

# REPORT

of the Council of Management for the Year ended 31st December, 1945

THE Council of Management has pleasure in presenting its Thirty-fifth Report for the year ended 31st December, 1945.

The Balance Sheet shows an Excess of Expenditure over Income of £1,829 6s. 2d. Much of the increase in expenditure is due to the general rise in costs, fuel, materials, etc., although the partial decoration of the Institute, £680, an expensive but much overdue piece of work, accounted for a considerable portion of the excess.

The Agreement with the Sheffield Hospitals' Council has again been renewed and the Council of Management takes this opportunity of thanking the Contributors' Association for the support given to the Institute.

Owing to the shortage of trained Staff the work of the Institute has, of necessity, been curtailed to some extent. This has led to some reduction in the number of patients treated and in the number of attendances made by them. With the cessation of hostilities the number of physiotherapists required in Military Hospitals should be less and the Council hopes that the services of more masseuses will be available for the Institute, for it is essential that the Massage Staff should be kept up to strength if the work of the Institute is to be carried on unimpaired.

The Council regrets to report the loss the Institute has sustained through the deaths of Mr. C. K. Everitt and Mr. F. Firth, during the year under review.

Mr. Everitt had been a Member of the Council of Management and Executive Committee for several years and had been President of the Institute since 1941.

It is noted, with pleasure, that Mr. L. K. Everitt, kindly consented to serve on the Council of Management and Executive Committee and to be elected President in the place of his father.

Mr. Firth had been a representative of the Contributors' Association since 1939, and so long as his health permitted he regularly attended all Meetings of the Executive Committee.

The Council welcomes Mr. W. Lofthouse, nominated by the Sheffield Hospitals' Council, in place of the late Mr. F. Firth, and it is also pleased to report the return of Mr. S. P. Smith, the Honorary Secretary, and Mr. E. A. Barker, on their return from service with the Forces.

More news is awaited of the proposed National Health Bill, but it is of interest to note that the Minister of Health, when speaking to the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy at the beginning of the year, emphasized the importance of physiotherapy. In view of the remarks made by the Minister of Health at this Meeting, the Council is of the opinion that the experience and facilities of the Institute should be utilized to the fullest extent. To this end the Institute is desirous of working in very close co-operation with the Royal Sheffield Infirmary and Hospital.

The Council is pleased to report the receipt of legacies from the Executors of the late Mr. J. Ward and of the late Mrs. E. L. Vincent.

In conclusion, the Council of Management thanks all Members of the Staff for their loyal service and it also acknowledges with gratitude the support and interest of all subscribers.

# Report of the Medical Director

THE year 1945 was a period of great activity in the history of the Institute, and it was also a period of very considerable difficulty. We were called upon to treat large numbers of patients and this we had to accomplish in the face of severe shortages of staff and of accommodation, together with difficulties in obtaining apparatus and materials. Amongst these difficulties, by far the most serious was that arising from the shortage of trained staff. I can only say that we have done our best with the limited means at our disposal. We must hope that as conditions become more settled we shall be able to bring our staff up to its proper strength, so that we may be ready for the tasks which the future may bring. It seems probable that the forthcoming changes in the medical services of the country will bring with them an increased requirement for the special methods of treatment employed at the Institute; indeed, increased facilities for physiotherapy appear to be one of the chief benefits promised by the new hospital system. I am in hopes that the Institute, in association with the other medical institutions of the City, will play a worthy part in providing the increased facilities for physiotherapy for the benefit of the community.

It is with deep regret that I allude to the approaching resignation by Mr. Harland of the Chairmanship of the Executive Committee. My regret is not only that of the Medical Director, but is also of a very personal nature. Mr. Harland's wisdom has guided the Institute through many difficulties and he has been a steady friend to the Medical Director and to every member of the staff, by whom he is regarded with respect, gratitude and affection. So great is Mr. Harland's insight into the special point of view of a doctor, that it has often been a source of regret to me that he was not himself a member of the medical profession, for the world would have gained a great physician or surgeon.

In concluding my remarks I have pleasure in acknowledging the co-operation and help given by the Deputy Medical Directors, Mr. Ferguson Wilson and Mr. Dornan, and the other members of the Medical Staff, and I also pay a special tribute to the manner in which the Matron and the rest of the Staff have carried out their duties under circumstances which have often been of great difficulty.

## NOTE ON TREATMENT.

THE Institute is equipped for the carrying out of the various methods of physical treatment. It possesses a set of the Zander apparatus, part of which is power-driven for the performance of passive manipulations, and part of which is designed for active exercises.

The Institute also possesses a complete electrical installation for treatment by means of galvanism, faradism, high frequency, diathermy, short-wave therapy and ionization. It is provided with a set of whirlpool baths, and apparatus for treatment by means of radiant heat, and it is equipped for treatment by means of the Ultra-Violet Rays. Treatment by means of Therapeutic Mud Baths is also provided.

Massage, remedial exercises and re-education are carried out by a trained massage staff in specially-equipped gymnasia.

When necessary, manipulations under anæsthesia are performed.

Attention is paid to the provision and fitting of orthopædic and surgical appliances. Certain types of splints are made at the Institute.

The following may be mentioned as types of the morbid conditions treated:—

- (1) The results of injuries to bones, joints and muscles; the results of nerve lesions.
- (2) Arthritic conditions, as rheumatoid arthritis, osteoarthritis and allied diseases; general rheumatic conditions, including myalgia and fibrositis.
- (3) Neuritis; sciatica; certain general nervous diseases, especially those requiring re-education; functional nervous diseases.
- (4) Orthopædic cases, including scoliosis, the results of infantile paralysis and rickets, and congenital malformations.

No patients are accepted for treatment without the sanction of their usual medical attendant.

### ADMITTANCE OF PATIENTS TO TREATMENT.

THE Institute is a charitable Institution chiefly supported by voluntary contributions. Subscribers receive a "Recommend" for each guinea subscribed. For one month's treatment two "Recommends" are required.

Patients who are requiring but are unable to obtain "Recommends" should apply to the General Secretary for the names of Subscribers to whom application may be made.

Private Patients: The fees for private patients are 8/- an attendance or alternatively £7 for a course of 20 treatments, the course to be completed within two consecutive months. These charges cover all services with the exception of X-ray, surgical appliances or manipulative treatment under anæsthesia. There is a separate Block for Private Patients. The entrance to this is 50 yards lower down Gell Street from the main entrance.

The Institute is now recognized by the Ministry of Health as an Additional Benefit (No. 16) for the treatment of rheumatism. Any patient desiring to receive treatment under this Additional Benefit should make application to his or her Approved Society.

Patients contributing to the Sheffield "1d. in the £" Scheme, and their dependents, may receive treatment on production of a "1d. in the £" Scheme Letter of Introduction.

All patients coming for treatment should be provided with the approval of their usual medical attendant.

ONLY OUT-patients are treated as the Institution does not provide in-patient accommodation.

It is preferable that in the case of private patients appointments should be made by telephone or otherwise.
