

ROYAL SHEFFIELD INFIRMARY AND HOSPITAL.

The Court of Management has pleasure in presenting its Second Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1940.

Chairman and Vice-Chairman.—Sir Ronald W. Matthews, the first Chairman of the Court of Management, proposed at the Annual General Meeting the election to the Chair of Mr. Fred. M. Osborn. This was seconded and carried unanimously. On the Chairman's proposal Sir Ronald Matthews was unanimously elected Vice-Chairman.

Treasurer.—Mr. Stuart C. Goodwin was unanimously elected Treasurer.

The late Bishop of Sheffield.—The Court records with deep regret the death in February, 1940, of the Right Reverend Dr. Leonard H. Burrows, the first Bishop of Sheffield. Dr. Burrows devoted much time and gave valuable service both to the Royal Infirmary and to the Hospitals Council, of which he was Chairman up to his retirement from the See in 1939.

Resignation.—Owing to increasing calls upon his time, Mr. \int . J. Baldwin Young, M.A., J.P., resigned from the Court, having given valuable service to the Royal Hospital since 1930. The Court expresses its sincere thanks to him for past service and for his promise of help in the future if required.

New Hospital—Plans Competition.—Progress in the acquisition of the remainder of the site in Glossop Road has been delayed by the War, but an Architect Assessor (Mr. J. Mansell Jenkinson, F.R.I.B.A.) was appointed, and with the advice of the Medical Committee drew up the specification of the new buildings and defined the competition conditions in accordance with the Rules of the Royal Institute of British Architects. Seven of the most prominent Hospital Architects were invited to compete and prizes were offered—the first, in addition to being the architects of the new buildings, were to receive £500, the second £300, the third £200 and others £50 each.

In June five sets of plans were received—one competitor having died and the other having withdrawn in the meantime. All were of a high order and the final selection was :—

First - Messrs. Adams, Holden & Pearson.

Second - Messrs. Sir John Burnet, Tait & Lorne.

Third - Messrs. Stanley Hall & Easton & Robertson.

Thanks to the members of the Libraries, Art Galleries and Museums Committee and the courtesy of the Director, all the plans were exhibited for two weeks in the Graves Art Gallery.

The War.—The additional accommodation mentioned in the last Report has been added to by the opening as a Recovery Hospital with 25 beds of "High Wray," Ecclesall, thanks to the kindness of Mrs. Bayldon Barber. The Trustees of the George Woofindin Convalescent Home have made more accommodation available for patients from the Hospitals, and the Sheffield Works Convalescent Homes at Matlock and Ashover have also extended a helping hand for suitable cases. Still more beds in places outside the target area are being sought to make good the reduction caused by the order of the Ministry of Health to empty all upper floor wards and reduce the occupation of other wards by fifty per cent.

The arrangements for treating air raid casualties were fully tested in December and found to be quite satisfactory. Both unit Hospitals suffered considerably from blast, the incendiary bombs which alighted on and around the buildings being dealt with before they could do much harm. Great credit is due to all the patients and staffs who behaved with bravery during a period of great discomfort.

School of Radiography.—During the year the first pupils were received for a course of training to prepare them for the qualifying examination as radiographers. At the end of the year seven pupils were under instruction.

Bye-Laws.—In pursuance of Clause 33 of the Scheme Scheduled to the Royal Sheffield Infirmary and Hospital Act, 1938, Bye-Laws have been made for regulating the management of the Hospital.

Chaplain.—The Court has appointed a full-time Chaplain who will co-operate with other ministers and religious bodies for the welfare of the patients in hospital. The appointment is held under licence from the Bishop of Sheffield and on his nomination.

Appointments for Out-Patients.—To save the time of Out-Patients and to reduce waiting to a minimum, a system of giving each Out-Patient an appointed time for a consultation was adopted and put into operation on the 1st November, 1940. Already it has proved its value and the percentage of patients using it is growing rapidly.

Thanks.—The Court of Management thanks sincerely all who have during the year contributed in any way to the support of the two unit hospitals, and expresses the hope that the ever-open doors which the hospitals maintain and their immediate readiness to cope with any emergency will ensure them funds in generous measure to carry on during these War years without the anxiety of having to curtail the work or borrow to meet daily needs. This opportunity is taken to record the Court's appreciation of all the unselfish and loyal services rendered by the whole Staff and of a host of friends who have helped the institutions during times of great difficulty and pressure.

Reports.—Both the Royal Infirmary and the Royal Hospital are issuing Reports of their year's working, including their Accounts for 1940.

Legacies, gifts and endowments may be made to the "Sheffield Royal Hospital" as in the past, or alternatively, if desired, may be made to the "Royal Sheffield Infirmary and Hospital." It is hoped donors will kindly remember the needs are as great as, if not in fact greater, than in the past.

Chairmanship.—Mr. Fred. M. Osborn, who had been Chairman since 1924, asked the Board to accept his resignation. Mr. Osborn is this year's Chairman of the Court of Management, and feels his health may prevent him from satisfactorily fulfilling the duties of both offices. Joining the Board in October, 1912, Mr. Osborn began at once to take a deep interest in the work of the Hospital and of the hospital movement in Sheffield and district. He was very prominent in the formation of the Hospitals Council, of which he has for years been Vice-Chairman, and actually coined the phrase "1d. in the £" by which Sheffield's great contributory scheme is known throughout the country. When in 1932 the "Royal" celebrated its centenary, Mr. Osborn threw his great energies and ability into the raising of £100,000 for a new X-Ray Department; new Laboratories; improved Ophthalmic Department and more accommodation for nurses, etc. That success crowned his efforts is visible for all to see :--

> The Miners' Welfare Block, The Zachary Merton Convalescent Home,

The Nurses' Home, Tapton Court.

A glance at the Balance Sheet figures under the heading of Land, Buildings and Equipment testify to the progress made since the Centenary :—

The Board accepted Mr. Osborn's resignation with the most profound and sincere regret and thanked him for his deep interest, generous support and devoted service.

Election of Mr. A. C. Davy.—The Board was fortunate in having as its Vice-Chairman and Chairman of the House Committee Mr. A. C. Davy, whose great experience and ability has been freely placed at the Hospital's disposal since he joined the Board in 1912. Mr. Davy, who has held office since 1924, accepted the unanimous invitation of his colleagues to become Chairman and his first year of office has seen a marked increase of responsibility in meeting and dealing with emergencies arising out of the War.

Treasurer .- Mr. Arthur D. Barber, who was elected to the office of Treasurer in 1923, resigned for health reasons. His intimate and detailed knowledge of the hospital was by no means confined to the financial side, but ranged over every phase of the hospital's work. He knew every member of the staff in whose welfare he was deeply interested, and his frequent visits to the various departments, including the Annexe at Fulwood, were highly appreciated. In addition to keeping a faithful watch on the finances by scrutinising and frequently criticising items of expenditure, he was instrumental in influencing both large and small gifts, legacies, subscriptions and donations. Mr. Barber was always a generous supporter of the hospital funds and many of his acts of kindness were known only to himself and the recipients. He rarely missed attending Board and Committee meetings, and his decision to continue his membership of the Board was received with pleasure.

The Board is pleased to announce that Mr. A. E. Graves has consented to fill the office in which he has shown a deep interest and whose business ability proves him to be a worthy successor to Mr. Barber.

Obituary.—While this report is being written, the Rev. Geo. W. Turner, M.A., died in the Hospital on 14th February, 1941. He had been Vicar of St. Jude's, Eldon Street—the Hospital Parish Church—for sixty years, and during all that time had acted as the Hospital Voluntary Chaplain. In 1931 he accepted a seat on the Board whose meetings he regularly attended. He also acted as one of the Board's representatives on the Sheffield Hospitals Council (Inc.). His genial presence, willing help and wise counsel will long be remembered and respected.

Sheffield Hospitals Council (Inc.).—The year 1940 saw the largest collection of funds since the "1d. in the £" Scheme was launched. To have reached and exceeded the sum of £200,000 is a truly magnificent response to the efforts of all concerned, for which the Board offers sincere thanks. The record sum of £57,453 4s. 8d. was allocated to this Hospital and relieved the Board of any anxiety about funds. Strenuous efforts were made during the year to maintain the number of beds for the civilian sick when so many were occupied by Service and air raid casualties, and it is gratifying to report that at the close of the year the number was almost normal despite the fact that upper and vulnerable wards were closed and the occupied beds in other Wards reduced as a precautionary measure.

Income.—Ordinary Income was $\pounds 71,366$ 2s. 10d., compared with $\pounds 66,838$ 19s. 7d. Legacies of $\pounds 17,235$ 1s. 9d. and $\pounds 14,037$ 9s. 10d. received from the Ministry of Health on account of Emergency Medical Service have been

placed to a Suspense Account. The Hospital Sunday Fund contributed £493 (£671 7s. 0d. in 1939), and the Alexandra Rose Day Fund £532 5s. 5d. (£325 2s. 0d. in 1939). From the Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust £150 was received, making the total gift of the Trustees to date £1,785. The Board thank all who have contributed in any way to this most satisfactory financial position.

Expenditure.—Ordinary Expenditure was £73,610 6s. 9d., and Extraordinary £1,205 11s. 0d., compared with £68,392 8s. 9d. and £5,371 4s. 2d. in 1939. The totals were £74,815 17s. 9d. in 1940 and £73,763 12s. 11d. in 1939. The daily average number of beds occupied was 328 in 1940, and 332 in 1939. The increase of £1,052 4s. 10d. is, in the circumstances, not unsatisfactory.

Bank Overdraft.—The amount owing to the Bank this year is still further substantially reduced when compared with 1939. The figures are : 1939, £67,784 6s. 1d. ; 1940, £31,840 14s. 5d. This contraction may be attributed partly to the cessation of capital expenditure and partly to the considerable sum received from legacies during the year.

Members of the Board.—To the regret of his colleagues Mr J. J. Baldwin Young, M.A., J.P., resigned his membership in June as he could not now find the time to attend the meetings. Mr. Young joined the Board in 1930, and had given freely his help and advice, and in thanking him for his valuable services the Board received with gratitude his promise of continued interest and a kindly offer of assistance should occasion arise.

The Late Mrs. E. Powell Batt.—In 1922, following the inauguration of the "1d. in the \pounds " Scheme, the Sheffield Voluntary Hospitals decided to appoint Almoners, and Mrs. Batt was appointed to the Royal Hospital. She had a wide knowledge of business, including insurance, was ever ready with advice and help and brought to her work a sympathetic outlook. During the past two years her health showed signs of failing, and by her death in the Royal Hospital on the 30th December, the Hospital has lost a devoted worker.

Improvements.—An order has been placed for a new Waygood-Otis lift at a cost of approximately £1,000 to replace one which is no longer reliable. The well will be wholly enclosed to conform to modern conditions.

Samaritan Society.—The Annual Report of the Society is incorporated as usual in this Report. While the number of cases needing after-care has not been so numerous in 1940, the services so freely rendered have been gladly received. The Board and the Honorary Staff appreciate highly the Society's good work.

The War.—The number of beds available for patients was steadily maintained despite the growing shortage of Medical, Nursing and Domestic Staffs until November when the Ministry advised the emptying of the upper floor wards and the reduction of the numbers of patients in other wards. In order to be able to treat the civil sick the Annexe and Convalescent Home at Fulwood, already upgraded to Hospital status, were from November used as a General Hospital with 105 beds, and Mrs. Bayldon Barber's house, "High Wray," Ecclesall, kindly offered for our use at the beginning of the War, was furnished, equipped and staffed for the reception of 25 convalescent patients. The average daily occupancy of 328 for the year reflects the very good use which was made of the Hospital's accommodation.

The Pay Beds were re-opened on February 5th and, because of their vulnerability on an upper floor, were closed on November 19th.

Air Raid Precautions.—In response to the appeal in the last Report the 113th Detachment of the British Red Cross Society offered their services as stretcher bearers, and in fact took over the whole of the organisation of the willing band of volunteers who came forward to be trained for and do this work. Their devotion to the work and the enthusiastic interest they have shown in it have been fostered by many lectures and much practice in First Aid work, Anti-Gas work and stretcher bearing. The Central Ambulance Service has throughout the year readily cooperated by lending ambulances, and thanks are due to Dr. D. Allen, Commandant; Mr. Hardy, second-in-command, and other officers of the British Red Cross Detachment, and Capt. J. Kenny, Manager of the Central Ambulance Service, and his staff. The efficiency of the stretcher bearing organisation successfully withstood the great tests which came during December, and the work they performed on those two memorable occasions was beyond praise.

Another section of the A.R.P. work is the registration of all casualties on arrival at the Hospital, and for this service every member of the clerical staff has volunteered to take a turn on night duty, thus ensuring a continual service for the First Aid Post and Casualty Clearing Station.

Additions to and improvements in the present air raid shelters for both patients and staff have either been completed or are approaching completion. The sandbag revetments around the Hospital are being replaced on the advice of the Ministrv by brick walling.

The fire-fighting team formed in 1939 has been greatly expanded by the addition of volunteers from the whole eligible male staff. More equipment has been acquired and interest maintained by lectures and demonstrations to both male and female staffs by members of the Sheffield Fire Brigade, by courtesy of Superintendent Teather.

Thanks are expressed to everyone for their help throughout the year, not overlooking the Rover and Boy Scouts of the Sheffield St. Luke's and other Troops who have continued to black-out the Hospital during the whole twelve months.

Pay Beds.—The beds were re-opened on 5th February to meet an increasing demand, but had to be closed on 19th November on official intimation that upper floor wards should not be used owing to their vulnerability in Air Raids. 417 patients were received during the period, the average daily occupation being 18.55 and the average number of days each patient was resident was 13.55. The fees were, with the approval of the Charity Commission, increased on 13th September, 1940, by one guinea per week, and are now :—

There is a balance of over £10,000 of the Capital cost still unpaid and contributions to this fund will be welcomed.

Annexe and Zachary Merton Convalescent Home.—The number of patients transferred during the year was 1,269. In addition there were direct admissions of both the civil sick, Air Raid casualties and Service patients. Linen and Clothing Guild.—During the year a great amount of most useful work has been accomplished. Approximately £90 has been spent on linen and 275 garments provided. In addition, special gifts of 1,000 articles of clothing have been made by the Ecclesall ladies, under the presidency of Mrs. A. C. Davy, the Chairman's wife.

The Junior Guild has also spent an active year, providing 325 children's garments and a considerable number of toys and games, and purchasing linen to the value of £26.

The Board and Honorary Staff express their warm thanks to every member for continued support and abiding interest in the welfare of the patients.

Laundry.—The number of articles washed in 1940 was 474,735 at a cost, including a charge for depreciation of machinery, of £2,357 8s. 7d., or at the rate of 1.192d. per article.

Solicitor.—The thanks of the Board are accorded to Messrs. Wake, Smith & Co., the Solicitors to the Hospital, for continued advice and help.

Nursing.—Twenty-one nurses completed their training and left the Hospital. Nine of these elected to have further training in Midwifery or Fever. Five left to be married and others left to gain nursing experience elsewhere. Twenty-nine candidates entered for the final State examination and 27 were successful. Twenty-four entered for the preliminary State examination, and 21 passed.

Sisters Foggitt, Mitchell and Crossley, who were Territorials, have been embodied, and are now serving with the Forces.

Our refugee nurses discontinued their service at the Hospital in June.

Mrs. Fred. M. Osborn and a large party of lady helpers have been regularly meeting at the Nurses' Home and making swabs, masks and caps and preparing surgical dressings for the wards and departments.

Gifts have been numerous, generous and most acceptable, particularly 112 lbs. of honey from the West Indies for air raid victims, theatre and other clothing from the American Red Cross, fresh vegetables from the Botanical Gardens and Allotment Societies and fruit and flowers from many friends.

There was no Reunion of nurses or Sports Club outing during the year.

Surgery and Dispensary.—A complete year under war conditions, with such influencing factors as in-patient evacuation and intermittent out-patient attendances, has not reduced the number

of prescriptions as much as expected, nor has there been anything like the difficulty there might have been in providing the numerous medical and surgical preparations required. Supplies of many substances to the wards and departments would have been less regular had provision not been made in the early stages of the war to safeguard against disorganised industry and transport. The fact that such conditions have existed for many months speaks well for the emergency stores which were available to be drawn upon. These extra stores were dispersed in three separate places for safety, and were so comprehensive that after eighteen months of war they are by no means depleted. There are now signs of a national shortage of some of the items and their value is therefore increasing. As the year progresses it is possible many more drugs, etc., may become scarce-especially those we import from overseas. It is therefore imperative that all concerned with the use of drugs, chemicals, medical and surgical preparations should exercise the greatest care in their use.

The provision of a dispensing service at the Fulwood branch hospital is working smoothly. The beds are now occupied by serious cases, and the supply of medicines from the main hospital would not have been possible. The crucial test of this scheme came on December 13th-14th, when the exceptional requirements for the major operations and associated treatment of air raid casualties found the Fulwood dispensary fully equipped and staffed to provide everything asked for by the medical and surgical Staff working there.

The scheme for providing emergency accommodation should evacuation become necessary called for the provision of a number of medical outfits for use at each reception centre, and a useful range of preparations and surgical dressings was packed up in units ready to accompany each convoy of evacuated patients should the emergency arise.

The manufacturing laboratory is now completed and in operation. Several items of equipment are still needed, but the difficulty of obtaining them necessitates postponement of installation. The equipment available is proving its value and the ability to manufacture compounds from components not only secures an independence of supply but also avoids or reduces the additional cost imposed by the purchase tax. As some indication of the effect of this tax on the cost of drugs, etc., to this Hospital, the extra expense entailed from its introduction in October to the end of December was £50 in spite of the saving resulting from our own manufacture.



RULES

For the Management of the Samaritan Fund.

I. NAME :--

The Name shall be "THE SAMARITAN FUND," in connection with the Sheffield Royal Hospital.

II. MANAGEMENT :---

The Fund shall be under the management of the Committee of Lady Visitors appointed at the Annual Meeting of the above Hospital.

III. COLLECTIONS :--

All Members of the Committee shall aid in collecting funds.

IV. OFFICERS :--

The Officers shall consist of a Treasurer, whose duties shall be :--

- (I) To supply and keep account of Relief Tickets;
- (2) To pay all accounts quarterly, and to keep an account of the Funds.

And a Secretary, whose duties shall be :--

- (1) To summon Meetings;
- (2) To keep the Minutes, etc., etc.

V. MEETINGS :--

Meetings shall be held quarterly. Three shall form a quorum

VI. RELIEF TICKETS :--

Relief Tickets shall be supplied to the Home Visitors by the Treasurer on application. Each Ticket shall be of value not exceeding 5/- during present high prices.

VII. INVESTIGATION :-

No Relief Ticket shall be given unless the Home Visitor who signs the ticket can vouch that the case has been investigated and found to be suitable.

VIII. GOODS OBTAINED :--

The goods which may be ordered may be Groceries, Meat, Milk, Coal, and any other article which it may be decided to add to this list by mutual consent of any three members of the Committee.

IX. TRADESMEN :--

The Treasurer shall supply the following Notice to the Tradesmen employed :---


- (1) No Ticket is to exceed 5/- in value.
