REPORT FOR 1927.

THE number of patients received during the year was 209, being 173 children and 36 adults.

London sent 79 cases, as follows:—The Invalid Children's Aid Association 45, Brompton Hospital 19, Royal Free Hospital 6, University College Hospital 5, and King's College Hospital 4. Portsmouth sent 48 cases (of which the Royal Hospital supplied 16), Southampton 40 (of which the Rotary Club sent 34), Winchester and District 17, Bournemouth 8, Fareham and Gosport 4, Shedfield and area 8, and 5 from various places in the County. The Home was open for 35 weeks, with an average weekly stay for the patients of 5½ weeks.

The cost of food was £336, and the Establishment Charges £350.

The principal receipts for the year were:—Patients' Fees, £565; Subscriptions, £97; Collections and Donations, £103. The balance in hand at the end of the year was £67.

The waiting room accommodation for Out-Patients and Visitors has been considerably improved by enlarging the glass-covered passage near the Dispensary, and this has been found a great convenience.

Owing to various causes, the Home had to be closed during September and October, so was kept open at Christmas time, and the children had a very happy time, thanks to the many gifts contributed by friends of the Home.

We have been glad to welcome a few new Subscribers in 1927, and the Home has been helped during the year by many kind gifts and services for which the Committee are very grateful. To mention a few of these, especially appreciated by the children, are a full-sized rocking-horse given by Mrs. Carpenter-Garnier, two beautifully fitted-up dolls' houses from Mrs. Williams at Wickham and Mrs. Brown at Southampton, and some delightful toys to suit all ages from the Titchfield Toy Service.

The Egg Collections have resulted in 1455 eggs being sent to the Home, and the donors and collectors are very heartily thanked for this very useful help towards the maintenance.

The Committee would especially like to thank those who contributed so generously to the various Collections and Entertainments organized on behalf of the Home, namely:—The Shedfield Boxing Day Comic Parade and the "Black Boy" Inn Boxing Day Collection, the Botley Social and Concert, the Hedge End Carnival, and a Dance at Bishop's Waltham (per Miss Davis), which efforts resulted in very substantial help to the funds.

The Committee again offer their thanks to the Medical Staff for their deep interest in the work of the Home, and to the Matron and her staff for their unfailing care and attention to the needs of the patients.

or Two In-patient's Tickets for 2 weeks.
10s. 6*d.* entitles to One In-patient's Ticket for 2 weeks.

Out-patient's Tickets, available for 4 weeks, are supplied at the rate of 2s. 6*d.* for each Ticket.

The area of Shedfield includes the parishes of Wickham, Soberton with Newtown, Droxford, Swanmore, Bishop's Waltham, Curdridge and Botley.

* The maintenance charged for adult Patients during their stay in the Hospital is 9s. per week with Subscriber's Ticket.

The payment for children under 15 years of age is 5s. with a Ticket and 10s. 6*d.* without.

* Patients or Convalescents may be admitted if properly recommended, without a Subscriber's Ticket, at a weekly charge of 15s.

Beer, Wine and Spirits to be charged extra in all cases.

Subscriptions and Donations will be most thankfully received by Miss Medlicott, Whingarth, Shedfield, Botley (Hon. Secretary), to whom all enquiries should be addressed, and by whom all tickets are issued.

Gifts of Useful Articles, or Fruit, Vegetables, Game, etc., will be gratefully received by the Matron at the Hospital.

Notice to Subscribers

Subscribers are requested to give directions that any Patient they recommend shall be sent in a proper state of cleanliness.

Patients must be provided with a change of clothing, and two towels.

Rules

1.—All In-patients shall, on entering the Hospital, be placed in charge of the Matron, to whom all Medicines and Instructions for the management of their respective cases shall be entrusted.

2.—No In-patient shall be admitted to the Hospital without giving due notice to the Matron, cases of emergency alone excepted.

3.—Any In-patient wishing to leave the Hospital without being discharged by the Medical Officer in attendance, is expected to give a day's notice to the Matron.

4.—Any In-patient not conforming to the Rules of the Hospital or directions by the Matron, will be liable to dismissal, on application of the Matron to the Secretary or any member of the Committee.

5.—In case of emergency the nearest Medical Officer on the Staff shall be called in.

6.—No person to be treated as an Out-patient without a ticket; cases of emergency alone excepted.

7.—No person to be eligible as an Out-patient who is in a position to provide medical attendance if treated in his or her own house.

8.—Every Out-patient to pay Two Shillings and Sixpence on their tickets at the Hospital before receiving Medical advice.

9.—Patients or Convalescents may be admitted for a period not exceeding three months. Exceptional cases to be dealt with by the Working Committee.

10.—The following persons are disqualified for admission as Patients: Women in advanced state of pregnancy; lunatics, and persons disordered in their intellect, or subject to fits; and persons having habitual ulcers, pulmonary tuberculosis, or *any contagious disease*.

No case of Neurasthenia can be admitted.

11.—Male Patients over 15 years of age are not admitted.
