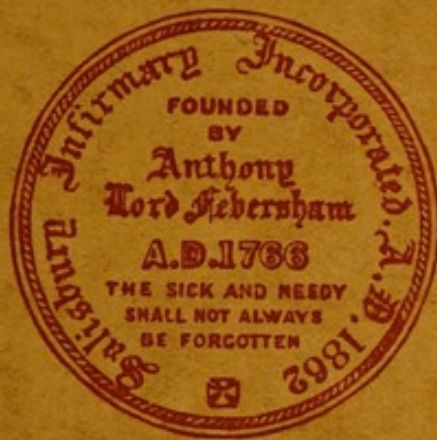

THE ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FIFTH REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGE- MENT TO THE ANNUAL COURT OF GOVERNORS.

The Committee of Management has pleasure in submitting its report for the year 1940.

In-Patients.—The total number of patients admitted, 3,082, was 214 less than in 1939, due to a decrease, caused by War conditions in the average number of available beds during the year and also to an increase in the average length of stay of each patient, 18.8 days as compared with 16.8 days in the previous year. The average number of patients resident daily was, however, increased from 151.7 in 1939 to 158.9 in 1940, and the number of days of hospital treatment, 57,998, was 2,628 more than in 1939. Since its foundation, 156,092 in-patients have been admitted to the Infirmary. The total number of major operations was 1,042 as compared with 1,197 in the previous year.

Out-Patients.—The work in the Out-patient Department continues to increase, the number of new patients being 11,053 as compared with 10,912 in 1939, whilst the attendances were 50,307 and 47,462 respectively.

Finance.—The result of the year's working is that on the Income and Expenditure Account there is a surplus of £260 as compared with a deficit of £3,519 in the previous year. Ordinary income reached a record total of £39,136, an increase of £2,763 over the previous year, which is mainly accounted for by the larger receipts from voluntary sources, the League, and services rendered to patients. It is gratifying to record that the appeal made in the last report for increased voluntary income has been answered, and it is hoped that further increases can be reported in the future. As was foreshadowed last year, there has been a further considerable rise in the cost of all commodities, resulting in total expenditure being increased from £32,144 to £34,651 and, in consequence, the average total cost of each in-patient is increased from £8 17s. 1½d. to £10 1s. 10½d. The average cost of each in-patient per week is £3 15s. 2½d., as compared with £3 13s. 11¾d. in 1939. The average cost of each out-patient is

77.7d., an increase of 12.4d. on the previous year, and the average cost of each out-patient attendance is increased from 15.1d. to 17.1d.

During the year, H.M. Treasury acquired the Infirmary holding of £2,000 Grand Trunk Railway of Canada 4% Perpetual Consolidated Debenture Stock from the Endowment Fund Capital Account. This Stock was replaced by Stocks of equivalent value from the General Fund Capital Account and the proceeds of the acquisition were transferred to the Reconstruction Account in reduction of Bank Overdraft.

Expenditure on road accidents is again high, 172 civilian cases having spent 3,148 days in the Infirmary at a cost of £1,692, as compared with 156 cases in the previous year which spent 3,238 days in hospital at an estimated cost of £1,700. Receipts from Insurance Companies and other sources in respect of these cases amounted to £1,009, leaving a balance of £683 to be borne out of the General Funds of the Infirmary.

Salisbury Infirmary League.—The Committee is pleased to report a further increase in the amount received from the Infirmary League, £12,520, as compared with £12,215 in 1939. Great credit is due to the Council of the League, its Secretary, Collectors and helpers for the continued increase in the receipts from this source.

During the year the League kindly presented a new Refrigerator for the Bartlett Ward and two Hotlock Food Conveyors for general use. These most useful gifts are greatly appreciated in the Wards. The following table give the proportion of Infirmary League in-patients and their cost for the past four years:

Annual Subscriptions.—Receipts from Annual Subscriptions amounted to £2,688, an increase of £93 over the previous year. This increase is again due to the recovery of Income Tax on Subscriptions made under Deed of Covenant. There are still many subscribers, however, who have not adopted this course, by which, without further expense to themselves, the Infirmary can benefit enormously from the increasing Income Taxes now payable. During the past two years, Subscriptions amounting to over £140 per annum have been lost owing to the death of subscribers and subscriptions which have been discontinued amount to an even greater sum. An earnest appeal is, therefore, made to all supporters of the Infirmary to induce their friends to become Subscribers.

Donations.—It is pleasing to record an increase of £70 in Donations, the total for the year being £379. This increase is due to the receipt of an anonymous gift of £53 for the Children's Ward and £35 from the Silver Lining Guild. The larger contributions include the following:

Entertainments.—It is gratifying to report on the great increase in the receipts from Entertainments, £523 as compared with £33 in 1939. This is the largest amount received from this source for many years and is largely due to the sum of £375 received from the Salisbury Sunday Cinemas. In addition, many more entertainments have been organised in aid of the Infirmary during the year, and it is hoped that this evidence of increasing interest in the welfare of the Infirmary will be maintained.

Box Collections.—Our thanks are again due to all Box Collectors for the kind interest they have maintained during the year. Receipts from this source amounted to £349, as compared with £322 in the previous year, and £66 in 1938. Much valued support can be given to the Infirmary in this way, and the Committee appeals for more friends who have opportunities to take and display boxes.

Alexandra Rose Day.—A further record contribution amounting to £737 was received from Alexandra Rose Day, a wonderful increase of £323 over the previous year. This was the first collection organised by Sir Murdoch McLeod, Bart., and the Committee is pleased to record its grateful appreciation of the support which has enabled him to achieve this record result. Our warmest thanks are due to Sir Murdoch, Mr. A. E. Lawrence, the rose sellers and helpers.

Congregational Collections.—The Committee is pleased to record its appreciation of the response to its appeal in the last Annual Report for increased Congregational Collections; £692 was received in 1940, as compared with £600 in 1939, and it is hoped that Churches and Chapels will continue their valued assistance in maintaining these higher receipts.

Building Fund Appeal.—Contributions and donations to the Building Fund Appeal amounted to £670, as compared with £974 in the previous year. The total amount now raised, including promises, is £52,884 and the Committee thanks all those subscribers to this Fund whose promises were redeemed at the end of the year, on the expiration of their Deeds of Covenant. Bun Penny Collections, although slightly smaller than in the previous year, still maintain their popularity, and the Committee looks forward to the opportunity of naming a second Cot in appreciation of these collections, which since 1935 have realised £862 for the Building Fund. To all donors, organisers of entertainments and bun penny collectors our gratitude and thanks are again extended.

Samaritan Fund.—Twenty-one patients were assisted to obtain surgical instruments, at a total cost of £65 5s. Of this sum, £52 2s. was paid by the patients or raised from outside sources, £7 9s. was borne by the Fund, and £5 14s. is still outstanding. Two patients were sent by ambulance for special treatment in London Hospitals and 12 others were helped with travelling expenses. In addition to the patients who were helped by the

Samaritan Fund many more were assisted with convalescent treatment, ambulance journeys and surgical instruments by the Infirmary League.

The Almoner would like to acknowledge gratefully the co-operation and help that she has received throughout the year from the Salisbury Infirmary League and many statutory authorities and voluntary agencies in the district, particularly the Salisbury City Council Health Department, the Wilts County Public Health and Public Assistance Departments, the Soldiers' and Sailors' and Airmen's Families Association, the Salisbury Diocesan Association for Moral and Spiritual Welfare and the Diocesan Association for the Care of the Deaf and Dumb, the Wiltshire Association for the Care of the Blind and the Women's Voluntary Services.

Herbert Convalescent Home.—It was hoped that the increased number of admissions from this Infirmary to the Herbert Convalescent Home in 1939 would be maintained in 1940, but as the Home has not been available since June only 31 cases were transferred there, as compared with 93 cases in the previous year. The number of cases transferred to other Convalescent Homes was also reduced from 20 in 1939 to nine in 1940.

Committee of Management.—The Committee extends its congratulations to Dr. Gerald E. Thornton on his election to the Mayoralty of the City of Salisbury and to the Hon. Gertrude Best on her award of the M.B.E.

Honorary Medical Staff.—The Committee of Management acknowledges gratefully the valuable services rendered by the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff during the year.

The Committee has to report the appointment of Mr. G. M. Thomson, F.R.C.S., M.R.C.P., as an Honorary Surgeon and Dr. A. D. H. Simpson as an Honorary Anæsthetist. In accordance with the policy of the British Medical Association, these appointments are for the duration of the War.

The formal retirement of Dr. J. J. Armitage from the office of Medical Officer to the Maternity Department has also to be reported. Dr. Armitage has been associated with the Infirmary since 1912 and as a token of the Committee's appreciation of his valuable work he has been appointed Consulting Medical Officer to the Department. Dr. Armitage has kindly offered to continue his active association with the Infirmary for the duration of the War.

It has been learnt that Dr. P. B. Barker, one of our Honorary Anæsthetists, is now a prisoner of war in Germany.

Obituary.—The death of the Hon. Louis G. Greville on March 6th, 1941, has deprived the Infirmary of one of its outstanding benefactors in recent years. For 36 years Mr. Greville had been closely associated with the work of the Infirmary and from 1915 to 1919 he was Chairman of the Committee of Management. His charm and kindness to both Patients and Staff are sadly missed.

It is with much regret that the Committee has also to record the deaths of Mr. Francis Rigden, Major E. G. M. Buckley and Mr. J. W. H. Scott.

Mr. Rigden had been a member of the Committee of Management since 1914 and was for many years a member of the Finance and Appeals Committee.

Major E. G. M. Buckley, a former member of the Committee of Management, was a member of a family which has been greatly interested in the welfare of the Infirmary.

Mr. J. W. H. Scott was a former Chairman of the Infirmary League and from 1921 to 1936 a member of the Committee of Management. His interest in the work of the League was of great benefit to the Infirmary.

In recording its appreciation of the work of these gentlemen, the Committee regrets that their loyalty and interest has been lost.

Chaplain.—A memorial service to Dr. A. H. Watson, which was attended by the Nursing and Administrative Staffs of the Hospital, was held in the Chapel on Sunday, January 7th. We have to thank Mr. Parnell for speaking at the Florence Nightingale Commemoration Service, and Canon Quirk for preaching at the Harvest Thanksgiving. We were glad to welcome Archdeacon Dale on his first visit to the Chapel on Sunday, October 12th.

Private Patients' Department.—During the year, 305 patients were admitted to the Private Patients' Department, this being the first complete year it has been in operation. The demand for beds in these wards is well maintained and the patients are appreciative of the service given. To meet the increased costs, and with the approval of the Charity Commissioners, the maintenance fees of £5 5s. and £6 6s. respectively, have been increased by a War Surcharge of 15%. (See page 89).

Improvements.—Much-needed improvements to the Radnor and Queensberry Ward Sluice Rooms have been carried out and the front Courtyard has been repaired and resurfaced. Improvements have also been made in the black-out facilities throughout the Hospital, and many new Baffle Walls have been erected.

Nursing.—During the year many changes have been made in appointments. Miss Lea and Miss Metcalfe, Sisters of Pembroke and Queensberry Wards respectively, have been called up for war service, and Miss Sutherland, Miss Coatesworth and Miss Cahill have relinquished their posts as Sisters of the Private Patients', Harcourt Coates and Ophthalmic Wards respectively. Miss Overton, Miss Morrissay, Miss Tovey, Miss Cobb, Miss Hatch and Miss Collins were appointed to Sisters' posts in various Wards and Departments. Three of these ladies, Miss Cobb, Miss Hatch and Miss Collins received their training in this Infirmary.

Seven nurses have received their hospital certificates on completion of their training. Eleven nurses were successful in the Final State Examination and eleven nurses in the Preliminary State Examination.

Four pupil midwives entered for and were successful in Part II of the Central Midwives' Board Examination and six others have completed their training and are awaiting the forthcoming examination. Nineteen applications have been received for vacancies for pupil housekeepers and four pupils have completed their training and received their certificates.

We should like to express our grateful thanks to Dr. Monnington, Dr. Buttar and Dr. Armitage for their kind attention to the sick staff, and to Dr. Monnington, Dr. Saunders, Dr. Conroy Dixon, Dr. Taylor-Young and other members of the Honorary Medical Staff who have lectured to the Student Nurses.

The Committee and the Nursing Staff are especially appreciative of the staunch support received from the Commandant, Mr. Charles Harris, and members of the British Red Cross Society Wilts 5 Men's Detachment who have so promptly reported for duty at the Infirmary on all "alerts." Their presence and help has been much appreciated.

Gifts from America.—In common with many other Hospitals and Institutions in this country, this Infirmary has received gifts from America which are particularly appreciated at the present time. Our warmest thanks are due to the American Society for British Medical and Civilian Aid (Inc.), for medical and surgical equipment; the British American War Relief Society for its donation of £25 to provide refreshment for voluntary night workers, and to St. David's Church, Radnor, Pennsylvania, for its gift of an Ambulance through the British American Ambulance Corps. The kind thoughts of American sympathisers which prompted these gifts are gratefully appreciated.

South Wilts Needlework Guild.—The continued kind support and interest of the South Wilts Needlework Guild is warmly appreciated. This year the Guild presented 697 articles to the Infirmary.

Hospitals Supply Depots.—Several hundreds of articles, comforts and dressings for our patients have again been received from Hospitals Supply Depots and large quantities of linen supplied by the Government have been marked by them. Our appreciation and thanks are extended to Mrs. Freeth, Miss Wilson-Fox, Mrs. Benett-Stanford, Miss Rawlence and the Misses Davies for their kindness in organising the various depots.

Patients' Library.—The Committee is pleased to again record its thanks to the members of the Salisbury Branch of Toc H for their organisation of the library. This is greatly appreciated by the patients.

Acknowledgments.—To the numerous friends upon whom the Infirmary is dependent for its reputation, its work and its support, the Committee expresses its gratitude and thanks for their service and assistance.

The kind help and loyal services of the following are also gratefully acknowledged:—

The Dowager Countess of Pembroke for her continued help and interest in the Chafyn Grove Ward.

Mrs. Forester for welcome help in Beatrice Ward.

Mrs. Monnington and Mrs. Brown for their kind assistance in the Ophthalmic Ward.

Mrs. H. R. Harraway and the ladies of her mending party, who since its foundation during the year, have helped so considerably with the mending of linen.

The Matron's Working Party for 619 articles received and for their marking of several hundreds of articles during the year.

The Women's Institute for the weekly supplies of flowers and produce from their Market Stall.

The Voluntary Domestic helpers who, through the kindness of Lady Everett, have given much assistance to the depleted domestic staff.

The junior members of the British Red Cross Society and Girl Guides Detachments who have also helped with domestic duties.

The British Red Cross and St. John's Nursing Detachments for their loyal support and untiring help in the wards.

The Churches, Chapels, Women's Institutes, Mothers' Unions, Schools, Girls' Clubs, Girl Guides, Brownies and other Associations for supplies of eggs, fruit, vegetables and provisions, received from Harvest Thanksgiving Services, and throughout the year.

Donors of money and gifts in kind to the General and Building Funds, and to the Matron's Christmas Appeal.

The organisers of Concert Parties and Entertainments, which have been greatly appreciated by the patients.

The Press and its representatives for their co-operation and assistance during the year.

The Honorary Auditors and Honorary Solicitors for their services and helpful advice.

Conclusion.—In bringing its Report to a conclusion, the Committee of Management, though deeply appreciative of the small financial improvement in the past year, is again compelled to stress upon its friends and the public the imperative need for continued and increasing support. The difficulties created by War conditions have affected the Infirmary very acutely and the necessity of being constantly prepared to meet any emergency that might occur, together with the ever-growing demands upon its service, call for more and still more financial support.

The wisdom of the scheme of financial reconstruction carried out in 1939 has been well confirmed during the past year, and the Committee hopes that through the kindness and generosity of its friends opportunities for still further improvements will be made available.

The real need of the Infirmary could not be better expressed than by quoting the words of the Duke of Kent when presiding at a meeting of the King Edward Hospital Fund for London on the 11th December, 1939:—

“ I trust that in the midst of so many conflicting claims no one will forget the hospitals. A full measure of Voluntary support is more than ever needed. New methods for the prevention and cure of disease entail ever increasing expenditure.”

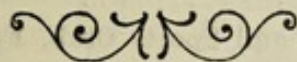

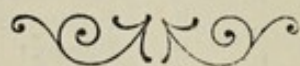

ADMISSION OF PATIENTS

In-Patients.—URGENT CASES AND ACCIDENTS can be admitted at any time of the day or night. Trouble and expense may be avoided by making enquiry of the Resident Medical Officer by telephone as to whether there is a bed available before sending a patient to the Infirmary.

Out-Patients.—The Out-Patient Department is intended only for cases requiring specialist opinion and special treatment. All patients on their first attendance must bring with them a letter from their doctor giving details of their case, together with an Infirmary League Certificate or Voucher from any other Contributory Scheme.

N.B.—Patients coming from a distance, in order to save disappointment and unnecessary journeys, should forward to the Resident Medical Officer the doctor's statement of their case, and they will be instructed when to attend.

Casualties are treated at any time and, if in-patient treatment is not required, are referred to their own doctors.

PRIVATE PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT.

Admission of Patients.—The Private Wards of the Salisbury General Infirmary are provided for the admission of suitable patients who, while ineligible for the general wards of the Hospital, and unable to afford the fees of a nursing home, can pay appropriate fees for maintenance, nursing and medical attendance. (Admission to the general wards is now limited to patients whose incomes do not exceed £300 per annum.)

Every patient admitted to a private ward must be recommended by his or her own medical practitioner, subject to the income limits.

Patients may be attended in the wards by any registered general medical practitioner whom they may select. Any consultative opinion, operative treatment or specialist service that may be required shall be rendered by a member of the Hospital Staff, or by some other consultant, agreed to by such member of the Hospital Staff.

Maternity cases are eligible for admission.

Mental or infectious cases cannot be admitted.

Visitors are allowed daily between the hours of 2.30 and 4.30 p.m., and 7.30 and 8.30 p.m., subject to the consent of the Medical Officer in charge

In the event of no private ward being available for a patient requiring immediate admission, the patient will be admitted to one of the general wards of the Infirmary and transferred to the private wards as soon as a room becomes vacant—usually within one or two days. In such cases maintenance fees will be charged in retrospect.

Applications for beds will be made to the Matron by the Medical Practitioner in charge of the case.

Income Limit.—Patients will be eligible for admission to the private wards subject to the following income limits:—

Single persons with income not exceeding £300 per annum.

Man and wife with income not exceeding £400 per annum.

Man, wife and one child with income not exceeding £475 per annum.

Man, wife and two children with income not exceeding £550 per annum, and thereafter, with an addition of £50 per child up to a maximum of £750.

Patients whose incomes are over these limits may, in special circumstances, be admitted at the discretion of the House Committee on the recommendation of the general Medical Practitioner in charge of the case. In this event the charges payable to the Hospital may be increased under the direction of the House Committee.

Fees.—The fee for maintenance of medical and surgical cases will be £5 5s. per week, and for maternity cases £6 6s. per week. (These rates are now subject to a war sur-charge of 15%.) This includes accommodation, board, nursing, medicine and surgical dressings. Children are admitted at the full rate of charges.

Special nurses, massage, electro-therapeutic treatments, X-Ray, pathological examinations and expensive remedies ordered are extra charges.

Fees for medical and surgical attendance will be privately arranged between the patient and the doctor in charge of the case.

Accounts are payable weekly to the Secretary-Superintendent, Salisbury General Infirmary, from whom all information regarding this Department can be obtained.
