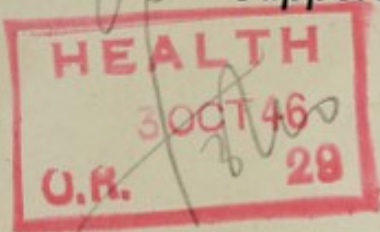

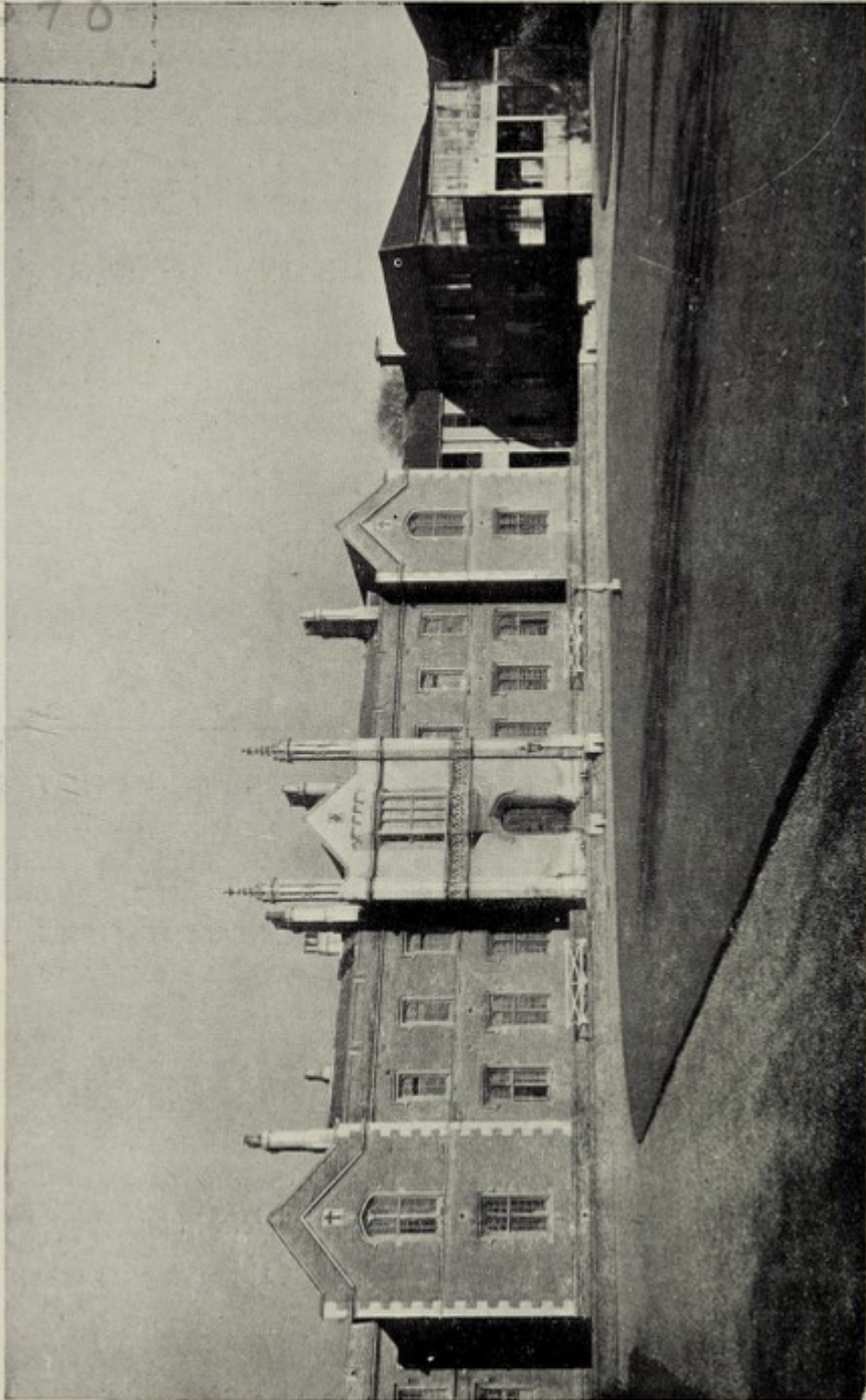

**One Hundred and Seventeenth Annual Report
of the
Stamford, Rutland and General Infirmary,
1945.**

The Board of Management has much pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Seventeenth Report of the Infirmary with the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for 1945.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

1638 In-Patients were admitted during the year compared with 1840 in 1944. The average length of stay of each Patient was 13.4 days compared with 13.6 days last year. 4725 Out-Patients were treated compared with 4910 in 1944. Out-Patient attendances numbered 12,885. The reduction in the number of Patients treated was due to the restriction on the admission of Patients owing to shortage of Staff.

INCOME.

Ordinary Income for the year amounted to £23,379 13s. 2d.

EXPENDITURE.

Ordinary Expenditure £24,166 8s. 11d.

Extra-Ordinary Expenditure £1,005 18s. 1d.

Deficit £1792 13s. 10d.

(Less Grant re Nurses Salaries due to 31/3/45, £891 16s. 3d.)

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The Income received from this source amounted to £8,424 10s. 2d., compared with £8,645 17s. 5d. for 1944. The amount received from other Hospitals in respect of services rendered was £784 10s. 3d. The sum of £375 3s. 6d. was paid to other Hospitals in respect of services rendered to contributors of this Scheme. The Board desires to express its appreciation and grateful thanks for the loyal support rendered by the Infirmary Voluntary Workers and Contributors. The continued success of the Contributory Scheme reflects great credit on all helpers.

The Board is deeply grateful to Miss Hannah Elizabeth Smith of Deeping St. James for the gift of £1,000 for the purpose of endowing a bed in memory of her mother (Mrs. Sarah Smith) and two sisters (Miss Mary Jane Smith and Miss Susannah Smith) and to be used for the benefit of the people of Deeping St. James.

NAMING OF BEDS.

During the year the Civil Defence Services donated a sum of £110 6s., for the purpose of naming a bed; thus following the example set by the "E" Coy., Stamford 4th Northants Batt., Home Guard, and the National Fire Service, Stamford. The Board is most grateful to the three services for recording their appreciation of the work rendered by the Hospital during the war years in this generous and practical manner.

GIFTS.

Miss M. M. F. O'Brien of Blatherwycke most generously presented the sum of £500 to be used for the direct benefit of the patients. A portion of this is being spent to provide the electrically heated food conveyer. The Board is deeply indebted to Miss O'Brien for this gift.

THANKSGIVING WEEK.

The South Witham Savings Committee have always remembered the Hospital on the occasion of the various special savings weeks campaigns, this year Saving Stamps to the value of £9 were received from their "Thanksgiving Effort".

BUILDING EXTENSIONS.

The amount due to the Bank in respect of Building Extensions is £2,662 10s. 11d.

CHURCH AND CHAPEL COLLECTIONS.

The support received from the Clergy, Ministers, Laity and Congregations is most encouraging. This year the sum of £233 7s. 7d. was received. The Churches and Chapels continued the custom of sending fruit and vegetables from the Harvest Festival Thanksgiving Services. These gifts are much appreciated.

ALEXANDRA ROSE DAY.

The Board is much indebted to all helpers for raising the sum of £121 13s. 4d. by the 1945 effort.

POUND WEEK.

3729½ lbs. in produce and goods and £48 19s. 9d. in cash were received. In view of the existing restrictions this is a most gratifying result.

WOTHORPE ANNEXE.

With the reduction in the number of E.M.S. beds required, the annexe was closed on 17th July. During the period it was in commission, 207 patients were admitted.

LADIES LINEN LEAGUE.

The League has been a source of helpfulness to the Infirmary for many years, and during the year gifts of Linen and cash were received. The Board wish to convey to the Ladies who have been so industrious and generous, their very grateful thanks for this loyal support and help.

MATRON.

Miss I. Elliott resigned her appointment as Matron in August. During the 15 years Miss Elliott was in charge of the nursing side of the Infirmary she proved herself to be of outstanding ability. In the absence of a Sister Tutor, Miss Elliott carried out the tuition and was most successful with her students. Miss Kathleen Grayson was appointed by the Board to succeed Miss Elliott and took up her duties in September. Miss Grayson has had a wide experience of nursing in many different types of Hospitals and at the time of her appointment was first Administrative Sister at the County Hospital, Farnborough.

GENERAL.

During the year the Ministry of Health Report of the Survey of the Hospital Services of the Sheffield & East Midlands area was published. The Board of Management have carefully studied the remarks appertaining to Stamford Infirmary, and are of the opinion that geographically, Stamford must remain a Centre (i.e. Small General Hospital), and that the remarks concerning the Consultant Staff no longer apply.

NATIONAL HEALTH SERVICE.

The Bill for a National Health Service is now before Parliament. So far as can be seen, the Bill clearly means the end of Voluntary Hospitals as such, and, indeed the end of Local Authority

Hospitals as well. Thus, with the exception of the Teaching Hospitals, all Hospitals will be administered under 16 to 20 Regional Boards, appointed by the Minister after consultation with various bodies. The Regional Boards will appoint local Boards of Management for a Hospital or Group of Hospitals. The powers of these local Boards seem to be concerned with day to day administration only.

Hospital managements realise that the time has arrived when it is essential that Hospital services should be co-ordinated, but it would appear that the new Scheme will, owing to its very magnitude, destroy the outstanding features of the Voluntary Hospital Movement.

The British Hospitals Association representing 1100 Voluntary Hospitals, has put forward a plan that would retain all the best characteristics of the Voluntary hospital, and at the same time provide for the co-ordination of a regional hospital plan.

The Board take this opportunity to pay tribute to the Chairman, Sir Bernard Docker, and to the Secretary, Mr. J. P. Wetenhall, for the great service they have rendered to the Hospital Movement by their approaches to the various Government Departments to press for the adoption of the Association's plan.

The Board sincerely trust that the Bill in its final form will be so framed as to foster local interest.
