One Hundred and Twelfth Annual Report

The Board of Management has much pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Twelfth Report of the Infirmary with the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for 1940.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

Although the admission of Patients has been interrupted during the year because of the reservation of beds due to the National Emergency, a record number of 1336 was admitted. The average stay of each In-Patient was 12.6 days compared with 13.9 last year. The Out-Patient department figures shew a decrease in the number of patients treated, but a considerable increase in the number of attendances. The number of Out-Patients treated during the year was 2230 and the number of attendances 8829.

FINANCES.

The Board is pleased to record that the year closed with a credit balance.

ORDINARY INCOME.

The ordinary income for the year amounted to £12,869 5s. 0d. as compared with £11,769 3s. 1d. for the previous year. This showed an increase of £1,100 1s. 11d.

EXTRA-ORDINARY INCOME.

Extra-Ordinary Income totalled £1,065 0s. 4d., compared with £2,192 4s. 4d., showing a decrease of £627 4s. 0d. on the previous year.

EXPENDITURE.

The ordinary expenditure for the year amounted to £12,735 11s. 0d., compared with £11,035 16s. 9d. for 1939.

VOLUNTARY GIFTS.

Owing to war time conditions the Carnival and the Hospital Ball were cancelled. The loss of income from these sources being £1,300.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The Income from the Contributory Scheme amounted to £5,926 10s. 6d., compared with £5,528 13s. 3d. in 1939. The amount transferred to the Infirmary was £5075 0s. 0d., compared with £4590 0s. 0d. for 1939 and £3755 0s. 0d. for 1938. The Board desires to express its appreciation and thanks for the very loyal support rendered to the Infirmary by the voluntary workers and contributors.

NURSES' NEW HOME.

Work on the Nurses' New Home, which was commenced in March, 1940, has now been completed, and is ready for occupation by the Nursing Staff. The cost of this Building was approximately £7,250, whilst alterations to the Old Home amounted to £1,370, the total cost being £8,620. This work was carried out under the supervision of the Hospital Architect, Mr. F. J. Lenton, Broad Street, Stamford; the Contractor being W. Brick and Sons, Broad Street, Stamford. The New Home which comprises 42 Bedrooms, Lecture Room, Sisters' and Nurses' Sitting Rooms, Sun Lounge, etc., has been tastefully decorated and furnished and affords pleasant and comfortable surroundings in which the Nurses can spend their off duty and leisure hours.

The Board of Management wishes to place on record its sincere and grateful thanks to the Organisers and Helpers, and the General Public for the kind and generous assistance received in connection with the following efforts:—

POUND DAY.

This year 5,251½ pounds of produce and £31 10s. 5d. in cash was received despite the war time difficulties.

EGG WEEK.

The Egg Collection amounted to 7,743 compared with 10,195 for 1939.

ALEXANDRA ROSE DAY.

£132 was raised in 1940, this surpassed all previous records.

WARD VENTILATION.

Owing to Black-Out conditions the ventilation of the Wards has been a trying problem. Mrs. C. B. Marriott, of Tickencote Hall, very kindly defrayed the cost of installing ventilators in the Wards, these have proved of great benefit to both Patients and Staff. The Board deeply appreciate this further evidence of the interest taken in the work of the Infirmary and the generous support so freely given by Mrs. Marriott.

A.R.P.

All possible precautions have been taken to ensure, as far as possible, an uninterrupted hospital service, with the utmost safety for the Patients and Staff. Lace-netting has been fitted to every window, blast walls have been built around the theatre and portions of the Wards. The cellars in the original Hospital Buildings have been converted into Air Raid Shelters.

EMERGENCY HOSPITAL SCHEME.

The Hospital has fulfilled its obligation under the Emergency Hospital Scheme, although happily the demands made upon the resources available have been few. Nevertheless, the Hospital and its auxiliary services are ready to cope with any emergency. The bed complement at the Hospital has been expanded to 121, in addition the Authorities have approved the use of Wothorpe House and Burghley House, which have been adapted as Annexes and equipped for 65 beds.

LADIES' LINEN LEAGUE and THE BRITISH RED CROSS SOCIETY and ORDER OF ST. JOHN.

The Board of Management are deeply grateful for the services rendered to the Hospital during the year by members of the Ladies' Linen League and The British Red Cross Society and Order of St. John.

CHURCH AND CHAPEL COLLECTIONS.

The Board are pleased to record an increase from this source in 1940. The sum raised being £137 0s. 11d., compared with £109 17s. 1d. for 1939.

HARVEST FESTIVAL THANKSGIVING.

The Hospital continues to receive the usual large quantity of fruit and vegetables, and the grateful thanks of the Board of Management are due to the Churches and Chapels who continue to support the Infirmary so well.

TRAINING SCHOOL.

During 1939 eleven Nurses were accepted for training. One trainee passed the Final State Examination and seven were successful in the State Preliminary Examination.

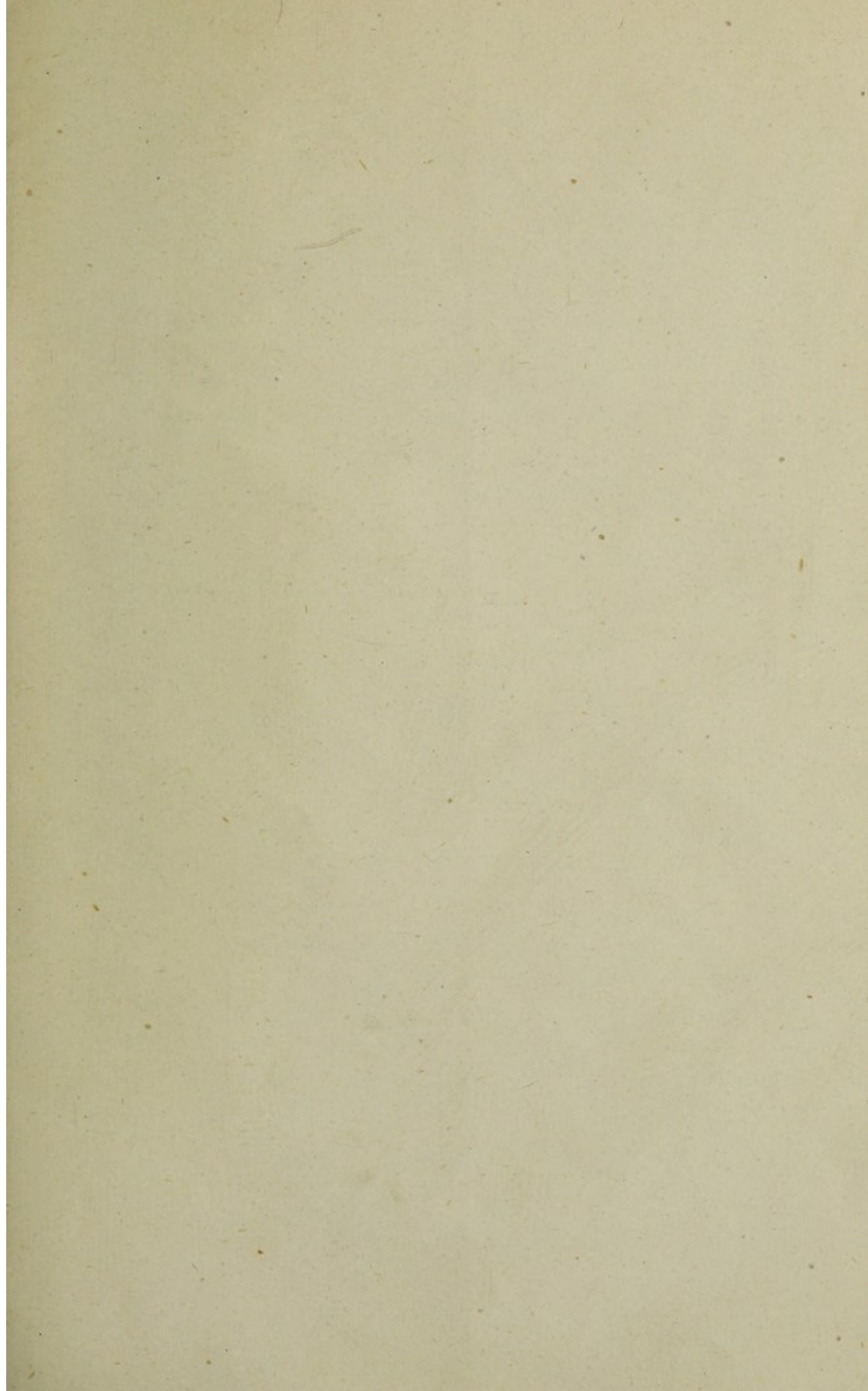

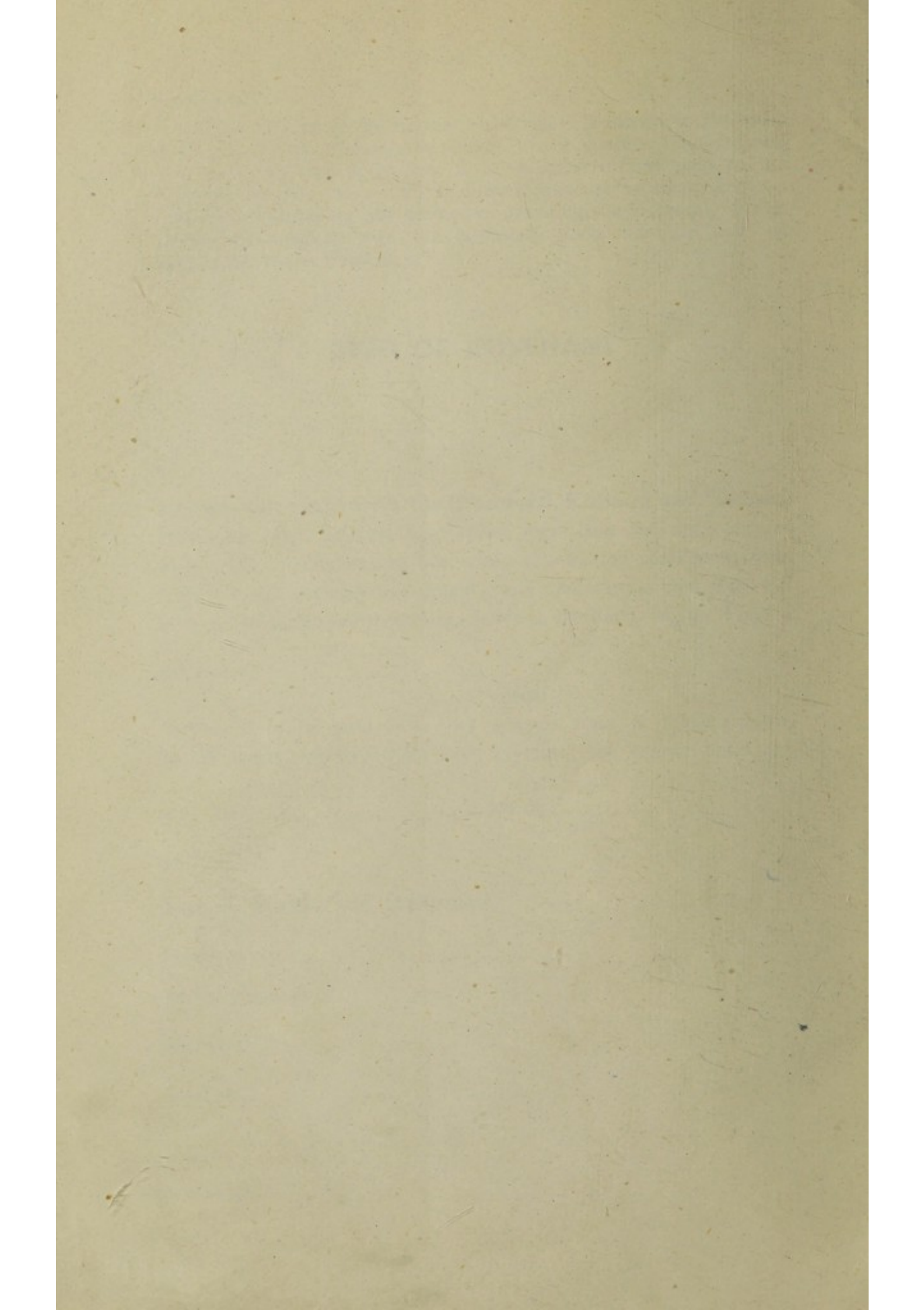
