BOARD OF MANAGEMENT FOR THE YEAR 1940.

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One Hundred and Eleventh Annual Report

The Board of Management has much pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Eleventh Report of the Infirmary with the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for 1939.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

The full services of the Hospital were maintained. As will be seen from the Statistical Tables, the resources of the Infirmary were again taxed to the utmost.

The average number of beds available to 31st August was 68, whilst from 1st September, the number of beds was increased to 121, the increase being due to the provision of 53 beds by the Ministry of Health for War emergencies. The admission of cases during the early months of the war were restricted to acute and emergencies.

IN-PATIENTS.

The number of In-Patients admitted during the year was 1228 compared with 1213 in 1938. The average daily occupation was 48.17 and the average length of stay of each patient was 13.9 days. The slight reduction in the average stay enabled a larger number of patients to be dealt with.

OUT-PATIENTS.

The number of Out-Patients treated during the year was 2242, and the number of attendances 6782.

MOTOR ACCIDENTS.

The sum of $\pounds 310$ 19s. 5d. was received under the Road Traffic Act in respect of motor accident cases.

FINANCES.

The Board are pleased to record that the year closed with a surplus on Revenue Account. Credit balance being £660 14s. 10d., the deficit at the 31st December, 1938 £462 5s. 7d. was cleared, leaving a Credit balance on the 1st January, 1940 of £198 9s. 3d.

ORDINARY INCOME.

The ordinary Income for the year amounted to the record sum of $\pounds 11,769$ 3s. 1d.

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS AND DONATIONS.

The Annual Subscriptions amounted to £662 7s. 8d. and Donations £411 5s. 2d. The principal donations being:—C. B. Marriott, Esq., K.C. and Mrs. Marriott £100, N. Goddard-Jackson, Esq. £25, The Most Honourable the Marchioness of Exeter £10 and Mr. and Mrs. Allan R. Baker £10.

The Board is deeply grateful to the many friends who continue to interest themselves in the welfare of the Infirmary, but make a strong appeal for new Annual Subscribers. Five hundred additional Subscribers of one or two guineas each would help to solve the financial problem which at present confronts the Board.

ENTERTAINMENTS AND SPECIAL EFFORTS.

The Board desires to express its appreciation and thanks to the friends who kindly organise efforts during the year, and it expresses the hope that it may be possible during the coming year to increase the revenue from this source.

CHURCH AND CHAPEL COLLECTIONS.

The Board regrets to record a decrease of £14 0s. 9d. in the amount contributed by the Churches. The amount received in 1939 was £109 17s. 1d. compared with £123 17s. 10d. in the previous year. The Board desires to convey its deep appreciation and thanks to the Churches who continue to support the Infirmary year after year. It is hoped that those Churches which have not hitherto participated in this effort will do so in the future.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The Board is pleased to record a record income, the total being $\pounds 5,112$ 17s. 8d. The Board desires to express its appreciation and thanks for the very loyal and cordial support rendered to the Infirmary by the Voluntary Workers, Employers and Contributors.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES.

The sum of $\pounds 1,692$, being contributions towards cost of Casualty Services, has been received from the Ministry of Health.

CARNIVAL.

The Carnival held on Whit-Saturday and Monday, in support of this Institution drew from the public of the Town and District a magnificent response and resulted in a nett profit of $\pounds 1290$ for the Infirmary. This sum has been allocated to the Building Fund. No praise could be too high in refering to the helpers under the direction of the Honorary Secretary, Councillor Arthur Beardmore and to the generous hearted local public who were good enough to patronise the Carnival in its various aspects.

LEGACIES.

The Board has pleasure in reporting that the year 1939 proved exceptional in regard to the amount of benefactions received. The following legacies being received :—

EGG WEEK.

The Board is pleased to record that the response to Egg Week was most successful, the total number of Eggs received was 10,195 compared with 6148 in 1938. The Board is grateful to the many friends who undertake the organization of this effort and desires to record its grateful thanks to both the Collectors and Donors.

INFIRMARY BALL.

The Annual Ball held on Friday, 6th January, 1939, was very successful, the splendid sum of $\pounds 132$ being added to the Infirmary Funds as a result of this effort. The sincere thanks of the Board are due to Lady Willoughby de Eresby, who was responsible for its organization.

ALEXANDRA ROSE DAY.

Despite the unfavourable weather this year the sum of $\pounds 54$ 12s. 1d, was raised. This is somewhat less than the amount raised in previous years, but in view of the unsatisfactory conditions which prevailed, the result is most gratifying. The sincere and grateful thanks of the Board are offered to the Organizers and Collectors.

POUND DAY.

This year 7,272 pounds of Groceries and $\pounds 50$ 11s. 9d. in cash was collected. The Board is deeply grateful to all who helped to achieve this magnificent result.

LINEN LEAGUE.

The Board congratulate the Officers and Members of the Linen League on another very successful year. Notwithstanding the difficult times through which we are passing, it is gratifying to record the considerable assistance received by the provision of Linen and cash.

The additional assistance which the League renders each year, merits our deepest gratitude.

EXPENDITURE.

The total ordinary Expenditure amounted to $\pounds 11,108$ 8s. 3d. This figure is slightly in excess of the previous year. The main increases appear in Provisions, Salaries and Miscellaneous. During the year the Board adopted a 96-hour fortnight for the Nursing Staff, which necessitated the employment of additional Nurses and Ward Maids. The Staff increase has consequently affected Expenditure.

TRAINING SCHOOL.

During the twelve months five nurses were enrolled for the first year of their training. Two trainees were successful in the State Preliminary Examination. One trainee succeeded in passing the State Final Examination, thereby becoming a State Registered Nurse.

RESIGNATIONS and **ELECTIONS**.

In July, Dr. J. A. M. Cathro was appointed House Surgeon to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Dr. W. A. Dunnett.

OBITUARY.

The Board has to record with deep regret the death of Mr. Henry F. Young.

Mr. Henry F. Young, who was a Trustee, had a long and intimate association with the Infirmary, serving on the Board and House Committee for many years, until ill-health prevented him taking an active part in the administration.

NEW HOME FOR NURSING STAFF.

The Governors have decided to proceed with the building of the Nurses' New Home and have accepted the tender of Messrs. W. Brick & Son, Stamford, for the sum of $\pounds 7,210$. It is hoped that this Building will be completed by the end of 1940.

The Board appeals to all sections of the community to increase their support in order that this essential service may be maintained at a high standard of efficiency, and they are confident that this appeal will not be in vain.
