DOCTORS' LETTERS. Patients, other than casualties and cases of emergency, who are insured under the National Health Insurance Act or are members of the Contributory Schemes, are not seen unless they bring a letter from their General Medical Practitioner. It is advisable for ALL patients coming to the Hospital to bring such letters.

ACCIDENTS AND EMERGENCIES. Accidents and emergencies are received at any time. Practitioners are asked when possible kindly to telephone the Resident Surgical Officer or House Physician to ascertain whether a bed be vacant.

PRIVATE PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT. There is a well-equipped Private Patients' Department containing twelve beds in single rooms of adequate size. Patients may be admitted under any member of the Honorary Staff of the Hospital, and fees are arranged between the patient and the physician, surgeon, or specialist in charge of the case. The Hospital's maintenance charges are as follows : Maternity cases £6 6s. 0d. per week, Other cases £5 5s. 0d. per week. Visitors are allowed at any reasonable time.

PATIENTS' VISITORS. Visitors are allowed in the general wards, except the children's wards, to see their friends on :

Sundays Wednesdays Saturdays

From 3 to 4 p.m.

Two visitors only are permitted to each patient at one time. Patients on the danger list may be visited at any time.

Visitors are strictly forbidden to bring food or liquor into the Hospital without permission of the ward sister.

RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICERS. There are four house officers : one resident surgical officer, one house physician and two assistant house surgeons and casualty officers.

Report of the Committee of Management

For the Year ended 31st December, 1941

The Chairman and Members of the Committee of Management, in presenting their report for the year ended 31st December, 1941, beg to seek the forbearance of Governors and Subscribers in as much as it has been necessary drastically to curtail this summary of their activities during the past year, and to omit from the published report the lists of subscribers and donors, in addition to several other usual features. It will be realised, however, that this decision represents a small national economy which will add to the Hospital's ever increasing contribution to the war effort, and while lack of space may make it impossible clearly to depict the claims and needs of the Hospital, it is hoped that there might be a general recognition of the fact that the Hospital's usefulness and power of healing have never been so great as at present, and it is only the beneficence of town and county that will ensure these are maintained and pressed forward, thus bringing untold benefits to the sick and injured.

It is again possible to record a year of far-reaching development and astonishing progress. There was only one small reduction in activities, which was in the number of In-patients admitted, due to keeping, in accordance with the instructions of the Ministry of Health, a slightly larger number of beds available for war casualties, all other departments recorded larger numbers of cases :

The Committee's financial policy has proved highly successful. The bank overdraft, which in 1938 reached the alarming figure of $\pounds 18,349$, has disappeared; the capital which was realized in 1939 to reduce this overdraft has now been replaced; the value of the Hospital's lands and buildings has been increased by the purchase of No. 7, Oxford Road as an annex of the Nurses' Home, but the balance sheet reveals that the Hospital cannot yet caim to be free from debt. However, this great burden of debt which at one time reached the crushing figure of £40,365 1s. 1d. has now been reduced to £21,359 12s. 9d., and your Committee encouraged by the success of their efforts are emboldened, even at this time of high living costs and taxation, to appeal for redoubled attempts to liquidate the remaining debt, thereby quickening the Institution's progress.

Expenditure for the year reached the record figure of £45,850 8s. 5d., and it was largely due to the generous grant of the Trustees of the estate of the late Sir William Julien Courtauld, Bart., and payments made for work carried out on behalf of the Government, that a substantial balance of income over expenditure was available for the purpose of reducing the accumulated debt.

It must be realized that while rigid economy takes an important place in the Committee's policy, the impairment of efficiency must never be permitted, because to-day the Institution's responsibility as a first-class hospital and consultative service for a large part of Essex is greater than ever. Thus large sums of money were spent during the year to complete and maintain such a service at the highest possible level. Works of preservation of fabric and improvements to existing accommodation included : The remodelling and redecoration of the main operation theatre unit, to bring the facilities into line with the requirements of modern surgery; the external and internal redecoration of No. 7, Oxford Road ; redecoration of Wards Nos. 3 and 4, landing, staircase and entrance hall ; the provision of additional office accommodation for the Matron, Registration Officer, and Patients' records, and the widening of the door between the Out-patient Department and the Main Building. Protective measures, as advised by the Regional Housing Architect of the Ministry of Health, were also undertaken at a cost of £960 1s. 0d. A modern filing and follow-up system for patients' records was authorised at a cost of over £250, plus the salary of an additional records' clerk, and new surgical equipment purchased included a Universal operation table with attachments (Brompton Hospital Model) at £200; anaesthetic apparatus, lung inflators, endoscopic and facio maxillary instruments at £238 7s. 3d., and an adjustable suspension for the Scialytic Shadowless Light in No. 2 operation theatre at £13.

It is with pleasure that your Committee report that a number of successful efforts were made during the various War Weapons' Weeks and the proceeds sent to the Hospital for investment in War Savings Securities. One effort, of which special mention must be made, was Ward C Wardens' Post Gala held at Harwich Road, which raised the splendid sum of £150. The total amount received from this source was £357 5s. 0d., and with £295 of this 3 per cent Defence Bonds were purchased, and the balance, £62 5s. 0d., was used for the purchase of 83 units National Savings Certificates.

The expenditure of the Contributory Schemes includes substantial sums which were paid to the Essex County Council under the Government's Emergency Hospital Scheme for the maintenance of members of the Schemes who were transferred by the Essex County Hospital to County Council Hospitals where the patients received treatment by the specialists under whose care they would have been had they entered this Hospital. Therefore the record of work done during the year is really greater than that indicated in the summary quoted above, as the work has overflowed into other Institutions and grants towards the cost of this have been made from the Hospital's funds. Never before has the Hospital been privileged to undertake so great a work for the sons and daughters of Essex as it has achieved during the twelve months under review, while its professional and scientific resources have contributed in no small measure to the National Effort.

The total income from the town and county contributory schemes totalled £14,820 0s. 3d., an increase of £223 19s. 9d. over the preceding year—and your Committee are mindful of the strenuous efforts made by workers' representatives and local collectors in order that the schemes might not suffer in war-time. To these, who continue to serve so faithfully both the contributors and the Hospital, the Committee extend heartfelt thanks, and at the same time gratefully acknowledge the valuable services rendered by the Workers' Executive Committee ; their Chairman, Mr. F. W. Firmin, and their most able honorary secretary, Mr. C. A. Newnum. The Contributory Scheme organiser, Mr. C. W. Longley, B.Sc., who was appointed in July 1940, was taken ill in October last, and shortly after the close of the year under review unfortunately had to submit his resignation, on the grounds of continued ill health.

The Annual Board of Governors was held on Friday, 30th May, 1941, at 7 p.m., when the President, Mr. S. A. Courtauld, D.L., J.P., supported by the Rt. Worshipful the Mayor of Colchester, Ald. P. A. Sanders, O.B.E., J.P., C.A., the Lord Bishop of Colchester, the Rt. Rev. C. H. Ridsdale, M.A., the High Steward of Colchester, Ald. Sir Gurney Benham, J.P., F.S.A., Major Charles J. Round, D.L., J.P., Chairman of the Committee, Ald. A. Owen Ward, J.P., and others, presided over an assembly of about forty governors and subscribers. At this Board it was unanimously resolved that Rule No. 5, para. I, be varied so as to read as under :

> "There shall be not less than three Trustees, who shall be appointed or may be removed, by the Governors at a General Board. All vacancies in the number may be filled up by the Governors."

At the first meeting of your Committee, following the Annual Board of Governors, it was unanimously resolved that Major Charles J. Round, and Ald. A. Owen Ward, be re-elected Chairman and Vice-Chairman respectively for the ensuing year. Mr. C. J. Aldis of Ardleigh took a seat upon the Committee in place of the late Dr. Philip G. Laver, and Mr. G. W. J. Cocker filled the vacancy for a third representative of the Workers' Executive Committee.

The British Hospitals Association formed an Essex Area Committee, and your Committee have appointed as their representatives : Ald. A. Owen Ward, J.P., Mr. T. Alexander Ogilvie, F.R.C.S., and Mr. E. R. Hanchet (House Governor and Secretary).

On the 24th January the Hospital suffered an irreparable loss by the death of the late Mr. Philip G. Laver, M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., whose services the Institution had been privileged to enjoy for no less than 45 years. He was Assistant Surgeon from 1896 to 1904, Surgeon from 1904 to 1927, Consulting Surgeon, Vice-President, and Member of the Committee since 1927, and Member of the Finance and General Purposes Committee since 1936.

Another sad loss was caused by the passing of the late Mr. E. G. Renny on the 4th October. Mr. Renny was Assistant Surgeon from 1914 to 1924, Surgeon from 1924 to 1932. In 1932 he was appointed Consulting Surgeon, and became a Vice-President in 1934, and held these two offices until his death.

It is also with deepest regret that your Committee refer to the death of the late Mr. J. Mannix Robins, F.R.C.S., which took place on the 21st May, He was appointed temporary Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeon in September, 1939, and while serving the Hospital for a comparatively short period, knowledge of his professional skill was rapidly spreading throughout the wide area which the Hospital covers. Mrs. J. Mannix Robins has already generously donated £120 to form the nucleus of a fund in memory of her late husband to be known as the "J. Mannix Robins, F.R.C.S." Fund.

The following important appointments were made to the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff, but in accordance with your Committee's war-time policy these were made temporarily :

- Dermatologist : Mr. Arthur Porter, M.A., M.D. (Cantab.), M.R.C.P. (Lond.)
- Plastic Surgeon : Mr. Richard Battle, M.A., M.Chir. (Cantab.) F.R.C.S. (Eng.)
- Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeon : Mr. H. Alexander Cowan, F.R.C.S. (Edin.), D.L.O.

The Committee feel that they have been very fortunate in securing the services of these gentlemen.

Drs. T. Dean and B. Parker-Wood, and the late Dr. A. G. Gregory were appointed to the resident medical staff during the year, and Dr. H. D. Eddy and the late Dr. A. G. Gregory resigned. The war-time bed complement of the Hospital which necessitated an increased nursing staff led your Committee to negotiate with the Ministry of Health with a view to leasing No. 4, Lexden Road as additional nurses' accommodation. These negotiations were successfully concluded, and this house, together with No. 7, Oxford Road of which your Committee purchased the freehold in order to replace a more distant property held on lease, are now in full use as annexes to the Nurses' Home. It must be mentioned that the Assessment Committee kindly granted an appeal for the reduction of the assessment of these two properties.

Your Committee adopted the scale of student nurses' salaries as recommended by the Ministry of Health, also the scale recommended by the British Hospitals Association for staff nurses, and this necessitated consequential increases for all senior members of the nursing staff. The immediate cost of this increase was £800 per annum, which will rise to £1,200. A part of this additional expenditure is as a temporary measure recoverable from the Government through the British Hospitals Association.

The Bishops Stortford General Hospital is now affiliated to the Essex County Hospital for the purpose of the training of nurses.

The academic success of the Nurses' Training School was well maintained, and at the annual prize-giving, the Bishop of Colchester presented the prizes and diplomas, and gave a short but inspiring address to the assembled nurses and others who were in attendance.

Yet another proof of his unfailing interest in the Hospital's welfare was provided when the Bishop of Colchester suggested that a Harvest Thanksgiving Service might be held in the Out-patient Waiting Hall. On Sunday, 26th October, the Chaplain, the Rev. Canon G. A. Campbell, ordered a shortened form of evensong in the tastefully decorated Hall, and patients, staff and friends, numbering 180, and overflowing into the corridors, will long remember the Bishop's wise and stirring address. It is hoped that this innovation might develop into an annual service.

In December, your Committee received and accepted with regret the resignation of the Chief Dispenser, Mr. H. Motson, Ph.D., made on medical advice, on the grounds of ill health. It was agreed to accede to Mr. Motson's request that he be allowed to continue to hold the appointment of official optician to the Hospital, and to place on record expressions of appreciation and thanks for his services as a member of the staff for twenty years, also for the six years preceding that period when he dispensed at the Hospital while an assistant to a local pharmaceutical chemist.

A new agreement for the provision at the Hospital of facilities and accommodation for the treatment of venereal diseases was entered into with the Essex County Council for a period of five years from 1st April, 1941, and an arrangement was made for the treatment of certain orthopaedic cases at the Hospital from the Council's Ascertainment Clinics. It is desired to extend warmest thanks to the County Council for :--

- (a) The increased annual grant of £222 0s. 0d.
- (b) The allocation of £465 6s. 4d. from the proceeds of Sunday Cinematograph Entertainments.
- (c) Their willingness to rename several of their institutions, thus leaving the Essex County Hospital in sole possession of the name by which it has been known since 1907, and (d) many other acts of courtesy and helpfulness during the year.

At the request of Colchester Borough Council a site was provided rent free in the Hospital's grounds for the erection of a static water tank for war-time fire-fighting. Hearty thanks are extended to the Council's Parks Committee for the regular and most valuable gifts of vegetables. Not only were these of considerable monetary value but often provided foodstuffs for patients and staff which were otherwise unobtainable.

In this report, the keynote of which is brevity, but few can be mentioned of the great number whose generous gifts or selfless labours have enabled the Committee to maintain and to extend the hospital service. Those, however, to whom deepest gratitude is due, include : The American, British and Canadian Red Cross Societies : the Ladies' Linen League under the presidency of Mrs. C. J. Round ; Alexandra Day Committee and Helpers ; the League of Mercy (and to Mrs. James Paxman, Sir Hugh Walmsley and Gertrude Lady Worthington-Evans for bringing the Hospital's needs to the notice of the League) ; Colchester and other Carnival Societies ; Hospital Collection Committees, and similar bodies who have kept in existence and in some cases organised restricted war-time efforts ; local Hospital Flag--day Organisers ; Miss Louisa Jones for " Egg Week " Collection and other efforts; Colchester Repertory Company and all Organisers of dances, whist drives and other entertainments ; the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff ; the Clergy and Ministers of Religion for intercessions and Hospital-Sunday collections, and especially those who permitted the use of their pulpits for acquainting their congregations with the work, development and needs of the Hospital; the Chaplain and his Assistants; Mr. F. W. Firmin for maintainance of buildings and plant; the late Mr. G. W. Doe for fire drills and inspection of appliances ; the Honorary Solicitor ; the Auditors ; the Press for generous and helpful publicity ; the Matron, Miss E. M. Elliott and the Nursing Staff ; the Dispensing, Adminisstrative and other Staffs, and all workers who have discharged their duties loyally and well.

The population of that large part of Essex which the Hospital serves have provided convincing proof of their esteem for the Charity by contributing generously enough to enable the Committee to overcome the bank overdraft and to make far-reaching improvements in the available hospital service. It is, therefore, with confidence that an appeal is now made for most generous help in order to meet the ever growing costs of the existing hospital service, and to liquidate the accumulated debt of £21,359 12s. 9d. The Hospital possesses a grand history, and to-day possesses powers of healing comparable to any Institution of its kind in the country. It is an excellent example of how a well-managed hospital under the voluntary system can achieve outstanding results with a relatively small income, and it would be difficult to envisage a contribution producing a more gratifying issue than one given to the Essex County Hospital. The Committee, most ably assisted by the lay and medical staffs, will continue to do all in their power to maintain and add to the efficiency of the Hospital.

To end this report the Chairman must refer to one whose day never ends, who at all hours of the day and night is found at his work, and to whom the Hospital owes more than most people. The Chairman refers to the House Governor and Secretary, Mr. E. R. Hanchet, and it is to be hoped that he will be given health and strength in these days of strain to continue his good work.

THIRTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

The Hospital Workers' Executive Committee present their Thirty-first Annual Report, and in doing so have pleasure in recording another satisfactory year's progress. The total amount raised by weekly contributions among the workers of the town and district and handed over to the Hospital during 1941 was £7,903 12s. 10d., this showing an increase of £285 14s. 5d. over the previous year. Notwithstanding the disorganisation of many business houses caused by the war, the contributions in most centres have been maintained, and although, owing to depleted staffs, some have paid in less than in the previous year, this has been more than balanced by largely increased amounts received from establishments where more workers are employed on war work, notably at Messrs. Davey, Paxman & Co.'s, where £751 13s. 7d. was subscribed, the L.N.E.R., from where £563 13s. 10d. was received, Messrs. E. N. Mason & Sons, whose total was £228 14s. 4d., The Rowhedge Ironworks £138 4s., Messrs. M. W. Woods £241 11s., and The Wivenhoe Shipyard £101 0s. 1d., these six establishments between them handing over to the fund £410 8s. 11d. more than they did in 1940. Attention must also be drawn to the ever-increasing sum received through the Lion Walk office, where the very useful amount of £2,121 3s. 10d. was gathered in during the year, an advance of £66 19s. 4d., and congratulations are offered to Miss L. Jones and her assistants for this very handsome contribution. Space does not permit of mention of many other centres where increased amounts have been raised, but a very grateful acknowledgment is made to everyone who has helped, both in collecting and contributing, to show such a good result.

It should be specially noted that in these trying days, when practically everything has advanced in price, the Hospital has made no request for increased contributions for the valuable benefits offered. The weekly contribution still remains at 3d. for married persons (giving free hospital treatment such as is available at the Essex County Hospital or under certain conditions at other Institutions, to contributor, wife, children of school age, and any other dependents), and 2d. for single persons (giving free treatment for themselves only), and it is up to everyone to show appreciation of this by seeing to it that the scheme is made known to all non-contributors, and that every effort is made to bring into it all persons who are non-subscribers. The expenses of the Hospital have increased enormously, and it is hoped that the Workers will be able in this present year to lift their total contributions to well over the £8,000 mark, thus helping to lighten somewhat the Hospital's financial burden.

The Workers' Committee have been represented on the Hospital Committee during the year by Mr. F. W. Firmin, Mr. H. Seaborn and Mr. G. W. J. Cocker, and many thanks are accorded to them for the time they give to the fortnightly meetings of that Committee. An acknowledgment is made, too, of the very valuable work undertaken by the Ward Visitors, who take on the duty of visiting the wards and chatting to the patients. These visitors send in reports of conditions in the Hospital, and tell of the good work being performed by the Medical and Nursing Staffs, and the Workers' Committee would like again to offer their sincere thanks to both doctors and nurses for all they are doing for the patients.

Contributory Scheme Seventeenth Annual Report 1941

Report of the Contributory Schemes Funds' Committee

For the Year ended 31st December, 1941.

The past year has been beset with many grave difficulties, and it was most unfortunate that the Organiser, Mr. C. W. Longley, B.Sc., after serving the Hospital for a little over a year, was taken ill. After a slow recovery it was found that any attempt to resume his duties would jeopardise his health, and consequently he submitted his resignation, which was accepted with regret.

The evacuation of the coastal areas served by the Contributory Scheme has caused the loss of many members, and this has also occurred to a lesser extent in other areas as a result of the calling-up of men and women under the National Service Acts. Furthermore, the Scheme has for various reasons lost some of its Local Collectors, and although others have been good enough to step forward and undertake the work, the loss of such old friends is greatly to be regretted.

Thus with so many obstacles to overcome it is considered that the year's income, £6,880 19s. 11d.—a reduction of only £106 15s. 8d. when compared with the previous 12 months—reflects the greatest possible credit upon all Local Collectors. Their selfless labours both for the contributors and for the Hospital are worthy of the highest praise, and the Committee look to them with confidence not only to hold the Scheme together, but to carry it forward from success to success.

When the total income of both Colchester (town) and Country Districts Schemes are taken together, it will be observed that the figure, £14,820 0s. 3d., is greater by £223 19s. 9d. than that of the previous year. Again, congratulations and deepest thanks are tendered to all concerned.

The Committee must call attention to the facts that as a result of the increased cost of all materials and labour, and the purchase tax—from which hospitals are not exempt—the average cost of each in-patient per week has leapt to £3 18s. $10\frac{1}{4}$ d., and the average cost of each out-patient to 13s. 4d. Further, the Committee have paid £1,148 6s. to other Institutions (compared with £779 2s. 6d. in 1940) for hospital treatment of members of the Schemes which was not obtained at the Essex County Hospital. Despite these heavily increased charges, the Committee have not yet asked members to supplement their weekly payments, viz., 3d. for contributor, wife, children and other dependants; and 2d. for single persons.

It is felt, however, that the scope of the Contributory Schemes should be clearly outlined : Members of the Contributory Schemes who are in benefit are entitled, upon production of the usual form of recommendation, to free maintenance and treatment at the Essex County Hospital, Colchester, either as in-patients or outpatients, and no enquiries are made into the financial circumstances of such patients. When for certain reasons members are afforded such treatment at other hospitals, grants towards the cost thereof are made by the Schemes. It must be realised that the Essex County Hospital, like other first-class voluntary hospitals, provides highly skilled specialist, consultative and diagnostic services by leading physicians and surgeons, and except in cases of accidents or other emergency, does not undertake to provide such medical services as can be provided equally well by the general medical practitioners of the district.

The Contributory Schemes do not accept responsibility for :

- (1) Medical fees, and medical treatments such as are normally provided by general practitioners outside the Hospital.
- (2) Treatment in a Private Nursing Home.
- (3) Tuberculosis, Mental Cases, Infectious Diseases, Normal Maternity Cases, and Chronic, Incurable and Senile Cases.
- (4) War Disabilities for which the Ministry of Pensions is responsible.
- (5) Injuries received in motor accidents which fall within the provisions of the Road Traffic Acts, and cases within the provisions of the Public Health Acts, or other enactments.

The Contributory Schemes are prepared to make payments on behalf of their members who may receive service in municipal hospitals, provided that the case was medically eligible for admission to and retention in the Essex County Hospital, but was not admitted thereto because no bed was available, or for some other adequate reason.

Members, or dependants, wishing to receive treatment in the Essex County Hospital Private Patients' Department, are allowed a rebate of 30s. a week from the customary weekly maintenance charge of £5 5s.

Old Age Pensioners of 70 years of age or more are eligible for free treatment at the Essex County Hospital, and need not, therefore, continue their weekly payments to the Schemes, but old age pensioners between 65 and 70 years of age, who are not members of one of the Schemes, will, if in need of the specialist medical services of the Hospital, be questioned as to their financial circumstances, and may be called upon to contribute towards the cost.

Those whose incomes fall within the following limits are eligible for membership of the Schemes :

Single persons, and married couples without dependants ... £250 p.a. bonuses and Married Couples, with dependants £300 p.a. similar allowances

Finally, the Committee wish to extend their heartfelt gratitude to all Local Collectors and others, who have organised whist drives, etc., to raise much-needed funds for the Hospital. Please redouble your efforts, for at this critical time increased income to maintain the splendid existing hospital service for Colchester and the surrounding districts is of vital importance to the whole population.

Again the Committee express their grateful thanks to all the voluntary workers in these two great organisations.

Report

For the Year ended 31st December, 1941.

In presenting the Annual Report of the Essex County Hospital Ladies' Linen League for the year ended 31st December, 1941, it is to be regretted that it is very late in appearing. This is partly due to the illness and resignation of Mr. C. W. Longley, of which all members will have learned with concern.

The bank balance is slightly larger than last year owing to the fact that it is now possible to spend money only when market conditions are favourable, and a substantial balance is desirable to enable the League to make purchases whenever suitable opportunities arise. As against this the drop in gifts of linen, etc., is considerable, but unavoidable in present circumstances, but it must be pointed out that the League has facilities for buying linen which are not available to the public, thus increased subscriptions, instead of gifts of linen, are most valuable. Another reason why increased income is so necessary is because the funds will not benefit this year, owing to rationing, by the sale of Rayon goods, which in the past have been most kindly given by Messrs. Courtauld Ltd.

It is perhaps not generally realised that since the outbreak of the war the number of beds for in-patients has been increased from 174 to 269, and, this, of course, has necessitated additional accommodation for staff. Therefore the demands upon the League are greater than ever, and the efforts of those able to augment the funds by organising whist drives, dances or other entertainments will be greatly appreciated.

At the request of your President, the Committee of Management of the Hospital made a grant of £50 to the Linen League at a time when, although no funds were available, an opportunity presented itself to purchase linen on favourable terms.

The League is greatly indebted to Mrs. Gilmour, of Alresford, who has so kindly organised a special effort, thereby raising £6 15s. 6d.

Mrs. Baldwin, who was doing so much to help Mrs. Denton in the Borough, had to resign owing to her departure for New Zealand. Mrs. Ogilvie has most kindly consented to take her place, and will take up her new office immediately. Mrs. Denton has carried on meanwhile, and an acknowledgment is made of the debt of gratitude due to her and to the other District Secretaries.

Mrs. Blewitt still retains the office of Honorary Treasurer, and her help is greatly valued.

Owing to war-time conditions, the Linen League Committee feel that it is not advisable to hold an Annual General Meeting this year.

The object of the League is to provide the Hospital with Household Linen, Sheets, Blankets, Pillow Cases, etc.

RULES

- The League shall consist of Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Honorary Vice-Presidents and Associates, Hon. Secretary (or Secretaries), and Hon. Treasurer. From these an Executive Committee will be appointed of which the Matron will be an *ex-officio* member.
- 2.—Vice-Presidents shall undertake to find not less than six Associates and to send in two articles of linen with a subscription of 2/6 a year.
- 3.—Vice-Presidents by payment of £1/1/- annually shall be exempt from the responsibility of Rule 2 and become Honorary Vice-Presidents.
- 4.—Each Associate shall undertake to send to her Vice-President two articles of linen and a subscription of 1/- a year.
- 5.—A General Meeting of the League to be held once a year at the Hospital.
- 6.—(For Vice-Presidents only). Subscriptions and Donations to be collected and sent in by the Vice-Presidents to the Hon. Secretaries or Treasurer, on or before May 15th. All contributions of linen to be sent direct to the Matron, Essex County Hospital, also on or before May 15th in each year.
