



THE ONE HUNDRED AND NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

of the

Stamford, Rutland and General Infirmary

1947

The Board of Management has much pleasure in presenting the One Hundred and Nineteenth Report of the Infirmary with the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for 1947.

WORK OF THE YEAR.

1578 In-Patients were admitted during the year compared with 1491 in 1945. The average length of stay of each Patient was 12.6 days compared with 12.8 days last year. 5355 Out-Patients were treated compared with 5053 in 1946. Out-Patient attendances numbered 10813. The increase in the number of Patients treated was due to the continued improvement in the Nursing situation.

INCOME.

Ordinary Income for the year reached a record figure of £24,127 10s. 11d.

The receipts from the Government Hospitals Emergency Scheme continued to decline, the total for 1947, £2,057, was £1,647 less than 1946.

The most striking increase was in the amount received from the Contributory Association i.e. £8195, an increase of £1,610 on the 1946 figure. The receipts from Public Authorities in respect of services rendered also continues to increase annually.

EXPENDITURE.

Ordinary Expenditure continued to increase and the total of £30,391 19s. 1d. is the highest ever recorded.

Extra-Ordinary Expenditure totalled £598 13s. 11d.

The Deficit for 1947 is £6,773 2s. 1d.

Salaries and wages were 3,138 8s. 1d. higher than the 1946 figure, whilst there was an increase of £1,142 9s. 11d. under the heading Domestic.

There was very little change in the remaining items of Expenditure.

CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

The Income received from this source amounted to £8,195, this is the highest allocation received from the Contributory Association. The substantial increase is mainly due to the increased rate of contributions (6d. per week instead of 4d.) which operated from the 1st July.

You will, no doubt, be interested to know that since the inception of the Contributory Scheme in February, 1931, the total amount collected to the 31st December, 1947 exceeds £92,000.

Qualifying Whist Drives have produced on an average £200 a year so that the total received is over £95,000. It is anticipated that when the Contributory Scheme ceases on the 3rd July 1948 over £100,000 will have been collected. This is a remarkable record, particularly as this large sum has been raised by voluntary effort, and not one penny has been charged for collection.

BUILDING EXTENSIONS

On the 17th September, 1947, the Entertainments Committee authorised the transfer of £2,662 10s. 11d. to pay off the balance due on the Building Extensions Account, at the same time a sum of £211 13s. 7d. was transferred to General Account.

X-RAY FUND.

This Fund was closed by the above transfers.

ENTERTAINMENTS COMMITTEE.

The Board is deeply grateful to the Entertainments Committee for organising the Whit-Monday Carnival and for raising the sum of $\pounds763$ 13s. 6d. It is with pleasure that the Board place on record its deep appreciation of the splendid services rendered by this Committee.

From August, 1942 to May, 1947 the Entertainments Committee raised over £5,500, the cost of re-equipping the X-Ray Department (X-Ray Unit, Processing and Drying Units) was defrayed from this Fund.

The Board welcomes this opportunity of paying tribute to this energetic Committee for its untiring support.

CHURCH AND CHAPEL COLLECTIONS.

Sincere thanks are accorded to the Clergy, Ministers and Laity, for their invaluable help in contributing through offertories in Places of Worship, the sum of £224 9s. 9d.

ALEXANDRA ROSE DAY.

The response to this year's appeal was satisfactory, the sum raised is ± 106 6s. 0d. Sincere thanks are accorded to all those who contributed either in cash or services.

POUND WEEK.

In view of the continued restrictions this appeal was discontinued.

LADIES LINEN LEAGUE.

This invaluable organisation had another very successful year, the Board records its appreciation of the splendid service rendered by the Ladies Linen League over many years. The League had been responsible for supplying the Infirmary with most of its linen requirements, this has saved the Board a considerable sum of money.

The success of the Linen League has been largely due to its President, The Marchioness of Exeter, who has presided over its destinies and inspired its activities for 38 years.

For the thirty years prior to 1935 her Ladyship was mainly responsible for the organisation of the Annual Hospital Ball, a most popular and successful social event, and from which the Infirmary derived many thousands of pounds.

EAST ANGLIAN REGIONAL BOARD.

The Hospitals in this area will be administered by the East Anglian Regional Hospitals Board, with headquarters at Cambridge.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee, Canon J.D. Day, M.A., has been appointed a member of this Board.

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.

In order to meet the revised requirements of the general Nursing Council the Board concluded an Agreement with the Kesteven County Council, whereby the Medical Wards at St. George's Home, and the Bourne Isolation Hospital shall be included in the Stamford Infirmary School Training Scheme. The detailed Scheme has received the approval of the General Nursing Council.

The Board much appreciate the co-operation of the Health and Public Assistance Committees of the Kesteven County Council in this matter.

The Board also concluded an agreement with the Board of Management of the Lincoln County Hospital, whereby 3 places are reserved anually at the Lincoln Preliminary Training School for Pre-Nursing Students from this Hospital. This Scheme has worked admirably.

PRE-NURSING COURSE IN SCHOOLS.

A scheme for the introduction of a Pre-Nursing Course in schools is at present in course of preparation, it is hoped that in due course an agreement on this subject will be reached with the various Education Authorities in this area.

MATRON.

Miss M. C. Coyne, S.R.N., SC.M., T.A., was appointed Matron in succession to Miss Grayson (resigned).

Miss Coyne who took up her duties on the 1st May, was a member of the hospital staff at one period and has had a wide experience of nursing in many different types of Hospitals and at the time of her appointment was Assistant Matron at the Wrightington Hospital.



STEPHENSON, SMART & Co., Auditors. A Tribute to the President and Chairman, The Most Noble The Marquess of Exeter, K.G., C.M.G.



UNDER THE National Health Act of 1946 the Stamford, Rutland and General Infirmary passes to the control of the East Anglian Hospital Board and this is the last Annual Report to be published by the locally appointed Body of Managers, who have been responsible for it since its foundation in 1828 through the generous benefaction of Mr. Henry Fryer.

During the whole of this period its President and Chairman has been a Marquess of Exeter. The Managers feel that this last report would be incomplete unless they paid tribute to

the unique service rendered to the Infirmary by the Cecil family and particularly by the present Marquess, who has been their Chairman for no less than 51 years.

The second Marquess took a leading part in the planning and building of the original Infirmary, for which he gave the site and of which he was a liberal benefactor. The third Marquess was President from 1867 till 1895. During his period of office various additions were made to the hospital, including the three Isolation Blocks, which in those days were considered the last word in efficiency. The fourth Marquess unfortunately held office for a brief period of only three years. He was succeeded in 1897 by the present Marquess.

During this long period only those who have served under him as Managers know how much money, time and thought the present Marquess has given to its affairs and how much it owes to his energy and wise leadership.

Year by year under his guidance the Infirmary has steadily added to its capacity for dealing with the ever increasing calls upon its services. New apparatus has been installed, improvements made in the buildings, the services of additional Consultants secured and nursing and administrative staffs engaged. From time to time he has inspired notable developments.

1926. A complete new wing consisting of Children's Wards, "Erected in memory of those who fell in the Great War 1914-1918" and Maternity Wards was built. This extension was opened by Princess Mary on 30th October, 1926.

1929. The Hospital was re-built and extended, thus providing for 52 additional beds.

1931. The Wards were fitted up with wireless. The Contributory Scheme inaugurated.

1932 A new Laundry was built and equipped.

1935. A Superannuation Scheme for Nurses was adopted.

1939. A new home for Nurses was built.

1939-1945. As a war-time emergency measure the bed complement was increased to 196 and included Wothorpe House and an Annexe at Burghley House.

1942. Maternity Department extended from 6 to 16 Beds.

1944. X-Ray Department re-equipped.

Nor must we pass over the services rendered to our Infirmary by the Marchioness of Exeter. No one has been a more helpful member of the Weekly Board or attended its meetings more regularly and no one can gauge how much the Nurses and Patients owe to her constant care and gracious influence. May they long be spared to continue the good work which they have done so consistently and ungrudgingly for so many years.
