

In submitting their fifty-first Annual Report to their subscribers, the Committee have pleasure in recording that, in spite of unique circumstances in the annals of the country, they have nevertheless been able to continue the work of the Institution at the high standard of efficiency which has hitherto been its characteristic.

Financially it has been a very trying year, as the great war, with its far-reaching effect on all classes of the community, has been responsible for a decrease in subscriptions, whilst, on the other hand, the general increase in the price of commodities has led to a proportional increase in expenditure. Whilst regretting that many varied calls upon the generosity of the subscribers have accounted for the reduction in their number, the Committee are gratified to find a welcome increase in the amount subscribed by the workmen. It though in several firms in the town the subscriptions for workmen shew a decrease, doubtless owing to the numbers of those employed having joined the colours, yet in the case of some of the larger firms a substantial increase is recorded, due in a great measure to the increase in numbers of workers on munitions of war.

Throughout the year the Hospital has treated a large number of H.M. troops, who have been stationed in the town and district for training, and as the Military Authorities have paid for these patients, the total amount being about £270, this has proved to be a welcome addition to the income. Although many of the cases have been serious and necessitated operations, yet the Committee are thankful to record that the majority have been cured, and thus enabled to take their places again in defence of their country.

Another special source of income has been the maintenance fees paid by the Durham County Council for Tubercular Patients undergoing treatment in the Hospital. A number of these cases have been In-patients during the year, and the County Authoritic have paid £140 towards the cost of their maintenance.

Without these two special items of income, the Committee would have had to face a very serious deficit on the year's working.

The Committee have again experienced difficult in securing the services of a House Surgeon. Dr. Hickey retired early in the year to take duty with H.M. Forces, and after several locum tenens had assisted the Committee were fortunate in being able to appoint a lady House Surgeon in Miss C. D. Maitland, M.B., Ch.B., who, although she was only able to stay a few months in residence, nevertheless acquitted herself in a remarkably capable manner, her work being very highly praised both by the Patients and the Hon. Medical and Surgical Staff. Dr. Maitland left in June to be married, and the Committee deeply regret that both she and her husband were drowned in the Mediterranean by the sinking of the "Persia" in November last.

Dr. J. Jopling Brown, a former House Surgeon, succeeded Miss Maitland, and was very ably assisted by Mr. Alex. Cleland, Edinburgh University, for a few months, until Dr. Brown's military duties called him from the town, when the Committee were again exceptionally fortunate in securing the services of another lady, Miss Jean Paton Gordon, M.B., Ch.B., who has had considerable Hospital experience as Surgeon both in this country and for about eight months in a Military Hospital in France. Miss Gordon came with the highest credentials, and has already endeared herself to the Patients and Staff, and in view of the serious difficulties already experienced the Committee trust that her stay will be a prolonged one.

The appreciation of the continued devotion and skill of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff and the House Surgeon, the kindness and attention of the Lady Superintendent, the Sisters and Nurses, receive constant confirmation from numerous letters received from Patients, who, in the majority of cases, enclose donations as thankofferings for the benefits received, of which the following are instances:—

Herewith please find 5s., as a slight donation to the Hospital, "from a Patient who received most careful and considerate attention, and who is thankful for the benefit derived."

"Enclosed please find a small subscription (£1). No doubt "you will leased to hear I am feeling very well. I shall always "feel very grateful to the Matron and all Nurses for your kindness "to me when in the Hospital."

"Enclosed is postal order for £1, a small donation in return "for all the kindness I received while I was an inmate of the "Greenbank Hospital a fortnight ago."

"I am enclosing a cheque for £5 towards the Hospital for your "kindness to — while she was there. I am also sending you three "nightshirts, which I thought would be useful to you."

"I enclose £2 2s. as a donation to the Greenbank Hospital, my "nurse having been in there for a week or so after her accident."

The Ladies' Committee report "that they have regularly visited Le Hospital during 1915. They feel the work of the Hospital has been done efficiently, in spite of some disorganisation caused by the difficulty in replacing the Staff, and Nurses leaving to get well-paid posts in Military Hospitals. Several servants left to do munition work, but the vacancies were ultimately filled. The Patients constantly express their appreciation of the treatment they receive. The Ladies' Committee are satisfied that the Lady Superintendent and the whole Staff are desirous that the standard set up in the Hospital in easier times shall be maintained."

Sincere and hearty thanks are herewith accorded:-

To the Hon. Medical and Surgical Staff for their devoted and skilful services, their uniform kindness and continuous attention to the necessities of the Patients in the relief of their sufferings.

To the House Surgeon—Dr. Gordon—who has rendered valuable service to the Hospital.

To the Lady Superintendent, the Sisters, Nurses, and Staff

generally for their assiduous attention to the diversified ties devolving upon them in carrying out successfully the requirements of the Institution.

To the Ladies' Committee for the general oversight of the domestic requirements which they have exercised and the helpfulness of their counsel.

To the many generous friends who have during the year contributed food, clothing, books, periodicals, and innumerable other gifts, which are highly appreciated by the Patients and Staff.

To the many generous Annual Subscribers, who secure to the Institution a continuous income.

To the Editors of the Daily and Weekly Newspapers for placing their columns at the service of the Committee.

The Committee regard this report as conclusive evidence of the highly efficient manner in which the whole work of the Hospital has been accomplished under the continued exceptional circumstances. They cannot sufficiently thank all those who have displayed such a kindly interest in the welfare of the Institution, as to send gifts both in money and in kind, and have done such splendid services to help the Committee to keep the efficiency of the Hospital up to its previous high standard. They cannot, however, close without again regretting the falling off in subscriptions, and in spite of the many and varied claims on the generosity of their subscribers, they nevertheless make an urgent appeal for additional help to enable them to carry on the beneficial work of the Institution as worthily in the future as has been its tradition for the past fifty-one years.

EYE, EAR, NOSE, AND THROAT DEPARTMENT.

A large—and increasing—amount of work has been done in this departm. during the year among our Out-patients, many of whom have been admitted to the Hospital for operations, and have again become Out-patients to complete the cure.

On an average 4 or 5 fresh cases have been seen at each Clinique (Tuesdays and Fridays), and, in addition, 25 to 30 attendances of cases already under treatment; in other words, 200 to 250 fresh cases have been dealt with during the year and 1,300 attendances at the department.

There have been 186 operations performed under a general anæsthetic during the year, and 46 under cocain or a local anæsthetic. These operations are quite separate from—and not included in—the operations on In-patients alluded to in the House Surgeon's Report.

On an average half of these Patients are eye cases, the remaining half being about equally divided between ear, nose, and throat cases. In some cases the nose and throat are involved; in some the ear, nose, and throat; and in a few the eyes, ears, nose, and throat.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.

I beg to report that good use continues to be made of the X-Ray Department.

During the year 324 cases have been treated, including 109 X-Ray examinations and 215 exposures for therapeutic treatment.

Many cases from the military in the district, Catterick, Richmond, Bishop Auckland, etc., have been examined, and bullets and pieces of shrapnel localised in wounds.
