REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT FOR 1944

THE Committee have the honour of presenting the ninety-eighth Annual Report to the Governors of the Hospital.

In common with other hospitals in the London area the fifth year of the war did not lessen the anxieties and strains of management. The heavy enemy attack on the capital, particularly by the V Bombs in the latter months, has been described in official disclosures. Providentially the hospital escaped completely disabling damage, but the highest praise must be accorded to all members of the staff for their devotion to duty on the many occasions when it received minor but nerve-shattering injuries. Under the circumstances the Committee were compelled to make a temporary arrangement whereby In-patients were accommodated in the East Wing only, and the remainder of the beds were closed. However, this report is being made in happier days and for the first time in five years we may contemplate a future free from the actual-ordeal of war.

Reference was made in our last Report to the election of Sir John Stewart-Wallace as Chairman of the Hospital Committee of Management.

PERSONNEL.

Members of the various Sub-Committees have been re-elected en bloc and one new member, Mr. A. Everett Jones, elected to the Committee.

The Chairman was elected to represent the Hospital on the British Hospitals Association and on the Women's Group of Special Hospitals.

Captain H. Trevenen Grantham was appointed Delegate to the Hospital Saturday Fund.

We are pleased to welcome back from Medical duties Mr. Leslie Dodds, Surgeon to Out-patients, and Dr. George Edwards, Anaesthetist, and in so doing take this opportunity of thanking the Medical Staff for their great and unselfish service to the Hospital.

Following the resignation of Miss Sproule, Miss M. M. Tupling has been appointed Pharmacist.

SUBSCRIBERS AND SUPPORTERS.

We would thank our friends, so many of whom come from All Souls Church, South Hampstead, who helped us on Hospitals Days and Alexandra Rose Day, under the very trying conditions of a summer none of us are likely to forget.

We cannot sufficiently express our appreciation of the great work done for us by the British Red Cross Society, especially in maintaining our splendid library service, and the kindly way in which their Librarian has ministered to the patients.

FUTURE OF THE HOSPITAL.

The appearance of the Government White Paper on Health Services was followed by a Memorandum issued by the British Hospitals Association setting out their considered views of the various Government proposals. The Committee gave careful thought to the Memorandum and afterwards expressed their full agreement with it.

There has naturally been much discussion during the year as to the future of Voluntary Hospitals, and the Committee have been very vigilant in their aim to take whatever steps may be necessary to raise the standard of the hospital to the highest level of efficiency and service. Those of us who believe in the Voluntary principle must now give proof of its vitality by the inspiring quality of our Voluntary Hospital standards, as well as in continued, unselfish and generous financial support.

Consultations have taken place between the Chairman, Mr. R. Christie Brown, Mr. C. M. Gwillim and leading Hospital and University authorities as to what action might be taken in the discernable post-war future to safeguard and extend the service of the Hospital to future generations of patients, and to enlarge it to Empire Status in gynaecological teaching and research. The question of re-building or extension does not appear to be practicable for at least 7 years.

It will be recalled that the Convalescent Home at Amersham, Buckinghamshire, had to be closed in 1941 owing to war circumstances, and the Committee decided to let the Home furnished for the duration of the war. In the meantime we are pleased to say that by an arrangement which we had with other Convalescent Homes, every patient who has been ordered convalescence by the Surgeon has been accommodated. The Committee have seriously considered the post-war situation of this matter and at the moment they are investigating the possibilities of selling the Amersham property and buying some suitable premises at a sea-side resort to take its place.

One other matter affecting the Hospital building may be mentioned. The advertisement hoarding and boards in the front area are being replaced by a garden, in an effort to introduce a note of beauty into the Hospital surroundings and amenities. The Committee are deeply indebted to the Metropolitan Public Gardens Association who have most kindly undertaken to plan, to plant, and to maintain this area as a garden of flowering shrubs and annuals. The Committee hopes to continue this effort, and to that end would welcome gifts of beautiful furniture, pictures and other objects of art to the Hospital.

FINANCE.

As will be seen from the financial statement the excess of total ordinary expenditure over total ordinary income was £2,098 12s. 1d., and to our regret this balance had to be made good by a transfer from Legacies account.

The total legacies received during the year amounted to £19,069 1s. 6d. Included in this figure is the sum of £13,620 3s. 2d., which is payment on account under the Estate of the late Mrs. S. A. M. Saunders, in memory of her daughter, and in recognition of her gratitude for the kindness, skill and care which her daughter received while a patient in one of our Private Wards. The Hospital are sole Residuary Legatees of the Estate of Mrs. Saunders. Our appreciation for such encouragement in our work and such a munificent gift is indeed unbounded.

They also acknowledge with deep gratitude the sum of £1,800, being the balance of the Residual bequest made by the late Major A. Corrie Keep, M.C. The gift is the more significant as Major Corrie Keep was Surgeon of Out-patients; subsequently Surgeon to In-patients; and on his retirement was appointed Honorary Consulting Surgeon to the Hospital, an office which he held until his death in 1940. Altogether his total benefactions to the Hospital have amounted to £5,800.

During the year an anonymous gift of £147 in £1 notes was received by post without covering note. Many most touching donations were also received from old patients—one of 25 years ago—to whom the sums sent must have meant much personal denial. Several thankofferings were also received in happy remembrances of a mother's life saved by our very eminent gynaecological and obstetric surgeons, and of a healthy baby born out of the very jaws of death. One such proud Mother sent us the photo of her son, once a Samaritan baby, in the uniform of one of the fighting services—and a cheque. How charming a gesture!

Once again we thank all these and our many friends for their generous subscriptions and donations during the year, and we welcome those who have come to us as new, and we trust renewing subscribers.

We cannot pretend that we have no financial anxieties. Hospital expenses, like all other expenses, have been rising. New income must be sought and found if we are to continue and expand our service.

CHAIRMAN'S POSTSCRIPT.

Before signing this Report on behalf of the Committee of Management I may be permitted to express my very great personal indebtedness to my colleagues for their very generous support in every effort to improve our service throughout the year as well as to all members of the Staff, administrative, nursing and domestic, for their most loyal work during the V.1 and V.2 bombing—the most testing time I trust the Hospital will ever know. Matron and her nurses were an inspiration in their steadiness, courage and devotion to duty.

I should like also to take this opportunity of assuring our subscribers that while our nurses spend themselves to the full for their patients (as the many letters we receive in grateful recognition attest) we aim at the highest standard of comfort, food and recreation, permitted by war conditions, for our nurses. We are confident that in so doing we are carrying out the desires of our subscribers, and I would assure them how deeply grateful we are for their encouragement, support and generous subscriptions.

We ardently trust that that support will be continued in even greater measure in the very difficult and expensive re-construction period which is now upon us.

Rules for the Admission of Patients

Applications for admission must be addressed to the Secretary, at the Hospital.

A Printed Form will be supplied, which, when carefully filled up, should be returned to the Secretary.

If the case appears to be one suitable for admission, the name of the applicant is entered in the Register, and she will receive notice when she can be admitted.

Patients are admitted as beds become vacant, in succession, according to the date of their application, exception only being made in favour of the more urgent cases.

All the ordinary wants of the Patients are amply provided for by the Hospital.

No formal application is required for admission to the Out-Patients' Department.

An enquiry officer examines into the circumstances of Patients attending the Out-Patients' Department.

REGULATIONS

1. FOR IN-PATIENTS—The Visiting days are Sundays, Thursdays and Saturdays, from 2 to 3-30 p.m. Not more than two Visitors can see a Patient on each Visiting day.

2. FOR OUT-PATIENTS—This Department is open to receive Patients every week-day, except Saturdays and Bank Holidays, between 1 p.m. to 2-30 p.m.

The Medical Officers are in attendance at 2 p.m. daily.

The Out-Patients' Department is in Walmer Street, Seymour Place, immediately behind the Hospital.

Poverty and sickness being the only qualifications necessary for admission, the Committee appeal for contributions from anyone personally interested in a Patient.

The contributor pays the promised amount in the ordinary way ; the Hospital claims the rebate.


In the event of death before the expiry of the Covenant, the promise lapses.

The object of this Association, which consists of President, Vice-Presidents, Honorary Secretary, Honorary Treasurer, and Members, is to provide for the supply of the garments, linen and blankets required for the use of the In-Patients of the Hospital.

The Ladies' Association has little to report for the years 1943 and 1944, beyond supplying the necessary linen. As the Hospital is now full, the demands are specially heavy. On account of the war, practically no subscriptions are coming in, except from Members of the Committee. It might be noted that during the "Great War" the Ladies' Association ceased to function, but in this, so far, the Committee has carried on, and hopes later to be able to raise further funds, as so much is needed besides the actual linen: curtains, bedspreads, chair covers, etc., all will have to be renewed.

During 1943 the Ladies' Association supplied 46 sheets, 3 dozen pillow cases, 149 yards of draw sheeting, 14 rubber air rings.

Total for 1943, £30 19s. 6d.

In 1944: 50 sheets, 50 pillow cases, 120 yards draw sheeting, 104 flannelette sheets.

Total for 1944, £95 9s. 3d.
