only elementary justice that the voluntary hospitals should have some voice in the control of these funds, but this appears to be denied by the scheme. The financial proposals are unacceptable in that they afford part payment only for services rendered under the Scheme, whilst postulating that the financial gap thus caused must be filled by benefactions and other voluntary gifts, while, at the same time, by the impression created of a free medical service for all, the scheme will destroy all incentive for the public to contribute by their benefactions to fill the gap. Can it be that the authorities hope that the voluntary hospitals will, in the end, find the financial burden impossible and thus solve the difficulty by clearing out of the field?

The British Hospitals Association has of course done its utmost to bring this aspect of the situation to the notice of the Minister of Health, and it is very much to be hoped that its criticisms may produce some modification of the proposals put forward in the White Paper.

### Thanks.

The Board desires to thank most cordially all those who have helped either by personal service or by their financial support, the work of the Hospital during the year. The achievements attained during these difficult times have been noteworthy in that a greater volume of work has been done, and it is fitting that some appreciative reference should be made to the staff of the institution who by their loyalty and devotion to duty have maintained the proud tradition of the past century or more of the Hospital's service to the community. Whatever changes may take place in the post-war period the Board of Management feels confident that the efficient organisation and highly skilled staff of this hospital has an important contribution to make in any National Health Service which may be formulated.

# Annual Report of the Medical Board.

In common with most other organisations, the hospital has suffered from shortage of staff, of all categories, during the year. It is gratifying to record that this has been successfully overcome, inasmuch as more patients have been treated and a high standard of work has been maintained.

The Medical Board desires to thank the Board of Management for their ready approval of expenditure necessary for the efficient maintenance of equipment and apparatus. They would also like to thank the Honorary Treasurer, Mr. J. F. Emery for his generous gift of new X-ray apparatus, the installation of which will completely modernise the equipment in that Department. This, together with the appointment of Dr. James White as Radiologist, and his re-organisation, has brought the work up to a high standard.

The Medical Board welcome as colleagues on the Honorary Staff, Mr. W. Sayle Creer and Mr. R. W. Wyse, both of whom were appointed during the year.

Two additional anæsthetists—Dr. Dodds and Dr. Simmons—have been appointed, whose help has been very welcome on the surgical side.

The wards on the old side of the hospital have been reorganised and one additional ward reopened, giving a small increase in the number of both surgical and medical beds.

During the past year, post war planning has begun to claim the attention of the Medical Board, both as regards general hospital policy and particularly regarding post graduate teaching which will be in great demand in the post war years. It is felt that this hospital could play a leading part in this—given adequate facilities.

The Board's thanks are due to the Resident Medical Staff and to the Nursing and other staffs for their willing help during difficult times.

The Annual Party was held at Buile Hill Café, by kind permission of the Mayor and the N.F.S. The Mayoress, Mrs. C. J. Townsend, and the President the Hon. Mrs. Constantine Smith were present, and a most interesting talk was given by Mrs. John Coatman about hospitals in India. The afternoon was a great success and much enjoyed by everyone present.

It was felt this year that the usual Pound Day could not be held owing to the increasing restrictions, and as a substitute a Bring and Buy Sale was held at the Hospital on December 2nd, 1943, which produced £104 18s. 0d. The Sale was opened by the Mayoress, Mrs. L. Webb, supported by the Hon. Mrs. Constantine Smith. It was greatly appreciated by all that the efforts of the Matron and the Nursing Staff contributed in a large measure to the success of the event.

The Dorcas Society have continued their valuable work throughout the year, in spite of present day difficulties, and have made numerous attractive and useful garments for the Hospital.

To all workers who have helped to bring about this splendid result we tender our sincere thanks.
