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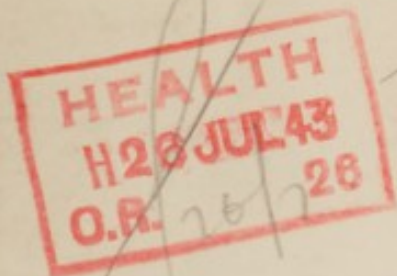

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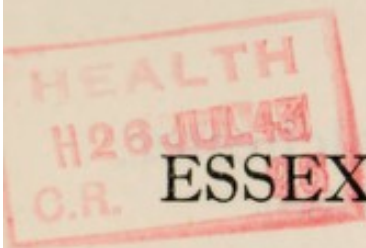

DOCTORS' LETTERS. Patients, other than casualties and cases of emergency, who are insured under the National Health Insurance Act or are members of the Contributory Scheme, are not seen unless they bring a letter from their General Medical Practitioner. It is advisable for ALL patients coming to the Hospital to bring such letters.

ACCIDENTS AND EMERGENCIES. Accidents and emergencies are received at any time. Practitioners are asked when possible kindly to telephone the House Physician or House Surgeon to ascertain whether a bed be vacant.

PRIVATE PATIENTS' DEPARTMENT. There is a well-equipped Private Patients' Department containing twelve beds in single rooms of adequate size. Patients may be admitted under any member of the Honorary Staff of the Hospital, and fees are arranged between the patient and the physician, surgeon, or specialist in charge of the case. The Hospital's maintenance charges are as follows: Maternity cases £7 7s. 0d. per week, Other cases £6 6s. 0d. per week. Visitors are allowed at any reasonable time.

Report of the Committee of Management

For the Year ended 31st December, 1942.

The Chairman and Members of the Committee of Management, in the interests of war-time economy, present to the Governors and Subscribers an abridged report for the year ended 31st December, 1942.

As a result of permission granted to reduce the number of vacant beds to be held available for war casualties, more work was done for In-patients; the average daily number of occupied beds being 210 compared with 174 in the previous year. Owing to the fact that the average stay of each In-patient was increased by $4\frac{1}{2}$ days, the number of admissions fell by 18 to 3,108. There was little variation in the work of the Out-patient Department, there being a small increase in the number of new Out-patients and a decrease in the total number of attendances. The number of examinations in the Pathological Department leapt from 4,850 to 6,841.

It will be realised that an Institution so well-staffed, well-equipped, and of such a high scientific standard as the Essex County Hospital, must, especially in time of war, do far more than care for the sick and injured members of the contiguous population, and the Committee would assure the Governors that they have every reason to be proud of the Hospital's continued contributions to the National effort.

Total income, as a result of reduced proceeds from legacies, fell by £5,584 to £51,184, while total expenditure increased by £1,687 to £47,537. Therefore, there was a balance of income over expenditure of £3,646 which was used further to reduce the Hospital's debt which, at the end of the year amounted to £17,712, and while so substantial a figure must be considered serious, its gravity is not comparable with the position at the end of 1938 when the debt and bank overdraft together totalled £55,464. It is with much pleasure that your Committee are able to state that the debt on Wards Nos. 6 and 7 Block has been liquidated, and at the close of the year under review there was a small balance in hand of £108 towards the next stage of the re-building scheme.

The Worker's Fund and Contributory Scheme revenue increased by £935 to £15,755, and warmest thanks are hereby tendered to Mr. F. W. Firman, Chairman; to Mr. C. A. Newnum, Honorary Secretary;

to Mr. C. E. Child, Honorary Assistant Secretary; to all the Members of the Worker's Executive; to Worker's Representatives, and to Honorary Local Collectors.

The In-patient statistical tables reveal the rather remarkable fact that despite increased expenditure and the higher cost of labour and materials, the average cost of each In-patient per week has fallen from £3 18s. 10½d. to £3 9s. 8½d. This surprising figure may be explained by the growth of activities as shown in the increased number of occupied beds and consequently larger total of daily occupied bed counts. On the other hand owing to there having been little fluctuation in the work of the Out-patient Department, the average cost of each Out-patient attendance increased from 1/11 to 2/2¼. If proof be required of your Committee's vigilant control of expenditure, it may be found in the fact that these figures have been kept within such reasonable limits.

The Annual Board of Governors was held on Friday, 31st July, at 7 p.m., when the President, Mr. S. A. Courtauld, D.L., J.P., occupied the Chair and was supported by the Rt. Worshipful the Mayor of Colchester, Ald. P. A. Sanders, O.B.E., D.L., J.P., C.A., the Lord Bishop of Colchester, the Rt. Rev. C. H. Ridsdale, M.A., the High Steward of Colchester, Ald. Sir Gurney Benham, J.P., F.S.A., Lt.-Col. Charles J. Round, D.L., J.P., Chairman of the Committee, Ald. A. Owen Ward, J.P., and others. There were about 48 Governors and Subscribers present. On this occasion, Mr. F. A. Pope, J.P., President of Colchester and East Essex Co-operative and Industrial Society Ltd., presented on behalf of his Society a cheque for £200 to Mr. Courtauld for the purpose of the purchase of an Endothermy Unit for use in the main operation theatre, and sincere gratitude was expressed for this gift.

It is with profound regret that your Committee must report the death of two Members. The late Mr. G. W. Doe, who passed away in April, had served as a Member since 1910. He also served upon the Finance and General Purposes Committee; the Worker's Executive, and up to the time of his last illness had regularly inspected fire appliances and conducted fire drills. The late Mr. Alfred Crowther, was closely associated with "Sportsmen's Million Pennies Fund Bed," and had been a Member of the Committee since 1932. Another sad loss was sustained by the passing of the late Mr. C. J. Wilkin, J.P., who was a generous benefactor and who had been a Patron since 1924.

Once again the Bishop of Colchester has shown an unfailing interest in the welfare of the Hospital. At his suggestion a Harvest Thanksgiving Service was held in the Out-patient Waiting Hall on Sunday, 20th September, at 3 p.m., when, including the choir of St. Mary's Church, no less than 160 crowded into the tastefully decorated Hall filling it to capacity. The Chaplain, the Rev. Canon G. A. Campbell, M.A., officiated at a shortened form of Evensong, and the

Bishop preached a most helpful sermon. Earlier in the year the Bishop kindly consented to present the books in lieu of medals, prizes and diplomas at the annual nurses prize-giving; a gesture which was much appreciated by the nurses and all concerned.

Your Committee, therefore, as an expression of gratitude and mark of respect extended to the Bishop an invitation to become a Vice-President of the Hospital. This invitation was accepted, and the Hospital now has the advantage of His Lordship's counsels as a Member of the Committee of Management.

The resignation of Mr. B. H. Kent, J.P., from the Finance and General Purposes Committee was received and accepted with great regret. Mr. C. J. Aldis was elected to fill the vacancy. Mr. Kent, in place of the late Mr. Doe, kindly undertook, together with Mr. J. Chase, to serve as Representatives of the Committee on Colchester and District Worker's Executive.

The Financial Organiser and Organiser of the Contributory Scheme, Mr. C. W. Longley, B.Sc., submitted in April his resignation on the grounds of continued ill health. This was accepted with regret.

There were a number of changes on the resident medical staff, Dr. C. E. Jamison, house surgeon, resigned and his place was taken by Dr. R. G. Sykes who, having completed his six months' term of office resigned, and was replaced by Dr. J. W. Salt. Dr. E. Rosenthal, house surgeon resigned and Dr. H. M. J. Rowan was appointed to fill the vacancy. Dr. Thomas Dean, house physician, resigned and Dr. J. G. U. O. Alexander who was appointed in his stead was called to the Forces three months later, so that a further vacancy occurred which was filled by Dr. D. J. Conway. Messrs. J. B. Blacklay, Bernard Mushin, and Terence Steen served as student house officers during the year.

Mr. C. F. Barwell, M.B., B.Ch., who had charge of the designated pathological laboratory for two years, was transferred by the Ministry of Health to another Hospital. His place was taken by Mr. H. Lowenthal, M.D., Ph.D.

Miss M. A. Brand, chief dispenser, and Miss S. P. Palmer, assistant dispenser, submitted their resignations, on the grounds of ill-health, in November. These resignations were accepted with regret, and Mr. Cyril Monahan was appointed chief dispenser, and Miss B. Ainger, assistant dispenser.

It is with great pleasure that your Committee announce that two beds and two cots were endowed during the year: "Ada Madelaine Clayton" Bed; "Ethel and Robert Hoyle Craske" Bed; "'C' Group Wardens" Cot, and "Employees of Woods of Colchester, Ltd." Cot. The beds and cots were dedicated by the Hospital Chaplain.

It is a tribute to the Hospital's high standard that the Council of the Royal College of Surgeons of England agreed to recognize the Institution, without limitation of period, under Fellowship regulations in respect of the posts of (a) senior house surgeon, and (b) first assistant house surgeon and casualty officer. Further the Examining Board in England of the Royal College of Physicians and Royal College of Surgeons agreed to recognize the Hospital for post graduate studies for the Diploma in larynology and otology. Two candidates who pursued their studies at the Hospital have already been successful in securing the Diploma.


Your Committee cannot give in detail the many improvements carried out or started during the year under review, but the policy of providing the best possible centre of healing with the funds available has been faithfully pursued. Perhaps the most important decision was completely to re-equip the X-Ray diagnostic room so that the sick and injured might have the full advantages of the latest discoveries in radiological science. Mention must also be made of the fact that that No. 2 operation theatre, hitherto capable of use only for minor and certain branches of special surgery, is now staffed and equipped also for major general surgery.

In this brief report it is obviously an impossibility to thank all those whose gifts and labours have caused the Hospital's magnificent work both for Country and sufferers to prosper. Nevertheless an attempt must be made to mention a few of those to whom warmest gratitude is extended: Miss Louisa Jones, whose ingenuity enabled her to raise £966 16s. 3d. for her "For England and Our Hospital" Appeal; Mr. George Rose for yet another gift, this time a saloon motor car; Mr. H. Seaborn for his numerous endeavours to promote the Hospital's interests; the League of Mercy and its Representatives, especially Mrs. James Paxman for her great help in this and so many other directions; Essex County Council for help afforded on many occasions; War Organisations of American, British and Canadian Red Cross Societies, and American "Bundles for Britain" per Dr. Penry Rowland for valuable gifts; all Subscribers and Donors and Organisers of entertainments; "War Savings Weeks" Committees for donations from expenses' funds; the Clergy and Ministers of Religion; the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff; the Honorary Solicitors; the Press; the Auditors; the Matron and Nursing Staff, and all those employees of the Hospital who faithfully discharged their duties.

It is not always realized that besides the very arduous duties attached to the office of House Governor and Secretary, Mr. E. R. Hanchet undertakes many others including those of attending to the requirements of the Ministry of Health under the emergency hospital

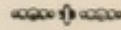
scheme; secretaryship of Medical Board; general appeals and propaganda; supervision of administration of contributory schemes; and senior air raid warden and officer in charge of Hospital A.R.P. party and fire brigade. In these difficult days when he is the only male member of administrative staff left, a very deep debt of gratitude is owed to him for all his work and for the smooth running of the Hospital.

The existence of a first-class Hospital is always a great comfort to those residing in the area which it serves, because in time of accident or illness highly specialised services are available at the discretion of the general medical practitioner, but in time of war the existence of such an institution is a veritable tower of strength. Therefore your Committee despite the many calls upon both your generosity and time without hesitation make an earnest appeal for redoubled efforts and sacrifices for the maintenance and development of this truly essential service.

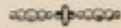

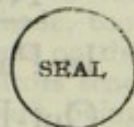

Hospital Workers' Committee

THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

The Thirty-second Annual Report of the Worker's Hospital Committee is presented by its Executive Committee this year with exceptional pleasure: it is the record of a very successful result—the reaching of the target of £8,000 put before it last year. The amount actually raised in Colchester and District during 1942 was £8,204 10s. 0d., and after deducting £46 14s. 0d. for expenses the Hospital received the sum of **£8,157 16s. 0d.**, as against £7,903 12s. 10d. in 1941, (an increase of £254 3s. 2d.) The dislocation of business caused by the war and the transfer of so many workers (both men and women) into the Forces and to work of national importance has created a drop in the amounts sent in from the majority of establishments, but this has been made up by the larger sums received from munitions works, and from several new centres, some of which are only temporary, but none the less very welcome additions to the honourable company of contributors. In addition to this, the Lion Walk office, which continues to go from strength to strength under the able control of Miss L. Jones, increased its contribution of £2,121 3s. 10d. in 1941 to £2,297 16s. 6d. in 1942, an advance of £176 12s. 8d. Considering all things it is felt to be a most encouraging result, and the Executive Committee desire to offer their sincere thanks to everyone concerned in raising this very substantial sum.

It should be pointed out that so far, no raising of the weekly contribution has been asked for. Notwithstanding the largely increased cost of running the Hospital, the contribution still stands at 3d. per week for married persons (to cover the contributor, his wife, and all children of school age for free Hospital treatment), and 2d. per week for single persons (to cover themselves only). This treatment is such as is available at the Essex County Hospital or under certain conditions at other Institutions, but it does not cover treatment in senile and incurable cases. Such as these are not considered to be Hospital cases, and have to be looked after at other Institutions controlled by the Local Government Authorities. It is the Medical Practitioners who decide which cases come in this category, and it should be noted that the Hospital cannot accept financial responsibility for their treatment.

During the year the death occurred of Mr. Geo. W. Doe. He had been a very prominent worker for the Worker's Hospital Committee since it was started thirty-two years ago, firstly as a representative of Messrs. Davey, Paxman & Co. Ltd., and afterwards as the Hospital Committee's representative on the Worker's Executive Committee. He was one of the stalwarts, and in his day had rendered valuable service to the cause he had so much at heart. Notwithstanding his great age he retained his interest in and continued his work for the Committee nearly to the end, and he will be greatly missed by his colleagues. His widow has the sincere sympathy of the Worker's Executive Committee in her great loss.

The Workers' Committee have again been represented on the Hospital Committee by Mr. F. W. Firman, Mr. H. Seaborn, and Mr. G. W. J. Cocker, and many thanks are accorded to them for the time they give to the fortnightly meetings of that Committee. An acknowledgment is made, too, of the very valuable work undertaken by the Ward Visitors, who take on the duty of visiting the wards and chatting to the patients. These visitors send in reports of conditions in the Hospital, and tell of the good work being performed by the Medical and Nursing Staffs, and the Workers' Committee would like again to offer their sincere thanks to both doctors and nurses for all they are doing for the patients.

Report of the Contributory Scheme Funds' Committee

For the Year ended 31st December, 1942

The year under review has presented many obstacles, as, in addition to war-time difficulties, the Country Scheme was for the whole period without the services of a full-time organiser. Fortunately, however, the Committee were able to obtain help from Miss K. M. Wilson, a former clerk in the office of the house governor and secretary of the Hospital, and she acted very efficiently as clerk to the scheme. Shortly after the close of the year your Committee got into touch with Mr. P. H. McLean in connection with the vacancy, and he has now commenced duties as organiser, and Miss Wilson is acting as his part-time clerk. Mr. McLean has had considerable organising experience both in London and in the provinces, and it is hoped that he will soon make contact with all Honorary Local Collectors.

Many Collectors, by reason of health or other causes, have had to discontinue the splendid services which they were rendering to the Hospital and the community, and to these old friends of the Scheme and to all Collectors, not forgetting the new ones who in these busy days have come forward to fill the vacancies caused by resignations, the Committee extend their warmest thanks and gratitude.

It is with great sorrow that the Committee announce the death of the late Mr. F. C. Arthy who had served as Honorary Local Collector at Earls Colne since the inception of the Scheme in 1924. His passing is a great loss and the Committee's condolences have been extended to his daughter.

It is, indeed, a striking tribute to all Honorary Local Collectors that the revenue from the Scheme was £7,550, as compared with £6,881 for the previous year, and while it must not be forgotten that this total has been increased by the receipt of payments which owing to the illness of Mr. C. W. Longley were not collected during the preceding year, this substantial growth of income reflects great credit upon the Collectors whose work is worthy of the highest praise. The Town Scheme also made progress, and the income from both Schemes totalled £15,755; a total increase of £953 over the previous year.

Despite the ever growing costs of labour and materials, the rate of weekly payments has not yet been raised. The matter, however, is now under consideration, and it is felt that before long contributors will have to be asked to share in carrying the greater financial burden falling upon the Hospital.

For the guidance of Collectors and Contributors, especially the newcomers, the Committee once again set out the rules governing the Schemes:

1. Persons whose incomes fall within the following limits are eligible for membership of the Schemes:

Single persons, and married couples without dependants	£250 p. a.	} excluding war bonuses and similar allow- ances.
Married Couples, with dependants	£300 p. a.	

2. A payment of 3d. weekly provides for contributor, wife, children (under sixteen if at school) and all other dependants; or single persons and their dependants. A dependant is a relative normally resident with and wholly dependent on the contributor.

A payment of 2d. weekly provides for single persons.

3. There is a waiting period of twelve weeks before and contributor is entitled to the privileges of the Schemes. Any arrears of contributions must be paid before the privileges of the Schemes are granted, and any person thirteen weeks in arrear loses his title to such privileges.
4. Contributors who are in benefit are entitled to free treatment at the Essex County Hospital, Colchester, either as In-patients or Out-patients, and no enquiries are made into their financial circumstances. When, for adequate reasons, contributors are afforded such treatment at other hospitals, grants towards the cost thereof are made by the Schemes.
5. Payments are made on behalf of contributors receiving Service in Municipal Hospitals provided such cases be medically eligible for admission to and retention in the Essex County Hospital, but not admitted because beds be not available or for some other adequate reason.
6. Contributors wishing to receive treatment in the Essex County Hospital Private Patients' Department, are allowed a rebate of 30/- a week from the customary weekly maintenance charge of £6 6s. 0d. This privilege cannot be extended to contributors who may enter the Private Wings of other Hospitals.
7. Old Age Pensioners of 70 years of age or more need not continue their weekly payments to the Schemes as they are entitled to free treatment at the Essex County Hospital, but old age pensioners between 65 and 70 years of age must continue their payments or they will lose their title to privileges.

8. The Contributory Schemes do not accept responsibility for:
- (i) Medical fees, and medical treatments such as are normally provided by general practitioners outside the Hospital.
 - (ii) Treatment in a Private Nursing Home.
 - (iii) Tuberculosis, Mental Cases, Infectious Diseases, Normal Maternity Cases, and Chronic, Incurable and Senile Cases.
 - (iv) War Disabilities for which the Ministry of Pensions is responsible.
 - (v) Injuries received in motor accidents which fall within the provisions of the Road Traffic Acts, and cases within the provisions of the Public Health Acts, or other enactments.

Finally the Committee in again congratulating Collectors on their great achievement, look forward with confidence to the continuance with unabated vigour of their great work during 1943.

Report, 1942.

It is with pleasure that the Committee of the Ladies' Linen League can report that in spite of all difficulties the receipts for the year 1942 show an increase of about £40. 0s. 0d. Naturally the same happy state of affairs cannot be reported with regard to the gifts of linen, etc., which have decreased from 1,427 articles in 1941 to 411 in the past year. With the increase in rationed goods and the prices now pertaining this is understandable.

The Committee would like to express their appreciation and thanks to Mrs. Bird for the sum of £9. 10s. 0d. raised by means of a Whist Drive at Shrub End; to Mrs. McMullen for £6. 2s. 4d. the proceeds of a "Bring and Buy" sale at Goldhanger, and to Mrs. Gilmour for the sum of £3. 4s. 0d. representing the proceeds of a special effort which she

organised in Alresford. Special efforts of this kind are particularly welcome as the calls on Linen League Funds increase. The work of the Hospital grows ever heavier and replacements of linen more and more costly.

The accounts also reveal an enormous increase under the heading of purchase of linen—£685.0s. 0d. as compared with £161.0s. 0d. during the previous year. As already suggested there is a three-fold cause for this rise in expenditure, namely, the continued decreased gifts in kind and consequent necessity of making larger purchases, the soaring prices of the articles which the League has had to buy, and the greater quantity of linen needed as a result of the expansion of the Hospital's work for the sick and injured. Indeed, so great were the Hospital's needs that your President was forced to make a further request to the Committee of Management for a grant of £150.0s. 0d. to enable those needs to be satisfied, and despite this grant and a balance of £280.0s. 0d. at the beginning of the year, the accounts closed with a balance in hand of only £49.0s. 0d. It cannot, therefore, be too strongly emphasized that now gifts of linen are almost unprocurable, personal donations and monies raised by whist drives, dances, and other entertainments are most urgently needed by the Linen League Funds. There is every indication that the requirements of the Hospital during the year 1943 will be very substantial, and the small balance of £49.0s. 0d. must be added to quickly and considerably if the future is to be faced with confidence.

It is with deep regret that the death is recorded of Mrs. James Hines, an Honorary Vice-President of the League since 1916, and for many years a member of the Committee and a most generous benefactress to the Hospital in many ways.

Although at the present time the Committee can no longer boast that the Linen League funds are able to meet the needs of the Hospital in this department, yet the members of the League feel proud of the result of yet another year's work in these most difficult days.

LADIES' LINEN LEAGUE.

The object of the League is to provide the Hospital with Household Linen, Sheets, Blankets, Pillow Cases, etc.

RULES.

- 1.—The League shall consist of Patron, President, Vice-Presidents, Honorary Vice-Presidents and Associates, Hon Secretary (or Secretaries), and Hon. Treasurer. From these an Executive Committee will be appointed of which the Matron will be an *ex-officio* member.
- 2.—Vice-Presidents shall undertake to find not less than six Associates and to send in two articles of linen with a subscription of 2/6 a year.
- 3.—Vice-Presidents by payment of £1/1/- annually shall be exempt from the responsibility of Rule 2 and become Honorary Vice-Presidents.
4. Each Associate shall undertake to send to her Vice-President two articles of linen and a subscription of 1/- a year.
- 5.—A General Meeting of the League to be held once a year at the Hospital.
- 6.—(*For Vice-Presidents only*). Subscriptions and Donations to be collected and sent in by the Vice-Presidents to the Hon. Secretaries or Treasurer, on or before May 15th. All contributions of linen to be sent direct to the Matron, Essex County Hospital, also on or before May 15th in each year.

To the Benevolent when making their Wills.
