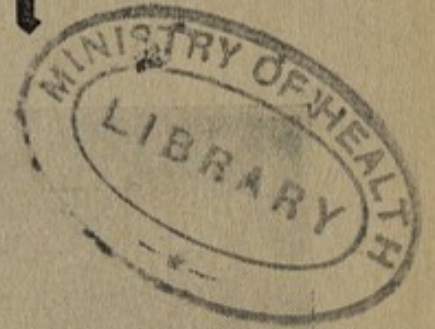
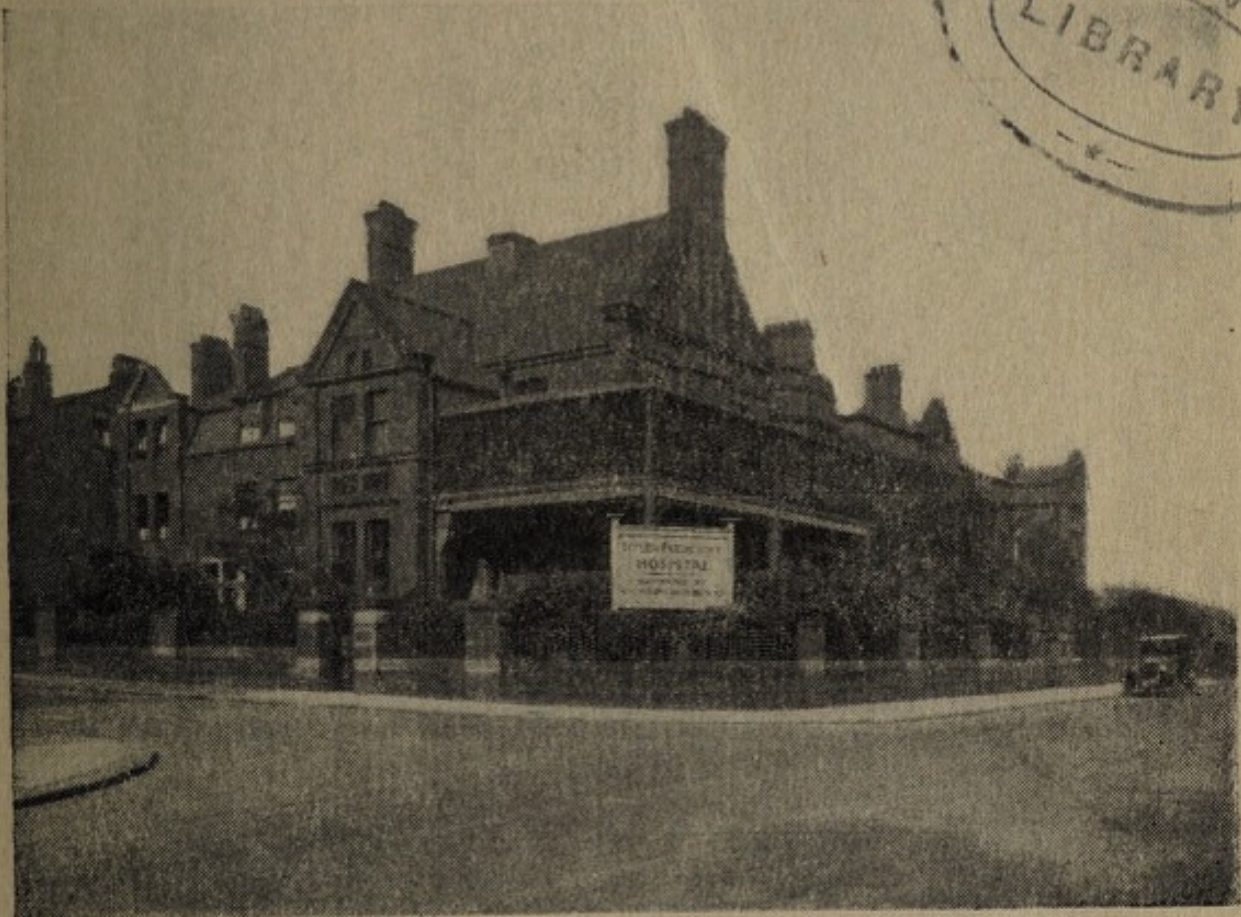

ANNUAL MEETING

of the Governors of the Eccles & Patricroft Hospital,

HELD 13th MARCH, 1929, AT THE TOWN HALL, ECCLES.

The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Eccles and Patricroft Hospital was held at the Town Hall, Eccles, on Wednesday, 13th March, 1929.

Mr. Alfred Tongue, President, occupied the Chair, and was supported by the Mayor of Eccles, Councillor Robert Cardwell, Mr. F. T. Kinsman, the Honorary Superintendent, Dr. J. Dowzer, J.P., the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Dr. Geo. Sidley, the Chairman of the Medical Board and others.

The Secretary, Mr. B. Manson, read the notice convening the meeting and the minutes of the previous meeting.

Mr. Alfred Tongue in moving the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts commented on the great strides made by their local Hospital. He made a strong appeal for a still larger number of people to contribute to the funds of the Institution in order that the good work may not be jeopardised in any way. He expressed his deepest thanks to the work-people of the district. He regarded their efforts as the most encouraging feature of the Report; their contribution had been increased by £500 on the previous year. The latter effort would, however, be off-set during the coming year in so far as they would not have the help of the Mayor's 100,000 Shilling Fund. The ladies had again promised to come forward in their self-sacrificing work and to hold in due course a Bazaar.

If the people in the area were kept well informed of the good work done at their Institution, he felt sure, they had not exhausted the possibility of raising more money.

Dr. J. Dowzer, J.P., seconded, and the Report and Accounts were adopted.

Mr. F. T. Kinsman, the Honorary Superintendent in proposing a hearty vote of thanks to the Honorary Physicians and Surgeons commented on the great advancement that the Hospital had made since he took office as Honorary Secretary some 15 years ago. They would be pleased to note that during the past year the number of Honorary Physicians and Surgeons had been increased by the appointments of Dr. A. Corsar Sturrock, M.D., as Honorary Physician, Mr. Robert Ollerenshaw, F.R.C.S., as Honorary Orthopædic Surgeon, and Dr. I. Martin Sidley to the Medical Board. He regretted the illness of Dr. R. Addis, the Gynæcological Surgeon, but trusted he would soon be restored to health and amongst them. Without making individualistic reference, for all were deserving of the greatest praise, he must mention

the yeoman efforts of the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Dr. J. Dowzer, J.P., and the Chairman of the Medical Board, Dr. Geo. Sidley.

The vote of thanks was seconded by Mr. H. J. Albrow, J.P., the President of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund, and carried with acclamation.

The resolution proposing a vote of thanks to the Honorary Officials was moved by the Worshipful the Mayor, Councillor Robert Cardwell, who intimated his intention to encourage the support of the Hospital whenever possible. The resolution was carried.

Mr. F. W. Watson proposed the vote of thanks to the Matron and Nursing Staff. Councillor G. G. Senior, O.B.E., J.P.C., seconded. Carried.

Mr. H. M. B. Davies, Honorary Treasurer, moved that a hearty vote of thanks be accorded to the Subscribers, Donors, and friends of the Hospital. He was not unmindful of the fact that they would need over £7,000 for maintenance purposes only, during the coming year, and much work would have to be done to attain this end. He appealed for continued and increased support.

Mr. Geo. F. Kitson, seconded, and the resolution was carried.

The Rev. C. B. Martyn-Johns then moved that the warmest thanks be accorded to the President, Mr. Alfred Tongue, and that he be re-elected President.

Dr. Geo. Sidley in seconding stated that the foundation of excellent administration depended on the interest taken by their President, and in this respect Mr. Tongue had fulfilled his great mission to the uttermost.

The resolution was adopted with acclamation.

Col. J. Andrew, J.P. moved the re-election of the Vice-Presidents, Mr. S. Butler, seconded, Carried.

Dr. W. J. Hayes moved the election of the undermentioned as members of the Board of Governors for the ensuing 12 months.

ANNUAL REPORT

of the

Board of Governors

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31st, 1928.

The Board of Governors has pleasure in submitting their Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the year 1928.

The year just completed has been an important one in the history of the hospital, in that, primarily, the outstanding feature has been its growth consequent on the vast calls from this large industrial area. Every existing department had been taxed to capacity and owing to the insistent demands upon the Hospital's good offices extensions and re-equipment have taken place on a large scale.

The principal extensions have been in the bed accommodation; the X-ray department; the Massage and Electro-therapy department and the Ultra-violet Ray department, all at great cost to the Institution, the whole of which has not been paid for yet.

Income. The receipts for the year from general sources amounted to £5,412 15s. 9d.—the principal items being £782 10s. 0d. Annual Subscriptions—an increase of £131 19s. 3d. on the previous year; £886 1s. 0d. from fees for services rendered; £1,619 13s. 11d. from the Workpeople's Hospital Fund—an increase of £465 11s. 7d. on the previous year; £546 14s. 5d. from the ex-mayor of Eccles, 100,000 Shilling Fund and £190 unfettered Legacies. The Extra-ordinary Income, details of which are shown later, was mainly received as a result of the Appeal Fund launched in regard to the extensions.

Expenditure for the Current and After years. The Board is very anxious to augment the income from ordinary sources—for the essential maintenance of the Hospital, and particularly in view of the greater bed capacity in the Hospital, which, of course, will mean an appreciable increase in the Expenditure for the current year. THE FACT THAT ON THE YEAR'S (1928) WORKING, THE BOARD HAVE TO REPORT THE EXCESS OF EXPENDITURE OVER INCOME OF £1,275 6s. 4d. TELLS ITS OWN TALE; more so when this sum has to be added to a deficiency of £1,305 16s. 0d. for the year 1927. Now that our expenditure will certainly not be less than £7,500 for the current and after years, it behoves the people in the district to come quickly and readily to the support of the Institution.

Expenditure. The Ordinary Expenditure for the year 1928 was £6,688 2s. 1d.—an increase of £1,143 9s. 4d. over that of the previous year, but taking into account the great increase in the work of the Hospital—specified in detail on page 12, the increase is not out of proportion to the extra work done. In fact, many economies have been effected—through careful handling, but in no case has this economy militated against the efficiency of this working.

Unfortunately, our income has not reached the required sum, but the Board hope that with the publicity gained by the Hospital during the past few months, many more Subscribers and Donors will enlist in the support of the Institution.

Mention must be made of the item £230 11s. 4d. Bank Interest. This is really unfortunate—in that it can be avoided by Subscribers and others sending their gifts early in the year, and by a more generous response to the appeal for funds to maintain the Hospital.

Hospital Extensions. The year 1928 may be looked upon as a memorable one in the history of the Hospital as regards extensions and, incidentally, a fair amount of re-equipment. In March of 1928, certain new departments were opened by the Worshipful the Mayor, Councillor J. W. Ireland, J.P., namely, a Sunray department, Massage and Electro-therapy department and an entirely new and modern X-ray equipment housed.

The New Medical Wing. A further extension, the New Medical Wing—and one which makes the Hospital a “General” one, in that almost all manner of cases can be treated—was brought about towards the end of the year and was officially opened on January 5th, 1929, by the Right Hon. The Earl of Derby, P.C., K.G.

This meant an addition of 15 medical beds to the Hospital, and included the “Alderman Joseph Schofield Ward”—a sum of £1,000 being given by Mrs. Schofield to perpetuate the memory of her late husband.

With the increase in bed accommodation, extra staff had to be appointed—and this staff had to be housed. Through the generosity of the President, Mr. Alfred Tongue, two houses in close vicinity of the Hospital were purchased, and furnished, thus providing the accommodation needed.

Statistics of Work Done. Undoubtedly, this has been the heaviest year, as regards work done, in the history of the Hospital. The table on page 12 is indicative of this.

The admissions have increased by about 16% and other departments show even a much larger increase. Now that the New Medical Wing is open, the work—and consequent cost—will be still greater. It is worthy of note here that with the growth of this industrial area it was essential to provide extra accommodation and extra staff—in order to meet the ever-growing needs of the district. Mention must also be made of the number of patients treated through street accidents, mainly as a result of motor traffic. During the year 1928—18% of the Hospital's user and cost was brought about by these accidents—with, however, practically no return in the matter of payments or contributions. This undoubtedly, is a heavy burden on the Hospital and steps will have to be taken to gain some recompense for these services. The Hospital is being taxed to the uttermost—by the people living in the district and this extra outside burden calls for immediate action.

The Board has given serious consideration to the matter and avenues are being sought whereby the Hospital will obtain some return in this direction.

The Hospital's Status. The Eccles and Patricroft Hospital has now become a fully equipped Institution—capable of dealing with all manner of cases. It has 25 workers on the Honorary Staff, 2 Resident Officers, and 26 on the Nursing Staff, which, considering the size of the Hospital is very gratifying.

This Hospital will now be a recognised Institution, ready to perform and offer its services to all from whom the call may come. 1928 will be written in the annals of the Hospital as the year when the Institution grew to "manhood" and with it the status attached to a "Temple of Healing Service."

Medical and Surgical Staff. All the greatness of buildings, of equipment, and of administration would be of little avail, were it not for the services rendered by our Honorary Officers. One is left in complete admiration of their magnanimity. At no little cost to our Physicians and Surgeons, their services have been given ungrudgingly, and without the slightest hesitancy.

To these members of the Staff, the Board wishes to convey their most grateful appreciation and warmest thanks.

The Hospital is extremely fortunate in having such an able, painstaking, and enthusiastic Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff.

Nursing Staff. The Nursing Staff has continued its loyal co-operation in its usual unselfish manner and devotion. The numbers of the Nursing Staff have increased during the past year.

Honorary Officials. The Board notes with great pleasure and esteem the continued valuable interest and work of the President, Mr. Alfred Tongue ; the Hon. Superintendent, Mr. F. T. Kinsman ; the Chairman of the Board, Dr. J. Dowzer ; the Chairman of the Medical Board, Dr. G. Sidley ; The Honorary Treasurer, Mr. H. M. B. Davies (who during the year has performed most valuable services, particularly on the Appeal Committee) ; and the Chairman and Treasurer respectively of Workpeople's Hospital Fund, Mr. H. J. Albrow, J.P., and Geo. F. Kitson ; and the Board also desires to tender its grateful thanks to the Honorary Auditor, Mr. H. Duckworth ; and to the Honorary Solicitor, Mr. F. W. Watson.

The ex-Mayor's 100,000 Shilling Fund. On relinquishing office as Mayor of the Borough in November, 1928, Councillor J. W. Ireland, J.P., made his final contribution from the Fund inaugurated by him to the Eccles and Patricroft Hospital, thus making the total during 1928, £546 14s. 5d. and £2,170 14s. 5d. during his period of Mayoralty.

To the ex-mayor and his willing band of workers most grateful thanks are given.

Note is made also of the promise of his successor in office, Councillor Robert Cardwell, that every possible help will be given during his period of office. His Worship is acting in a very practical manner in this direction and much good will accrue to the Hospital.

Workpeople's Hospital Fund. During the year 1928, a new scheme of contribution was adopted by the Workpeople in the District ; and to-day over 50% of the Employees have agreed to allow a weekly deduction from their wages—or salaries—for the benefit of the Fund.

The result of this scheme is being shown in that whereas in 1927 the contribution to the Hospital was £1,154 2s. 4d. that in the year 1928 was £1,619 13s. 11d. The scheme is not working fully as yet, but is expected to do so within the next few months. The Workpeople's Hospital Fund has been—in the past—hindered in its work by reason of the fact that so many Eccles residents had to be sent for treatment to Salford and Manchester, because of our past lack of facilities for treatment, but now that we have extended our accommodation and can cater for all manner of cases, this drawback is swept away, and the Workpeople's Hospital Fund Committee will now proceed unfettered in its work on behalf of the Hospital. Their's is a great undertaking and has required tremendous energy and forbearance.

Appeal Fund. In October, 1928, an Appeal for Funds to cover the cost of the extensions was launched, and thanks to the contributions of the President, Mr. Tongue, the Members of the Board of Governors, Mrs. Schofield (Blackpool) and the large number of subscribers, the Appeal Fund has—at the moment of going to press—reached a total of over £4,000.

There is still £1,000 required and it is hoped this will be forthcoming early. To all members of the Appeal Fund Committee, namely, Messrs. Albrow, H. M. B. Davies, Geo. F. Kitson, Geo. G. Senior, Chas. Edmeston, Dr. Dowzer, and Dr. Sidley, the Board tenders its grateful thanks.

Efforts Committees. During the past year, Mrs. Watson and her Committee have again shown their untiring interest in the welfare of the Hospital and much of the new equipment in the Ultra-violet Ray Department was installed by this Committee's efforts.

Mrs. Hollinworth and Dr. D. Glen organised in March, 1928, a very successful function at the Midland Hotel, Manchester, and over £80 accrued therefrom.

The Winton Ladies, under the guidance of Mrs. Tonge, their President, again contributed handsomely to the Funds of this Hospital. This Committee working in its usual unobtrusive manner benefits the Institution in no uncertain fashion.

The Sewing Ladies (Mrs. A. Brooks as President) has provided some 600 garments during the past year, and also contributed readily in the matter of material for making garments.

To all these Committees the Board desires to express its gratitude and appreciation, hoping that they will continue their kind services towards the Institution.

Conclusion. The Board takes this opportunity of expressing its thanks to all Subscribers, Donors, Schools, Congregations, Clubs, Lodges, Organisers of Functions and Box Collectors for their efforts on behalf of the Hospital and expresses the hope, particularly in view of the required extra income, that, in their support of the Institution, they will endeavour to foster the idea of engaging the sympathies of many more possible friends and donors to the Hospital.

Eleventh ANNUAL REPORT and Statement of Accounts of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund

The Committee have much pleasure in presenting the 11th Annual Report and Statement of Accounts.

The year 1928 has been a very successful one and has also marked an important step in the matter of consolidating the means of raising funds to help the Hospital in its great mission towards the sick. This latter has been its outstanding feature—the institution of a Contributory Scheme of voluntary deduction by Employees of a weekly sum from their salaries or wages—such amounts being collected gratuitously—by the employers and paid over to the funds. Thus the whole of such deductions has gone directly to the benefit of the Institution. At a time when the position of the Voluntary Hospital's status is being vigorously inquired into by the Country, this voluntary contributory scheme replies effectively to the many attacks made as to the advisability of the continuance of the "Voluntary" system.

INCOME.

The year 1928 has brought forward the greatest amount ever collected since the inception of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund in this area as the following comparative table shows :—

Thus an increase of £147 11s. 10d. on the previous year is worthy of congratulation to the many subscribers. The principal items of the income for the year are :—

£1,175 13s. 5½d. from the Contributory Scheme.

£261 1s. 11½d. from the Licensed Houses.

£70 16s. 9d. from "Efforts."

£26 17s. 0d. Donations.

£12 2s. 10d. Collecting Boxes.

The Contributory Scheme, taking the place of the casual collections at factories and shops; the Licensed Houses' contributions; the Donations and Collection Boxes all show a material increase on those of the previous year, and is very gratifying.

EXPENDITURE.

The Expenditure necessary to collect the income is but 1.8%—indeed a very small amount, and most of it is on account of printing and postages. £1,505 was handed over to the Eccles and Patricroft Hospital and the Cash at Bank at the end of the financial year was £26 0s. 8d.

It is worthy of mention that there is no item for salaries or wages—in other words the whole of the work is done gratuitously—those on the Committee doing their work—arduous as it certainly is—willingly and with no eye on reward.

THE CONTRIBUTORY SCHEME.

In the Spring of 1928 the scheme was launched, asking employers to allow a deduction of twopence for Adults and one penny for youths and girls—from the weekly earnings. Many works have so far come into the scheme, but there are many—if not the greater number—who have not as yet. Thus the scheme is far from complete. £1,175 13s. 5½d. has been received under this heading, but considering the working population of the area the sum which ought to accrue, allowing for "off work" and holidays is no less than £4,000 per annum!

Thus, with Licensed Houses' collections and other items, the Committee will not rest content until they are in a position to hand over close upon £5,000 to the Hospital. This might at first sight appear a huge figure, but it can be done—if only the workpeople in the area will take that interest in the Hospital it really deserves.

To those firms, factories, workshops, and business houses who have joined the scheme, the Committee tenders its most grateful thanks and to those who have not as yet "joined up," the Committee expresses the hope that twelve months hence, they will no longer be classified as the "nots."

LICENSED HOUSES.

The collections at Licensed Houses show a material and welcome increase of £28 5s. 7d. making the 1928 collection £261 1s. 11d., a record to date.

There are 51 licensed houses in the Borough—but only 35 have contributed. The others must come in—more work for the Committee! Surely the income from this source ought to be £400 per annum!

DONATIONS AND EFFORTS.

No doubt the efforts of the Hospital itself in its Appeal for Funds for the Extensions, have meant a slight decrease in the estimated return from these sources. In the coming year it is hoped that these items will proceed unfettered in their eventual returns. Mention must be made of the Peel Green—Grapes Hotel Bowling Association for their wonderful contribution in 1928.

THANKS.

The grateful thanks of the Committee are tendered to all Subscribers, Donors, Licensed Houses, and friends of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund—and the hope is expressed that they will continue in their efforts—not merely maintaining their support but enlisting the support of as many more possible.

THE ECCLES AND PATRICROFT HOSPITAL.

It is pleasing to note that the main object of the Workpeople's Hospital Fund is to help maintain this Institution firstly, because of the great services rendered by the Hospital hitherto and is ever ready to go on in its mission of healing, and secondly, because the Hospital readily increases its bed accommodation and other facilities, so as to meet all calls made upon its good offices. There was need for extensions (the Workpeople's Hospital Fund made this call) and the Hospital speedily replied. During the past year the bed accommodation has grown from 32 to 62! This growth included a Medical Wing and incidentally making the Hospital a "General" one—in that all manner of cases can be dealt with. The X-ray department was fitted with entirely new and up-to-date equipment; the Massage department was re-equipped and a "Sunray" department supplied. Thus the work of the Hospital has grown in every department. From modest beginnings it is now a recognised General Hospital. But it must be remembered that this growth in work has meant a corresponding increase in expenditure, so much so, that whereas in 1927 the expenditure in maintenance alone was £5,544, that in the year 1928, £6,688 and in the coming year it is expected that no less than £7,500 will be required to meet the expenditure.

The Workpeople's Hospital Fund must share the burden of this expenditure. Surgeons and Physicians are giving their labours willingly and gratuitously. Nurses are working at sacrificial remuneration and hours, and the least we can do is to help keep the Institution open and free from the ever cry of a burdensome debt. The Workpeople's Hospital Fund pledges itself to do its "bit" and will gladly do it. It is their duty, a duty shouldered, knowing that magnanimity brings its own reward.

The Committee desires to extend its warmest thanks to the President, Mr. H. J. Albrow, J.P. and to the Treasurer, Mr. Geo. F. Kitson, who both have worked nobly in the cause ; and trust they will continue in their efforts for many years to come.

CONCLUSION.

There is much to be done yet in the matter of support to the Hospital. The £5,000 mark must be reached if not in 1929, then not later than 1930. The Hospital needs the money and it behoves all to work hard to attain this end.
