Minutes of the Forty-second Annual Meeting.

The Forty-second Annual Meeting of Governors and Subscribers was held at the Hospital on Wednesday, March 5th, 1930, at 3-30 p.m.

The President, the Right Honourable Lord NORTHBOURNE, was in the chair.

The Secretary read the notice convening the meeting and the Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were signed as a correct record of the proceedings at such meeting.

A letter of regret for unavoidable absence was read from the Mayor and Mayoress of Gateshead, and apologies were also received from Ald. Mrs. A. M. Wicks, Mr. H. E. Galloway and Dr. J. T. Dunn.

The Secretary read the Forty-second Report of the Committee of Management, *which with the other Reports is printed in the following pages.*

Dr. Gilbert presented the report of the Honorary Medical and Dental Staff. He pointed out that the number of cases treated in certain departments showed a slight decrease through the Hospital being partly closed for cleaning and also owing to the "Sunlight Rooms" being closed for some 6 weeks for repairs and overhaul but the demands on the Hospital are still as heavy as ever.

The report presented on behalf of the Honorary Treasurer showed a loss for the year despite economies in nearly all sections of the Expenditure.

Upon questions being invited a Governor asked the position of the Hospital so far as De-Rating was concerned and what amount the Institution would save. It was pointed out that as the Hospital had never previously been rated it was impossible to give any figure.

A question was asked regarding the time children are kept in the Institution under treatment in certain circumstances and after the matter had been dealt with by Dr. Gilbert and the Matron

it was referred to the Committee of Management for any further consideration necessary.

The question of treatment of patients with Letters of Recommendation and those without Letters was also dealt with, it being particularly pointed out that in urgent and necessary cases the question of having a Letter of Recommendation did not enter into the matter.

Lord Northbourne proposed the adoption of the Reports and Accounts.

He expressed his great pleasure at again being present at the Annual Meeting.

Commenting on the work of the Hospital during the year His Lordship remarked that :—" Until there is a clearance of slums in Gateshead these distressing cases of illness will continue to prevail among the children, despite the advance of science."

Many cases of a shocking nature were brought to the hospital, said his Lordship, but, considering the conditions under which many people were living it was not surprising. " I am not in favour of giving up the voluntary support system. In the better world we all hope for, our greatest desire is that the ailments from which the little people attending the hospital suffer will be obliterated. But these desirable changes will not take place in a moment; and, in the meantime, we have children who are suffering from ailments which should not exist in a civilized age. One can't walk along the road without finding examples of barbarism."

Commenting on the adverse balance his Lordship said it was wonderful how institutions were able to keep their heads above water at all and it was amazing how people support them in view of the excessive taxation to which we are subject.

No country in the world has such generous supporters of charity and there appears no sign of waning and, said Lord Northbourne, I for one will not throw up the sponge at present.

An adverse balance is no uncommon thing, but he urged all to extra efforts to put matters right.

His Lordship concluded by saying that nothing goes to one's heart so much as the suffering of children and alleviation of that suffering and preventing the diseases from which these children suffer.

Lieut.-Col. G. R. B. Spain, seconding the motion, expressed appreciation of the services of the medical staff, hon. treasurer and joint secretaries.

It was proposed by Canon Stephenson that the President, Vice-Presidents, Patroness, Vice-Patronesses, Trustees, Lady Visitors, Honorary Treasurer, Joint Honorary Secretaries, Matron, Dispenser and Honorary Auditors with the exception of the late Mr. Edward Watson, W. Swinburne and Mrs. M. King be re-elected.

This was seconded by Mr. J. C. Christophers, who feelingly referred to the loss sustained by the Hospital in the death of Mr. Edward Watson.

The Secretaries reported that in accordance with the rules there were six vacancies on the Committee of Management and the House Committee and two in the Workmen's Charity Representatives.

Nominations equal in number to the vacancies had been received for the Management and House Committees and therefore no ballot was necessary. As regards the Workmen's Charity Representatives no nominations had been received, and it would remain for the Committee of Management to fill the vacancies.

Mr. Stoddard moved and Mr. W. Smeaton seconded: "That the thanks of the Governors be given to the Honorary Medical and Dental Staff, Subscribers, Donors, the Teachers of the Day, Voluntary, and Sunday Schools, the House Committee, the Committee of Management, the Ladies comprising the Sewing Guild, the Honorary Treasurer, the Joint Honorary Secretaries, and the Honorary Auditor."

This resolution was warmly carried.

On behalf of the Saltwell Bowling Club, Mr. Stoddard handed over to the President a cheque for £22 10s. 0d., being the proceeds of a special effort made by his Club on behalf of the "Sunlight

Rooms" He commented on the keen interest his Club members took in the Hospital and how willingly the people supported them in their efforts for the Institution.

Lord Northbourne in accepting the cheque conveyed to Mr. Stoddard the grateful thanks of the Committee for the donation and remarked that he thought it was a magnificent effort for one Club to obtain such an excellent result from one effort and he urged other Clubs to follow the example shown by this Club. This was the Saltwell Club's third successive donation each one being larger than the previous one and he hoped they would go on increasing.

Mr. H. C. Watson, Chairman of the Committee of Management moved that the thanks of the Governors be accorded to Lord Northbourne for coming again and presiding. He pointed out how grateful we were to His Lordship for the inconvenience he must put himself to in attending the meeting.

Mr. F. J. Thompson heartily seconded the proposal which was carried with acclamation.

Lord Northbourne suitably replied and stated what a pleasure it was to him to attend.

Forty-second Annual Report,

FOR THE YEAR 1929.

MY LORD, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

During the past year the work of the Hospital has continued to progress, although no further extensions have been made to cope with it.

The record of work done will be given in the Report of the Honorary Medical and Surgical Staff and the Honorary Treasurer will acquaint you with the financial position and Balance Sheet for 1929.

At the outset your Committee feel that they would like to express their thankfulness for the receipt of certain benefactions:

Lord Joicey, £1,700 Local Loans Stock, to endow a cot in memory of his daughter.

Gateshead Carnival Committee, £200.

Birtley Special Effort Fund, £42.

Mrs. Leybourne, Bridge and Whist, £25.

J. W. Porter, deceased, legacy, £48.

T. Watson, deceased, legacy, £1,000.

"Gloopers," per Uncle Nick, £50.

Mrs. Wallace, deceased, legacy, £18 18s. 0d.

It is with regret that we record the death of Mr. Edward Watson for 32 years Secretary of the Hospital, Mr. W. Swinburne, Mrs. H. F. Fallaw, Mrs. M. King, Mr. H. Noble, Mr. H. C. Embleton, Mr. James Tennant and Mrs. J. A. Sisson all Life Governors.

Some changes in the Medical Staff have occurred during the year. Dr. G. H. Norris was compelled to resign through ill-health. As a mark of recognition Dr. Norris was appointed by your Committee as an Honorary Consulting Physician.

Dr. John Galloway, after faithful and devoted service has also resigned, having left the district.

Drs. McLellan and Shanks have been appointed to fill these vacancies.

Your Committee has under consideration the Local Government Act, 1929, and its possible effect on voluntary institutions. The Minister of Health has given an assurance of his desire that the development of a closer co-ordination between the Voluntary Hospitals and the Public Health services should be achieved without prejudice to the voluntary principle.

The Hospital has been rated substantially under the new Assessment, though no rates have been demanded hitherto. Needless to say, charges of this kind would seriously handicap the Hospital financially, and strenuous efforts are being made by your Committee to be relieved of this obligation if possible.

In connection with "Health Week" it was acknowledged that the "Open Day" at the Hospital proved of great usefulness, and the Committee have to thank the British Fruit Traders' Association for a gift of fruit used in their display that week.

The Michaelmas Mart conducted by the House Committee proved a profitable venture and promises much success in future similar undertakings.

We are greatly indebted to the Ladies' May Day Fund Committee for building and fitting up a greenhouse. This is a distinct acquisition to the Hospital and fills a much needed want. Its value for forcing and growing food-plants, etc., is obvious.

The building of the wall on the North boundary has proved a great boon, but there are certain necessary extensions, etc., becoming urgent such as a small Tonsils and Adenoids Treatment Ward, additional accommodation for Light Treatment, efficient Lift, etc.

The Committee would like to express their keen appreciation of the services of the Honorary Medical and Dental Staff and the Masseuse and Dispenser and of the Matron, Sisters and Nursing and general Staff, and for their devotion to the interests of the Institution.

In conclusion the Committee wish to record its thanks and gratitude to all who have assisted the Hospital either by contribution, service or gifts in kind.

The continued advance in Medical and Surgical knowledge and the discovery of new methods of treatment all show that there is no finality in Hospital work. Those responsible for the task of continuing and enlarging the scope of the Hospital activities fully realise the grave responsibility of their trust, and are determined, given that measure of support which the service merits, to continue in their effort for increasing efficiency and usefulness.

Medical Staff Report.

MY LORD, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

The Medical Staff have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report.

The character of the work done has been much the same as in previous years. It will be seen that there has been an increase in some departments and a decrease in others. The decrease is partly accounted for by closure of the wards for painting. In the Sunlight Department there were not quite so many treatments, owing to repairs to the instruments. This meant they were out of action for about six weeks, and also the fine summer allowed the patients to get the natural sunlight on the balconies, and so much artificial light was not required for the in-patients.

The increase of deaths is partly accounted for by the severe winter and the consequent admission of children with serious chest complaints, some of whom were in an almost moribund condition.

The greater part of that adverse balance is to be explained by the fact that we have had to meet a large and quite unusual expense in the shape of replacing the old fence on our South boundary by a brick wall, the cost of which was £253 17s. 1d. This was made necessary by the sale of adjoining property for development. Other items of expenditure show that the usual careful economy of management has been maintained, so that the loss on the year may serve to remind us that no slackening of our plea for support from the public of Gateshead is possible.

It has not been possible to realise last year our hopes of clearing the buildings from debt, but the amount remaining has been reduced to £166 12s. 10d., which should be finally cleared during the present year.

The full accounts as certified by the Honorary Auditors will be printed and circulated as usual as part of the complete Annual Report.
