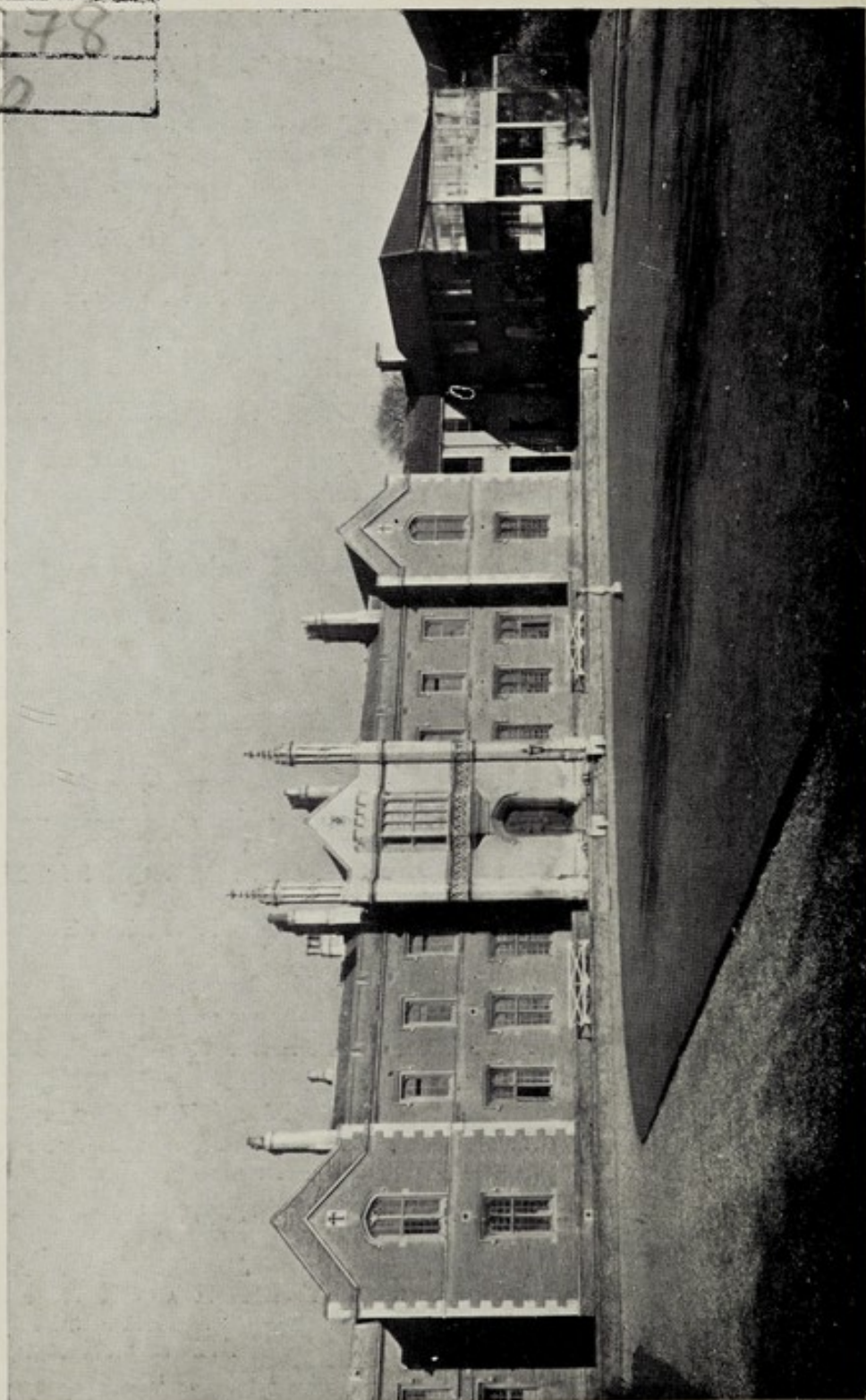

**One Hundred and Eighteenth Annual Report
of the
Stamford, Rutland and General Infirmary,
1946.**

The Board of Management has much pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Eighteenth Report of the Infirmary with the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for 1946.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

1491 In-Patients were admitted during the year compared with 1638 in 1945. The average length of stay of each Patient was 12.8 days compared with 13.4 days last year. 5053 Out-Patients were treated compared with 4725 in 1945. Out-Patient attendances numbered 12,164. The reduction in the number of Patients treated was due to the restriction on the admission of Patients owing to shortage of Staff.

INCOME.

Ordinary Income for the year amounted to £20,804 6s. 1d.

With the exception of receipts from the Government Hospita Emergency Scheme which fell by £2484 (i.e. 1946 £3704 against 1945 £6188) Ordinary Income remains static.

The continued success of the Contributory Scheme reflects great credit on all helpers.

The support received from the Clergy, Ministers, Laity and Congregations is most encouraging. This year the sum of £245 5s. 8d. an increase of £11 18s. 1d. over 1945 was received.

ALEXANDRA ROSE DAY.

This effort has again met with a generous response from the public and our best thanks is extended to all who contributed either in cash or by service. 1946 effort = £125 13s. 9d.

POUND WEEK.

In view of the continued restrictions it was deemed advisable not to hold a collection this year. This is the first occasion on which a Pound Week Collection has not been held in 30 years.

LADIES LINEN LEAGUE.

For many years the Infirmary Linen League has been in existence and as a result of their efforts supplied the Infirmary with most of the bed linen required, which has meant a considerable saving to the Board, and thus released funds for other purposes. To the President (The Most Honourable the Marchioness of Exeter), the Vice-Presidents, Honorary Secretary and Treasurer (Mrs. P. K. Banks, J. P.), and the large number of ladies who have given such valuable assistance the Board sincerely tender their best thanks.

Maternity Unit.

Plans are being prepared for a new unit of 40 beds.

The Building Sub-Committee has prepared plans of future developments briefly these are as follows :—

General beds—additional main wards for provision of medical beds.

Theatre—an additional and larger theatre unit.

Main Kitchens—a new Kitchen unit, including dining rooms for Nurses and Domestic Staff.

Additional accommodation for Nurses and Domestic Staff.

Heating and services—centralising boiler installation.
