

### GRIMSBY AND DISTRICT GENERAL HOSPITAL.

The Managing Committee presents its Sixty-eighth Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1945, in an abbreviated form. In order to conserve on the use of paper this report will not be circulated as in pre-war years, but a copy can be had by any Governor or Subscriber to the Hospital on application to the Secretary.

In-Patients numbered 3,939, and 12,810 Out-Patients made 44,115 re-attendances. One Ward is still allocated to Service cases and the Ministry of Health reservation for

E.M.S. cases is 40 beds.

Average daily patients in Hospital was 185.

Average daily patients attending the Out-Patients Department was 121.

All cases of an urgent nature have been admitted at once but due to commitments to the Service Departments, and the difficulties of staffing, it is regretted that there had to be some retarding of the admission of non-acute cases, but it will be the endeavour of the Committee to seek every possible means to provide treatment for all, at the earliest opportunity.

An abbreviated report does not allow a record of individual benevolence but the Committee place on record their sincere thanks to all who by their encouraging financial assistance have made it possible to achieve a record income of £69,151, being an increase of £3,836 over the previous year. The ordinary expenditure of £60,894 is £10,091 in advance of the previous year. Donations, Hospital Contributors' Association and Investments account for the rise in income, and nine months occupancy of the new Annexe Rehabilitation Department and Salary Scales are the main reasons for the increase in expenditure.

Dr. J. Williamson who has retired from active practice has consented to join the Managing Committee as a private member. Unfortunately, there is a vacancy on the Committee by the deaths of two of our stalwarts, Mr. George Grant and Mr. G. W. Woods. The passing of these colleagues leaves the Hospital and the community very much poorer.

Mr. J. W. Gale unfortunately had to resign his membership of the Finance Committee for business reasons.

Upon his retirement, Mr. Albert Barter, Town Clerk of Cleethorpes, resigned his position on the Managing Committee, and was succeeded by the new Town Clerk of Cleethorpes, Mr. G. Sutcliffe.

It is with pleasure that the Committee record the appointment of Sir Walter Womersley, Bart., J.P., as Vice-President.

Medical Staff

The sincere thanks of the patients and Committee are recorded to Members of the Visiting Medical Staff who attend the Hospital and patients at all hours of the day and night, give lectures to nurses and assist very materially in the administration of the Hospital by their attendance at Committee meetings.

Dr. J. Williamson resigned his post as Honorary Surgeon to the Hospital, a post he has filled since 1905. Dr. Williamson was also for many years Secretary of the Honorary Staff Committee.

Mr. C. L. Granville Chapman resigned his post as Honorary Surgeon to the Hospital, a post he had held since July, 1919. Throughout the war years, Mr. Chapman has also been Chairman of the Honorary Staff Committee.

Mr. J. McKerchar resigned his post as Honorary Surgeon

to the Hospital, a post he has filled since 1921.

Mr. J. J. Rainforth resigned his post as Ear, Nose and Throat Consultant as and from December, 1945, a post he filled since 1943.

The resignations, due to retirement of the foregoing Members of the Honorary Staff leaves a considerable gap in the Hospital services, which will be exceedingly hard to fill. These Honorary Officers have made remarkable advances in their respective fields of work and many patients in the town and area owe them considerable tribute for services rendered.

Mr. M. S. Harrison, M.B., Ch.B., M.D., F.R.C.S., F.R.C.P., has joined the Staff as Ear, Nose and Throat Surgeon.

Mr. S. E. Duff is now able to give more service as a General Surgeon.

Dr. J. Macarthur, the Honorary Psychiatrist, has extended his service to patients by now holding a clinic on the first and third Wednesdays of each month.

Dr. A. H. D. Richmond who rendered considerable services to the Hospital as Honorary Anaesthetist before joining the Royal Navy, unfortunately passed away during the year whilst still in the Navy.

The Committee record with great satisfaction the approval of the Hospital by the Ministry of Health for Post Medical Studies Scheme, whereby medical men returning from the Forces can take a six months' course as Resident Medical Officer to rehabilitate themselves in their profession.

Captain R. Lawson, M.C., a former House Physician, has already been appointed under this scheme and others are expected during the coming year.

During the year, 8 Nurses passed the Final State Nursing. Certificate and 13 passed the Preliminary examination. The best thanks of the Committee are accorded to the Honorary Lecturers, Mr. J. T. McCullagh, Dr. F. W. Tabois, Mr. C. R. Macdonald, and Mr. C. W. Spendelow, for their able assistance. On December 31st there were 48 nurses in training.

Through the kindness of Mrs. K. Letten, the Nursing Staff have been accommodated in her home at "Hazlemere" throughout the year, but it is hoped very shortly that the Nurses' Hostel at 13, Queen's Parade, which will accommodate twelve members of the Night Nursing Staff,

will be out of the hands of the contractors.

Unfortunately it has to be recorded that Sister M. S. Jakes, who had to retire a year ago on account of ill health, passed away shortly before the end of the year. She did not have a very long, or happy retirement, and her colleagues place on record their sympathy with her relatives.

Steps have been taken during the year to associate with other Hospitals in the county and participate in a Group Preliminary Training School, which for convenience will be arranged at Lincoln. There will be four classes for Students yearly and as soon as this School is open the Committee will be able to send six students for each class. The cost will be £25 per student.

The Committee is assured that this additional service for Student Nurses will be of inestimable value.

Members of the South Parade School Red Cross Link attended the Annexe during their school holidays and gave invaluable assistance to the Nursing Staff in looking after the younger patients in this Department.

HOSPITAL CONTRIBUTORS' ASSOCIATION. The Cash Gifts. Managing Committee record with thanks another wonderful contribution of £24,148, being an increase of £1,203 over the previous year, and a further service so vitally necessary, the provision of an Ambulance Service for patients. This service has been increased during the year by the provision of one new ambulance costing £1,500 and one ambulance donated by the American Red Cross, Great Britain. The total fleet available for patients of the Hospital is now five.

It will also be noted that £1,890 has been paid to other Hospitals for the treatment of contributors.

Hospital Saturday collection amounted to £1,134, and Hospital Sunday collection totalled £577, an increase of £80.

A further service to contributors was inaugurated during the year in conjunction with Grimsby Corporation and any contributor being admitted to Scarthoe Road Infirmary is not assessed for payment for his maintenance if a contributor's voucher is produced. This further service to contributors cost the Hospital £1,289 paid to Grimsby Corporation during the year.

Space precludes the publication of all the splendid financial assistance that goes to make a total income of £69,151, but to all annual subscribers, organisers of efforts, members of the Ex-Patients' League, donors of equipped beds, and the many other ways people of the town and district support financially the funds of this Hospital, the very sincere thanks of the Committee are recorded.

Gitts. The Committee place on record their deep appreciation to many good-natured members of the public for gifts in kind during the year.

The gifts add considerably to the comfort of patients, all of whom are deeply appreciative of this service.

The Committee have in mind the great need of patients convalescence. for Convalescent Home facilities. Grainsby Hall was offered for such a purpose, but unfortunately it was not found suitable. Mablethorpe Convalescent Home has been in the hands of the Military and will not be ready for occupation for some considerable months, but it hoped to use some of the facilities at the Alexandra Hospital, Woodhall Spa.

The Committee have spent considerable time during the General Staffing. year on the question of obtaining additional staffs for all departments.

As the Governors are aware this is a very important problem and has a very great effect on the treatment of patients.

Salaries and wages rates have been approved on National and Regional scales for all classes now employed in hospitals and the Committee has put into effect these approved scales.

The Secretary of the Hospital represents Lincolnshire Voluntary Hospitals on the National Joint Council for Hospital Staffs.

Development.

CANCER CASES. As instanced in previous years the Hospital is an Approved Hospital under the Cancer Act, 1939 and very wide-spread arrangements are made in Lincolnshire for the treatment of this class of patient. It is now the desire of the National Radium Commission to extend a co-ordinated scheme over the whole of the East Midlands and this Hospital was represented during the year at a conference in Sheffield for this purpose.

CARDIOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT. Plans have been prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Health for the erection of a Cardiological Department on the west side of the Hospital. This scheme will give facilities to Dr. J. W. Brown, to practice his speciality and it is expected that the sum of £3,000 will be required to build and equip such a Department. As soon as the licence is obtained it is hoped that the development of this department will proceed.

LADIES' GUILD. All members of the Committee are very glad to welcome back the Members of the Ladies' Hospital Guild. This very efficient organisation has throughout the war maintained and staffed the Grimsby War Supply Depôt. Now they have returned to their peace-time activities and a sewing meeting is held every Tuesday in the Hospital Board Room.

REGISTRATION DEPARTMENT. The new Registry for all clerical work in connection with patients, Appointments' Bureau, and statistics, was opened during the year. This new department gives very welcome facilities to the important duty of maintaining proper records of patients. The building was a gift of the Ministry of Health. The erection and fitting a cost to the Hospital Committee. This department had been accommodated in one of the rooms in South Parade Chapel very kindly loaned by the Trustees throughout the war. It has now been possible to release these premises and the Committee place on record their appreciation to the Trustees of the South Parade Chapel for their very kindly co-operation through the difficult war years.

NEW ANNEXE. In March the new Annexe premises for in-patients and the new Rehabilitation Department for out-patients was formally opened by The Rt. Hon. Malcolm S. McCorquodale, M.P., Joint Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Labour and National Service, who was accompanied by The Rt. Hon. Sir Walter Womersley, Minister of Pensions, and General R. W. D. Leslie, C.B.E. Ministry of

Health Hospital Officer. 173 patients have been transferred to the Annexe during the year and had the benefit of recovering from their operations under ideal surroundings. Further, since the 1st April, over 30 patients daily have been attending the Rehabilitation Department going home each evening. These patients have made over 4,000 attendances since the 1st April, when the Department was opened. This new departure in Hospital work has been of inestimable benefit to the many patients who attend there daily. Amongst these have been Service cases evacuated from overseas, ex-Prisoners of War, in addition to casualties occurring in the industrial side of the community's life, and the Committee is assured that the work carried on in this new Department has justified the time and expense in this development.

DIETARY. Notwithstanding food problems, common to everyone, very careful consideration has been given during the year to the food of patients and Staffs. The Housekeeping Sister attended a course organised by the Ministry of Health and a Ministry of Health Visiting Dietition who attended the Hospital examined the feeding arrangements for patients and staff and discussed the variety of diet, reported favourably to the Ministry and the Committee on the arrangements at the

Hospital.

With the end of hostilities it has now been possible for End of the Committee to make some arranements for removing the Hostilities. various protective works carried out at the Hospital early in the war. It has now been possible to revert very nearly to peacetime arrangements for such important items as ventilation and lighting. In view of the Government's requirements for bed accommodation it has not yet been possible to reduce the wartime bed complement and some of the Wards are distinctly overcrowded. Arrangements will be made as soon

as possible to eliminate this difficulty.

It is interesting to note that since the commencement of the War to the end of hostilities, 5,611 in-patients and 54,428 out-patients attendances have been treated as a direct result of the war, and the Committee take very great pleasure in recording the services that the Hospital has been able to render to members of the Forces, Merchant Navy, Air Raid Casualties, War Pensioners, etc. Tributes for these services has been received from the Prime Minister on behalf of His Majesty's Government, the Minister of Health, Consular Officials, and the Officer Commanding the Royal Naval Sick Quarters.

Service.

National Health The Members of the Committee desire to assure Governors and friends of the Hospital that it is their earnest desire to cooperate to the fullest extent in any arrangements made by the Central Government for the inauguration of a National Health Service. The efficient treatment of all classes of patient must be the first consideration in any scheme of Hospital services. A plan has been suggested by the British Hospitals' Association whereby Voluntary Hospitals can take their part in the future service without in any way eliminating local support and interest in the development of the Hospital. The Members of the Hospital Committee are not inclined to be carried away by the panicky paragraphs appearing in some sections of the National Press, as they are sure that the Minister of Health on behalf of His Majesty's Government will be the last to in any way reduce the interest in the Hospital and patients taken by every member of the Community. The Committee hope therefore that when the plan of the Government is available it will be found that although some control and direction of services will be necessary, that the management and development of this Hospital, as in other voluntary hospitals, will be vested in the Managing Committee which is representative of so many interests in the town and district.

Appreciation.

In an abbreviated report it is not possible to record the kindly services received by the Hospital patients throughout the year from so many generous friends—some give of their

time and ability, others of their financial resources.

Again, the Hospital receives considerable gifts in kind which assist both the comfort and dietary of patients. To all who have rendered service in any way during the past year the most appreciative and sincere thanks of the Committee are accorded and an earnest hope is expressed that in the very difficult period that lies ahead the Hospital Managing Committee and the patients of the Hospital will continue to receive an even greater measure of support than in the past.

### HOSPITAL CONTRIBUTORS' ASSOCIATION.

Contributions received during 1945, amounted to £24,148, representing an increase of £1,202.

The Association has raised on behalf of the Hospital the

sum of £220,620, since it was founded in May, 1890.

Further, members of the Hospital Contributors' Association have rendered faithful and voluntary service to the Hospital and its funds extending over forty years.

The Ambulance Service inaugurated in May, 1941, rendered great service during the War years, with particular

benefit to contributors and dependants.

During 1945, the Service carried 8,500 Patients involving a total of 45,220 miles, and the cost of maintenance for that year was £2,000.

Subscriptions received to this fund amounted to £2,300.

The sum of £142 was paid to the Hospital account during the year, and for the assistance I have received from members of the Committee I should like to express my thanks.

Veal Ward was allocated wholly to Service cases throughout the War. From the Royal Navy crews were received from ships, large and small, and some ships with notable service are found in our records-His Majesty's Ships, "Southampton," "Birmingham," "Jaquar," "Express" are the names of a few of them.

Nearly every unit of the Army is recorded-Guards, Loyals, Lincolns, Norfolks, County Regiments and Yeomen. as well as Royal Regiment of Artillery, Service, Signals, Medical, etc.

The Air Force numbers are very large and the adjacent air fields contributed their quota of patients, particularly during the intensive bombing of Germany.

In the early stage of the War, considerable Hospital service was rendered to shipwrecked crews of the Merchant Navy, British, Allied, and Foreign Seamen were treated. British Sailors, Trawlermen, Poles from s.s. "Pilsudski," Lascars from s.s. "Mangalore," Frenchmen from s.s. "E Labine" and many other are to be found in the registers.

Our own folk injured in air raids, both civilian and Civil Defence personnel, are included in the total, and casualties from "incidents" like some of the following will no doubt be a reminder of perils now happily removed:—Lord Street, Riby Square, Albert Street, Guildford Street, Anti-Personnel Raid and many others.

Patients from many lands and towns far away know Grimsby by the service rendered at the Grimsby General Hospital during the war years, and the community in general owe a deep debt of gratitude to all classes of hospital staff, paid and voluntary, for services rendered over the six years of War.
